


















#### SENIORS -- AFT AND FOREWARD

Eloise Jenkins is very patriotic so we are giving her some postage stamps to keep up the army morale.


Gwendolyn Favorite who is a very good designer has won a design scholarship from the University of Minnesota for her good work in designing dresses.

Then in come Elviry (Pat Utter) and Hiram (Royel Webster) Skaggs, Amy's grandparents, straight from the hillbilly country, and the fun riot gets well under way. This Beane chap isn't too tough to get along with because he's got a sense of humor which makes for a touch and go sort of contest between him and John. Zoe Dudley, (Gwendolyn Favorite) has marital problems with her greasy garage mechanic husband Bob (James Kneale). Mrs. Worthington Belcher, (Rose Marie Cavender) Burley's social climbing aunt, does not help in the solution of their problems.

The play was well attended and the proceeds will be used to defray the expenses of the senior trip.

#### ALL GUMMED UP

Romance and adventure in a candy factory sgainst an up-to-the-minute background of Defense, Priorities and Rubber Rationing are the keynotes of this new comedy. These terms don't sound particularly drametic but the author has cleverly used them as topical meterial in a play that is hilariously funny, telling as it does the story of the completely cherming but absolutely inept Hemming family who, trying to carry on the family business of making gundrops, run into all sorts of difficulties set in their path by the war effort.

Head of the family is Hazel Hemming, a giddy widow in her forties, whose sole interest in life is hats-Hitler ranking second in her category of values. Not that the Hemmings aren't patroitic, far from it: Roger, the youngest son, is in camp studying to be a General. Running the candy business is his older brother Carl, a handsome, charming but completely incompetent young man. Helping him is Miss Perkam, known as Perkie, the book-keeper, a fixture in the firm for years. Also on the staff is Miss Brown, a stenographer who provides the love interest.

Garl gets the brilliant but wacky idea of making antiseptic gum. You chew it on your way to work for your daily morning mouthwash. Working on the formula is excitable Pierre, a French chef Home from Singapore, one jump shead of the Japanese invesion, comes "ne'er-do-well" Uncle Tim. Seeing the family in dire financial straits, he decides to hang around a bit incognito—and to explain his prying tells them veguely he's from "the O.P.P. in Washington." Immediately the Hemmings hope for all sorts of things from that megic spot, including government contracts for making peanut oil. When Miss Lydia Goucher, President of the local bank, nears that Washington is interested in the plant, she decides to foreclose an old note which she has long held. Now Washington isn't interested in the plant, nor is the antiseptic chewing gum a success as chewing gum; but when the gum turns out to be rubber, then Washington is interested and we're plunged into a series of uprogrious situations.

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
