Fair Continues Through Saturday

Michigan Bell Is Adding To Local Exchange

Addition Is Being Built To Care for Continuous Growth in Mason Territory

Mason people have talked themselves right out the back end of the Michigan Bell Telephone building at 314 Park The building was erected in 1940.

Because of the steady growth of the telephone business in the Mason area the building has become inadequate. The construction which was started this week is the first step in a \$37,000 program telephone needs, the Michigan Bell announced.

A 20-foot addition is being extended to the west. It is of brick construction to conform to the original building, Granger Bros. of Lansing have the contract.

The addition will cost about \$13,000. It will be used to house additional dial switching equip-ment which will be installed upon completion of the building, scheduled for September.

Installers for the Western Electric company will install the equipment starting in September. It will be cut into operation early in November and provide facilities for 2.100 customers as compared with the present equipment which serves 1,800 subscribers. The calendar calls for the opening of schools Tuesday, September 6. The state institute will be held October 13 and 14. Thanksgiving recess is November 24 and 25. The Christmas holiday is to commence December 23 or 24 and continue through January 2. February 8 is the date for the county institute. A half-day holiday was marked up for April 7, Good Friday. Schools will be closed May 19 for the sum-



State Valuation Ralph, who has wired county fairs Has Little Effect On Local Taxes

Ingham's valuation as equalized by the state board of equalization has little effect.

The state board boosted the county's valuation to \$35,300,000. Last year the state figure for Ingham was \$266,750,000. But those state figures don't count for much. Ingham county's 1948 valuation as set by the board of supervisors was \$234,470,031. In June of this year the valuation was equalized by the county board at \$242,417,-604. That's the figure against which 1949 taxes will be assessed "If the state levied a property tax," explained County Treasurer Lyle B. Austin, "the county would be forced to use the state's valua-

tion for spreading the state tax. Or if the state tax commission came into Ingham to settle an assessment dispute between cities and townships the county would probably end up close to the state's figure. No state tax is levied and so the county's valuaion as fixed by the state affects only the formula on which state school aid is based. In dollars and cents the state figure means



Status Of Land Not Disease Cause

Any statement that cancer, arthritis or heart disease are increasing because the foods we eat are raised on mineral-starved land is hokum according to specialists on

An article in Successful Farming health. The experts talked to doctors of the soil, doctors of plants, doctors of humans, nutrition ex perts and evangelists who say we are facing "race suicide."

It was pointed out that heart disease is often linked to diet, but not because food is of poor quality. Rather stoutness and heart disease

As to arthritis and cancer, mil lions will call you blessed if you can show definitely how to stop then through diet. Meanwhile, it is dis honest to give the false hope tha soil treatment can cure these dis


Other myths blasted in the arti cle are (1) that the baby won't have good bones if its formula is made of milk from a cow whose feed was deficient in phosphorus and calcium; (2) that the adult won't build muscle and blood from beefsteak devoid of protein-building minerals and iron; (3) that all chemical fertilizers are poison and that compost and earthworms are the only means of soil enrichment we should use, and (4) that we are being starved to death because the grains, fruits and vegetables we eat come from soils which lack needed minerals.

Discussing starvation from a mineral deficiency in foods, it is asked why we have a generationby-generation increase in the size of the bony structure of our young people if we are mineral-starved.

So far as scientists, know, man needs some 12 mineral elements for growth. Ruminant animals need cobalt, to make 13. Plants also need 13 mineral elements, 11 of them the same as needed for man and animals. Except for cobalt and iodine, plants won't grow unless all the man-needed minerals are present, according to the arti-

As to statements that some milk is low in phosphorus and calcium, it is said a cow will take calcium from her own bones and put it in her milk if her diet is low in calcium. As that supply runs low, she will give less and less milk. But it will contain honest weight in minerals. When her mineral supply is gone, she quits giving milk and often dies from the effects of robbing her body.

A fertilized farm will produce more milk than one unfertilized but not better milk. That's because it produces more grass. There is no evidence to prove the grass is any better, blade for blade.



Only the highest quality produce should find its way to the can since canning cannot improve quality. It merely preserves it.

Vegetables selected for canning are usually best when just slightly under-ripe or im-



mature. Peas, for example should be sweet and tender; corn should spurt juice when pressed with a fingernail. Gnarled bruised, wrinkled or otherwise im-

perfect vegetables are not fit to be canned. You cannot expect them to have good flavor and color. Perfect vegetables rushed from

LYNN SAYS:

Follow Vegetable Canning Pointers

For "stripe" cookies, shape the dough into rectangles. After baking, when the cookies have cooled, pipe confectioners' sugar icing in straight lines on top of the cookies.

Wipe the edges of the jar with a crean cloth before adjusting the cap. This helps achieve a perfect seal for the food.

Remove jars from the sterilizing vessel with tongs or gloves to

avoid burning the fingers. Sun is best and commercial as removing stains which ordinary

After filling the jar with vegetables and water, you may find some air bubbles anchored against the sides of the jar. Remove these by running a spatula between the glass and the vegetable.

Jars which have been sealed with self-sealing lid, should not be tested for sound until 24 hours after processing. It will take this length of time to cool the contents of the



Peddling Themselves Out of Jobs

Tinware used to be peddled from door to door. Grocery wagons used to travel the country roads. Baked goods and meats used to be hawked from house to house. Milk still is, but it won't be long if the Detroit milk peddlers have their way.

Detroit milk wagon drivers now make \$80 a week, based on salary and commissions. The commissions are paid on milk sales, the money sales. Milk producers have taken three cuts on the Detroit market, but the wagon drivers don't want any part of it. When prices have climbed as they did steadily during and after the war until a few months ago, the drivers cashed in on every price increase. They didn't want their commissions based on the number of quarts instead of dollar sales then. But when prices are coming down the drivers demand to be paid on the number of quarts handled.

The cost of milk distribution in the cities is out of line. It is wasteful, with four or five or more wagons covering the same area. It is expensive to consumers, because the big family pays as much per quart for deliveries as does the small family. If the delivery labor cost of delivering one quart of milk on a doorstep is three cents, then it shouldn't cost 12c for four quarts. The driver can carry four quarts almost for the price of

With the kind of refrigeration most homes have, with food stores in every neighborhood, there is no more reason why milk should be delivered floor to door than there is for pop, or eggs, or orange juice being delivered from door to door. The milk delivery system is a hangover from the days when the milkman measured out his product from big cans and poured into basins on back porches what the tickets called for, first scooping the tickets out of the basins.

Now the milk peddlers in the big cities make more money per quart on deliveries of milk than does the farmer who produces. The farmer works long hours and has a huge investment. The driver has nothing invested in the milk or in the wagon, horse or automobile.

With Detroit milk peddlers taking a strike vote to tie up milk deliveries, the time is ripe for producers to abandon the present archaic system. The time has come to retire the big city milk peddlers and to leave milk distribution up to food stores. In that way consumers can get their milk at lower prices and the producers of milk can keep a bigger percentage of the consumers' dollars for themselves.

\$10,380 Not Peanuts

A lot of people wonder what kind of coin newspaper men are paid in. Several newspapers last week carried editorial opinions that the \$10,380 salary paid Gen. Louis A. Kunzig as an executive of the liquor control commission is just peanuts.

The sum of \$10,380 is not peanuts to anyone. That's more money than General Kunzig can make anywhere else and he knows it or he wouldn't be fighting to have the civil service keep him on the payroll. That \$10,380 is more money than any newswriter, unless he's a syndicate man, ever sees in a year.

It's all right to feel sorry over the firing of General Kunzig. It's perfectly proper to point out that the general did a good job for the liquor control commission. It's O. K. to worry over what's afoot in Lansing. But somehow it seems wicked to libel a salary of \$10,380 a year as "just peanuts."

Consumers Pay Taxes To Raise Food Prices

By Vernon J. Brown

Last week in this column I paid my respects to the theories underlying the Agricultural Adjustment Administration and to what I consider its fallacies. From the response of those who do me the nonor of reading what appears under the by-line above, by telephone and by word on the street and elswhere, I am convinced that so far as the rank and file of farmers are concerned, the vast majority are either opposed to the AAA or indifferent to it or at least skeptical of its ultimate benefits. And all along I had thought I was sort of a lone wolf ranging the economic woods and having none to whom I could confess or in whom I might confide.

Once again I am constrained to use the same subject but along a different line.

A headline in the daily press tells us that the United States government will this year take \$60,000,000 dollars which the people have paid in to its treasury in the way of taxes and pay these \$60,000,000 dollars out to support the price on potatoes. I previously had read the same thing in some of the farm journals I get through the mail, so there was no element of surprise in the articles appearing in the newspapers.

The surprise I get is the fact that nowhere have I read the real cost to the people of this country's potato business. Sixty million dollars of tax money is not hay, to say the least and since the depression days of the early 30's when the government entered into this price support affair, the cost in tax dollars to the government has totaled into the vast billions. That is a lot of tax money.

But that is not the real cost to the people. The real cost is found in an arbitrary, stimulated market price set for one of the world's most common and essential foods. The average American family is found to consist of about four people, and 10 bushels of potatoes is probably less than the average family consumes in one year.

Now let us do some quick figur-ing and see how this benefit (?) benefits the public at large. For that purpose let us get away from staggering United States and world figures and take Michigan alone. Figures for this state alone are so big they are indeed hard to

ket price for potatoes, the consumers of potatoes paid out \$21-000,000 dollars on account of an inflated price which dealers were forced to pay for their stocks in trade and in turn pass on to the consumers. Let us never forget that all this money comes from the same pocket-that of the consumer. First he pays his taxes, a portion of which is used to inflate the prices he must pay for what he and the members of his family eat. In this case it is potatoes, and in this case Mr. Consumer paid first his \$4,000,000 so the government could pay the grower and then from what was left of his pay envelope he was forced to pay out

For Better Turf

Soil should be tested to determine whether or not lime is needed. If tests show lime is needed ground limestone should be broadcast at a rate of 100 pounds for each 1,000 square feet. This should be worked into the soil. Do not use lime unless soil is strongly acid in reaction (PH 5.5 or lower).

Fitting the sou for a new lawn is important. After being graded with the proper slope for drainage away from the house foundation, the ground should be alternately raked and rolled until firm seedbed is produced, Tyson suggested.

Before broadcasting the seed, the seedbed should be raked lightly with a steel rake, the teeth penetrating more than quarter of an inch.

For sandy soils Chewing's fescue or creeping red fescue grass is recommended by the lawn specialist. For open, sunny, fertile and well-drained loam, Kentucky bluegrass normally produces best resurts. On shady, fertile, welldrained loam, a mixture of Chewing's fescue or red fescue with rough bluegrass makes a good mixture. On wet, poorly-drained soils, Dr. Tyson recommends the use of Canadian bluegrass, rough bluegrass and redtop.

From a pound to a pound and a half of seed for each 1,000 square feet of yard is adequate if properly distributed.

Tyson recommends that measured amount of seed for section of the yard be mixed with enough dry screened soil to make sufficient bulk for distribution. The lawn should be raked lightly after the seed has been sown and rolled once with a heavy roller to firm the seed.

In reseeding to thicken a turf, Dr. Tyson recommends raking the lawn with a steel garden rake to remove dead grass and scar the surface of the soil. After sowing the seed-using about one-fourth to one-half pound to 1,000 square feet-the lawn should be sprinkled thoroughly to settle the soil around the seed.

Persons interested in more information about lawn planting and care can obtain "Growing Beautiful Lawns," an extension bulletin (Extension 224) by Dr. Tyson without charge. This bulletin is available from county agricultural extension offices or from the Bulletin Office, Department of Public Relations, Michigan State colege, East Lansing, Michigan.






