
New Beginnings



everyone's mind.





Debbie Stabenow came to Sexton High School to educate students on the job and responsibilities of being a State Representative.

It is called "The Magic Ride" because Magic Johnson helps support it, also. Everybody from surrounding counties go to Holt to ride bikes and give donations. You can ride 5-100 miles. The money they gather from this event goes to other counties to help support these child prevention clinics and counseling.

She decided to start something like this to help our community. She learned that 90% of the people in jail were abused or neglected as a child.

Another one of her jobs is to help individuals with problems, such as legal problems, public assistance, and state retirement.

Living with a host family takes some adjusting, which all of the students have done. They are en-


joying their experience in Michigan, and at the same time they are learning about our American culture.







In baseball, who can forget the "cinderella" team, the Minnesota Twins, winning the World Series. They were led by many great players, most of all,


