



Cold weather doesn't stop students from enjoyment








Homecoming King and Queen





Students help to improve the world in a variety of ways

























Varsity water polo team comes together despite losses





















The Junior Varsity golfers rule the course





























What is the biggest difference for you between being a teacher and being an author?













AP Classes promote long hours of work and studying

Several meeting places such as the Okemos Library, a friend's home, or a coffee shop, such as Biggby Coffee, allow to study while students maintaining their focus. AP Chemistry student, Kelly Conlon (12), said, "Before every test or

quiz, someone would stand up during 5th hour and say, 'Okay, guys, Beaner's at six.' So we'd all meet there and have a chem cram session, from six to close." Other AP's differing from more academic based courses, such as AP Art or AP Computer Science, allow students more hands-on experiences throughout the year. For AP Art, instead of a typical exam, students work on a portfolio all year that is submitted in May to be critiqued and scored by judges. Several AP's may be considered 'easier' than others by students, including Alex Salvadori (12) who said, "AP Government was definitely my easiest AP," while other students consider certain AP's to be significantly harder, like AP Chemistry, "we knew we'd fail together," said Kelly. Overall, AP courses challenge students in a variety of ways, to work harder and longer hours as well as establishing certain study habits to succeed. (Page by Shelby Robinson)











There is an elite group of personnel students don't truly understand at the school. These are the people that work behind the scenes at nearly every single event that takes place at the school, inside or outside. At the same time, certain staff clean up after 1,446 high school students every day. These are the custodians, or commonly referred to as janitors. "The difference between a custodian and a janitor is that a janitor just cleans, while custodians do everything," Mike Miller said about his profession. In just one normal day of work, custodians will open all school doors at 5 A.M., shovel snow if needed, clean the lunchroom, setup activities for sports, setup banquets, setup presentations, then do any necessary cleaning. A custodian can be at the school until midnight. During the summer, the floors must be buffed and waxed, desks cleaned and buffed, gym floors

refinished, classrooms totally emptied, and every window cleaned. These are up to 18 hour days. The custodians' jobs are tough, however, they are not the only people that allow the school to run smoothly. Secretaries Ms. Gibbard, Ms. Latham, and Ms. Stow make sure that students obtain messages left for them and are reliable sources for information for both students and staff. Counselors Ms. Gillespie, Ms. Hallead, Ms. Josephson, and Mr. Walton talk to students about problems and questions they have about nearly everything. Along with these important roles, lunch staff prepare food for every student and teacher. Last, but not least, the administrators Mr. Verrell, Ms. Wilcox, and Dr. Lanzetta oversee all aspects of the school. Mix all of these important people together, and you have one outstanding staff. The cover is Custom Litho with cover material of High Gloss Litho 478, Process Color 317, UV Coating Cover 350 and a Pin Morocco grain. The endsheets are 65# cover weight printed in full color with a different design on the front and the back. The cover and endsheets were designed by Editor-in-Chief Shelby Robinson. All pages were printed on 80# gloss paper. All body copy was 12 point Myriad Condensed, caption lead-ins were 12 point Myriad Condensed, captions were 10 point Myriad Condensed, Sub-heads were 12 point Myriad Headline, and Headlines were 36 point Times. The base ink color is black. The Okemos High School Yearbook was produced entirely on Dell PC Computers. All design elements and submitted pages utilized Jostens YearTech Online program. Additional software used included PhotoShop and Microsoft Word. The Yearbook is a fully digital book. Okemos Studio of Photography is the official school photographer and they photographed team sports, band, orchestra, choir, and many senior portraits. Underclassmen portraits were photographed by Life Touch Studios. The yearbook staff along with local photographers Alan Holben, Dan Crites, Brian Williams, and the staff of The Chronicle, especially Lizzy Rinner and Matt Currie, took many of the action shots featured in the yearbook. The Okemos High School Yearbook is sponsored by the high school and produced and managed by students. All monies were raised by book sales, senior ads, and commercial ads. 900 copies of the book were printed. This book is 100% student produced by our fellow classmates. 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

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

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
