CAPITAL AREA DISTRICT LIBRARIES N ANNUAL REPORT 2013

The year 2013 was an important milestone in CADL history-it marked our 15th birthday!

In 1997, voters approved a plan to merge two existing library systems into a single one. On Jan. 2, 1998, the 13 branches of the newly-formed Capital Area District Libraries opened their doors, providing service to 23 different municipalities.


Since that time, CADL has become a vital member of the communities we serve, and a great example of regional cooperation. By sharing a single collection and other resources, we provide significant cost-savings for taxpayers. Shared resources also ensure that everyone in our district has access to the same services, no matter how big or small their community.

This year we celebrated our success with a series of exciting events, starting with a birthday party at every branch. Patrons enjoyed free cake and a chance to win movie passes courtesy of NCG Cinemas. Other events throughout the year included special visits from storybook characters, a coloring contest, a trivia contest, an eReader giveaway, chances to win beach bags filled with books and other goodies, a birthday card-making station at Impression 5 Science Center and more.


## Website MAKEOVER

## OUR ONLINE BRANCH

It seems hard to believe now, but when Capital Area District Libraries was formed in 1998, we didn't have a website. That was before the Internet became the "information highway" we take for granted now. To use the library, patrons visited one of our 13 branches in person.

Today, an up-to-date, user-friendly website is an essential component of library service. In the spring of 2013, we gave ours a makeover. The new and
 improved cadl.org provides 24/7 access to a wide variety of services. It's another way CADL makes using the library easier, faster and more convenient than ever.
Since launching it in April, cadl.org has welcomed an average of 86,100 visits each month. Features include:

- An online catalog, allowing visitors to browse thousands of book, movie, CD and magazine titles at their convenience. With a click of the mouse, items can be placed on hold or renewed.
- Hundreds of free eBook titles and digital magazines, ready for instant download
- An expert reader recommendation service to help users choose what to read, watch or listen to next
- A detailed calendar of library events, searchable by branch, age group or event type
- Unique and detailed pages for each of our branches
- Daily blog posts that are chock-full of useful tips on topics like technology, business and parenting
- Free access to subscriptions and databases such as HeritageQuest



## Community INVOLVEMENT

Through our partnership with Capital Area Michigan Works!, CADL has become a vital member of efforts to support the area's un- and underemployed. A reference librarian regularly attends meetings of CAMW's career networking group to promote CADL resources and encourage
job seekers to view the library as a place to find help and training.

## DELTA DENTAL OF MICHIGAN

A new partnership was formed in 2013 when CADL was approached by Delta Dental's charitable foundation, which focuses on supporting organizations that enhance the quality of life in our community. In February—National Children's Dental Health Month—we invited them to present oral health storytimes at six CADL branches, teaching basic dental hygiene habits to preschoolers. The kids especially enjoyed meeting their mascot, Marshall Molar.

Delta Dental also supported our Summer Reading initiative, donating 150 tickets to "Share a Smile Day" at the Lansing Lugnuts, plus 65 children's books for prizes.

## EARLY CHILDHOOD LITERACY COALITION

This volunteer committee is made up of local literacy, education and early childhood advocates, such as CACS Head Start and WKAR/Ready To Learn. Representatives from CADL participate in monthly meetings to network, share resources and discuss ways to promote literacy among area children. Each year during March, CADL partners with ECLC to host popular storybook characters at our branches. Our website serves as the public gateway to information for similar events throughout the area.


## IMPRESSION 5 SCIENCE CENTER

Partnering with the local science center always brings a blast of high energy to the library! In 2013, the talented staff at 15 created a special interactive exhibit just for us, big enough to draw
 lots of attention but small enough to travel among our branches. The theme was "The Sun," a perfect complement to our popular Summer Reading initiative. 15 also made room for a colorful mailbox and art space in their building, inviting visitors to create and "mail" a birthday card to CADL during our year-long birthday celebration.

## MICHIGAN LIBRARIES FOR LIFE

For the second year, CADL was proud to join an initiative that helps libraries spread the word about the critical need for organ donations. In Michigan, only $39 \%$ of adults are registered to be donors, far below the national average of $45 \%$. From Oct. 7-14, eight of our branches served as sites for people to sign up with the Michigan Organ Donor Registry. The results: more than 400 people stopped by to check out donor information or share their own stories, with 61 of them registering on the spot.


## MICHIGAN SECRETARY OF STATE

In July, Secretary of State Ruth Johnson visited CADL's Downtown Lansing branch to announce a partnership with
 libraries across the state. The goal was to be sure that all Michigan residents have access to a website called ExpressSOS.com, which allows them to skip the visit to a Secretary of State office and do routine tasks online, such as renewing/replacing a driver's license or renewing a license plate. Anyone with a CADL card can access the site by using our public computers and high-speed Internet, available during open hours. Since one of our core services is to provide access to technology and online services, helping people connect to this service is a natural fit.

## MOVERS FOR MOMS®

In 2013, we partnered once again with TWO MEN AND A TRUCK® on their national campaign to provide personal care items to women in need. Starting in April, donation boxes and wish lists were placed in all 13 branches, and staff and patrons were encouraged to donate items such as soap, socks and pajamas. Just in time for Mother's Day, these
 items were picked up by TWO MEN AND A TRUCK staff and delivered to local shelters, including the City Rescue Mission, C.A.R.E., Haven House and The SafeCenter.


## POTTER PARK ZOO

What better place to be than the zoo on a summer day? Once again, CADL was invited to participate in Potter Park's Zoo Days event, giving us a chance to meet families from all over midMichigan. We challenged visitors to a game called Read Around the Zoo, encouraging them to read exhibit signs and answer animal trivia questions for prizes. We also added a fun new feature this year-a photo booth! Everyone loved grabbing a prop and striking a pose in front of our colorful backdrop. Photos were available for viewing on our website the next day.

Then it was back to the zoo in October for their annual Boo at the Zoo event. Even our mascot Linc got into the Halloween spirit, dressing up in his superhero costume to meet fans and pose for pictures. Trick-ortreaters took home library stickers and bookmarks along with their candy.


## WRITE MICHIGAN

In the fall of 2013, CADL was invited to partner with Kent District Library, Schuler Books \& Music, and Pooh Corner bookstore on the second annual Write Michigan project. The project encourages kids, teens and adults to explore the art of writing by entering an original short story in a contest. Winning stories were chosen by celebrity judges as well as the public, with cash prizes awarded to First Place, Second Place and Readers' Choice entries. Stories by the top 10 finalists in all age categories were published in an anthology produced by Schuler's Chapbook Press.

CADL promoted the project throughout our communities and on a special page of our website, where we also shared information about our collection, suggesting titles of short stories for all ages and a number of books on the craft of writing. We also contacted every school in our service area, as well as homeschool groups,
 encouraging them to participate. The results of these efforts were very rewarding-the number of entries nearly doubled from the previous year, jumping from 551 to 888 , and five of the 10 winners came from the Greater Lansing area.

## SPECIALTIES

Among CADL's core services are Access to Technology, Expert Assistance and Access to Books,
Movies and More-some of the most popular reasons that people seek out their libraries.
In 2013, even with two of our largest branches closed for several months for renovations, we recorded more than 1.4 million visits. People came to use the computers, get help with school projects or job applications, and research their family history. They also checked out about 2.7 million items from our 13 locations and cadl.org.

## ACCESS TO TECHNOLOGY

Rather than spelling the end of libraries, new technologies simply present another way CADL connects people to information and ideas. In fact, access to the Internet and free instruction on technology topics continue to be among our most popular services.

## Public Computers

In 2013, we recorded 222,153 hours of use on our public computers. The vast majority of that time was spent connected to the Internet, where patrons accessed email and social media sites, filled out job applications, worked on research projects and more. According to a Numbeo cost of living survey, Americans paid an average of almost $\$ 46$ per month for personal unlimited Internet service. Using library computers instead saved the average patron more than $\$ 550$ a year.

## Wireless Internet (WiFi)

This service continued to be wildly popular in 2013, as more and more patrons brought their own devices to the library. Several branches added many additional electrical outlets expressly for this use. Despite having two of our largest branches closed for several months of the year, we recorded 157,205 hours of WiFi use, a $54.4 \%$ increase over 2012.

## Computer and Technology Instruction

While many patrons still appreciated classes on the basics of email and Internet use, others were drawn to more specialized topics, such as Google Docs, Online Job Tools, and Downloading CADL eBooks. A popular trend at many branches was to provide personalized technology sessions. Rather than setting a schedule of classes, they offered one-on-one appointments at times convenient for each patron, on topics of their choice.

## EXPERT ASSISTANCE

A quote at daringlibrarian.com goes like this: "Who needs a librarian when you have Google? Well, who needs a doctor when you have WebMD?" In 2013, people continued to look to CADL for the most accurate information possible, provided by people with specialized knowledge and skillsand all just for the asking.

## Digital Downloads Workshops

As the popularity of eBooks continued to skyrocket, people came to the library in droves to learn how to use this technology. Staff offered expert, personalized assistance, encouraging attendees to bring their own smartphones, tablets, laptops and other devices.

## BookSleuth

It's no surprise that people depend on librarians for help finding the latest and greatest books, movies and music. At CADL, we call our recommendation service BookSleuth, because our literary detective tracks down all the best titles. Recommendations were available 24/7 on our website, during open hours in our branches, and during popular monthly sessions on Facebook and Twitter, where people interacted with BookSleuth personally.


## BOOKS

## Print

Print books make up the vast majority of our collection. In 2013, we offered nearly 470,000 of them. Laid end-to-end, that's over 70 miles!

## eBooks

The enthusiasm for eBooks shows no signs of slowing down-people love carrying books around on their tablets, eReaders and smartphones, or listening to them on MP3 players. Use of our eBook and eAudiobook collection rose to a total of 99,074 downloads in 2013-an increase of $29 \%$.

## TumbleBook Library

Up until 2013, most library eBook users were adults. But in November, CADL began encouraging parents to check out our latest offering-TumbleBook Library for kids. Viewable on any computer, smartphone or tablet, this free service includes talking picture and chapter books, plus animation, puzzles, games, National Geographic videos and more. In December, our first full month of service, we recorded 568 book views.

## MOVIES

Fans of classic films as well as the latest blockbusters found plenty of titles to check out at CADL. In 2013, our movie collection included 77,740 DVD, BluRay and video copies. Our TV on DVD collection proved popular, as people checked out buzz-worthy series they had missed or chose not to pay for via movie subscriptions.

## ...AND MORE

## Digital Magazines: Zinio

Introduced in July 2013, our new digital magazine service was an immediate hit. Zinio allowed CADL cardholders to download and read full issues of 100 different titles, such as O Magazine and National Geographic. Issues are available immediately on their release date, with no holds or due dates. Between July-December, these titles circulated over 14,000 times.

## Magazines \& Newspapers

Patrons love the idea of sharing magazine and newspaper subscriptions rather than purchasing their own. With 516 different titles to choose from in 2013, we offered something for every age and interest, from Highlights for Children to The New York
 Times to NASCAR Illustrated.

## Music

Music lovers continued to turn to the library to sample a wide variety of CDs. We added almost 5,600 items to our music collection in 2013. Items were checked out over 29,000 times, with rock, rap and country topping
 out as the most popular genres.


# Events to Inform AND ENTERTAIN 

Our libraries hosted hundreds of free events in 2013, ranging from storytimes for our youngest readers to technology help for seniors. What did they have in common? Expert information presented in a welcoming setting-all for free. Highlights included author visits and several community-wide library promotions.

## \#GetCaughtReading

Each year CADL presents special events during "March is Reading Month." But in 2013, we took the celebration up a notch, inviting people to capture and share their personal reading experiences via photo. These could be submitted through Instagram or Twitter, using the hashtag \#GetCaughtReading.
Pictures came in all month long, with people capturing not only themselves reading, but also their kids, co-workers, friends-even their pets! We added to the fun by going out into the community to get images of folks like Lansing's mayor, on-air personalities from WLNS-TV, WILX-TV, WFMK radio, CADL staff, and even our own book-loving mascot, who got caught at local hotspots like NCG Cinemas and Biggby Coffee.

All the photos were featured on our website, with a few favorites selected to appear in printed ads in The City Pulse.

## \#ShowYourCard

When it comes to value, there is no better deal than a library card. It means having free access to a huge collection of books, eBooks, movies and music, plus public computers, high-speed Internet and research tools.

To spread the word about this great deal, we partnered with local businesses to


## AUTHOR VISITS

## Luis Carlos Montalván \& Tuesday Until Tuesday



One of the most anticipated events of the year was a visit from former Army Captain Luis Carlos Montalván, the best-selling author of Until Tuesday. The book provides a first-hand account of his experiences in Iraq and of returning home after two tours of duty with traumatic brain injury and PTSD. Only after meeting a service dog named Tuesday did Montalván find a path to physical recovery and spiritual restoration.

Almost 180 people-and six service dogs-attended this inspiring presentation, held in September at the South Lansing branch. Special guest Tuesday amazed and delighted the audience with his mastery of language and commands. Following the event, adults and kids lined up for a chance to get books signed and to meet both man and dog.

## Wild: From Lost to Found on the Pacific Crest Trail

In CADL's first-ever "live via Internet" event, the author of the Oprah Book Club selection and New York-Times-bestselling memoir Wild appeared in May at the Haslett and South Lansing branches. Fans gathered at the libraries for a live Skype chat with Cheryl Strayed, stationed at her home in Oregon. Strayed talked about the weeks she spent hiking the trail solo, searching for a way to cope with her personal problems, and how the experience led her to unexpected answers. Signed copies of the book, obtained by CADL in advance, were available for sale.

## Detroit City Is the Place to Be: The Afterlife of an American Metropolis

Detroit native and current New York City resident Binelli visited our Downtown Lansing branch in May to talk about his Michigan Notable Book Award-winning title. Audience members heard about his vision of a Detroit that is smaller, greener, less segregated, more economically diverse and better functioning-a post-industrial city for the new century. Copies of the book, as well as Binelli's popular Sacco and Vanzetti Must Die!, were available for sale and signing.


## Events to Inform



Every summer, CADL offers a free reading and entertainment extravaganza, otherwise known as the Summer Reading program. This initiative encourages children and teens to read for fun over the summer, helping reduce the loss of skills that can occur while school is out.

In 2013, nearly 6,800 participants signed up to keep track of their reading time and do reading-related activities. For the first time, many of those activities could be accessed online at our website. By mid-August, participants had logged in over 150,000 hours!

We added to the festive atmosphere with hundreds of family-friendly events, featuring live animals, magicians, storytellers, musicians and more.

None of this would be possible without the support of many local businesses who donated prizes and incentives. Special recognition goes to City Limits Bowling Center, Curious Book Shop, The Daily Scoop, Dart Bank, Delta Dental Foundation, EDRU Skate-A-Rama, Impression 5 Science Center, the Ingham County Fair, Jack and Jill Consignment Boutique, Kean's, Leslie Area United Fund, Little Caesars, Pizanos, The Teacher Store, and Two Men and a Truck. Our Library Friends groups also offered generous financial support.

# Gathering PLACE 

Throughout Ingham County, CADL offers welcoming spaces where people can gather, learn and share ideas. We also host a thriving online community, encouraging visitors to connect with us at their convenience, day or night.

## SOUTH LANSING BRANCH

Located near the busy corner of Holmes and S. Cedar Street, our South Lansing branch received a head-to-toe renovation in the spring. We celebrated with a grand re-opening event on April 29, which included a ribbon-cutting ceremony as well as tours of the building, refreshments, activities and giveaways.
Right from the beginning, planning for the project involved suggestions from the public. Head Librarian Michele Brussow explained that, "We were very conscientious about addressing patron concerns, and correcting shortfalls of the old design. We designed the library to match the way they want to use the
 space." Among the changes are a vibrant new children's section, an open and up-to-date computer space, and a quiet lounge area for study and for WiFi use.

The South Lansing community has embraced the bright new space with great enthusiasm, resulting in more visits, more checkouts and higher attendance at events. Much of the cost was covered under the terms of the City of Lansing's rental agreement with DTN Management Company. Other improvements were paid for from a $\$ 20,000$ donation made by the Friends group.


## FOSTER BRANCH

Thanks to fundraising by the Friends of Lansing Libraries, the Foster branch replaced a small, outdated circulation desk with a new efficient one.

## CADL ONLINE

More than ever before, CADL has made our services available to the public 24 hours a day. In 2013, anyone with an Internet connection could visit cadl.org to browse our extensive catalog, put items on hold, download eBooks and digital magazines, access research sites, read daily blog posts offering expert advice, find event listings for all ages, and much more.

They could also engage us in conversation, sharing their thoughts and ideas via tweets, Facebook posts, Instagram images, Pinterest
 boards and more. We look forward to exploring even more ways to connect with our patrons, fans and friends, in the places where they work and play.

## YOUTH SERVICES SPECIALIST

 brings extensive experience in assisting both patrons and library staff with learning about digital collections and emerging digital skills.

## THE TOP 5

These events and achievements were among the most notable in 2013:

1. This year marked the 25th anniversary of our 5th Grade Battle of the Books, a partnership with Dansville Elementary that provides a book trivia game to students.
2. Attendance at our Summer Reading events increased by $23 \%$.
3. We saw continued support and growth for Coffee Chat, a weekly library program that gives community members an opportunity to connect.

## OUR THANKS

We are grateful to the City of Williamston, the Friends of the Williamston Library, the Williamston Community Library Foundation, our volunteers and our patrons for their continued support of the Williamston Library.

## 2013

This marked the third consecutive year of substantial tax revenue losses due to falling property values. Annual tax revenue fell $\$ 391,097$ in 2013, bringing the three-year total to nearly $\$ 1.4$ million. Despite these losses, we have remained viable by continuing to find ways to reduce our operating expenses. In 2013, our annual expenses were $\$ 9.8$ million, representing a reduction from 2012 of $\$ 363,000$. Since 2009, we have been able to keep pace with our revenue losses by reducing our ongoing operating expenses by over $\$ 1.6$ million.
Although CADL continues to reduce operational expenses, we have not stopped making improvements to our facilities. Our annual expenses include a total of $\$ 127,130$ spent to complete interior renovations to our South Lansing and Okemos branches. Both projects were collaborations with municipalities, donors and Library Friends groups. We also applied for and received a Broadband Technology Opportunities Program grant of nearly $\$ 75,000$, which was used to replace 84 patron computers. Funding originally earmarked for this project was reallocated for other uses.

## GRANTS

- Universal Service Fund - $\$ 86,730$ was approved for 2013 Internet Connections, while $\$ 12,712$ was approved and received for regular telephone services.
- Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) CADL received 84 computers, valued at $\$ 74,256$. This grant is funded by the federal government through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA).
- Michigan Humanities Council - $\$ 668$ was received to fund Summer Reading programs
- National Endowment for the Humanities - $\$ 1,000$ was received to host a screening of the movie Koran by Heart, and to promote a discussion of the Muslim Journeys Bookshelf collection.


## OTHER MONETARY DONATIONS

IN 2013, CADL received total donations of $\$ 45,165$ from individuals, Library Friends groups, and other organizations.
