Raising Readers Backpack

Cap, Mittens, Shoes and Socks

(To the tune of "Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes")
Cap, mittens, shoes, and socks,
Shoes and socks.
Cap, mittens, shoes, and socks.
And pants and belt, and shirt and tie,
Go together wet or dry,

The Winter Pokey

to the tune of "The Hokey-Pokey" You put your right mitten in, You take your right mitten out. You put your right mitten in, And you shake it all about. You do the winter pokey, [shiver] And you turn yourself around. That's what it's all about!

You put your left mitten in.... You put your right boot.... You put your left boot.... You put your long scarf in.... You put your warm cap in.... You put your snowsuit in....

Lets make snow paint!

What you need: Glue, Shaving cream, and glitter.*

How to make it:

In a bowl mix approximately 1 cup shaving cream to 1/2 a cup of glue (plain old school glue works great!) and add glitter till you feel there is enough glitter in it! Now you take a paintbrush and use this mixture as your paint! *The addition of food coloring makes

the snow paint different colors.

Game:

Use the yarn snowballs to help teach hand-eye coordination and try and have the child throw the yarn ball into the mouth or the belly of the snowman poster.
