I am sure we look upon our high school years as best years of our lives.














Talent Shows As . . . Floats Present Commercial Ads






The representatives gave all students a voice because there was a required amount of at least one person from each homeroom to be there.

With a cast of twelve, and only six weeks to rehearse, making this production work was a constant battle against time.




The freedom of Everett High




This year's team put in many hard hours of practice. They averaged about ten hours a week, not counting some Saturdays.


The girls started practice in the second week of March. They practiced for two and a half hours everyday, except those in which they had a game.

The girls' goals were to win as many games as possible, stop walks, and strike out as many opponents as they could. The girls diligently worked to improve their ever changing record.


As the year progressed, the team out-hit both J.V. and Varsity and had a super batting average of 429. They finished the season with a record of five wins and eight losses.




The team started practice approximately three weeks before school started. Their hard work at practice was rewarded by an overall winning record of eight wins

With hard work and team effort, the enthusiastic team, consisting mainly of sophomores, showed continuous improvement and promises for the future.



This year one of the captains, Sharon Darmer, received a very respected award, the CAC Honorable Mention for her great talents.



"We've beat some good teams and lost some close games, but we haven't giv-


en up yet," stated Coach John Jones.



Wrestling Team Pin Opponents


Rebuilding was all a big part of this wrestling team. Practices were long and late. The practices went as long as two and a half hours. The boys practiced new moves and worked out.

Determination and concentration were in the mind of each and every wrestlers. With that in their minds brought the team to a twelve win and thirteen loss record. "We had a better year this year, we


had more fun," said coach Fulk, when asked if the year was better than last year.

Richard Bevier is a four year wrestler and has been a big part of this year's 1987 wrestling team. Richard is also one of the team captains.






"Language is communication!" stated Mr. Humphrey, who teaches German. "Being able to communicate with different people will open up new friendships and roads to follow."


Home Economics

Home Economics played an important part here at Everett. Students who would like to get married or have a family took classes like Parent and Child or Personal Relations.



Parent and Child, taught by Mrs. Barker, gave the students a chance to experience situations in which one would be dealing with children.

teaching the subject but he doesn't like the behavior of some of the students.



ATTENTION! Are you a Junior, Senior, or Special Education student, looking for career opportunities? Well if so read on and discover a career that may interest you. Are you interested in Child Care, Food Management, T.V. Production, Horticulture, Electronics, Hospital or Dental service, Word Processing or Accounting, Drafting, Cosmetology, Small Engines or Auto Mechanics, plus more? You ask where can I get educated in the career of my choice? I'll tell you Hill Academic Center. All you have to do is apply in the career center.

The Vocational Center was designed to give students the chance

of starting a career and still earn three credits. Hill is made of Everett, Eastern, Sexton, and Adult Ed. students, who attend in the morning 7:45 - 10:45 or in the afternoon 11:30 - 2:30.

Hill offers a one or two year course depending on the course, which can be taken either Junior or Senior year. For instance Hospital service is a one year course, which can be taken either Junior or Senior year. But Cosmetology is a two year course that has to be started your Junior year.

If you're interested in any course but not sure of what is involved in that course you can talk to

Mr. Foster Everett's Hill coordinator located in the career center for more information.

Cosmetology is a strictly regulated program by the state and school district. First of all good attendance is a requirement to get into the program. You must attend the three hour class each day because you will need 1500 hours to graduate. 350 hours are earned your Junior year before you move onto the Senior side. When you start on the Senior side you will work on clients. All services are performed by supervised Senior students. Hill Cosmetology isn't just a class but it is also a salon.

Architectural Drafting is a two year program designed to provide an understanding of basic drafting skills, geometric construction, architectural design concepts, modular buildings, renovations and commercial structural plans. Students prepare for entry level employment in architectural, structural, civil and other related positions as drafter-persons. This is an excellent pre-engineering course as well as a job entry preparation.

Word Processing is one year program designed to provide knowledge of word processing equipment use, dictation, keyboard skills, and business attitudes and attributes. Students are provided with hands-on experience, on the most current up to date word processors and computers available. This course is good for students who want to continue in the business career, or who might want to go directly to work. Students interested in word processing should have basic typing skills.


