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



Spring break offers a needed time to relax and have fun. After spring break everyone is recharged and ready to work.





One of the best things about having spare time is finding ways to fill it and making memories that will last a lifetime.




The Race Against Time















For some, this will be the last big dance as a whole class. Aloha to the seniors!



The movie reel rolls by quickly. Remember to stop the film and take a deep breath, before going forward.



One very important decision they influenced was selecting qualities for a new superintendent and principal. With the help of Tom







Success isn't easy, especially when it comes to competition of the sciences. Dansville students push themselves and strive for success and that's exactly what they get.



Quiz Bowl and *Quizbusters* are great ways of showing your mental power. Dansville High School offers both. Mrs. Charlesbois recruits interested students every year.



Many teachers and office personnel think that aids are a very necessary help in making the school run smoothly.



According to Katelyn Russell, "I loved being part of the equestrian team. Everyone on the team was really great. They were a really fun bunch of people to be with."












No matter what the elective is, everyone likes to have a break between regular classes. They make the average student's day a lot of fun.







Whatever sport it may be, the athletes are committed to the goals of having fun and competing to the best of their abilities. Along with discipline, this is what Aggie sport is all about.






The varsity had a building season this time around. Their record was 5-15 throughout the year. They'll need to work and put a lot of effort into the games. That's what makes a good team.










Come cheer the team on for some great, competitive volleyball games.



































