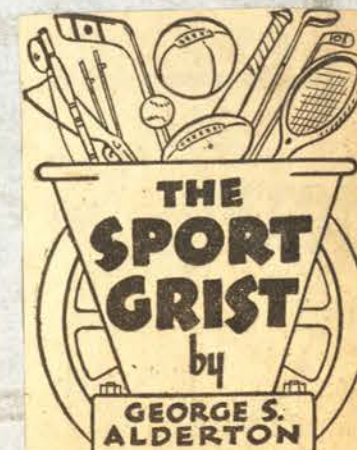

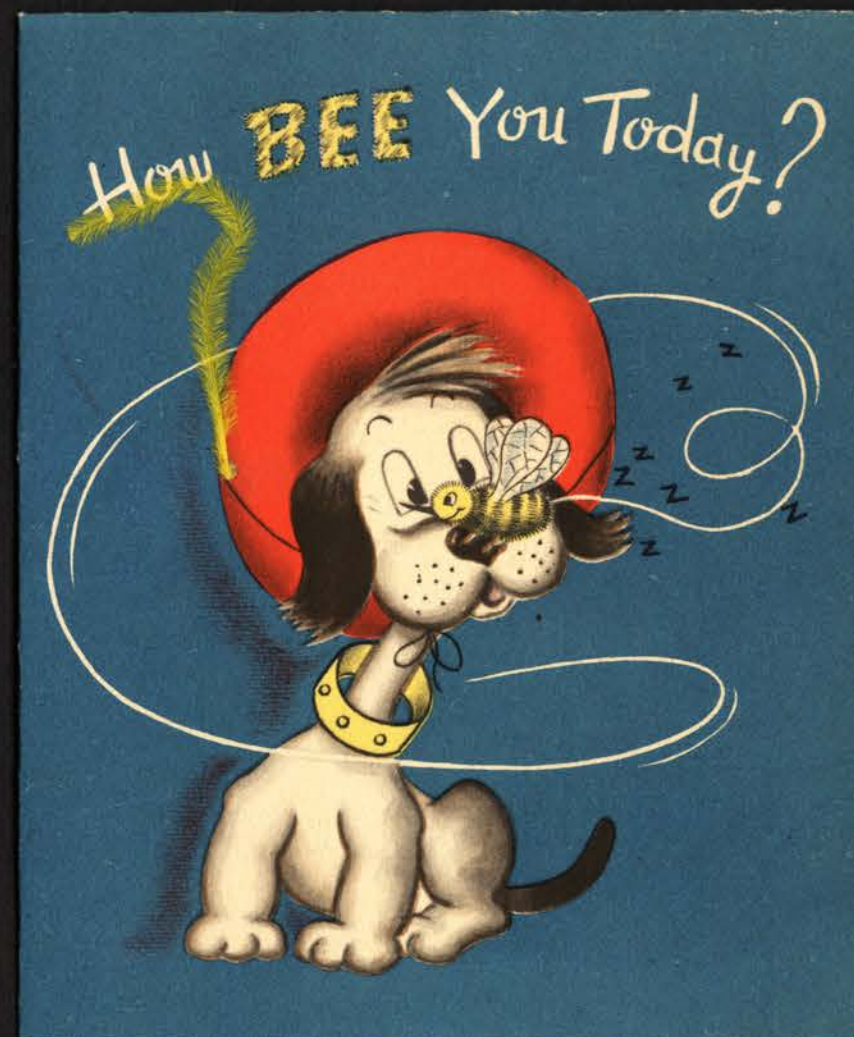
You're ahead of the hitter now, Doc, and those runners won't score. Bear down, Kid!

M. S. C. Football Ticket Sale Hits 5,274 Mark

Season ticket sale for Michigan State college's five home football games next fall have passed the 5,000 mark months ahead of the opening contest.

The Downtown Coaches' club's 10-day campaign to sell the tickets finished successfully Wednesday evening at the final banquet with a report of 5,274 sold. Of this total 3,842 were actually the work of the sales force of more than 200 workers.



The balance came from mail order sales already made by the Michigan State college athletic office and from reports coming from alumni conducting drives in 15 other cities.

The club's goal was 4,602 tickets, twice the total of 2,301 sold two years ago when the first drive was staged by the club.

The figure of 5,274 is incomplete. Some of the team leaders were unable to present final totals and there will be additional sales in the other cities.

"White" Team Wins

"I feel certain," declared Chairman Joseph R. Gwinn, "that the final total will pass the 6,000 mark. It is an unqualified success from the club's standpoint, a tribute to the hard work of these men."

Team honors went to the "White" army under the direction of C. Bart Tenny, general. This team sold 2,108 tickets. The "Green" army, under General Cornelius (Bud) Wagenvoord sold 1,734.

All-expense trips to State's game with Notre Dame at South Bend next fall went to 11 of the salesmen on the achievement basis. Tenny won the first as the top general. Others went to Frank Kropschot

with 900 and William Caskey with 1,311 as the top "colonels" of divisions. Team captains winning trips for their sales were Ron Weger 290, Wallace Beden 329, George Clark 206, Hubert Ellison 323. Individual workers who won were Charles Main 59 and John Pingel 61, while Al Wendrow and Gail Retzliff topped the entire field with each selling 107.

Chairman of the meeting was Edward Hacker. Dean L. C. Emmons extended appreciation for the college and Ralph H. Young, athletic director, responded for the athletic department. President Glenn Sanford of the club was given a football bearing the autograph of all present.

An honorary membership in the Downtown Coaches' club was presented to Nick Kerbawy, who is leaving the college athletic publicity directorship at the end of the current week to fill a similar post for the Detroit Lions.



Capital prizes for the salesmen were a registered English setter and a live pig which will be fattened and delivered for storage

locker use next fall. I. E. Hill won the handsome dog and be-ribboned porker went to G. Clark, shown with their prizes.

Gwinn thanked the salesmen and told them that "it was a grand job, well done."

Three members of the football coaching staff spoke briefly. In the absence of Coach, Biggie Munn, remarks were offered by Forrest Evashevski, Leverne (Kip) Taylor and Hugh (Duffy) Daugherty.

Evashevski told the "coaches" that "I think we will have a team with imagination and color; one that will block and tackle, and one that may be beaten, but never out-fought."

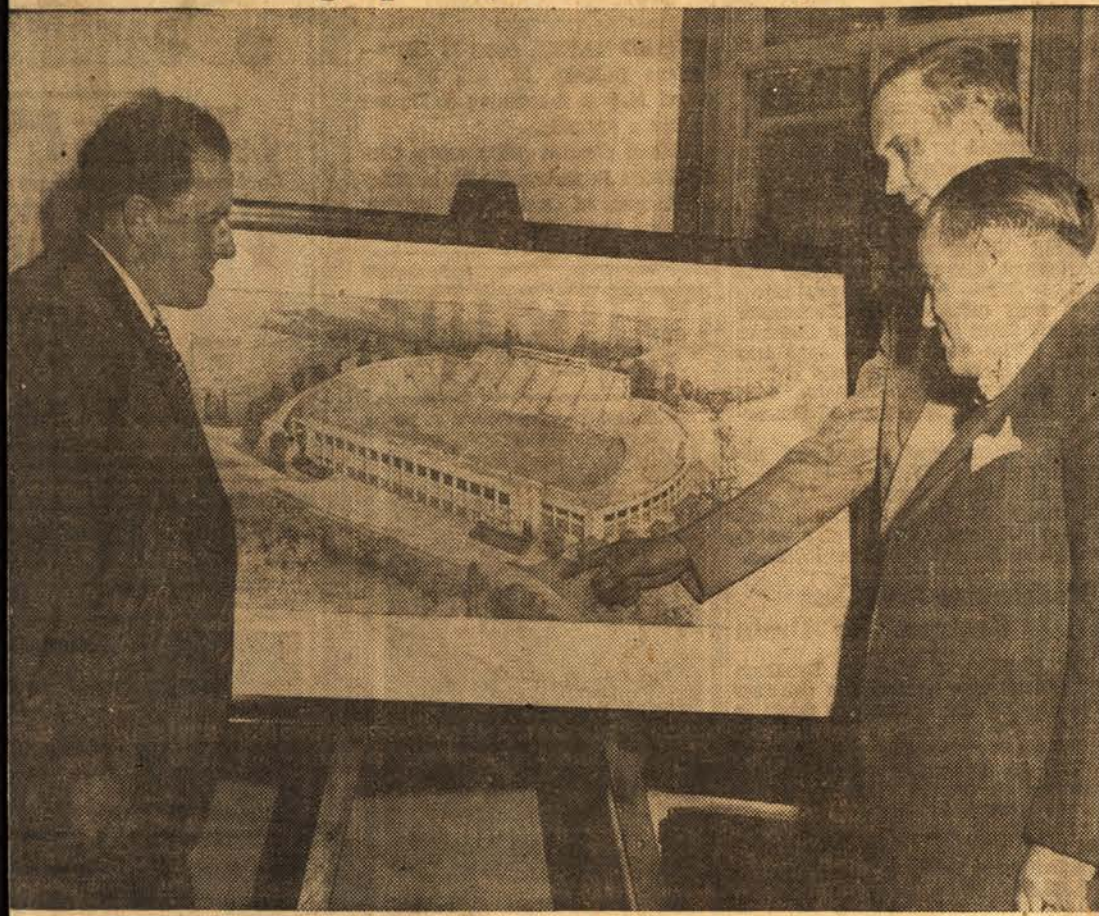

'Coaches' Sell 1,808 Tickets in First Charge

With first reports bearing out optimistic forecasts for the success of the Downtown Coaches' club football season ticket sale at Michigan State college, salesmen swept forward to a busy week-end Thursday.

Cheered by the surprising 1,808 sales reported Wednesday noon, the nearly 200 workers broke fresh ground. Prospect lists are now cast aside and the selling goes on a free-for-all-basis. Some of the workers apparently have been waiting for this signal.

Joseph R. Gwinn, general chairman, was pleased with the first report.

"That's wonderful news," he said when he surveyed the big scoreboard after the first report lunch-

eon Wednesday noon at the Union building on the campus. "These fellows are really pitching! I just have the feeling that they are going to go stronger as we move along toward the finish. Remember, two years ago we sold only 2,301 tickets in the whole campaign. We have 1,808 the first day this time!"

There will be no further report until next Monday noon when the workers again gather at the college for the second report meeting. The victory banquet is scheduled for Wednesday night, April 28, when the last totals will be turned in. Competition for the large array of prizes is keen, but chiefly the accomplishments are due to sincere effort.

First round honors went to the White "army," commanded by C. Bart Tenny, which sold 1,001 tickets. The Green "army," directed by Cornelius (Bud) Wagenvoord, totalled 807.

Top individual in the first report was Ronald E. Weger, who came in with 108 sales. Al Wendrow disposed of 83 tickets. Chris McManus sold 59. Other high men were Dick Lilley, 55; Art Brandstatter, 47, and Tom Paton, 41.

Wendrow and Ernest Shassberger were called to the platform by Chairman Edward Hacker to reveal the secrets of their success. Wendrow said he had sold largely to individuals, most of whom had

never before purchased season tickets at the college.

No reports have been received from the out-of-town drives being conducted in 15 cities. This may not even be available when the final banquet is held, but a substantial total is almost certain to result. This out-of-town campaign idea was also a product of the Downtown Coaches' club, which will receive credit for the sales.

Albert Amiss, veteran M. S. C. athletic groundskeeper, was the guest of honor at the Wednesday luncheon. He was tendered a certificate of life membership in the club by President Glenn Sanford. Next Monday noon John G. (Jack) Heppinstall, veteran athletic trainer, will be similarly honored.

Ticket Salesmen Making Report Monday

Downtown Coaches' club drive to fill Michigan State college's Macklin field stadium for football games next fall passes another milestone Monday. The second report meeting of the 10-day campaign was scheduled for the Union building at noon.

Chairman Joseph R. Gwinn and his leaders were eagerly awaiting the report of workers who have been busy selling tickets since they last turned in their score on April 21. With 1,808 reservations registered, leaders hoped the goal of 4,602 tickets might be reached Monday noon.

The campaign will run through

Wednesday, with the victory planned for that evening at the Union building.

"We will hit the ball hard the last couple of days," Chairman Gwinn said. "If we don't pass the goal Monday noon, it will be up to everybody to start batting again as they did the first couple of days. Workers are reporting a fine reception from the prospects."

Gwinn said that a survey of the sales slips indicated that many new season ticket holders were being enlisted.

"We're breaking new ground this time," he said. "Just from looking over the names of those who have

bought tickets, we can see that hundreds of Lansing people who never bought season tickets before are enrolled. It's a success in that respect right now."

Reports from the 15 cities where season ticket sales drives are being held simultaneously with the Lansing campaign will not be available before Wednesday, Gwinn said.

"I don't think we will have any accurate figures on these other drives," he stated. "However, we know that there will be several hundred to add to our total. Incomplete reports indicate they are doing well out-state, too."

Ticket Sales Forces Making Initial Reports; Field to Be Wide Open Now

First reports on the success of their football season ticket sale were to be made Wednesday when the Downtown Coaches drive workers made reports at a noon luncheon. They were to gather at Michigan State college's Union building.

Workers were given prospect cards for the first two days of the drive

which opened Monday evening. Following the luncheon they will be turned loose to pick up customers wherever and whenever they can. Indications are that the drive workers will reach their 4,602 ticket sales goal.

Not only is Lansing making an effort to produce regular customers for the Spartans' home games next fall, but similar campaigns are being staged in 15 other cities, including Toledo, O., and South Bend. The local staff of salesmen numbers approximately 200 with Cornelius (Bud) Wagenvoord and C. Bart Tenny serving as generals of two rival "armies." Joseph R. Gwinn is general chairman.

Sell for 'Doc'

Perhaps in tribute to their captain who is ill in Edward Sparrow hospital, Team No. 32 topped the entire field in the Downtown Coaches' club football season ticket sales at the first report luncheon Wednesday. Harold (Doc) Shaw, of Motor Wheel who was stricken with a heart attack several days ago, is the team captain. The total was 169, seven more than the runner-up total of 161 reported by Ronald E. Weger for Team No. 7. Hubert Ellison's Team No. 30 sold 154 tickets.

Football Ticket Salesmen Need 1,710 Customers in Drive

Downtown Coaches' club season football ticket salesmen are 1,710 sales short of their goal.

With tabulations completed after the report luncheon at the Union building on the Michigan State college campus, the figure of 2,992 was on the board for total. They have until Wednesday night to reach the 4,602 objective hung up for the workers.

Chairman Joseph R. Gwinn cautioned the workers that they could not ease up. They are expecting some returns from out-state, but Gwinn said they couldn't bank on

"We've got to make up the balance ourselves, and then we know it's done!" he declared. "We can't depend on the other fellow. Whatever he does will be a bonus."

At the first report luncheon a total of 1,814 sales was reported. The workers fell off the pace during the second phase of the drive for they turned in only 1,178 the second day.

"I think that slump was to be expected," declared Edward Hacker, who was program chairman Monday. "They'll get up their steam between now and Wednesday night. I feel sure. They got to! We are not going to fall in this thing!"

Gwinn told the workers that prospective customers were still plentiful. Three different people, knowing he was heading the drive, submitted voluntary orders to him for 36 tickets.

"That's proof they are still available," said Gwinn. "You can't see the forest for the trees, sometimes. I know the gang is working, and I give them credit for it. Just one more push and over we go!"

Gail Retzlaff was the top individual salesman. City bowling star, former local baseball player and an avid sports follower, Retzlaff turned in 66 sales. He won a casting rod for his prize. Dick Stew-

art came up with 42. Leslie (Doc) Surato who has been running the team for Harold (Doc) Shaw, ill in the hospital, stunned the assembly with another 150 team sales. He led the league in the first day's report, and is out to land the championship for "Doc" who from his hospital bed is watching the reports day by day.

"We got to win this one for 'Doc,'" said Surato. "It will do him a world of good. Anybody want to buy a ticket?"

Mayor Ralph Crego spoke to the salesmen Monday noon. "You aren't selling football tickets," he told the salesmen. "You are selling enthusiasm and

inspiration for the Lansing community."

Jack Heppinstall, for 33 years trainer of the college teams, was awarded an honorary lifetime membership in the Downtown Coaches' club. He has served under 10 different football coaches at East Lansing.

Cornelius (Bud) Wagenvoord's division won the prize for greater sales. At the first report luncheon the honors went to C. Bart Tenny's group. With a horse-apiece, the rival teams will drive for the wire Wednesday night.

Introducing team captains at Monday's luncheon were Donald Stirm and Frank Kropschot, colonels in the competition.
