Meaning of "Free Coinage." "Free Coinage" is understood to mean the right of any individual to deliver at the United States mint gold or silver of standard firmness and to have the same minted into coins of standard weight free of expense to th owner of the metal. This is the genenal meaning of the term. Of course the details would depend on the terms of the law authorizing it. The opera-tion of such a law just now, so far as sNver is concerned, would be this: The owner of said sixty cents worth of silver would carry his money to the mint, have the government stamp imprinted thereon, and compet his neighbor to accept the coin thus produced in payment of a debt of one dollar. But as it is not practicable for the customer to walt until his silver is minted, it is proposed that h shall be paid for the metal so deposit. ed, one legal tender paper dollar, r deemable in gold. The advantage this arrangement is that the lucky dealer may purchase with his paper dollar a dollar's worth of silver, 60 cents' worth of which he may take the mint and sell it for another dollar and so forth and on indefinitely which will be seen to be a very profit ble operation.
