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THE LINDBERGH BROADCAST

In this country where so much is said about freedom of speech and freedom of the press why should there be so much acrimony over Colonel Charles Lindbergh's radio broadcast? Colonel Lindbergh has a right to his own opinion and possesses the right to express it. Because what he said happened not to be the popular sentiment in Washington or in England a clamor immediately arises against the colonel. He is attacked by Anglo-Americans and the English as being Nazi.

Colonel Lindbergh is an American and a good one despite what happened to his family in this country. Lindbergh is an American who a few short weeks ago was being showered with praise for his service to army aviation. In England he was honored until he happened to make a report which was opposite to what government propaganda would have Englishmen believe. So the government took their spite out on Lindbergh.

When Lindbergh is asked a question he is inclined to give a direct reply. Statesmen don't do that, you know. Politicians want the people to be told only what the politicians would have them believe. Right now there is a powerful group of politicians who would have the people believe that we must help wipe out Germany and Russia, that we must again send our youth to European battlefields, that we must again turn out munitions to make a Christian war. The politicians and war-mongers want everyone who disagrees with the government policy branded as a Nazi or a Communist or a Fascist. Because the Americanism of politicians is hyphenated with Britain or France they can not understand that an American can stand on his own, without being a British-American, an Italo-American, a German-American, an Afro-American or a Polish-American.

We talk about free speech yet have you noticed that authorities are cracking down on Father Coughlin and that there is a serious possibility that his broadcasts will be banned from the air waves? No, of course, we don't agree with all of what the Royal Oak priest has said but we do maintain that he has a right to utter and publish his opinions and his beliefs.

Senator Key Pittman, Roosevelt senatorial leader and chairman of the senate foreign relations committee, appeared in newsreels last week in as clever a piece of propaganda as has come to our notice. He has a right to his opinions. So has Charles A. Lindbergh. So has Father Coughlin. So have you and I.

Of course, England is offended over the Lindbergh reference to Canada, and alarmed over what the British construe as an attempt to wean Canada away from the empire. Canada could have been a part of the United States at one time but refused. Benjamin Franklin made a trip to Canada at the outbreak of the Revolution and tried to coax Canada to go along with the Colonies. Many Canadians gave aid to the American cause but all of French-Canada was opposed to joining the Revolution. French-Canadians were of peasant stock and preferred living under the British autocracy to living under French bureaucracy. Then, too, there was the matter of religion. French-Canada was almost 100 per cent Catholic while New England was almost 100 per cent Protestant. In fact, the feeling in Canada was so bitter against the Colonies that American troops were driven out and American statesmen were given a cold shoulder.

The United States does not covet any part of Canada. Neither does Canada covet the United States. This continent is big enough for two great nations, and probably two can do a better job of governing than can one.

These issues are beside the point, however. The issue is freedom of speech. We have done a lot of talking about free speech. Are we willing to fight to retain that right? Are we willing to protect speakers from political abuse because of what they have said? We have permitted Communists and all sorts of propagandists and agitators to speak. Are we ready to bar Americans who have nothing to sell from the air waves and newspapers? Or should we permit propagandists or those whose views coincide exactly with those of the administration to speak and bar all others?

PRICES ON APPLES

Hundreds of carloads of Michigan apples are being purchased by the Federal Surplus Commodities Corporation for distribution through relief channels. Yet the prices to growers are remaining at a low level. Why? According to the Hartford Day Spring, published in the heart of the apple belt, the government is going at the apple buying the wrong way. The newspaper points out that the government takes only the cream of the crop, its inspectors being more exacting in their requirements than are the inspectors on local markets. The growers believe that if the government would buy second grade apples for distribution to relief clients that growers could command a better price for the choice fruit.

Under the present plan the best apples are sold to the government and the cash market must be satisfied with second grade fruit. We believe that the Hartford Day Spring has pointed to a real weakness in the government program for purchasing surplus commodities.

WORKING TOGETHER

Mason and Williamston business men who attended a joint meeting with the Williamston Kiwanis club one night last week came away with at least one sound thought. Bill Otto of the Lansing Chamber of Commerce was the speaker and Bill has a way of coming up with something almost every time he talks, and he speaks often.

Bill pointed out that no man's business is worth anything unless there are buyers in his community. A Mason merchant might consider his business worth \$20,000 today. If by some stroke of fate the entire community, with the exception of his store, was wiped out tonight, what would the one man's business be worth tomorrow? Very little. A business man must have customers to remain in business. The smartest lawyer in the country must have clients. The best physician must have patients or else his practice is of little value. Therefore, all of us are dependent on others. City folks are dependent on farmers just as farmers are dependent on city people for the sale of their products.

No man can be self-sufficient. Neither can a city, a county, a state or a nation. All of us, if we are to lead lives of usefulness, must have someone besides ourselves to serve. We must work together and the more we work together the more useful we can be.

THE CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

The half-hundred who attended the centennial banquet honoring former county officials and members of the board of supervisors will be better and more useful citizens. They could not but be inspired with the recounting of the accomplishments of the first century of Ingham county history. They were told of their rich heritage, of the privations suffered by our forefathers that this might be a peaceful, happy place where their children, their grandchildren and their great grandchildren might live in harmony.

Ingham county's early settlers were of English, Scotch, Irish and German ancestry. They followed the westward urge; most of them coming to Michigan from Western New York and New England. They were solid, thrifty, independent, self-reliant folks, able to contend with the wilderness and the hardships of pioneer life.

Ingham county has a proud history of accomplishment. Our forefathers did well. Now it is up to us to do as well with our modern tools as they did with pioneer tools.

Last week we worked day and night getting out reports for county departments, printing the fifty centennial programs and publishing a 16-page newspaper. We are still one man shy because of Joe Brower's broken arm. Therefore we were an hour or so late going to press Thursday afternoon. Just as we were changing the packing, part of a pin dropped down. The pin controlled the opening of the grippers and without the grippers opening as the cylinder revolves there is no use trying to feed sheets into the press. We were stuck.

I called Hallenback's in Lansing and asked them to stand by to print for us. They willingly agreed. We looked the press over and thought we would call in Cecil Hall, across the way at the Chevrolet garage. He came, he inspected the setup and said, "I believe I can fix it."

He took a few of the main gears off the press, retrieved the butt of the broken pin, took the two parts to his garage, welded the pieces together, dressed the pin down to thousands of fit the groove in the cylinder and just one hour and a half from the time of the break the press was back together again and we had started action. When Cecil gets tired of the automobile business he can get a job erecting and repairing presses.

We really blame V. J. Brown for the press breakdown. Presses do not and should not break down often. I think this is only the third time in 10 years that the cylinder press has been down. Yet just before midnight Wednesday we stepped into the plant where a full crew was working and said, "What's this? I thought that there was not going to be any overtime after the installation of the new typesetting machine. Here everyone is at work. What will happen about press time tomorrow will be a press breakdown."

"You're a cheerful soul," I replied. "What kind of creep-hanging do you call that?" His remark rather infuriated me and I returned to work leaving the office I returned to find that the rollers had been lifted and that the stop button had been pegged down. And then as we were just going to press with the last run the pin broke. * * * All of us climbed on to the auditorium general good and strong when he stepped in to see how things were going Thursday night. We accused him of hexing the press. He must be psychic because he declared that he had a hunch that something was going to happen.

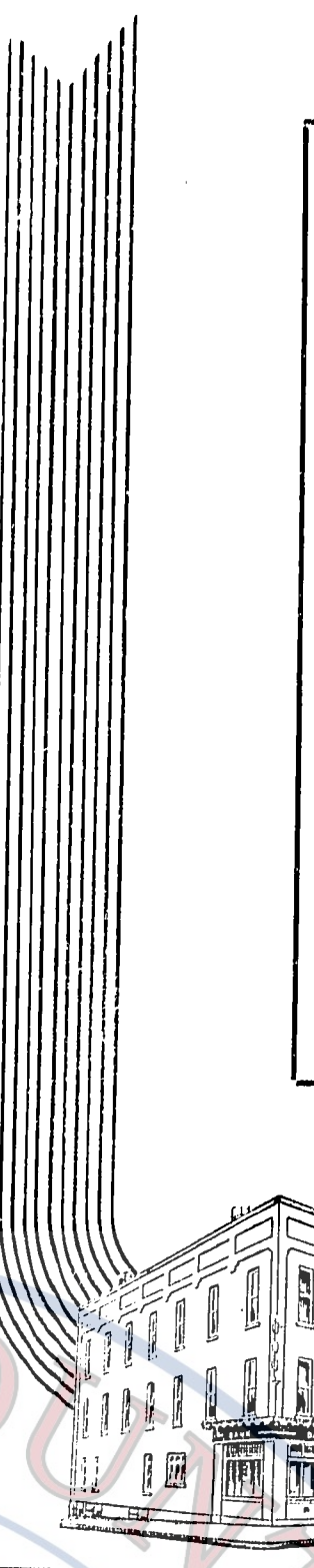

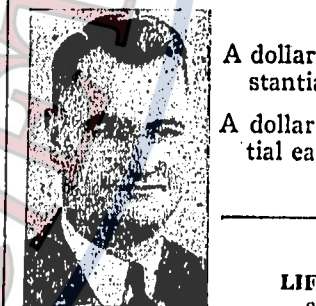

COWS RELISH CULL BEANS
Cull beans can be worth \$1.50 a hundred pounds as livestock feed when cottonseed meal is worth \$1.70 a hundred for 43 percent protein, says P. H. Huffman, associate professor in dairy husbandry at Michigan State college. Experiments at the college indicate that at least one-fourth of the grain mixture without affecting the palatability of the feed. SIXTH DISTRICT FAVORS STRICT NEUTRALITY LAW

100 TO 1 MARGIN FILED UP BY LETTER WRITERS.

Rep. William W. Blackney of Flint, representative in congress from the sixth congressional district made up of Ingham, Livingston and Genesee counties, is in favor of retaining the present neutrality law and is against the lifting of the arms embargo as demanded by President Roosevelt. In a letter to the Ingham County News Rep. Blackney declared that there is a great preponderance of sentiment in this district favoring his stand.

The representative wrote, "During the three years that I have represented the sixth district in Congress, no legislation has attracted as much attention as the present neutrality legislation. I have received letters, telegrams, and petitions from the 50 townships in my district, the nine cities, and the 28 villages. The highest number of letters received in one mail's delivery exceeded 1500, and the total of the letters, telegrams, and petitions received throughout the district is in excess of 10,000.

There has been considerable talk in Washington by the proponents of the president's neutrality legislation that letters from one's constituents home, adverse to the administration's bill, are propaganda. This statement is not true. If the citizens in America in their respective congressional districts write their congressmen on legislation in which they are vitally interested, that certainly is not propaganda, but their lawful right in expressing their convictions to their congressmen who, after all, are but the agents of their constituents.

"I have read the letters sent to my office with interest because these letters contain an earnest appeal from fathers and mothers and other interested citizens of my district, expressing their views upon this all-important subject. I personally am glad to receive these letters. It is a fine thing in America when our citizenry takes interest in government. It is a wholesome sign, because it shows they are vitally interested in governmental problems and policies.

"I have received letters and telegrams from practically every profession, business and group—from lawyers, doctors, dentists, editors, ministers, farmers, manufacturers, factory workers, laborers, women's clubs, churches, lodges, and fraternalities. The preponderant thought contained in these letters and telegrams is against the American's embarking in European war. The writers are unanimous in the thought that America has all of the problems it can safely handle without assuming new and dangerous problems across the ocean.

"The great majority of the letters are opposed to the repeal of the existing neutrality law with its embargo provision. My letters would be, conservatively, 100 to 1 against the repeal of the neutrality bill. The main reason expressed is that they are afraid its change would embroil us in European war, and that it would be unneutral to change while a war is in progress. Many letters contained the statement that the neutrality acts of 1935 and 1937 were passed virtually unanimously by congress when there was no public excitement or danger of war and when congress could put its unprejudiced thought to the preparation of the proper neutrality bill, and that the president approved of this legislation.

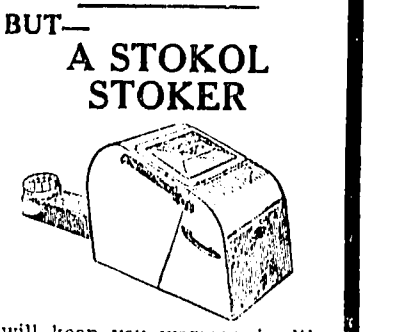
"Many of the writers of my letters are now unable to see why, in time of war, there should be a sudden departure from a neutral policy which had met with practically unanimity by both congress and the president.

"I wish to state to the readers of your paper that I am in favor of a strict neutrality bill with teeth in it, rigidly enforced, and my votes shall always be to protect America in that regard and also to prevent America from being drawn into European wars."

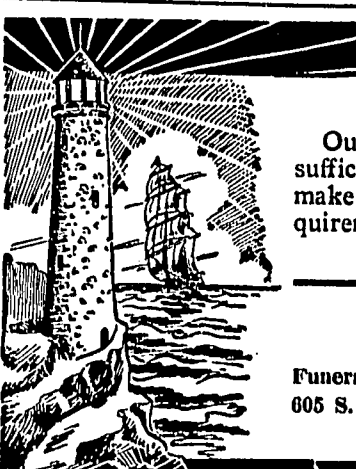

Ruling On Roadside By Attorney General

BETTER SUPERVISION OF ROAD-SIDES IS URGED.

"Who owns the rural roadways?" That is a question which has been submitted to Michigan's Attorney General Thomas W. Read to answer some of the problems that face P. A. Herbert, head of the forestry department at Michigan State college.

Need for a clarification of the legal rights of the public, of county and state highway commissions, and of owners of abutting properties is cited by Professor Herbert. Contrary to general belief, he says, it is apparent that the counties or the state do not ordinarily own the roads.

He commends the state highway commission for its program of adequate supervision of the landscaping and maintenance of roadways, but finds fault with many of the programs of county road commissions. Unsupervised roadside work, he indicates, is resulting in poor care of roadside trees and shrubs and building up friction with landowners. Expropriation among the counties, he says, are Wayne, Kent and Oakland where beautification is supervised under trained arborists.

In most cases a property owner's deed reads "to the center of the right-of-way," or gives him title to an entire acreage without mention of an easement for highway purposes. Ultimate solution would be outright purchase of highways, but this is admitted a costly correction.

GEORGE SHAFER HUNT THREE DAYS WITH UTES.

Two weeks ago George Shafer of Marion, accompanied by Gilbert Polz, left Marion on a leisurely trip through the west. Mr. Shafer was a teacher at Indian schools in the west and at schools in the Philippines for many years. In the following paragraphs Mr. Shafer gives an account of his journey to the coast:

"We left Marion about noon Tuesday, October 3, for the west without any particular route in mind, or destination either except that we wished to see the San Francisco fair, the Ute Indian reservation, where I had been in charge of the schools for some years, Los Angeles and the friends there, Boulder Dam and the Grand Canyon, and the Shiner ranch in New Mexico.

"The first afternoon we drove to Joliet, Illinois, where we stayed the night in a tourist cabin. The area traversed the first day was uninteresting as most of the country through which we passed seemed dry and dusty from drought. On the second day we drove through Iowa and slept that night in a tourist cabin in Omaha, Nebraska. The only eventful thing that happened to us was in Council Bluffs. Just as we were entering the city we were met by a heavy sand storm. Dust, leaves, corn husks and tumble weeds so enveloped us that we could hardly see. This was followed by a cloudburst. Rain and hail pelted us and soon made the streets actual rivers. There was plenty of lightning and the city was in total darkness. Gilbert was driving and we barely crept along the dark and watery streets. We crossed the Missouri by the toll bridge and found that Omaha on the Nebraska side of the river was lighted. The weather turned cold and we had an unheated cabin. We felt as though we were not particularly lucky that day.

"Thursday we started out early and after the rain driving was fine. But soon we got out of the rain and entered the 'dust bowl.' The wind blew from the southwest and was hot and laden with dust. The country through which we passed looked like a desolate phantom land. Everything and everybody looked dilapidated and the picture of misery. All the trees were dead and extending bare branches to the sky. The buildings were dust colored and in ill repair. Most crops were poor indeed and there were very few crops at all. At first we did not mind it, but after hours of driving and we had passed miles and miles of desolation, we could hardly keep from feeling depressed. After we had passed the Colorado line things began to look better and we were gladdened by the fresh fields of sugar beets and alfalfa. Irrigation is used in Colorado almost exclusively. We drove 515 miles that day and slept in Greeley.

"Friday we started westward at 7:00 a. m. We intended crossing the Rockies over the Fall River pass which is 13,900 feet high, the highest in the Rockies, but we found it full of snow, 10 feet over the pass, so we had to drive south 50 miles to Denver and cross the mountains by the Berthoud and Rabbits Ear passes. The Berthoud pass is only 11,600 feet high, but when we had driven to the top, Gilbert and I climbed up 600 feet higher. In the light air of the mountain, we found that breathing was very difficult and we both felt light-headed and shaky. Rabbits Ear pass is still lower and not so lovely but the autumn was showing in the bright yellow of the aspens and there was plenty of snow to contrast with the dark green of the pines and firs. We slept that night in Steam Boat Springs—with some of my old friends from New Mexico.

"Saturday we did not start out west until nearly noon and we drove but 280 miles, arriving in White-rocks, Utah, my old Indian school, about five. Everyone there, including Indians, employers and ranchers, seemed glad to see us. Gilbert soon found a congenial spirit in one of the young school ma'ams and she provided him with a gun and a horse and a companion. It was with some difficulty that I persuaded him to continue the trip after three delightful days spent in White-rocks. We left White-rocks about noon Tuesday, October 10, for a 180-mile drive

to Salt Lake City over the most beautiful scenery in Utah. Strawberry pass, over which we passed, is not over 9,000 feet high, but we saw plenty of snow. In fact, for about eight days now we have kept in sight of snow-capped peaks.

"We got to Salt Lake City about 4:00 p. m. and drove straight to the lake, some 14 miles north of the city. Although it was rather cool we both went swimming in the salt water. I have had that novel experience of not being able to sink in the water, but I enjoyed seeing Gilbert bobbing about like a cork on top of the water. We took some pictures there and filled several bottles with water to bring home as souvenirs. We used whiskey bottles as they lay in great numbers along the water's edge. Perhaps Mormons do not care for whiskey but certainly the Gentiles do as the bottles bore evidence. The next day we visited the capitol building which I consider one of the very finest in the United States, and certainly the cleanest, the temple grounds and the tubercule and heard the pin dropped at one end of the building which sounded like a ten-penny nail to the crowd at the other end of the 250-foot building. We left at noon October 11, and drove to Tonopah, Nevada, a distance of 410 miles, over the Great Salt Lake desert. The road was fine and smooth and the rim of snow-capped peaks always surrounded us, but the country was one desolate salt-crusted piece of country. We slept in a tourist cabin in Tonopah and started early for a trip to and through the Yosemite Valley. We were told that the Yosemite entrance was blocked with snow and that the park had been closed for the winter, but we took the chance and after some difficulty on cross roads over which thousands of head of cattle were being driven we arrived at the eastern gate of the park. At one place on the mountainside, we came up with a Frenchman—a shepherd—er, with his two donkeys and his camp furnishings. We stopped and took our pictures with him and his dogs and donkeys. He seemed pleased indeed at the break in his monotonous job and offered us some of his wine and bread. He had 1500 sheep. He said black sheep as counters. In his flock he had 20 black sheep, so on the hillside he needs only to see that the black sheep are all there to feel quite sure that none of the white ones have strayed. Should he note that one or more of the black sheep are missing, then he knows that some of his flock have strayed away.

"The park itself is beyond description. One must see its beauty to appreciate it. The geysers, the big trees whose tops seem almost to touch the sky, the crystal-clear lakes, the water falls and above all the dazzling white of the eternal snow-capped peaks surpass all attempts to describe. We did the park in the afternoon, and although we have missed a lot, we feel that we must hasten on to the coast. We are sleeping in a tourist cottage at this town of Mariposa, California and will drive on to San Francisco and the fair tomorrow."

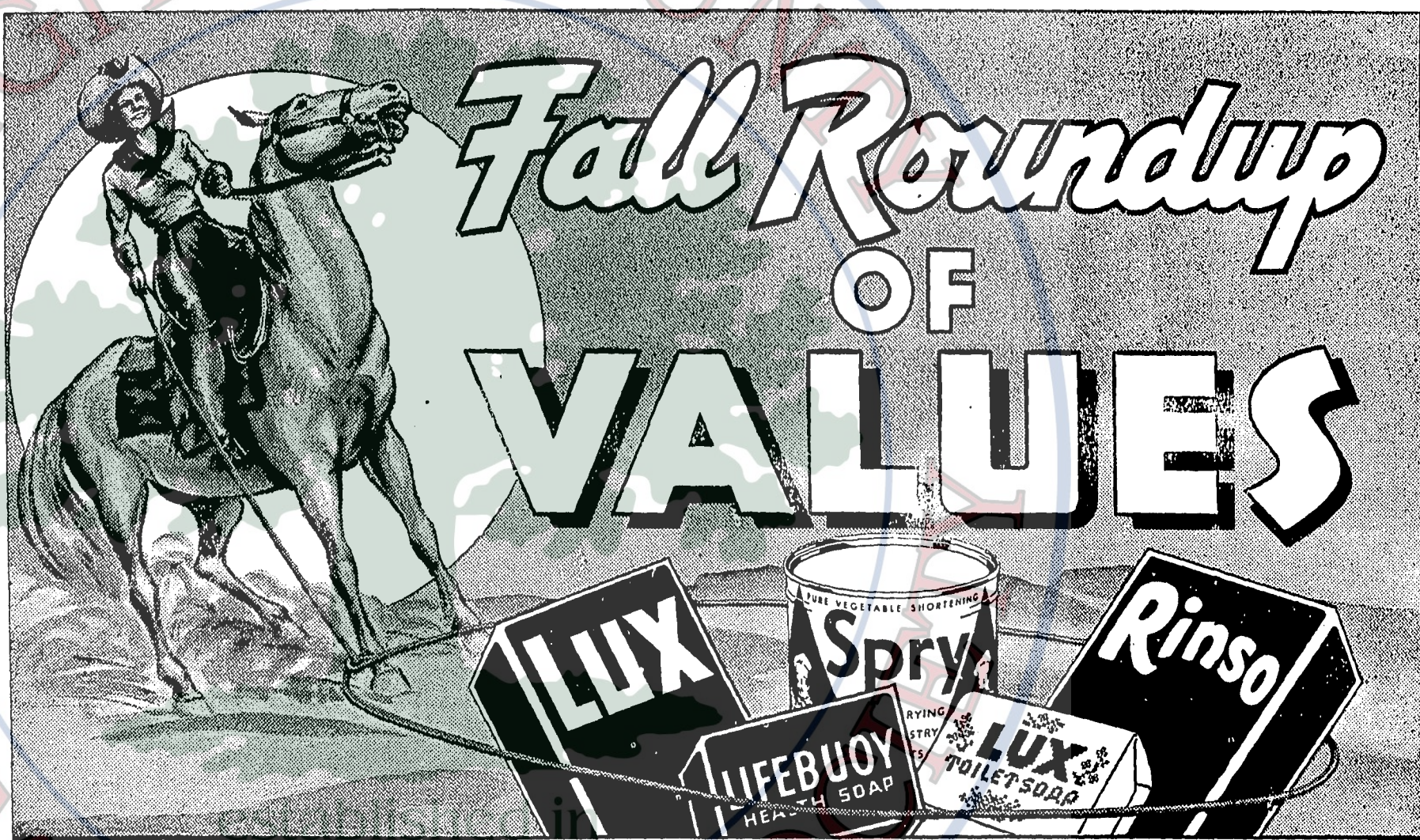

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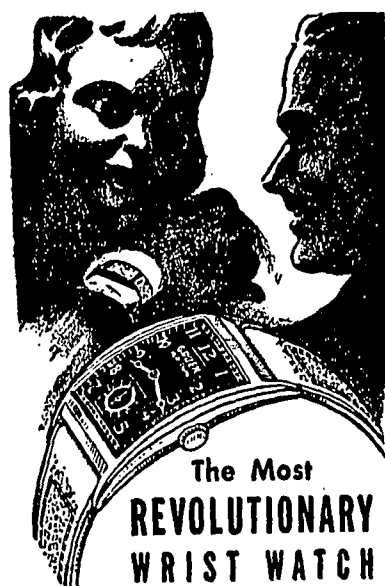

State Ignores Choice For Welfare Position

ed to the two-year term and Mrs. Lyman to the one-year state appointment. The welfare committee had been given the task of bringing in nominations.

Sup. Floyd Shaw of Lansing charged that the supervisors had been "blackballed" by the recommendation of the welfare committee. Sup. Toy replied that the recom-

mendations of the committee were merely nominations and that other nominations could be made from the floor.

Carl Marshall of Lansing was placed in nomination by Sup. O. R. Starkweather of Lansing, Sup. C. A. Clinton of Mason cautioned the board against hurrying the appointments through, declaring that supervisors are "now on the spot with relief and must make appointments of the ablest men and women available." He suggested that Louis B. McArthur, former judge of probate be drafted. The Mason supervisor stated that he had confidence in the three persons recommended but that the new commission needed a man of Judge McArthur's ability to help organize the new setup. However, Sup. Clinton withdrew the nomination from the lists of the two county candidates.

On an informal ballot for the three-year term Mr. Mills received 18 votes, Mr. Marshall 14 and Grant Hudson 1. For the two-year term Mr. Beatty was chosen unanimously.

On the recommendation for the state appointment Sup. Clinton again took the floor and warned his colleagues that the services of Mr. McArthur were needed. He declared that he had high respect for Mrs. Lyman but that the new commission

with its great responsibility needed Mr. McArthur's services. He also said that it was his understanding that Dr. Christian of the state board would have quite a lot to say about the state appointment and urged that there be no definite understanding between the supervisors and the welfare committee that the supervisors' recommendation would be accepted. He was assured by several supervisors that there was no question about the county recommendation being adopted by the state commission.

McArthur Declines
Mr. McArthur received 23 votes to 11 for Mrs. Lyman. The board then declared a recess while a committee visited Mr. McArthur to urge him to accept the state appointment. An hour to notify the board that Mr. McArthur had flatly refused the appointment. Then Mrs. Lyman was unanimously chosen as the state commissioner for Ingham. That was the way the situation stood until Monday afternoon when the state commission announced that Mr. Harris, instead of Mrs. Lyman, would represent the state on the Ingham commission.

The state welfare department has recommended that present emergency relief act be continued until the first of the year. However, it is believed that the Ingham organization plans to take over from the emergency relief on November 1, the date specified in the law. The present commission notified all employees that their employment could be terminated any time after November 1.

Last week end there was heavy snow 150 miles north and in Cadillac a fall of seven inches was recorded. The skies clouded over Thursday forenoon and the air had the feel of rain.
