





### Call List Provided For Business Men

Mason fire and police departments are being provided with a call list of business places to be used in case of fire, break-ins, or other emergencies.

The Chamber of Commerce is making a directory of members, giving the address and telephone numbers of each key man in a business organization. The directories will be turned over to police and sheriff's officers and the fire chief.

As explained by Chamber President Al Rice, firemen and police officers are sometimes unable to find out who to call when store doors are found open or a fire starts.

**CLOSED SEASON ON CHUCKS**  
Finding a woodchuck killed by a rifle bullet at Swan Creek wildlife experiment station has prompted a reminder to local hunters of the chucks status in southern Michigan as a protected game animal. Farmers may take woodchucks at any time on their own land, where there is no closed season in the upper peninsula. But in southern Michigan the only open season is October 15 to December 31; in northern lower Michigan the season extends through January. Once considered a "varmint" and a fit target for small boys practicing with 22 caliber rifles, the woodchuck earned protection of the law in spring and summer by his services as a digger of dens that furnish shelter to cottontail rabbits.

**SHORTAGE OF COCKERELS**  
It may be a long wait between chicken dinners next year, it is reported in an article on the shortage of poultry on Midwest farms in the Prairie Farmer. It is stated that baby chick sales have dropped from 20 to 25 per cent this spring. The shortage of cockerels is serious, says Clarence Ems, superintendent of poultry in the department in Illinois. According to Ems, this means that the number of breeding stock for next year and many broiler men have gone, but of business because of the high cost of feed.

April showers amounted to 3.48 inches this year against 7.35 inches in 1947 and against one of the driest Aprils in years, .07, in 1946. Most years the April rainfall amounted to between two and three inches. During the week the rainfall amounted to .20 of an inch. Most of it came Sunday afternoon. Fruit trees are in blossom and trees are getting their leaves. New cones are developing on spruce trees. Rains and warm weather have given fast growth to pastures and to city lawns. ## Woman Tells of Travels in Southwest

My travels began on April 11, at 3:00 a. m., as we left Mason, amid a downpour of rain. We arrived at Jackson after train departure time but upon making inquiry, we found that the train had steam trouble at Chelsea and was 40 minutes late. We reached Chicago at 9:50 a. m. and in the last to the Rock Island railroad LaSalle street station, I met two very lovely ladies. One was from Windsor, Ontario and planning a vacation at Phoenix, Arizona. The other from Toronto, Ontario, journeying to El Paso, Texas, to make her home with her brother there. We were fellow passengers on the train out of Chicago. I had breakfast with the lady from Windsor at the coffee shop in the depot, then we took a walk down to Michigan avenue. On our return we found our red cap and he took us to our pullman. Soon we were on our way. The train carried three tourist pullmans, filled with people from

various places, who were touring the Carlsbad Caverns and other points of interest. They were nice people and we enjoyed ourselves in the lounge car through the day. All of the cars on the Rock Island and Southern Pacific had porters who made us very comfortable. Everyone was jolly and very friendly, and we chatted, played cards or walked about the cars, meeting other people.

From the time we left Mason the rain kept up a steady downfall, until we came into Kansas. Here people were trying to work in their fields. In Southern Illinois there were a few cuts up and in Iowa the farmers were just starting their spring work. The soil was wonderful there, and the farms seemed to be very prosperous. There were many hogs, mostly black, red and white belted.

As we traveled on into Kansas, we saw the large farms, with their spacious houses, granaries and a few lovely trees. Most of these farms had acres of wheat, but there were a few which had none at all. A fellow-traveler from Liberal, Kansas, told me that there were many farms which were unable to get their wheat planted, because of weather conditions.

At 5:00 p. m. it was time for dinner. The meals were very good, but very expensive, also. We chatted for awhile, then it was time to retire. Along the route when crews were changed or re-laying was done we had 20 or 30 minutes in which to mail cards or stroll along the platforms. The copper mines were running in full

force at Douglas, Arizona. We saw desert dotted with cactus, foothills, and mountains; occasionally a well with windmill, to provide water for the cattle which roamed for miles, grazing from dawn to dusk.

In New Mexico we saw the beautiful white sand plain which is now being used as a proving ground for the government. There is a saying that the white sand came over the mountain peak and a certain moisture lies beneath it, so that the sand never blows away. The peak of El Capitan mountain was still covered with snow. El Paso, Texas, offered a glimpse of the deserted wartime buildings, Old Mexico, and the Rio Grande river.

At El Paso there was a change of crews, then we were on our way again. After dinner I changed to a pullman that was to be set out at Tucson. I arrived at Tucson at 12:45 a. m., but I was still enjoying my first good night's sleep. At 7:00 I had breakfast at the depot, and thought the weather extremely cold. Later on I treasured the memory of the chillness, for the temperature was 86 degrees. After breakfast I called Mrs. May Ferguson, a former Mason resident, who now resides in the country there at Tucson, and she directed me to the bus line, where she met me when I got off the bus. She was very pleased to see someone from her former home. We had a nice talk, and she showed me some points of interest around the city. Everyone in Tucson seemed pleasant and friendly, with always a smile for everyone.

On my return trip I saw the places in the daylight that I had missed before. On my arrival at Tucumcari, New Mexico, at 7:45 p. m. I found a good hotel, which had very reasonable rates. After dinner I visited my aunt, Mrs. Mary J. Gunn, who is a patient at the Thomas nursing home. The home is nice, probably because it is run by such a wonderful person. After a good night's rest, I had breakfast in the hotel coffee shop, where the food was very tempting and very reasonable.

I shopped at Tucumcari, and my first stop was at a self-serve 5c to \$1.00 store, which I thought quite a novel idea. Then I visited a drug store and a nice department store. I always purchase something along my travels for my daughter, Zoune. After my shopping was completed I returned to the home to spend the day with my aunt. I had lunch with her that day, then in the evening I started my journey toward home.

My how good it seemed to see green grass growing, the trees almost in bud, and beautiful flowers blooming, after the hot sand and cactus which I had been seeing so much of.

The air seemed cool and fresh, and there were beautiful flowers everywhere.

## Chemical Thinning Practical for Fruit

Thinning of apples and peaches with chemical sprays is practical, says C. A. Langer, extension specialist in horticulture at Michigan State college. Full bloom is the most advantageous time for thinning apples, advises the specialist. He explains that this is when the petals on the center or king blossom are loosening.

Sprays of naphthalene acetic acid, sold commercially under many trade names, should be recommended for such apple varieties as Northern Spy, McIntosh, Hubbardston and Jonathan is less that for such heavy-setting varieties as Golden Delicious, Yellow Transparent, Wealthy and Duchess. For the lighter setting varieties, 10 parts per million is suggested. For the heavier setting varieties, 15 to 20 parts per million is better. In case of a cool, rainy blossom period, it would be better not to thin at all. Thinning sprays of naphthalene acetic acid give best results when applied at temperatures above 65° F.

Dinitro compounds are most successful for thinning peaches, the horticulturist reports. Sprays should be applied when the peach trees are at full bloom, but the grower must be sure to allow sufficient time for the first blossoms to be pollinated. This can be determined by examining the pistil under a magnifying glass to find the length of the pollen tube in its center. A more common practice among growers is to wait 24 hours after the first warm weather during full bloom. The spray can then be applied with reasonable assurance of setting enough fruit for a full crop. Since dinitro compounds kill all unpollinated blossoms hit by the spray, proper timing is essential. A spray applied too early will kill too many blossoms, and one applied too late will have no thinning effect.

Michigan Is Paradise of Lakes, Wayne U. Geography Students Find



Wayne coeds, representing two of the seven Michigan counties which possess over 300 lakes each, find lake research close to their hearts.

The counties are: Marquette with 535, Luce 571, Iron 528, Gogebic 538, Oakland 477, Schoolcraft 340, and Barry 327.

In contrast, Saginaw and Sanilac Counties are without named lakes, they find, and in general the counties poorest in lakes are those in the Thumb area. In the Northern Peninsula region the counties with the fewest lakes are Menominee and Ontonagon.

Lake names in Michigan are especially interesting many of them being simply anglicized versions of descriptive Indian terms. There are 84 lakes named Mud, 59 named Little or using the prefix Little, 57 named Long, 41 Big, 41 Bass, and 34 Round.

Seven counties in the state have more than 300 lakes each, they note.

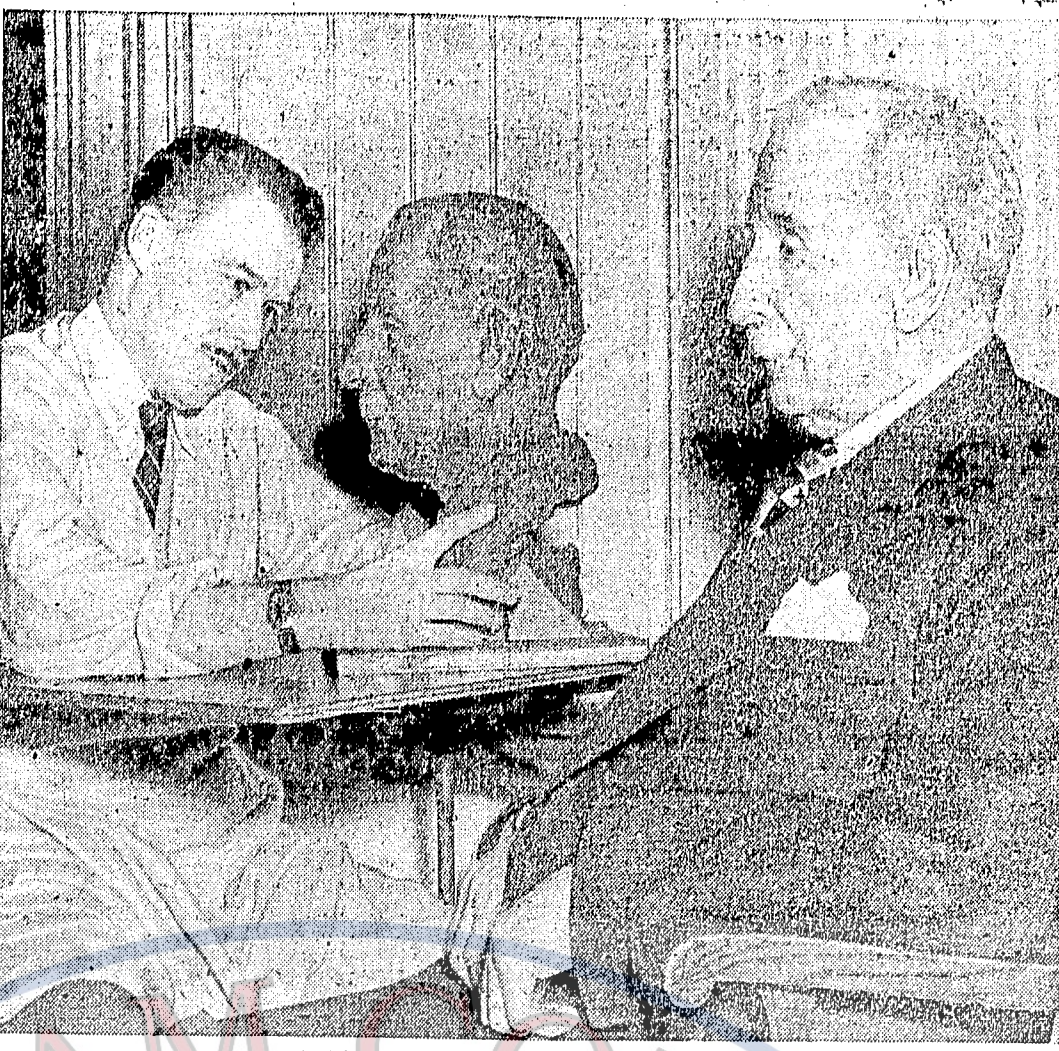
