

## Ingham Board Tables Action For New City

### Prosecutor Finds Flaws In Petition Asking for West Lansing Incorporation

Petitions for holding an election on the incorporation of West Lansing were tabled by the board of supervisors Monday. Prosecutor Paul C. Younger declared that the boundary lines as set forth in the petitions are not accurate.

Younger also informed the supervisors that the petitions do not comply with the statute. And he didn't need to tell the Lansing members of the board that by action of the Lansing council on November 13 part of the area in the proposed West Lansing city has been added to the city of Lansing.

Charles R. MacLean, Lansing attorney retained by the West Lansing petitioners, agreed that more time should be taken to study the petitions and the legal questions raised by the prosecutor. He asked that the matter be tabled until the January session. It was.

There are two moves under way in Lansing township. The Lansing Junior Chamber of Commerce is backing a plan to annex the entire remainder of the township to Lansing and East Lansing. Only a small area would go to East Lansing.

**Factories Cause Stir**  
The new GM jet plant and a new drop forge plant are what's causing the stir in the area west of Lansing. Those two big plants will pay a lot of taxes, enough to help out considerably in financing the proposed city of West Lansing.

The West Lansing group doesn't want annexation to Lansing, but asks that the area west of Lansing in Lansing township between the Eaton line on the west, the left (north) bank of the Grand river flowing into Lansing and the left (south) bank of the Grand flowing out of Lansing be incorporated as a fifth class city.

**Committee Approves**  
The West Lansing incorporation issue came to the floor Monday when Supervisor V. A. Triquet of East Lansing presented a recommendation that if the petitions were legal an election should be held next spring.

Younger then took the floor to tell what he thought was wrong with the petitions. He pointed out that part of the area has already been incorporated in Lansing. What Lansing took was about a quarter of a mile of frontage on Grand river where the boat club is now located. Because there was no one living on the site, the land was wholly owned by the city and contiguous to the city. It could be annexed by the city. No one lived there to vote, anyway. R. B. Olds gave the petition to Lansing years ago as a park.

George Sidwell, Lansing attorney who specializes in municipal problems, had given warning of the legal entanglements lying in the Lansing park property situation, Younger said.

**River Banks Often Move**  
The prosecutor also declared that using river banks as boundary markers invites litigation because stream channels change and there are often disputes over whether the boundary is the bank at high water mark or low water mark.

A protest by James H. Mitchell of Lansing against incorporation of the West Lansing area was filed with the supervisors. He declared that incorporation as a separate city would interfere with his plans for building 400 new homes there.

The Waverly golf course, owned by the city of Lansing, also lies within the West Lansing area for proposed incorporation. That differs from the riverfront property annexed by Lansing because it is not contiguous. There is township land between the Lansing city limits and the Waverly golf course.

**Ferris Processes French Blacktop**  
The Ferris Co. at its plant on Kipp road is processing 6,000 tons of special blacktop mix for the state highway department.

It's a new mix, called Komac, the development of a French chemist working with the Koppers company of Pittsburgh. The Ferris Co. mixed up experimental batches last year. Tests made of US-16 proved so satisfactory that the state highway department placed the order for 6,000 tons. Some of the Komac is sold F. O. B. the Mason plant. The rest of it will be trucked to delivery points in southern Michigan, Ed Ferris said.

## Ancient Maps Are Offered

Appearance of the picture of the 1850 map of Ingham and Livingston counties in last week's Ingham County News uncovered three and possibly four others.

County Clerk C. Ross Hilliard informed the supervisors Monday that Eugene Tyler of Alameda had one and that another man had called to say he had one. Supervisor William J. Wright of Stockbridge said he had one, found among his father's effects. Another was also reported.

The supervisors decided to have the map found in the court house attic repaired or to buy one of the other maps now owned privately to display in the county building.

**Council Agrees To Buy Radio For Fire Truck**  
Mason's fire department will be able to keep in constant touch with the folks back home. City council members Monday night authorized the purchase of a two-way radio for the fire truck at a cost of \$608.00. The actual purchase will be up to the fire committee composed of Aldermen Hugh Silsby, W. Davis Post and Allan Stroud.

Alderman Barnhill told the councilmen that it would give the firemen an opportunity to call back to the city for more help or special equipment. It can be used for calling back the fire truck on false alarms, he added.

"I can also be used to call back for directions if and when the fire department gets lost in the country," Barnhill stated.

**Personal Taxes Paid**  
"Persistence pays off," Mrs. Leland Austin, city treasurer, told council members at the meeting Monday night in the city hall. "I collected all the property taxes except \$16.00 this year."

"That's almost a perfect record," Councilman Harold Barnhill told the council.

As a result of last year's personal property assessment, \$26,146.54 was on the books for collection. It usually runs about \$50.00 to \$60.00 in bad debts," Mrs. Austin stated. "It's just a matter of tracking down the property owners and then making some arrangements to collect. There wasn't one lawsuit."

Mrs. Austin said the uncollectable tax money was the least amount. She has served city treasurer. She collected 99.99 per cent of the total.

Two weeks ago the city received a petition from residents on Center street between Mechanic and Walnut streets for curb and gutter construction. The council approved the construction Monday night and asked Julius Schmeichel, superintendent of public works, to prepare a detailed estimate of the cost. The city agreed to pay a part of the cost with the remainder being assessed to the property owners.

Schmeichel said that the curb and gutter will probably be built next spring.

Mayor Hall appointed Eber Robinson of Mason and Julius Hanslovsky of East Lansing Monday night to set up an improved accounting system for the city. The men will start a study of the present system soon, Mayor Hall stated.

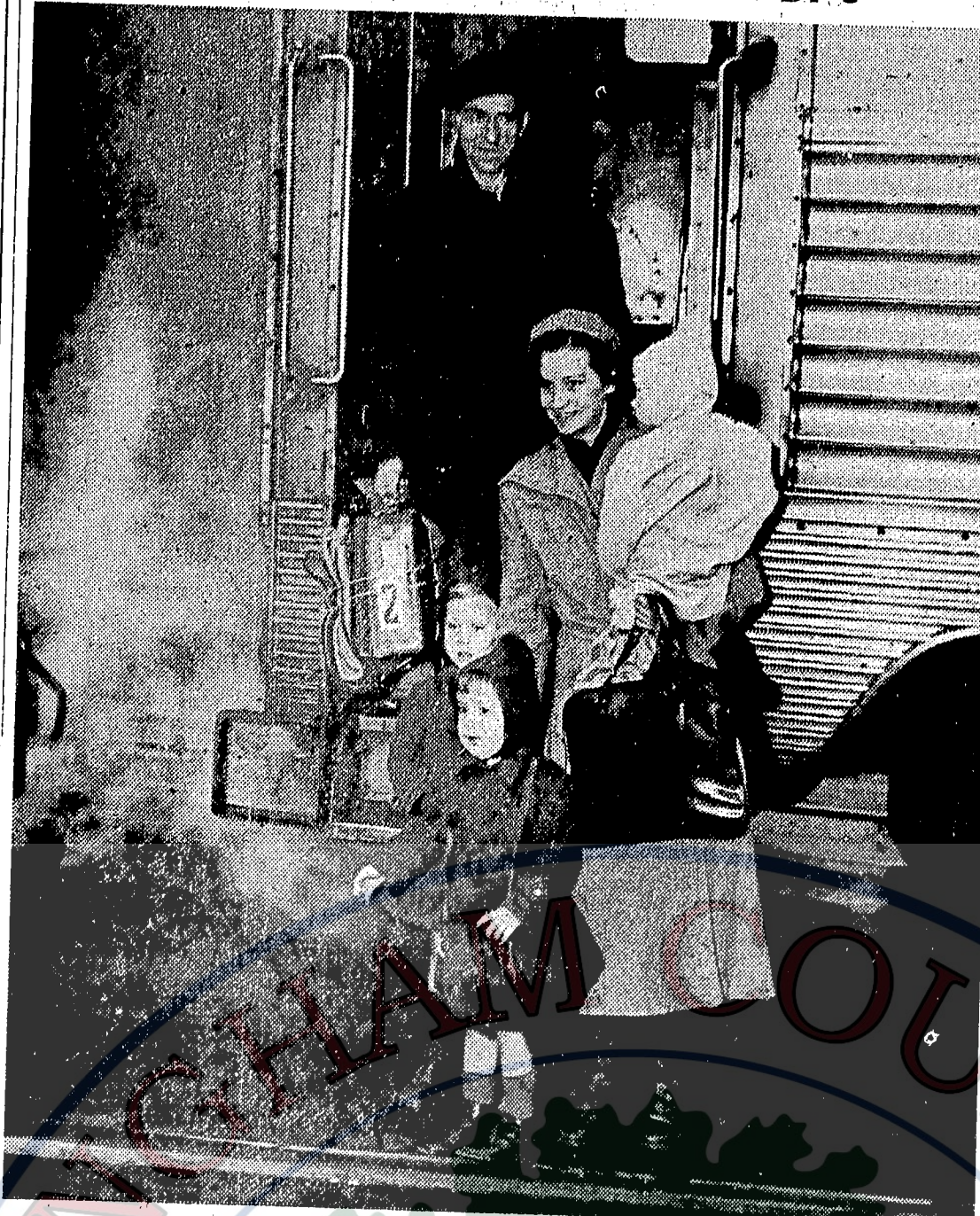
The schedule calls for landing at Jewett airport at three o'clock and from there a quick drive to a platform in front of the court house.

## Presbyterians Welcome German DP's



Mr. and Mrs. Milentije Zecevic and children, Peter, 6, Barbara, 3, and Janko, 1½, stopped being displaced persons when they stepped off the train in Jackson Wednesday morning. Rev. Paul Arnold, pastor of the Presbyterian church met them at the station. They had found a home after years of post-war roaming in Europe. Their new home is Mason. The Men's Council of the Presbyterian church asked the Zecevic's to come. Wednesday night the new family moved into an apartment at 427½ South Jefferson. That will be only temporary quarters until a house can be found, Rev. Paul L. Arnold, pastor of the church, stated.

Zecevic was a mechanic before the war. He will take up his tools again at the Al Rice Chevrolet garage Friday morning. He speaks few words of English. His wife, Katarine, speaks understandable English. Members of the Women's association are helping settle the Zecevic family.

Zecevic was born in Yugoslavia. He attended grammar school and worked on a farm. He was drafted into the Yugoslavian army in 1938 and was taken prisoner. During the war he worked on German farms and unloaded ships. After the war he worked in a German garage in the British sector of Germany.

Mrs. Zecevic was born in Germany. She attended primary school and later took a nursing course. She lived in the Russian sector. After the war her father was taken prisoner by the Russians. She hasn't heard from him since. Mrs. Zecevic's mother is dead.

Zecevic was brought up in the Greek Orthodox faith, his wife in the German Evangelical.

**PENNSYLVANIA USES INGHAM PATTERN**  
Miss Mildred Cardwell, supervising nurse of the Ingham health department, is leaving January 1 to serve Butler county in Pennsylvania.

She has been granted a year's leave of absence by the Ingham department to serve as consultant in Pennsylvania. Her duty there will be to help train nurses to do public health work.

Butler is the first Pennsylvania county to adopt a county health program. Presently, the state handles public health in Pennsylvania.

Already on the job in Pennsylvania is Dr. C. D. Barrett, who once served Ingham as medical director. He left Ingham to become an assistant in Wayne county, and from there he went to Japan to help set up a public health program.

Butler county is in the hills or western Pennsylvania, 30 miles northwest of Pittsburgh. Butler is the county seat. The county has a population of 97,000. The county health department will serve both the city and county.

Miss Cardwell completed 25 years in public health work in Ingham county November 1. She was given a reception to mark the completion of her long service. She said she intends to return to Ingham following her year in Pennsylvania.

Miss Elma Wiegman, a nurse on the Ingham staff for 15 years, will accompany Miss Cardwell. However, Miss Wiegman does not intend to work for Butler county. She has applied for retirement under the Ingham pension program. If granted, her retirement will become effective January 1.

No successor to Miss Cardwell as supervising nurse of the Ingham department has been announced.

**Burglars Labor For Small Wage**  
Burglars at Howard Pontiac Monday night did a lot of work for little pay. The garage is on Jefferson at Kipp road.

They broke a 15 x 20 window on the south side of the building, climbed through the opening, nudged the 200-lb. safe to the service department and there hammered away with a hammer, chisels and a wrecking bar to crack the door and knock out the combination. They pried open the door. Their reward was between \$5.00 and \$7.50 in nickels.

Papers in the safe were unmolested.

Dallas Langham, night police officer, said he checked the garage three times Monday night, at 10:00, 2:00 and 4:30, and saw no one inside. He tried the doors on all three stops, he said, and noted that night lights were on. The thieves left by the window, too, as the doors were left bolted.

Monday night's break-in was the third suffered by Howard Pontiac in three years. Thieves broke in last April.

## Robbers Crack Okemos Vault To Get \$400

Robbers hammered through the vault at the Okemos Consolidated school Thursday morning for a haul of \$400.

State police have no clues. No fingerprints were left.

George Richards, superintendent of the school, said that the night janitor, Milton Elcher, was on duty until midnight Wednesday. The robbery was discovered when Parker Prather, day janitor, opened the school at 7:15 Thursday morning.

State police and school officials believe the robbers must have entered the building and concealed themselves before Elcher left. There were no indications that entry to the building had been forced. The door from the corridor to the book store was pried open by the robbers. The vault adjoins the book store.

The vault is in the new wing of the school. It is made of cinder blocks, which the robbers apparently knew. Indications point to the use of sledgeham and crowbars by the robbers, and they must have lugged them into the building, police officials said. They also carried the tools out again. Tools in the school boiler room were not used.

About \$300 of the loot was from cafeteria receipts, Superintendent Richards said.

Sergeant Richard Tubbs of the state police is heading the investigation of the robbery. He warned that other schools who have built concrete or cinder block vaults should be on guard against robbery.

Apparently the robbers at Okemos must have known that they would have not encountered steel in hammering through the blocks. Sergeant Tubbs pointed out. School and class funds should not be left in schools, he added, unless locked securely in a steel vault.

About a year ago the Okemos school was robbed but only about \$10 was lost. The robbers could not crack the steel safe.

The Dansville school lost \$800 in cash and \$700 in checks to robbers last January.

**Pastors Collect Grain for CROP**  
Mary Williamson, 19, beat off an attacker last Thursday night. Her screams for help frightened the man. He eluded officers and made a clean getaway.

The attack took place in the alley between Henson's Modern Dry Cleaners and the rear of Jefferson street stores.

Miss Williamson and Miss Evelyn Frizell have an apartment above the Gamble store. The entrance is from the alley at the rear. Miss Williamson said she had been to the drug store and was on her way home at 9:20. Instead of going to her apartment by way of Ingham court she walked to Ash and then down Ash to the alley, there turning north toward her apartment. She used that route, she told police officers, because it offered a clearer view of the alley than she could get by using Ingham court.

Just as she reached out to turn on the switch to light the stairs, she related, she was grabbed by a man who had sneaked up behind her. He tried to cover her mouth with his hands. Miss Williamson said, but she bit his hand and screamed. As her screams continued, she said, the man turned and ran. She whirled to the north and ran to Ingham court. In Ingham court she saw Royal Seaton, proprietor of Our Cab Co. He had heard the screams. When the girl told her story, Seaton called the sheriff's department. The sheriff's department sent the call to Mason Officer Emory Colby, who was close by. Colby and Seaton were unable to find a trace of the attacker. Miss Williamson said he was dressed in a leather jacket.

## County Votes to Provide Sheriff With Five Cars Under New Deputy Deal

Three More Deputies Will Join Staff of Sheriff January 1 in Expansion of County Patrol

Ingham supervisors authorized the purchase of four patrol cars and a carryall for the sheriff's department Monday. The cars will replace automobiles now owned by deputies and operated by them on a mileage basis.

### Sheriff's Requests Heeded

Ingham supervisors granted Sheriff Barnes all he asked for in transportation for his deputies and prisoners. Beginning January 1 the county instead of the deputies will own and service four automobiles. Prisoners will also be transported in a carry-all. Heretofore the taxpayers have provided only one car for the sheriff.

**Hens Quit Cackling Eggs Drop 15c**  
Hens aren't cackling this week. Few of them can do more than mutter as egg prices nosedived 12c and up to 15c per dozen.

The price break came without warning to retailers. The drop started in the Chicago and Detroit markets and is credited by consumers, or blamed by producers, on pullets coming into heavy production and hens being affected by warm weather. The warm weather has fooled some of them into believing that nesting-time had come.

Price resistance is also offered as a factor.

Eggs sold last week at 77c and 79c at Mason stores. Prices were down to 63c and 67c at some stores Thursday.

**Girl Beats Off Attack of Man**  
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**Rev. Raymond L. Norton of the Mason Methodist church and Rev. Hugh Putnam of the Nazarene church lugged six bags of wheat and oats to the Mason Elevator Tuesday afternoon. The bags will go on the bottom of the Alaiedon-Vevay township pile destined for the CROP (Christian Rural Overseas Program). Dee-Bray, elevator manager, stands in the center checking the bags.**

The two ministers will collect from farmers in Vevay township all next week. If there is no grain on the farm, the churches will take any cash offering for the project, the ministers stated. The money will be used to buy grain on the open market.

The Baptist and Presbyterian churches will canvass Alaiedon township. Since 1947 CROP has sent 5,400 carloads of food to all parts of the world. The national quota for 1951 is 1,400 railroad cars of food. No local quotas have been established.

The board bought two Chevrolets at \$1,329.00 each and a Chevrolet carryall at \$1,600.00 from Al Rice of Mason, and two Fords at \$1,483.56 from Dean & Harris of Lansing. Delivery has been promised for January 1.

At the October session the supervisors tilted the 1952 budget for the sheriff to cover the expansion of his staff. Three new deputies, one for the Lansing office and two for Mason, are expected to join the force January 1, Sheriff Willard P. Barnes said.

Besides the sheriff and under-sheriff, there are now six deputies and turnkeys at Mason, two at Lansing, one patrol officer working out of Mason, and a license examining officer at each of the Mason and Lansing offices. The Mason staff also includes the sheriff's wife as matron, an engineer, a cook and a clerk. The clerk was recently added.

The 1951 budget for the sheriff's office was set at \$90,000. For 1952 he will have \$121,000.

**Eight Oppose Car Deal**  
Eight supervisors opposed the purchase of the five cars. Supervisor Earl Leeman of Williamstown questioned the need for four cars and the carryall in addition to the one car now furnished the sheriff. Supervisor John Patriarche of East Lansing declared that four patrol cars are not needed.

To the explanation of Supervisor Hubert Bullen of Aurelius that the present deputies demanded \$150 a month for car rental, Supervisor S. A. Bennett of Mason replied that the sheriff had better look around for some other deputies not quite so demanding.

Deputies have been paid \$50 a month for car rental. Since October 1 the rate has been \$100 a month. Supervisor Hugh Silsby of Mason said that Lansing deputies average between 1,500 and 2,000 miles of driving per month; with 2,000 to 2,500 averaged by deputies at Mason.

**Silbsy Saves Money**  
Silsby insisted that the county will save money by furnishing cars for deputies. The people will also receive better service, he added.

Supervisors Eno Helms and Bullen also said they were convinced the county will save money under the new plan. Bullen pointed out that the county will save what deputies would have to pay in food, excise and state sales taxes, and for license plates and individual insurance. The county will carry fleet insurance.

Sheriff Barnes insisted that county ownership of the cars will yield a saving. He said he planned to add a fourth patrol car and two more men on night patrol. The department will probably service its own cars, the sheriff stated.

The eight who voted against the purchase of the cars without further showing as to the need were Supervisors Bennett, Mason; Dell and Hayden, Leeman; Williamstown; Wheatfield; Leeman; Williamstown; Marshall, White Oak; Patriarche, East Lansing; and Wright, Stockbridge.

Supervisor Aseline of Alaiedon led a move to reconsider the action but it lost 21-10 and the purchase of the cars was authorized.

A \$19.50 shirt for Deputy Charles Hildebrandt came up for discussion. Supervisor Aseline questioned the claim. Sheriff Barnes explained that the sheriff's department provides uniform shirts for deputies. He said Hildebrandt had the shirt on order while a member of the Mason police staff and that it should be no more than fair for the county to pay for the shirt which the deputy can now wear on county service.

## Officers Rescue Dog from Culvert

Deputy Sheriff Alvin Hartig, with the help of County Highway Engineer Frank Evans and other volunteers, rescued a cocker spaniel from a culvert in Holt Saturday night.

The dog, owned by Jack Armour, 1955 Chestnut street, Holt, had crawled into a 10-inch culvert under Schoolcraft and extending to Hall street. He could not go forward and get out, he couldn't turn around and he didn't reverse.

Hartig asked permission of Evans to dig up the culvert. The county engineer not only gave permission but he drove to Holt to help in the rescue.

## Relief Director Cites Need For More Facilities

Daryl Minnis, Ingham relief director, told supervisors Monday that counties must soon recognize the problem of taking care of more senile aged. Present facilities are inadequate, he declared, and the state will not take into mental hospitals patients who are beyond help.

The issue came up for discussion because of an incident last week when an aged man who went suddenly insane had to be housed at the county jail because there was no vacancy in a state hospital.

Because of the extra years being added to lives of men and women, Minnis said, more old people will have to be housed in institutions. He said that they ought to be in buildings separate from other patients, probably in one-story

structures and with individual rooms instead of wards.

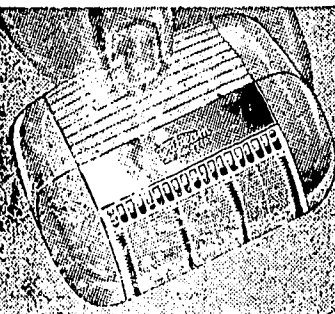
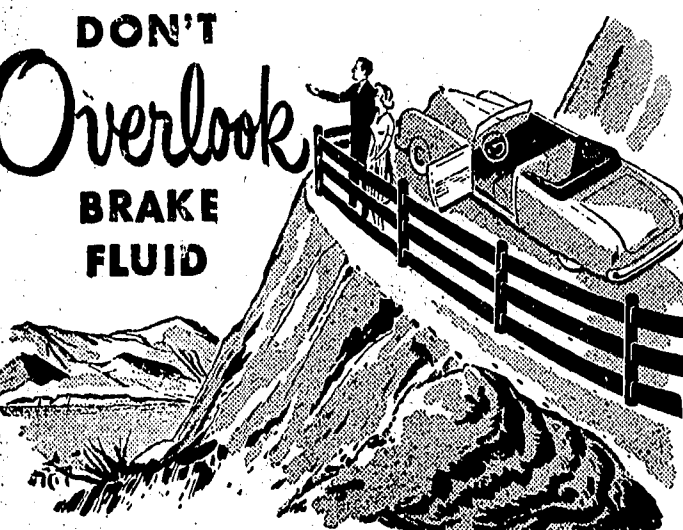
Minnis also told of the increase in mental cases among young people. Authorities blame some of the increase on alcohol. Minnis said. Chronic alcoholics are being treated at state mental hospitals, he reported.

One of the problems in caring for senile aged is that of help, Minnis declared. It is difficult to get and keep employees to work with such cases, the relief director stated.

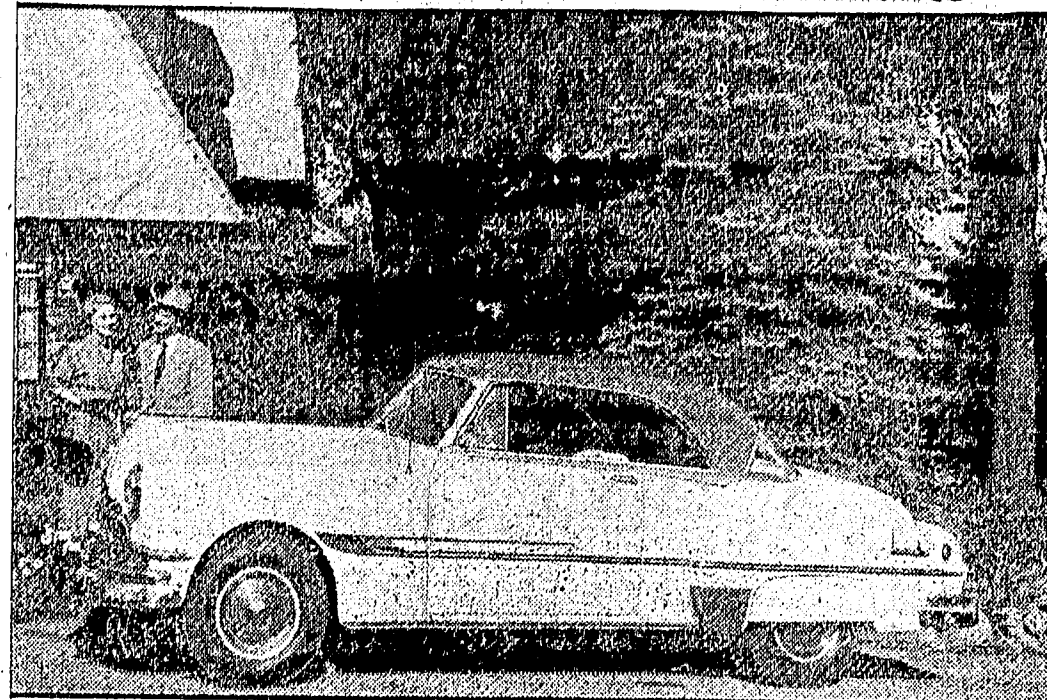

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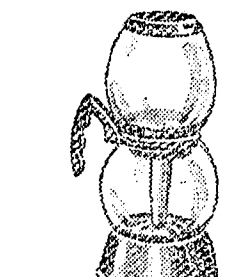

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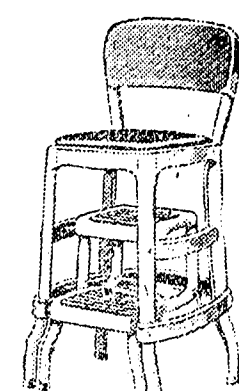

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## Kiwanians Learn How Television Uses Air Lanes

Members of the Mason Kiwanis club learned about communications Tuesday night. They learned how telephone conversations, thousands of them, are carried by radio, and how television programs, travel through the air from coast to coast over the American Telephone and Telegraph tower system and coaxial cable.

Robert A. Hennrichsen, customer relations assistant for Michigan Bell, came from Detroit to present the lecture and to stage the demonstration. He demonstrated how sound and light waves are transmitted and how they operate 107 towers to transmit telephone messages and radio and television broadcasts from coast to coast. The towers range from 13 to 40 miles apart, averaging about 20. The distance between towers is governed by the contour of the land, Hennrichsen explained.

Russell Englehardt of Howell, district manager for Michigan Bell, spoke briefly at the meeting. He introduced Hennrichsen.

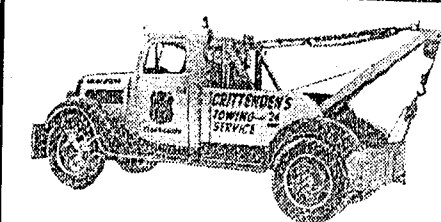
The driver of the other car in the wreck, Charles Spohn, 69, of Harrison, was instantly killed.

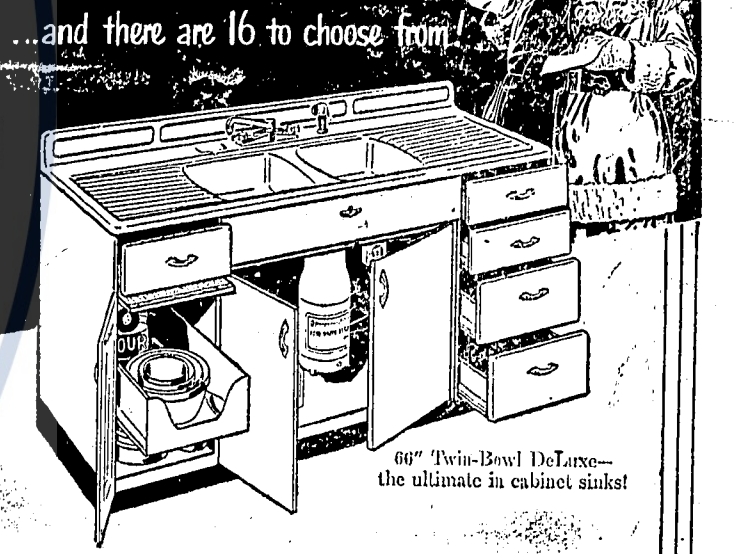

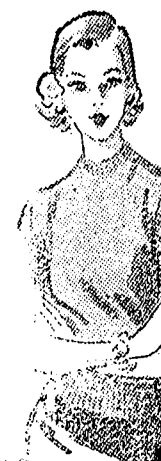

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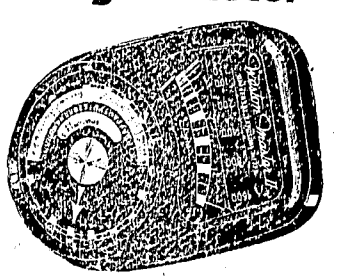

## ONLY TWO KEYS ARE AVAILABLE NIGHTS

## County Officials Protest Lockout

Heads of county departments have an idea they won't be asked to leave their offices at night when work piles up. The board of supervisors, on recommendation of the county buildings committee, decided that only two keys would be made available in addition to those fur-

nished the custodian and his helper. One of the keys will be kept at the sheriff's office with the turnkey on duty tonight. The other key will be left with County Clerk C. Ross Hilliard.

That arrangement doesn't suit other county officials. Supervisor Hubert M. Eddy of Lansing demanded that Dr. R. Lansing of the health department have a key. He needs it because of night meetings held in his court house office, the Lansing supervisor said.

Chairman John Russell of the county buildings committee led the move for restricting the number of keys to two. He declared that the keys have been recently changed because of the scores of keys to the old lock in circulation. Some former supervisors even had keys to the building, Russell said.

With only two keys available nights, Russell said, and with the use of them restricted to an eligible list now being made up, the supervisors will know who is in the building nights. He pointed to the fire hazard resulting from the practice of permitting many people to have keys. He also said it could prove no hardship for officials to walk across the street to jail to get and to return the key. There were no protests from officials at the meeting Monday, but they were rife around the county building Tuesday. They said that if the county would install a buzzer so that the night man, on duty until 11, could let them in they wouldn't mind. They just don't want to have to go to the jail to get the key and then take it back, they declared.

She was changing at a road map and did not see the stop sign at an intersection. The Gampel car struck the left rear wheel of a big trailer.

## PMA Balloting Closes Dec. 20

December 20 is the closing time for accepting ballots in the community PMA elections, according to Ralph Glynn, chairman of the Ingham county PMA committee.

Ballots will be counted on Friday, December 21, and the names of the committeemen elected will be announced as soon as the votes are counted. The delegates elected will meet December 31, and elect a county committee consisting of a chairman, vice-chairman, member and two alternates.

Ballots have been mailed to all eligible voters in each community. Any farmer, owner, operator, tenant or sharecropper is eligible to vote who is on a farm that is participating in any program administered by the elected farmer-committees of the production and marketing administration.

Eligible farmers who do not receive a ballot within a reasonable time before the closing date may get one from the county PMA committee.

Chairman Glynn emphasized that the first responsibility in farm program administration rests with the farmers themselves in electing the most capable and best qualified committeemen to administer these programs.

"This is especially significant this year when agriculture has such a great responsibility in producing crops and products to meet the nation's defense requirements," Glynn said. "No farmer who is eligible to vote should let December 20 pass without casting his ballot."

## Bell Oak Group Signs Members In Farm Bureau

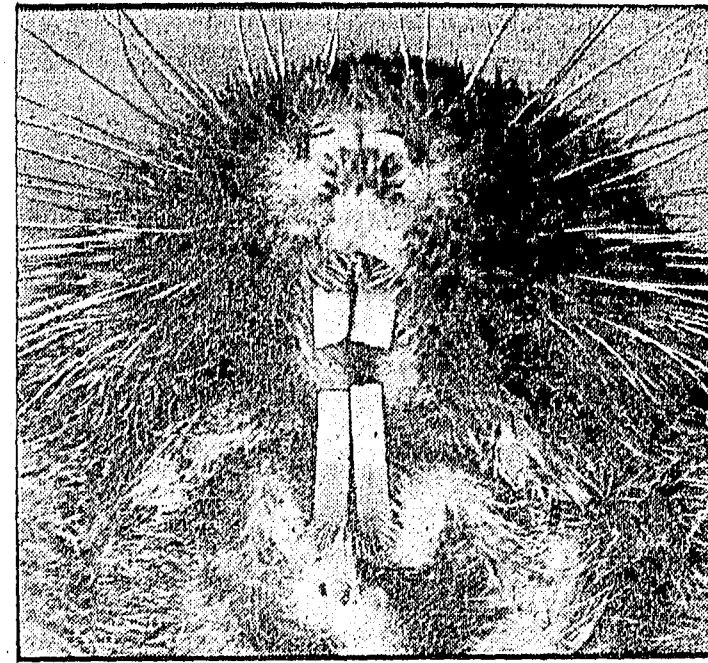
Ingham Farm Bureau officials are pointing to the Locke-Williamston and Bell Oak group as doing an outstanding job in membership enrollment.

"Last year," said Mrs. Ross Sumption, secretary of the Ingham Farm Bureau, "the Bell Oak group was a small one-saver in the northeast corner of the county. But at roll call time they decided to double their membership. Each member undertook to take two guest families, not Farm Bureau members to the kickoff dinner. They secured Mrs. Harry Whitaker, state chairman of the women's committee, as guest speaker and had 65 out. And they doubled the membership."

"On last Friday night," Mrs. Sumption said, "the greatly expanded Locke-Williamston group tried it again, this time at the new Locke township hall. When they gathered off they found that 95 people had gathered around the tables."

Dale Dunkel gave the invocation, Charles Robinson led in group singing, accompanied by Mrs. Dunkel, and Ray Allen was toastmaster. Keith Tanner, director of field service, from the state office was the speaker of the evening. His topic was "Take a Look at Farm Issues." He stressed that there are two big issues shared by all groups, one to prevent World War III and the other to preserve the American way of life. He said that World War II started just as the United States was emerging from the depression and pointed to some of its costs, 21 million civilians killed, 150 million left destitute. He mentioned some of the things which could have been accomplished with the money spent.

"Where do we end up if we start a war at the top of inflation," Tanner asked. Commenting on the American way of life he said that confusion leads to the left of center. "Gather all the facts and then draw conclusions," Tanner said. "Never be ashamed of being a farmer. The whole nation depends on you three times a day. Eight per cent of the people of the world go to bed hungry but not many of them are in the United States. One hundred years ago 80 per cent of the people lived on farms. Today the figures are just reversed. Twenty per cent of the people have learned to produce enough food and fiber to release the 80 per cent to professions and industry. At the end of the last war there were 15 per cent less people on farms than at the beginning but they were producing 85 per cent more. Food can largely keep the peace and it is to a great extent up to the American farmer to see that it is used for that purpose. The new year will

## County Defense May Be Merged With Lansing

With the resignation of Frank K. Evans as county defense chief, the county defense organization may merge with Lansing.

In placing his defense post resignation before the board of supervisors Monday, Evans indicated that the Lansing and county posts might well be combined under Col. Frank Pritchard of Lansing.

Evans explained that as county highway engineer he is not in a position to handle the defense job as it should be done. He reported that emergency housing, feeding and rescue squads have been organized and that five out of eight required plane-spotting crews have been set up. Plane-spotters have been secured at Onondaga, Aurelius, Lansing, Mason and Williamston, Evans said. Holt is making headway, he reported, leaving only Leslie and Stockbridge without units required under the county program.

In Ingham outside of Lansing, Evans said, the defense organization has found emergency housing for 79,386 people with feeding facilities to care for 53,652.

The supervisors appropriated \$1,800 last June to finance the county defense program. Evans listed the expenses to date as \$613.

Evans lauded Ralph Strobe for his work as assistant defense chief. Whether war ever comes or not, Evans said, the defense program now set up should prove useful in fires, floods or any other kind of disaster.

Chairman K. G. Brown named Supervisors Charles H. Hayden and Hubert M. Eddy of Lansing and Lloyd Aseltine of Alameda as members of a committee to choose a new defense chief or work out the merger with Lansing.

## SANTA'S SUPPER ON THE RUN



Even in the midst of the pleasant confusion of the last-minute tasks of Christmas Eve, appetites must be satisfied. This menu for Santa's busy helpers is easily prepared, has eye appeal, and served with a beverage, fills the nutritional needs of the hour.

Light fare casserole can be prepared in advance and the baker's stollen coffee cake is a help-yourself item, as are the fruits and nuts.

### LIGHT FARE CASSEROLE

3 tablespoons shortening  
3 tablespoons flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons salt  
1 1/2 teaspoons celery salt  
1 1/2 cups milk  
1/2 cup grated cheese

Melt shortening in a saucepan. Blend in flour, salt and celery salt. Add milk and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Add cheese and stir until cheese melts. Place halved eggs into a greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Cover with tomato wedges. Melt the butter, add dry bread crumbs and brown. Sprinkle 1/2 of the buttered bread crumbs over tomato layers. Pour cheese sauce over crumbs. Top with remaining buttered bread crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) for twenty minutes. Yield: 6 servings.

## FROM ALASKA TO LOWER CALIFORNIA

### Lodgepole Pine Gets Around

From Alaska to Lower California, the most common cone-bearing tree is the tall, straight lodgepole pine. It thrives from the Pacific Coast inland to the eastern slopes of the Rocky Mountains.

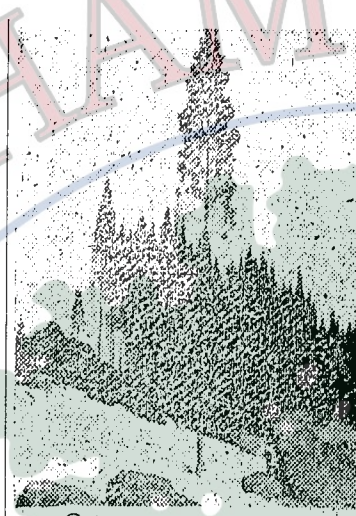
Wherever trees will grow in this region, the lodgepole pine is likely to be found. It grows from sea level to altitudes of 9,000 to 11,000 feet. It is at its best in the Sierra Nevada, where the mountains stand 8,000 to 9,500 feet above sea level.

Some trees need plenty of room in which to rise and spread their branches. But according to the National Wildlife Federation, this is not true of the lodgepole pine. It thrives in dense stands, where each tree becomes tall and slender. Only on the Pacific coast does it often remain a low tree with many forked branches from the ground up.

At the top of the erect trunk are branches which form the shape of a spire. The tree's needles, growing in clusters of two, are one to three inches long and about an eighth of an inch in diameter. They are yellow-green, giving the tree a light appearance.

Cones of the lodgepole pine are egg-shaped, and no more than two inches long. Covered with prickly scales, the cones sometimes remain tightly closed for many years. Though seeds may stay within a cone for as long as twenty years, they are still good at the end of that time. The seeds are so tiny that it would take 100,000 of them to weigh a pound.

The wood of the lodgepole pine does not make fine lumber, but it has many uses. The trunks are

trimmed into mine timbers, railroad ties, poles, and posts. The trees also yield pulpwood, fuel, and coarse lumber.

Like all trees, lodgepole pines protect the soil and keep it from washing away. They are especially valuable for this purpose, because they so often stand where no other trees will grow.

They are trees which have served man for a long time. Many years ago, says the National Wildlife Federation, it was found that the straight trunks made good tent and lodge poles. Ever since then, the tree has been known as the lodgepole pine.

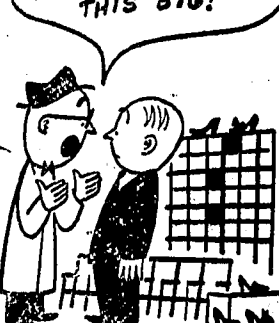

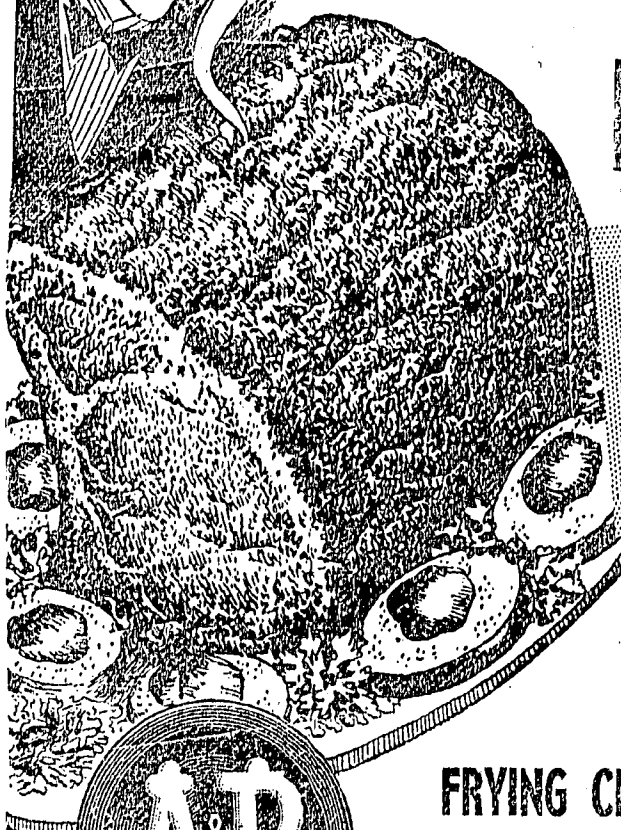

## Mason Looks Good in Taking Opener from Blackhawks 72-36

It was the best opening effort Mason has come through with in several years.

Friday night the Bulldogs will have a good chance to prove that the one-sided opener was no fluke. The Everett Vikings will be in town to atone for their loss Friday night to Ionia. Mason and Everett are supposed to be the cream of the Capital Circuit.

Everett was nosed out by Ionia Friday in a weird game in which the Lansing school has registered a protest to the Michigan Athletic Association. The Vikings are big and have plenty of experienced scoring punch. Mason will have to stop high scorers such as Martin Maurer, Art Smith and Gerry Bentley. Add to these Viking stars Tom Moon, a six-foot, five-inch center, and Friday's game may be a little harder for the Bulldogs to take than Leslie was in the opener.

**Mason Has No Stars**

The one outstanding point that the Bulldogs displayed against Leslie was that there are no stars. This year's version of the Bulldogs is a well-balanced team. The balance goes way beyond the five starters, too. A breakdown of the scoring proves this. ## Grosbeaks Are Flying Hobos

Evening Grosbeaks travel in little flocks of eight or 10 birds. Never staying long at any one spot, they come and go at unexpected times. If the feeding is good, they may remain for several days. Then they are off, perhaps not to return for a long time.

Always they are looking for seeds. Their favorites grow on box elders, but they also like the seeds of pine, cottonwood, locust, wild cherry, spruce, birch, maple, ash, dogwood, apple, hawthorn and cedar. Sometimes, too, they get their meals from poison ivy, Virginia creeper and ragweed.

A good way to attract the birds is to put out sunflower seeds. Although you can't count on your feeding station to keep the Evening Grosbeaks around constantly, they will return again and again for their meals.

There are several ways to identify them, according to the National Wildlife Federation. The male is a large, chunky bird about the size of a starling. His body is yellow and his wings are black with two large patches of white. His tail feathers are black, too, and he wears a black cap. His bill is large and light.

The same colors appear on the female, but they are harder to see. Almost hiding the brighter hues is a covering of silvery-gray. But enough yellow, black and white show through to let you know who she is.

Both the male and the female are about the same size. They are from seven and a half to eight inches long. Their wingspread measures nearly fourteen inches.

When flying, the Evening Grosbeaks seem to be bobbing up and down, as though they were floating on gentle air currents. If the sunlight shows them up clearly, the white patches on their wings can be seen at a distance.

It is possible to find them in the summer near the northern fringes of the United States. But that is about as far south as they come during the nesting season. Most of them build their homes and raise their young in Canada.

Their nests, made of sticks and mud, are placed at least 10 feet off the ground, and sometimes higher. In this dwelling, the parents raise a brood of three or four young which are hatched from greenish eggs blotched with pale brown.

By November, the flocks of Evening Grosbeaks are ready to move southward, though not away from cold weather. Many of them stay in southern Canada and in our northern states. Others go as far as Missouri, Kentucky and Ohio.

They are always welcome visitors, because they add a touch of cheerful color to dull winter days as they flit about, looking for seeds. When they stop to perch, they sing a short, warbling song.

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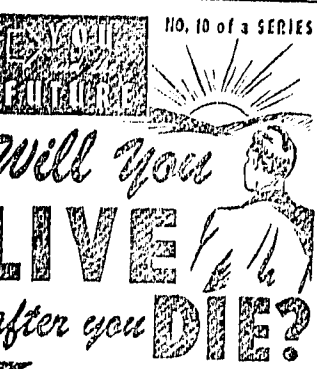

But, if that is so, where are they now? David says, "Let them be silent in the grave." Psalm 31:17. Yes, silent, and peacefully asleep until the mighty voice of God awakes them at their resurrec-  
tion: "The hour is coming, in the which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth; they that have done good, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have done evil, unto the resurrection of damna-  
tion." John 5:28, 29.

Did you notice that Jesus says they that have done good are also "in the graves" awaiting the resurrection of life? Strange? Not at all. David had been dead 4,000 years when Peter declared, "David is not ascended into the heavens." Acts 2:34.

A multitude of texts under- score this basic truth: the dead, both good and evil, rest in "sleep" until the divine voice hails them forth to their reward.

What reason would there be for a judgment and a resurrec- tion if the dead had already slipped away to damnation or bliss? Why bring up the matter again?

Here is understanding: none or as now has eternal life, God "only hath immortality." I Timothy 6:16. Immortality, or eternal life, is the gift of God through faith in Jesus Christ our Lord. It is for all who have kept His Commandments to the best of their knowledge. It is their reward. A wicked man has not eternal life, but eternal death.

Christ brings His reward to the righteous when He comes again: "For the Son of man shall come in the clouds of heaven with his angels, and then he shall reward every man according to his works." Mat-  
thew 16:27.

If you would seek eternal life the important thing is what you do before you die. "It is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment." Hebrews 9:27. Eternal life or eternal death: which is it for you? (Next: The Man Who Will Save the World.)

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## Iron Lung Graduates First Patient

University hospital's new respi-  
rator center, established with a  
\$27,000 March of Dimes grant, has  
"graduated" its first patient.

Stricken in the polio epidemic of 1950, 11-year-old Charles Watts, of Napoleon, was near death when he was placed in an iron lung in October of last year. He looked like a chronic respi-  
rator case, facing a bleak future of months and perhaps years of confinement in a tank which breathed for his paralyzed lungs.

Today all that is changed, thanks to the treatment adminis-  
tered at the respirator center. The modern methods developed in such centers financed by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis in all parts of the country, have made it possible for Charles and hundreds of other children to leave from lungs behind and resume normal, useful lives.

"Our job is to get polio patients out of tanks and back into their homes," explained Dr. David Dickinson, director of the center. "In the short time we have been in operation, we have discharged three patients who might have been doomed to respirators the rest of their days."

"We don't pretend to perform miracles, but we do teach our patients to utilize to their utmost the muscles not completely paral-  
yzed."

"Graduation" from the center usually comes in three stages. After a period in an iron lung, the patient is placed in a rocking bed, which helps him breathe. Then, for shorter periods each week, he uses a portable chest respirator.

For Charles Watts graduation day was a big event, for now he is back at home and needs the chest respirator only about four hours each day.

Mrs. Allen Stroud, will share through pictures and speaking, some of their recent work in Bible study related to the Christmas season.

The Intermediate Fellowship, with their counselor, Mrs. Russell McBride, will present a radio drama, entitled, "Making Wise Decisions."

An original poem entitled, "I Give Myself," will be printed for the first time on the souvenir programs. The writer is Mrs. Evelyn Shaffer of Mason. Illustrated carols shown on the screen will be sung by the entire group.

Prayers are asked to take food to pass, table service and sandwiches. Dinner will be served at 6:30.

A Christmas chorus, by Lillian Keyser, will be given by the fifth grade in charge of Mrs. Eberhardt. This is a verse speaking choir.

The Junior Fellowship, which has been meeting on Saturday mornings for 10 weeks, and has just completed a unit of study en-  
titled "Methodist Neighbors in Latin America," will present a demon-  
stration in the dialogue form. They will present their gifts for boys and girls of Latin America at this time. They have discovered that there are 150 boys and girls near one of the Methodist sta-  
tions, whose fathers earn 50c per day.

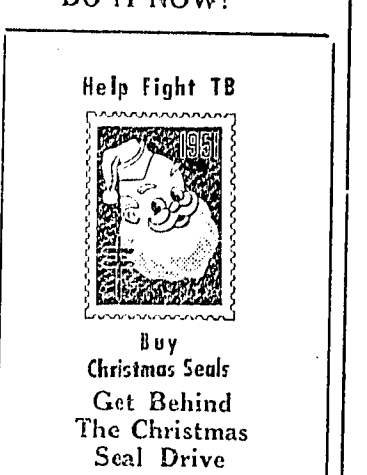

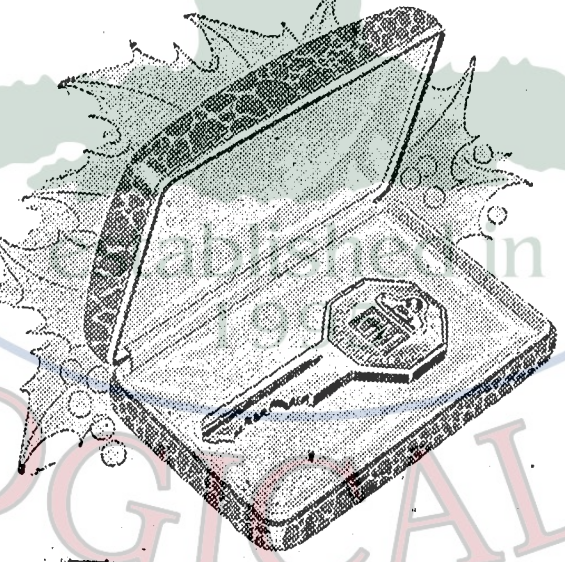

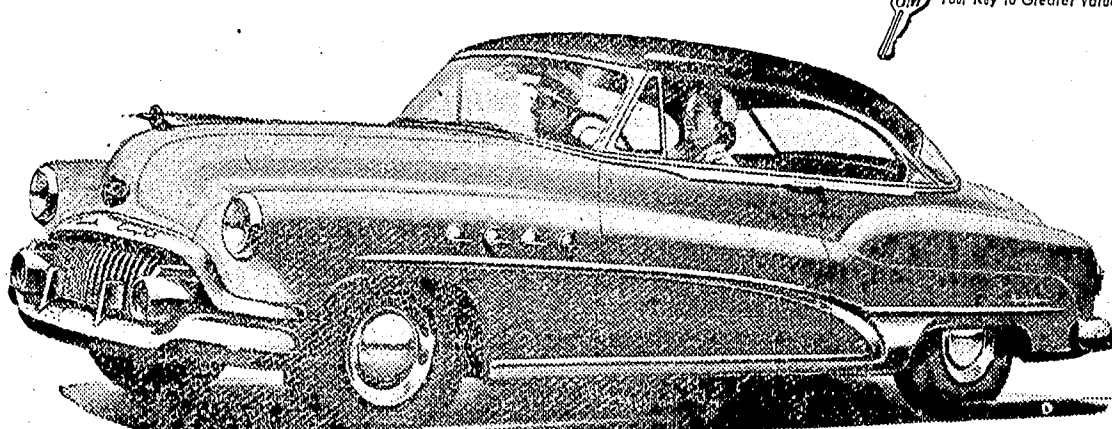

## Winter Will Officially Arrive On Saturday Before Christmas

Everybody in the northern hemisphere will have an extra guest for Christmas this year.

Old Man Winter is due to make his official arrival at 11:01 A. M. Saturday, December 22, just in time for the week end festivities in advance of Christmas Day.

The schedule for winter, as announced by Hazel M. Losh, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan, makes December 22 the shortest day since the sun will have reached its lowest point in the southern sky and will begin its trip northward.

While it is winter in the northern hemisphere, it's the start of the summer season in the southern hemisphere. Professor Losh explains that the earth's north pole is now tipped away from the sun while the south pole is tipped 23½ degrees toward the sun, thus accounting for the different seasons at opposite ends of the pole.

However, before you get to envying those living in the southern hemisphere too much, Professor Losh points out that our winter tends to be a little milder than the kind served up in the South American region at the time when our summer season holds sway.

"The northern inhabitants benefit from the fact that at this time of year the earth is about one and one-half million miles closer to the sun than average," Professor Losh says. "Also at this time of year the earth is moving a little faster in its orbit, thus tending to shorten our winter season. The interval from the time the sun passes the equator heading north in March to the September equinox when the sun is heading south is about six days longer than the time from the September to the March equinox."

If the earth didn't tip on its poles as it revolves around the sun, our winter seasons would be turned into the hottest part of the year, she points out. Imagine the heat waves that might come on Friday, January 4, at about 4 p. m. when the earth will be closest to the sun.

Instead we'll be having some of those crisp winter evenings when the stars seem to be just a few miles away. Professor Losh urges you to bundle up and take a good look at the beauty in the skies on these nights. Jupiter will be the brightest object in the Christmas evening sky and if the Christmas festivities keep you up real late you can get a look at three more planets—Mars, Saturn and Venus.

At the start of the month, the reddish Mars will be rising over the east point about 3 A. M. followed closely by the yellowish Saturn and then in about an hour by the brilliant Venus. Mars, which is moving eastward, will pass Saturn on the morning of December 19 at a distance not much greater than the diameter of the moon. Then

the order of appearance early each morning will be Saturn, Mars and Venus.

And, of course, December means the exciting constellation of Orion will be rising early each evening directly in the east. The three bright stars in a line which mark the belt of the mighty Orion, the Giant Hunter, make it easy to find. The three "belt" stars are enclosed in a four-sided figure with a giant red star, Betelgeuse, in the upper left-hand corner. The light from Betelgeuse, which you now see, left that star in the year 1650. If this giant star were as near to us as the sun, the light from it would be 2,900 times brighter.

With Orion a point of interest in the east each night, the western sky will be offering its usual December attraction, the Northern Cross with the long bar of the cross standing upright as a fitting symbol of Christmas, Professor Losh says.

## Gable at His Best in Outdoor Picture

Mason's Fox theatre has lined up a full week of top-flight film entertainment. Action takes over the fox screen Thursday and Friday with a big double bill featuring Wayne Morris in "Yellow Pin" and Whip Wilson in a thrill-packed western, "Lawless Cowboys."

The enchantment of the islands, the spectacle of volcanic eruption and the beauty of Technicolor in the tropics are the combined ingredients of "Bird of Paradise," the lavishly poetic romance emanating from Twentieth Century-Fox and showing Saturday at the Fox Theatre. Chief of the tribe, only to have all his efforts undermined when a member of his party stupidly kills Bear Ghost to avenge the death of his brother.

The story reaches a thunderous climax with an attack by Ironshirt and his warriors upon the white men, a fight in which Kamiah loses her life. Comedy Opens Tuesday. This time with Cary Grant and Jeanne Crain, two ingratiating players, as their stars they have poked some fun at the medical profession but at the same time have expressed a heartening philosophy while telling a really charming love story.

Cary Grant is the Dr. Praetorius about whom the story revolves and his polished performance is just what you have come to expect from such an expert actor. Women will love him and men will find him refreshing. It would not be fair to detail the plot of this unusual film play. Suffice to say that it is a story of a physician who had some strange and unorthodox ideas about the practice of medicine. With this idea, Zanuck, Mankiewicz and Grant proceed to have a field day.

They let Dr. Praetorius, who in the course of the story proves that he is a real human being, interested in miniature trains and symphonic music, expound on "faith, properly injected into a patient to be as effective in maintaining life as adrenalin," and say boldly that "the practice of medicine should become more and more intimately involved with the human beings it treats rather than confine itself to pills, serums and knives."

This fabulous doctor even takes a snipe at the practice of hospitals waking patients from a "health-giving sleep" to feed them

to suit the whims of the kitchen help, and states his conviction that patients are sick people—not inmates in the institution.

The love story part of this simple picture in which Jeanne Crain, lovely to look at and giving a cleverly balanced performance, adds to much of its charm. There are also splendid characterizations by Hume Cronyn, Walter Slezak, whose bass fiddle playing accounts for much laughter, Sidney Blackman, Basil Ruysdael and Katherine Locke. These players all seemed to be having the time of their lives and they impart this quality to the picture, which one might say was a social comedy with serious overtones.

Big Musical Is Next There is happy entertainment for everybody in M-G-M's star-song-and-laugh-loaded new Technicolor musical, "Texas Carnival," showing at the Fox Theatre Thursday and Friday. Esther Williams shows off that famous aquatic trapeze, Her job is to sit in a bathing suit on a break-away seat constructed over a tank of water. Patrons pay to throw balls at a target and if it is hit, Esther gets a dunking. The speller for this act

is Red Skelton, who gets himself and his star performer into more trouble than a barrel of monkeys. For songs you have Howard Keel as a warbling cowhand. For sneezing you've got fast-stepping Ann Miller, with Paula Raymond and Keenan Wynn also on hand in a story which sets a record pace for hilarity and which winds up with Skelton winning a chuck wagon race in which he does everything but drive the horses while standing on his head!

The troubles and laughs begin when Cornelius Quinell (Skelton) befriends drunken cattle baron Dan Sablins (Wynn), who insists on giving the speller his expensive car. When Cornie and Deborah Telford (Miss Williams) drive to Sablins' hotel, with the intention of returning the car, they are mistaken for the wealthy Sablins and his sister, Marilla (Paula Raymond).

Debbie gets involved in a romance with Slim Shelby (Howard Keel) while Cornie has a hard time eluding the clutches of the sheriff's daughter, Sunshine Jackson (Ann Miller).

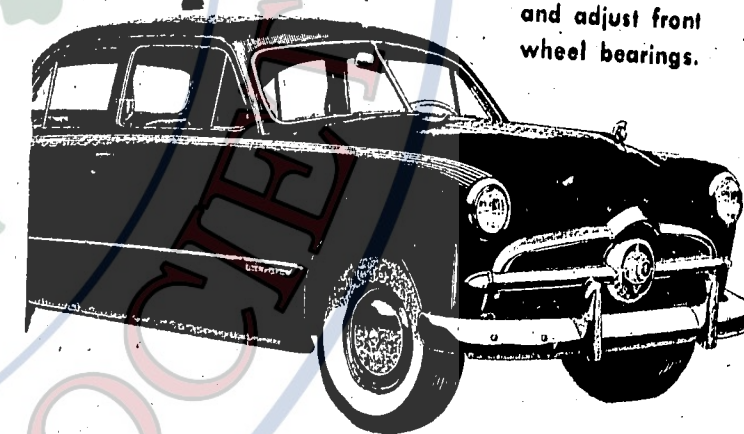

## Purges Would Make Us Strong

Here in the United States we get a lot of satisfaction out of purges in Russia, in Czechoslovakia, in China and in other countries where the Soviet dictatorship holds power.

We regard those purges as indicative of strife and dissension. We see them as a breaking down of government. Maybe they're not. Perhaps the purges are indicative of strength. They could be.

If the United States government today would purge itself of every grafter in the revenue department the purging would strengthen, not weaken this nation. If every man in the justice department who has been lax in the prosecution of chiseling government employees, gamblers and racketeers was purged, this nation would be stronger by that much. If every man who offered a mink coat or a home freezer for government favors was prosecuted, and every government employee who took the bribe was purged, this nation would be stronger, not weaker.

If every man or woman in the secretary of state's department who trafficked with the Reds was purged it would show strength, not weakness. If every American, no matter how well-intentioned he was, who had anything to do with building up Russia at Teheran, Yalta or Potsdam, was purged, Americans could again hold up their heads to face the people doomed to slavery in China, Poland, East Germany and Czechoslovakia. Their chains were fastened by the acts of Americans who are still in office.

Maybe we could do worse than to purge some of the deadwood cluttering up the Pentagon. That might make us stronger, not weaker.

Instead of regarding purges as indicative of weakness, strife and dissension, maybe we ought to consider that they can be indicative of strength.

A purging of those who have lowered the moral tone of this great nation to the present all-time low would not weaken us. It could only strengthen.

## Elections Can Cost Less

One of the congressional committees in Washington is probing election costs. Ohio is one state where the committee is checking up on costs.

Michigan once had and then abandoned a system of controlling election costs. Thirty years ago newspaper publishers were forbidden to use more than a single-column picture of a candidate. Also forbidden was the use of type in a larger face than the newspaper ordinarily used in its news or editorial columns.

Of course, 30 years ago was back before the expensive days of television and radio.

There are two things to consider in election campaigns. Certainly, cost is one of them. High office should not be reserved only for those who have the fortunes to invest in campaigns, or who have friends with such big money. Neither should costs be set so low that the people can not be informed of the issues and the candidates.

The party in power has access to many radio, television and newspaper facilities denied to the opposition. When the president wants to speak he gets free radio and television time. His opponents have to pay to get most of their messages over the air and sound waves.

Elections can cost less than they do now. Michigan once had a law which kept those costs low. It might be well for the congressional investigators to learn how the Michigan law worked and why it was repealed before marking out a federal pattern on political campaigns.

## Single-Shot Is Not Single

Much has been made of single-shot charity campaigns in Michigan cities. Most of them have reached their goals with harder work than a year ago. Some few have lagged.

Why the goal is harder to reach and why the campaigns have lagged is because single-shot campaigns are single-shot for only a few days. Then along comes an envelope filled with stamps for this cause or that, or an appeal for some other worthy charity.

There were promises of single-shot campaigns. But those who have made the promises have been in no position to carry them out. There is no way to shut the door on other charities. Probably there shouldn't be. People ought to have the privilege of giving their own money away to where they want it to go.

But if single-shot campaigns are going to be staged those in charge will have to bend every effort to see that they are single-shot. Or the campaigns will lag even more than they do now.

## Synthetics Are Not Substitutes

Rayon, nylon, orlon, acetate and dacron and other synthetic fibers are not substitutes for wool and cotton and silk. Had they not been developed people would have been bidding against each other to get enough silk for one garment, or enough wool for a suit or cotton for a calico wrapper.

Because of the increased population the demand for natural fibers far exceeds the supply. There is not enough cotton and wool and silk to go around.

The synthetics offer more than cloth for garments. Synthetic parachutes saved thousands of lives during the war. Synthetic hawsers are better and last much longer than rope made out of hemp. Some of the new synthetics offer features superior to cloth made from wool, cotton or silk. They can be washed and worn again without ironing. Some are wrinkle-proof.

Look around in homes. See the new fibers being used for furniture upholstery, for curtains, for clothing. Look at the new materials being used in manufacturing.

Synthetics have been developed by private industry investing millions of dollars for research. Synthetics are not substitutes. In many cases they offer advantages which the natural fibers do not possess.

## Dr. Hatcher Now Heads University

Tuesday of last week I took a day away from my usual haunts to look in the reflected glory of intellectuals. I accepted an invitation to attend the inaugural ceremonies attending the installation of Harlan H. Hatcher, the new president of the University of Michigan.

With all the pomp and ceremony at the command of the regents, Dr. Hatcher was formally inducted into office and duly charged with his great responsibilities.

It's a Big Job

Indeed it is no mean job to direct the work of a great university like Michigan. It involves recruiting a huge number of capable and learned professors and deans. It involves devoted attention to the bodily and spiritual needs of the thousands of young men and women on the campus and the wise use of university facilities in extending the teaching to other thousands of adults scattered throughout the state and nation. It involves the encouragement of research and experiment in every field of human interest and welfare.

It involves responsibility at Michigan for the maintenance of physical properties estimated at a value well above the \$100 million mark. It involves maintaining good public relations with the people of the state and in turn with legislative and administrative officials in order that adequate finances be available to support the work of the many schools and colleges included in what we call the University.

Dr. Hatcher appears like a man capable of all this. He has a background of teaching English; as an author and critic, as a college administrator and as a veteran of two World Wars.

Slab College in Vevay

It was a great day for me. You see the nearest I ever came to a college career was when I attended Slab college in Vevay. It was really the Hawley district school but it was called Slab college because the huge Round Oak stove which was the only heat we had was fed on slabs from the

Teal saw mill operated by water power. Slabs were strictly surplus and the Teal family always had the contract for supplying the fuel for the school.

Sometimes this school was good, sometimes not so good. Most of the time we rated three different teachers each year. The district board was made up of frugal men. Their top pay was just enough to get an inexperienced teacher. If that teacher was a good one, some other district hired him or her at the end of the term. If the teacher did not do so well, the board looked for another. So it went until my father sent me to the Mason school where I entered the seventh grade.

Farm Work Interfered

Four years took me part way through the 10th grade but I was a late comer in our family and my father was rearing his 70's when I was 16. Times were hard, money was scarce and none to pay a hired man to do the farm work.

Accordingly early in April each year I left school to do the spring plowing and planting. Up until the 10th grade I was able to go back and pass final examinations in June but that year I did not make the grade. That ended my schooling except for the next winter when I again enrolled at the Hawley where a former classmate of mine in the Mason schools was teaching. We worked together on some advanced mathematics, English and history.

Scholars Turn Out

So I say when I get the chance to mingle with scholars it is a real treat.

During my years in and about the state capital I came to know all the administrators at our several colleges and the university. At Ann Arbor last week, I met a lot of former acquaintances. There were 425 men and women in caps and gowns, representing colleges and universities in all parts of North America in the academic procession. They came from Alberta and from Florida; from Quebec and from Mexico and from all points between. They represented such as Harvard chartered in 1636 and such as Queens of New York

which dates only as far back as 1637.

Delegates from 312 colleges and representing 144 learned and scientific societies joined in the march of this army of intellectuals.

Mine Was Left Home

I did not take my cap and gown out of their moth ball wrappings but I have them just the same. Moreover, I have hanging in my memory room a neatly framed diploma showing that I was the first to receive an honorary degree from Western Michigan college. That was in November of 1944. The text of that certificate recites that in recognition of my record in public office, the state board of education had consented that the degree of master of public administration be conferred upon me.

Dr. Paul V. Sangren was then and still is president of Western and he was at Ann Arbor last week where I enjoyed meeting him again. At the time of my investment, Dr. Eugene E. Elliott was superintendent of public instruction. He is now president of Ypsilanti college and he too was among those I was happy to meet and greet again. And of course there is that lovable Dr. Alexander V. Ruthven, retiring president of the university, whose friendship I cherish very much.

Other old friends among the presidents of Michigan's string of institutions of higher learning were John Hannah of Michigan State; David Henry, who came to Lansing as deputy superintendent of public instruction, but who now heads Wayne University; Henry A. Tape, president at Marquette; Grover C. Dillman, once state highway commissioner but now president of Michigan Tech at Houghton; Charles L. Ansbach of Grand Rapids; Pleasant and William W. Whitehouse, president of Albion.

Added to this impressive list of able educators were numerous deans and vice-presidents whom I have known over the years and regard highly. Several former state officials and most of the incumbents were also among the distinguished guests present.

George Osborn of the Sault Ste. Marie Evening News and I seemed to constitute about the only press group present outside the working reporters and photographers of whom there were many. George and I had a good-time visit between ourselves and with mutual friends we found among the crowded places of meeting.

On the way home an early evening as I came up M-38 and Dexter Trail, I reflected along the way how good life has been to me and how delightful it is to step out of the ordinary routine once in a while to meet old friends and to meet others I do not know so well.

As a matter of fact when I reached home I thought at first my white-faced cattle looked upon me with more respect than common. Later I concluded it all could be traced to the fact I was three hours late with their supper.

## Down by the SYCAMORE

The Population Reference Bureau has college campuses atwitter with its survey on the profligacy of graduates. At Adrian, Alma, Hillsdale, Kalamazoo, Houghton and Michigan State colleges. The survey is designed to show whether or not college graduates have produced enough offspring to replace themselves. So far they haven't. There has been a rise of from 1.02 children per alumnus of the 1936 classes to 1.42 per alumnus of the 1941 classes. Female graduates have shown a rise from .95 in 1936 to 1.19 in 1941. A rate of 2.1 is necessary to keep even.

That's something that I refuse to worry about. If brains and ambition of college graduates could be transmitted, then the fact that college graduates aren't reproducing themselves would be of concern. Boys may inherit the broad shoulders of their truck driver fathers. They can't inherit a father's Tau Beta Kappa key and have it mean anything. A girl may get her beauty from her mother (Michigan State College Mortar Board 1936) but the brains, or the energy or the ambition to develop and use those brains, won't be transmitted. They may develop under environment, but they won't automatically come from college breeding on the part of either her sire or dam.

There lies the hope of the human race. Abraham Lincoln would have never been heard of if accomplishment came through inheritance. His father was "unlettered, shiftless and lacking in ambition."

A college graduate's boy or girl inherits just as much, not a bit more, brains than does a high school graduate's child, or an eighth grade graduate's child, or the child of one who never went to school. True it is, that a college graduate may have more intelligence and wisdom for training his child. Just as true, he may have less or he may be so mixed up with psychology and sociology or even biology that the child will be under a handicap instead of holding an advantage.

My father likes to see doctors of philosophy, doctors of laws, and doctors of other categories parade around college festivities in their gowns. I don't, which shows that even tastes can't be inherited. When I went out to see Jim get the first college diploma in his line from Adam on down, I wasn't impressed at all by the hundreds of professors and assistants milling around in their Mother Hubbards. A man shouldn't need all that cloth swathed around him to prove he is educated.

If a man wants to wear a gown to cover his nakedness or to save his good clothes I'll honor him for it, and I won't even peek to find out what if anything he has under it. But I don't like this practice of wearing a gown as a badge of learning.

I was over at Albion last fall when all the faculty were in their gowns up there on the stage and all the freshmen boys and girls and their parents were crowded into the auditorium. One of the professors was telling what a great thing it was that college culture was being handed down from fathers and mothers to sons and

daughters. Kind of passing the torch along. It sounded good, so good that the college men and their sons kept right on sitting down while many of the freshmen girls and some mothers (probably not graduates) stood because there were not enough seats to go around.

Such talk as this, so college graduates do it. Indicates that I have an inferiority complex because I spent two years in the fifth grade and needed five to get through high school. And maybe they're right. If I had a gown I might wear it.

Heredity is nowhere near as important a factor as we used to believe. Sons and daughters can inherit things that don't count much. Such as money or farms or looks. They can't inherit the important things like character, ambition and wisdom.

Because I don't believe in the transmission of learning by inheritance I can excuse myself in falling short of my father's mark. Because of my lack of belief in transmitting brains I have the right to expect that my sons and daughters will better my mark.

Because we placed too much stress on heredity here in Michigan and in all the middle west we didn't and still don't dare let first cousins marry. Yet there are 16 states and the District of Columbia where first cousins have as much right to fall in love and marry as do second or third cousins or total strangers.

For the benefit of boys and girls who may be sweet on cousins, the states where the blessing of law is added to those of the brother and brother, sister and sister, or brother and sister parents, are Alabama, California, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, Rhode Island, Tennessee, Texas, South Carolina, Vermont and Virginia; and yes, the District of Columbia, too.

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## What Other Editors Say

★ Dear Allies

We share the shock and surprise of Congressman B. Carroll Reece of Tennessee to learn that our esteemed allies in Secretary Acheson's North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) are charging us a local tax of 17 to 25 per cent on the defense projects we are building in Western Europe.

It works like this: We lay out an express highway or an airport to facilitate troop movements or supply routes; we pay for the construction, supply the materials, and provide all engineering skills; then we pay all the local taxes imposed by France, or whatever other power, for construction permits, sales taxes, and occupational duties.

One army engineer estimates that these taxes alone, in the case of France, eventually may amount to \$500 million—funds diverted from the defense projects to the local treasuries for routine operations.

By this device the American taxpayers in Omaha, Atlanta, Paducah and Howell are paying, not only for the defense works in Western Europe, but also for the operation of the local governments in those countries, as if sustaining local, state and federal governments in this country were not enough.

American officials said it would take a decision by all 12 North Atlantic powers to abolish local taxes.

One estimate was that merely a quarter of the building costs was for taxes. The French say it's 17 per cent.

The United States pays full French taxes on air-strips, roads, barracks and other installations built by Americans for mutual defense under the North Atlantic treaty.

"Of course, we could try to deal directly with the French," on United States Embassy official said. "But we probably wouldn't get very far. They would just point to all other countries in Europe doing the same thing."

The American official said a clause in one North Atlantic agreement handicaps the United States but does not bar it altogether in seeking tax exemptions. American officials refuse to be quoted on what percentage of building costs goes into the French treasury as taxes—they have a figure but not for the press. The French Finance Ministry has given the figure as about 17 per cent. Some American officers put it at 24 per cent.

Embassy officials, like those of the French government, consider it normal that taxes are paid by contractors working for the United States Army. The contractors pass on the tax charges in their bills to Uncle Sam (pardon—Sam).—Livingston County Press, Howell.

# College Experiments With New Pen-Type Barn

New dairy barn arrangements, designed as a research and demonstration unit, were put into use this week at Michigan State college. Savings in labor, herd health and ease of operation are among the advantages of the new structure.

A demonstration Thursday inaugurated a dairy cattle housing research project which will be conducted by Michigan State college's agricultural experiment station in cooperation with farm building and equipment manufacturers.

The new facilities are designed for one-man handling of a 25-cow herd by the "loose-housing" system. The structure may be expanded to allow one man to handle as many as 40 cows. Two quonset buildings are utilized in the unit, placed in an arrangement designed by Michigan State college research agricultural engineers. The arrangement may be duplicated by any farmer using buildings and equipment available to day.

Time required to care for the herd and perform milking chores is reduced by several innovations in barn design. A heated milking parlor and milk room are constructed within the housing barn; feed is mixed automatically and delivered by gravity to feed troughs in the milking stalls. Simplified controls handle entry and exit of cows to and from milking stalls; pipe-lines deliver milk from the milker unit to bulk storage tanks.

Maternity and calf pens are located within housing and hay storage barns; manure is removed by tractor scoop; hay is dried by

forced air and self-fed to animals. Other features are a paved footing lot and non-freezing water troughs.

Cooperating with the Michigan State college agricultural school in the project are the Great Lakes Steel Corp., Sarnia-Steel Division, manufacturer of quonset buildings; Starline, Inc., barn equipment; Chereboy Milking Machine Co.; Aerovent Fan and Equipment, Inc.; and the Libby-Owens-Ford Glass Co.

Denn E. L. Anthony of the Agricultural school formally accepted the new facilities on behalf of the college at the demonstration day. J. E. Bowen, Great Lakes Steel Corp. vice-president, pointed out that the project is typical of the manner in which manufacturers are assisting agricultural research to improve practical farming methods available to the farmer.

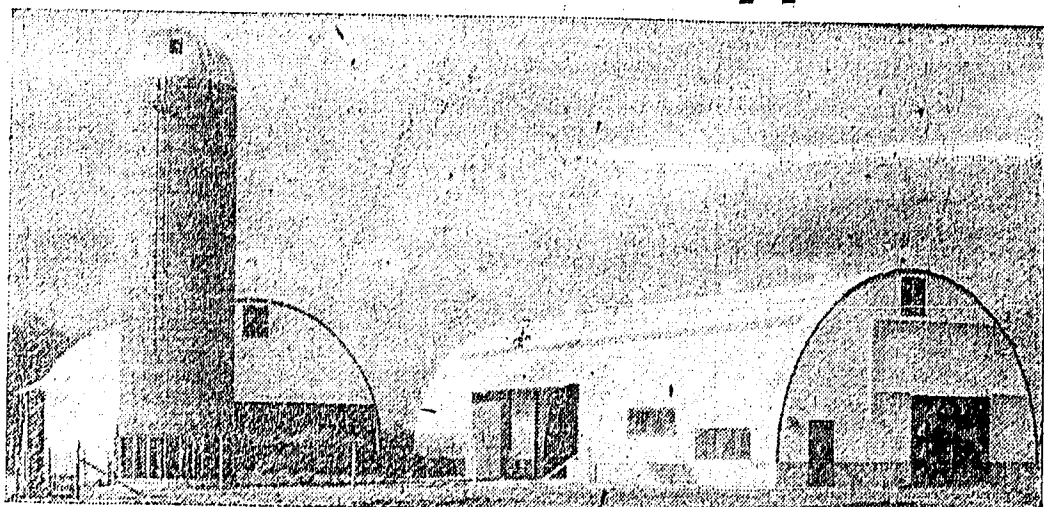
Research scientists of the Michigan agricultural experiment station have begun studies in the new structures to develop further improvements in building construction and dairy management practices that may be adapted by farmers of Michigan.

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**THIS FARMING BUSINESS**  
BY **CARL COLLIN**

Temperature makes the difference in milk production. Broiler production is 16 per cent over last year. Wet fall weather left a lot of high-moisture corn.

Cows produce the best when the temperature is about 50 degrees and relative humidity ranges between 60 and 70 per cent. In tests run by the University of Missouri, Holsteins began a definite dropping off in production between 70 and 80 degrees. The drop was more pronounced at 90 degrees. Jerseys showed no sharp break in production until the thermometer hit 85 degrees. When the temperature hit 100, animals practically stopped eating and producing. At 105 degrees the cows began to show serious distress.

Better management of livestock could cut down death losses sharply and help increase incomes of producers. One pig out of six dies before weaning. Twenty per cent of all calves die before three months of age. Ten per cent of all started chicks die before they mature. By cutting these mortality rates in half, we could up our production of meat animals materially and help boost food production. With rising population and continuous need for more food all over the world, here's one spot where we could increase production. We don't have much new land to put under cultivation any more in this country. We will have to do a better job on the land we are adding, sanitation, and care of livestock will boost livestock output pretty fast.

When ear corn is dried rapidly with an artificial drier in the bin, the kernels lose moisture content quicker than the cob. The kernels then absorb the moisture from the cob, which of course boosts the moisture in the kernels again. Agricultural engineers say the best deal is to dry the corn to a lower moisture content than is usually considered safe for farm storage. Then when the kernels pull the moisture out of the cob, the grain will not be too wet to store safely. It would be a good idea to check on artificially dried corn occasionally after the drier is turned off to see how much the moisture content in the grain has been increased by absorption from the cob.

The broiler industry is still going great guns. For the week ending November 16, the number of eggs set for broiler production in the major producing areas rose sharply to 16 per cent above a year ago. The number of chicks placed for broiler production was nine per cent above a year ago. The number of broilers for markets in December is estimated six per cent above the previous year. Marketers are expected to rise to 11 per cent above the previous year's level in January.

The October hog-corn ratio in Michigan was 11.9 according to MSC economists. That was up slightly from the 11.7 ratio in September but off considerably from the 14.0 ratio in October 1950. The farm economists at the college believe hog prices will reach their seasonal low point in December and then they will start rising to a spring peak in February.

More comments on the hog price situation come from Purdue economists. They believe prices will be weak in the immediate period ahead. The important fact or causing changes in hog prices from one day to the next is the volume of receipts. Bunching receipts on certain days will cause price breaks. Farmers should try to avoid sending their hogs on days when receipts are likely to be heavy.

The differential between light and heavy hogs will widen, say the Purdue people. Many heavy hogs will be coming to market. Try to pick days when receipts are light. Farmers with light hogs shouldn't be too anxious to sell in the next short period, even though some price breaks develop. Hog prices should be better in the latter part of December and January.

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Others are making a good come-back. Most damage was done in the middle and western part of the valley. Price controls are as old as history. They were used 2,000 years B. C. in Mesopotamia. . . . Vaccination against hog cholera is a cheap precaution. Get the job done early. Sanitation and reasonable care against bringing germs in from infected droves pays off. Once cholera hits hogs they're done for. . . . In the first three weeks of November Chicago hog prices averaged \$17.80 per cwt. lower than steers. Four years ago steers averaged only \$1.60 above hogs. . . . For the next few months the U. S. will be the only effective source of good quality wheat in the world. (That's the main bullish influence in wheat market currently). . . . Hybrid chickens have been on the market for 10 years. Currently about three per cent of all chickens are hybrids.

Herman Kurschner of Leslie raised a crop of Christmas watermelons this year. They're about the size of muskmelons. And they're good. If kept cold, they'll make good eating on Christmas day.

Since 1931 when the first cross was made, the Early Reds have gone through a long testing period at the South Haven station and a 10-year commercial test in the raspberry producing area near Benton Harbor.

Early Reds withstand the canning process very well without crumbling. They freeze as well as Latham.

While the berries begin maturing early, the ripening season is long. The good flavor and long ripening season of Early Red should make it a popular variety for home gardens, the scientists believe.

The limited number of plants available are being distributed among nurserymen specializing in raspberry plant production. This is being done to insure a stock of plants at the earliest possible date. The experiment station has no plans for general distribution, Johnston stated.

**Breeders Prefect Better Raspberry**

Breeders have developed a new red raspberry variety, named Early Red, at the Michigan State college's South Haven experiment station after 20 years of breeding and testing.

Stanley Johnston, MSC horticulturist and superintendent of the station, reports that the early maturing season of the Early Reds is of particular value, because the early season red raspberry crop is usually smaller and brings higher prices.

Plants of Early Red are upright, tall, vigorous, hardy and productive. Berries mature early and are light red when first ripe, turning dark when fully ripe. This is important, Johnston points out, as the berries are easy to pick while

## Potato Acreage May Be Increased On Michigan Soil

With present stocks adding up to a mere sizeable eating crop and prices climbing, potato production for 1952 looks pretty good according to D. L. Clannahan, Michigan State college farm crop specialist, was the lowest since records have been kept. The United States acreage dipped to the lowest point since the 1870's, according to Dr. Clannahan. That's the reason the United States department of agriculture has asked for an increase in acreage for 1952. A boost of 10 per cent for Michigan has been asked.

Number of acres planted to potatoes has been going down throughout the nation and Michigan growers have reduced acreage faster than those of other states. A cut of 25 per cent under 1950 was made in the state in 1951.

Michigan growers are located close to the national center of population and yet they grow barely enough to feed the state. Saving on freight in shipping to nearby markets should add up to a greater net return for Michigan growers.

Clannahan pointed out that the acreage of potatoes has been getting more concentrated. That means the nation's spud supply is more apt to be seriously hit by weather, blight or similar hazards. In the past, growers have been getting increases in yields and acreage. But there may be a limit to increased yields and therefore a limit to how low acreage can safely go.

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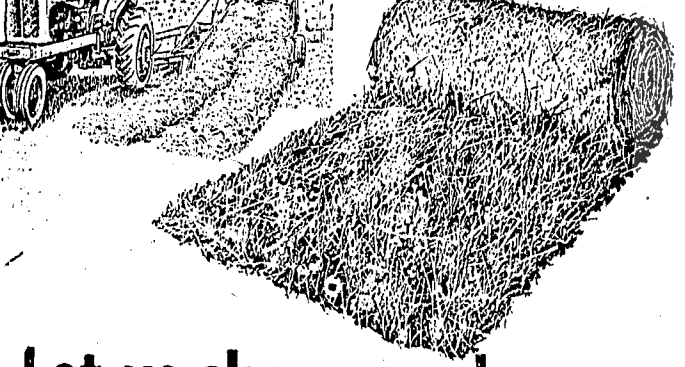

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# ' State Crops Look Good for 1952

Economists annually predict the future of Michigan crops for the coming year. Farm economists at Michigan State college are no exception. The following is the second in a series of articles dealing with the farm future for 1952:

**FRUITS**—Bud and fruit spur development on apples, cherries and grapes is reported good for most fruit areas of the state. Hence, normal crops of those fruits are possible in 1952, depending of course on climatic conditions between now and harvest time. Recovery of grape vines in southwestern Michigan from the record freeze of November 25, 1950, has been excellent, and a full crop is again possible. Peach trees in the same area were severely damaged and many have been taken out. Small Michigan peach crops can be expected for the next three or four years, due to the damage in southwestern Michigan.

Despite the pessimism of many growers, planting of popular varieties of apples at least sufficient to replace old stock will be profitable in the long run. There is no better time than the present to remove trees which do not pay their way.

Most attention is on marketing the 1951 Michigan crop, second only to the 1949 crop of 11.7 million bushels. The United States crop of 320 million bushels is three per cent below last year's production. Marketing the 1951 Michigan crop of 9.7 million bushels is made at most as difficult as the 1949 situation by the probability of at least one million bushels less moving to processors' outlets than in 1949. The reason for the decrease in processing is the record carryover stocks of canned apple sauce, and

canned and frozen apples. Eventual size of the crop thrown on the fresh market depends largely upon the orchards.

Storage of apples should be profitable this winter, provided growers watch monthly storage holdings and market accordingly. The state of Washington, one of our biggest competitors of winter apples, has the smallest crop since 1942—although the apples they do have are likely to be king size. Michigan growers may capture part of this Washington state market by using the new U. S. Fancy and Extra Fancy grades where their quality and color will permit, selling the fall varieties in the fall, and storing good-keeping varieties for a steady supply to the winter market.

Young cherry trees coming into production could mean another large crop. Stocks of frozen cherries are above last year, and a large pack of cherries from the 1951 crop must be contended with. Counteracting these forces is the expected increase in consumer incomes.

**VEGETABLES**—Vegetable growers will find contract crops limited in 1952, with the continued high consumer incomes expected. The outbreak of war in Korea caught many packers with out adequate supplies of many canned commodities. Production in 1951 allowed canners to catch up to normal needs on such short products. In spite of these increases in the supply of most canned vegetables, the expected high levels of consumer buying will result in small carryovers into the 1952 processing season.

Frozen vegetable holdings on August 31 reached a new record of 430 million pounds in storage, compared with last year's August 31 holdings of 361 million pounds. Increased consumption of frozen vegetables is expected during 1952.

We can expect production of vegetables for fresh market in 1952 to remain about as much as in 1951. Wages in the market garden areas will likely rise. Increased rates in rail transportation will about offset any gain in comparative advantage of distant production areas. More and more growers close to large industrial centers will find their land worth more as industrial sites than vegetable production could possibly return.

## Bray Announces New Swine Feed

McMillen Feed Mills, makers of Master Mix Feeds, has developed a new approach to feeding swine, according to Dee Bray, operator of the Mason Elevator which handles the line.

The system is a plan to meet the exact nutritional needs of hogs at every stage of production, Bray stated.

McMillen Feeds markets a separate sow concentrate for bred sows and gilts; and a baby pig feed which should produce faster gains. The company also has a pig concentrate for growing pigs up to 75 pounds, plus defensible feeds to speed gains from 75 pounds to market weight on either good pasture or in drylot.

The five new feeds, called the Master Plan, are in full production at the mill according to Bray.

## PRACTICE IN FORESTS



Michigan State College short course students in forest practice get their science with practice. Their college instructors take them into forests in different parts of the state to illustrate various forest management practices. 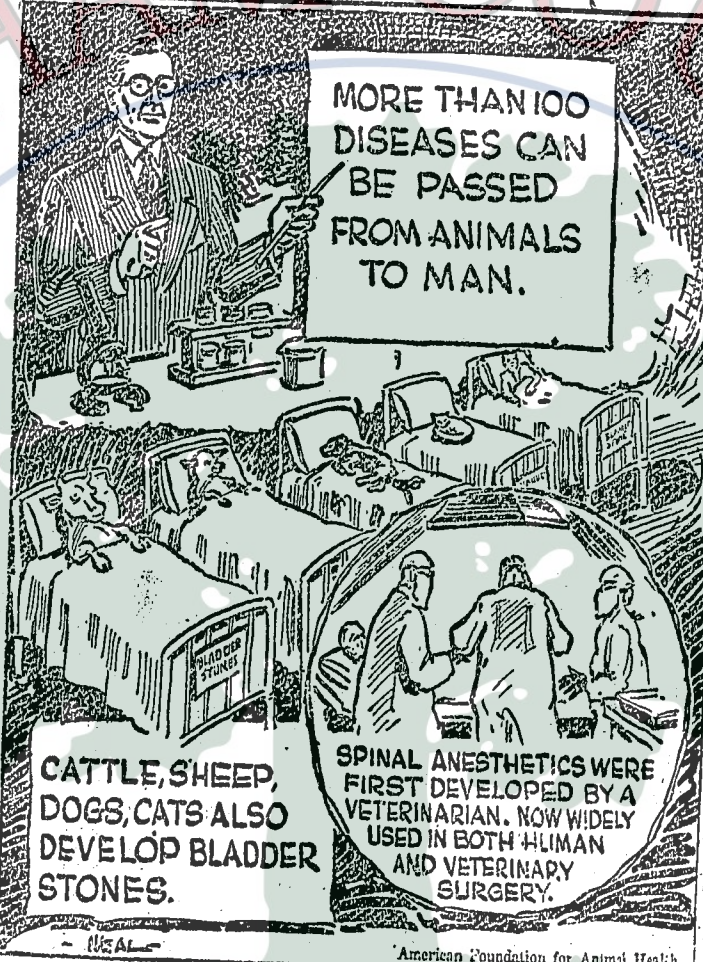

Rain slimmed the crowd in the morning, but sunshine brought more farmers to the demonstration in the afternoon.

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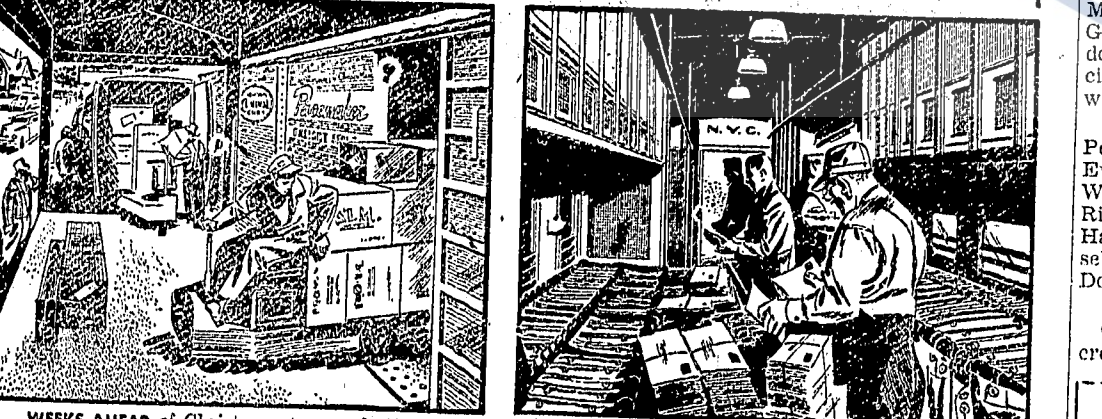
