# **Hospital Board Awaits Rulings** On Organizing

Until rulings on legal and tax aspects of the Mason General hospital situation are received the 4-member board is marking time. Reorganization will be started, said Dr. George R. Clinton, as

soon as the way is cleared. On the board now are the former owners, Dr. and Mrs. Clinton and Dr. William E. Clark and Mrs. Clark. All 4 signed over their holdings in the hospital building and equipment without receiving a penny in return. The present hospital belongs to the community to be operated as a

non-profit corporation. The initial step will be to enlarge the board to 6 or 7 members, representative of the community, said Dr. Clinton.

Several groups and many individuals, the doctors said, have pledged their support to the new hospital organization.

For 10 years the Mason General hospital has been operated by the 2 Mason doctors with profits from operations being plowed back into hospital equipment. Because the hospital has been operated as a regular corporation it and its perations have been taxable. There have been income and property taxes to pay and even sales taxes on supplies. Under the new non-profit setup the hospital will be exempt from taxes.







It was in 1928 that Vern again inswered the call of politics. He vas elected and served the second Ingham district with disinction. He was chairman of the ways and means committee and university, although when President John M. Hannah made the prewas a member of several commissions which reformed proplege. The name was changed in July. erty tax laws. He was a sponsor of some 100 bills designed to improve the state's accounting and business procedures. In 1938 he was elected auditor general. He served 2 teams as auditor general and one term as licutenantgovernor before entering the lists in 1946 for the Republican nomination of governor. He lost to Kim Sigler.

The Browns had bought back the old Brown homestead and they returned to the farm. They rebuilt the house and barn and put the farm back into production. Vern devoted himself to raising flowers and building a gigantic pool, fed by water from an artesian well.

But Vern was not permitted! to withdraw entirely from state affairs. He was made president of the Michigan State Office Buildings corporation, the agency which financed construction of the Stevens T. Mason building. In 1954 Gov. G. Mennen Williams named the Mason man to the state civil service commission.



# Christianity Is Always New

Every human child is born a pagan. Whether he becomes a Christian, a Buddhist, a Jew, a Mohammendan, a sun worshipper or adopts any other belief or cult is a matter

The only thing that a child can be born and remain without training is an idiot. If he is to learn to read and write, if he is to learn to think, if he is to learn to worship anything beyond his next meal he must be taught.

If it were not for the Christian churches in this land we would all be pagans. If it were not for the teachings of the churches our children would know nothing of Christianity.

Here in Mason and in almost every other community in festivals in his honor were called the United States we insist on every child attending school to learn to read and write, and to learn history, and as much as he is able of science and other matters. By our constitution the responsibility for teaching religion is left to churches. If churches do not accept their responsibilities for instructing the young in things even more important than academic subjects then there is little hope for the next generation.

### **Our Own City Park**

Mason people ought to pay more attention to the city park. Because the county established a park on the east side too many of us have lacked interest in developing an area just as pretty and even handier.

Mason's Junior Chamber of Commerce and city crews started a park development program between Ash and Maple streets. Roy W. Adams has beautified both banks of the Sycamore above Ash. Claud Perrin and Vance Kennedy and others downstream from State street have prettied up banks of the stream. Yet there remains much that could be done and much of what remains is on city property. All through the cemetery, all along behind the city storage buildings and downstream between the cemetery and disposal plant are areas which need cleaning or planting or both.

All of us have underrated the Sycamore. We have called it just a little crick. It may be, but it has a bigger watershed in Ingham county than either the Red Cedar or the Grand. After the Sycamore and the Willow join to meander through Mason there is a steady flow of clean water. It isn't a sewer or a drain. It's good water, and it should be kept that way, and the banks through which it flows should be maintained clean and sightly. We ought to pay a little more attention to our own city park.

county agricultural agent. Swine experts put the blame on poor nutrition as the most important cause of baby pig losses in the first 3 days after farrow it's an important part of our ing. For this reason, Avery recommends careful attention to

the sow's ration during gestation. Ed Miller, extension hog spe-Ed Miller, extension hog specialist at Michigan State university, recommends this ration for hand feeding: 45 lb of ground on Heifers of oats, 15 lb of alfalfa meal and 10 lb of protein supplement.

As a rule of thumb for feeding gilts, Miller suggests 11/2-2 lb of this ration for each 100 lb of body weight, for sows, 1-11/2 lb. Research to date has shown no particular benefit in adding antibio-

tics to bred sows' ration, he adds If farmers want to feed ear corn. Miller says to use 21/2 to 3 lb of the oats alfalfa meal pro tein supplement mixture and enough corn to keep the sows in medium condition. To insure enough exercise, the feed should

Suppose your neighborhood grocer opens the store some morning and finds the door to his safe blasted from the hinges and the cash box missing. He and the police have enough to go on to say that there was a burglary. They have the "corpus delicti."

And in spite of the "whodunnit" writers, the prosecutor doesn't necessarily have to produce a corpse to prove a murder. Even though he must prove the "corpus delicti," there are other ways.

It doesn't happen often, but courst have convicted men for murder in cases where a body was never found. The proof offered may be a combination of several circumstances such as a discharged gun belonging to the clothing in his possession, and similar incriminating factors.

Even though "corpus delicti" isn't a term you use in everyday conversation, you can be thankful American law,

"We want our share," the fabled cry thrown outby Detroit labor unionists at a Stockbridge dairy meeting last week, leaves a few questions unanswered. On the surface the Michigan Milk Producers Fair Share committee called the meeting to think out the problem of why farmers are receiving less and less of the consumers' milk dollar. It was a meeting to unite dairymen in a combined effort to do something about the dairy price squeeze.

But most of the thinking was done in Detroit before the meeting, it seems. Ingham farmers weren't given a chance. With a revival technique that would have done credit to Billy Sunday or Billy Graham, these "friends of farmers" lashed out at just about everybody in an effort to make Ingham dairymen mad enough to join in an unholy marriage with

But Ingham dairymen didn't buy it then. Homer Martin, local organizer and one-time preacher, and Sam Bailo, labor union lawyer, forgot that farmers aren't used to jumping into deals without thinking about all of the answers.

And they didn't get many answers in Stockbridge.

Martin and Bailo didn't point out that farmers are businessmen, not slaves of the soil. They are producers of wealth. They are to be compared with Ford Motor Co. or General Motors or any other manufacturers. They cannot be logically linked with organized labor. On the other hand, organized abor is a world-apart from dairymen. Labor has no financial nyestment in factories. Their labors is their stock in trade. When labor calls a strike they have no cows to keep on eatng, or no buildings and equipment to depreciate.

Labor leaders don't advocate the marriage of the CIO and the Ford company, yet they are pushing for a combine of labor and farmers.

> Is the Fair Share committee saying that Detroit labor will take less money for processing and delivering the milk so the dairy farmers can have their "fair share"? Probably not. The fair share they're talking about will be coming from consumers. And there are those who believe that as the price of milk goes up, the consumption goes down. So dairymen would find themselves loaded with even more surplus milk, a fact that the city slickers have completely over-

Farmers are entitled to a fairer share of the retail price. Soaring costs on the farm are making it impractical for many to continue in the dairy business.

But a union based on wild charges and moneygrabbing won't endure. It will take more than frantic half-truths and no-truths to make dairymen swallow the Fair Share program broached last week


