Drivers on Holt road are expected to stop before entering or crossing Williamston road. State police are seeking to establish whether Stormer stopped his car and then started across Williamston road, or didn't make a stop at all.

... Don and Leone Densmore put a small stock of groceries in the front half of what was then E. C. Smith & Sons meat market at 350 S. Jefferson street. The Smiths continued to operate the meat department and the store was renamed Jefferson Food Market. Prior to that time, Don Densmore had been employed by the Kroger Grocery and Baking Co. in the Mason store and by the A & P stores in Mason and Lansing, by Doyle Burgess' Standard Service and was on the road for a short time with the Island City Pickle Co. of Eaton Rapids.

Leone Densmore had been employed at the Ingham County News office following graduation from Cleary College in Ypsilanti. The Densmores were married in February of 1936.

At the beginning of World War II, the Smiths discontinued their meat business and the department was taken over by the Densmores. Don Densmore entered the service in 1943 and for the 3 years he was away the store was operated by his wife. Upon his return, a fresh meat department was again started with George Gorham as manager.

In June of 1954 the downtown Mason store was closed and a new location purchased in the Angell subdivision on US-127. At that time, the Densmores joined the IGA voluntary group of independent grocers. The store was renamed Densmore's IGA Foodliner. In 1955 more space was added to the floor area and stock rooms.

Plans are already being made for more expansion in the future. Ted Gilbert was manager of the meat department in the new location. Upon his death, Richard A. Mills joined the staff as meat department manager. Richard W. Morris has been grocery department manager for the past 3 years.





An Unlearned Lesson?

All organizations, political or otherwise, if they are successful must at intervals undergo self-inspection. They must compare accomplishments and weaknesses of the past with possibilities of the future. They must check the weak spots and encourage the strong points.

Considered in this light, the roundtable talks of state and national Republican leaders at Mackinac Island are in order. Yet, the conclave smacks of the same old pitfallspitfalls of poor public relations and the uselessness of selling Republicanism to Republicans. The connotation of swanky Mackinac Island and the Republican convention makes for poor public relations. The fact that Republican leaders removed themselves apparently as far as possible from the voters even unto an island doesn't pass without notice.

And by contrast, Michigan Democrats are doing everything possible to fall into the arms of voters. They're in the Detroit Labor Day parade, they're at the county and state fairs. They're at Boys and Girls States. They're everywhere at once.

Republicans, for all practical purposes the minority party in Michigan, must soon learn that their savior will come not from a summit meeting at Mackinac or from any country club or other silk stocking organization. Salvation, if it comes at all, will come from obscure voters who are touched by the seeming desire of Republican leaders to serve them.

Congressman Charles Chamberlain proved at the last general election that the winning way is the aggressive way. A newcomer so far as the sixth congressional district goes, he won out over heavy odds mainly because of his enthusiasm and lack of Republican stiffness.

Commercial salesmen don't sell merchandise by spending their time talking with each other. They must go into the market. And while some sales meetings are necessary, salesmen eventually must impress potential customers if they are to be successful.

Maybe this Mackinac Island convention is a sales meeting in anticipation of a hard-hitting election campaign. It's too bad if it's just another self-glorification and self-pily session. If it was a sales meeting, a session for instilling enthusiasm, then the salesmen ought to start work on prospective customers at once.


The Park Bill Veto

George M. Van Peursem, speaker of the house, and other Republican leaders are charging Governor G. Mennen Williams with duplicity in his veto of the park fee bill, and his present attack on Republicans for not providing more park money.

It does seem queer, not only to Republican legislators but to the public as well.

Michigan has possibly the best state park system in the nation; so good that thousands of people from other states are attracted to Michigan. The governor and the legislators were and still are agreed that more money is needed to improve and expand park facilities. Legislators recognized that people don't visit the parks because they are free or almost free. Legislators recognized that fees are the smallest part of vacation expense; that park visitors are willing to pay for food and travel, for entertainment, for buying trailers and tents and other camping gear. They are willing to pay fees for use of the parks, willing to pay fees toward the purchase of more park land.

The governor now insists that the people who use the parks should not be asked to pay for them. He insists that



Amateur athletics have just about disappeared at Michi-gan State, elsewhere in the Big Ten and in all other major college leagues and conferences. Amateurs are few and far between. Boys play for pay. The Big Ten now operates on tenders. Schools offer "scholarships" with definite price tags to promising athletes. It is up to the recruits to deliver or else. Still listed as amateurs, they receive pay for playing and no bones are now made about it. As paid hands they are not considered immune from criticism, even unkind, unfair and unjust criticism.

There are cases where boys of athletic reputation or promise choose their colleges on the basis of athletic tenders. That's why some boys shop around from college to college, trying to find the best professional offer for their amateur acceptance.

Some people say the Big Ten was wise to recognize the situation and to place their tenders on the table, instead of njaking their deals under it. Others say there should be no pay for play, or at least in the open. But it won't do much good what people say. The system has been established. College football is no longer solely a sport. It has become big business. Players who accept the cash can not complain of the newspaper treatment they receive at the hands of scribes, paid to get news of paid participants in paid business.



farmers union officials. Proxmire won the state's total farm vote by better than 2 to 1. Wisconsin farmers union called the Proxmire victory a repudiation of Secretary of Agriculture Benson, and believe that he will "not dare cut farm price supports."

Washington observers don't go quite that far, but they do report that Proxmire's victory has cheered the farm bloc. It is causing concern among Republicans over the farm vote in the mid west, particularly as that vote can affect congressional elections in 1958 and 1960.

Proxmire probably will be put on the senate agriculture committee, replacing a Republican member.

The last session of congress ended without any sign of a break in the deadlock between Secre tary Benson and the agriculture committee. The showdown prob ably will come in the next session. Committee members will have a chance to "get" the think ing of farmers in the next few months. Benson is expected to work on additional city support for his programs.

Votes of congressmen representing urban areas is highly im portant to the passage of any farm legislation. There probably are a number of reasons why city congressmen have gone along with all kinds of farm legislation in the past. One is that city people have a sentimental reaction about farming: Of persons 25 years and older, 37% were born of farm parents.

City Democrats in the house have usually voted 75% or more for any and all farm bills. Farm leaders had come to take this support pretty much for granted until this year. On at least 2 votes in the past session of congress city Democrats went against Democratic farm measures. One was on the corn bill. The other was on the meat check-off bill for promotion of meat products. The split in the farm bloc had a lot to do with this loss of city support.

Until representatives of farm areas can get together with a definite program, it's probable they won't get much backing from city congressmen. Congressmen from northern urban areas also used their votes against farm measures in the last session as a means of slapping down southerners who voted against liberal city measures.

Country and Town An oldtimer remembers

If ever there was a grocery store with a flare for fraternalism --- both with and among customers and employes, it was the old Jefferson Food Market. Now Densmore's IGA Foodliner, the super grocery store is celebrating its 20th anniversary next week. That first store, opened by Don Densmore in 1937 was a far cry from the modern market with electric-eye doors, intercom music, kids' play yard, paved parking lot and untold employes.

There was a time when things were not as grand. That was back when Don stepped out of the Kroger store in Mason to open Jefferson Food Market in the space now occupied by Western Auto store. There, for many years, Don operated the grocery in conjunction with E. C. Smith & Sons meat market. It wasn't a supermarket in those days. Customers stepped up to a counter and ordered

Business volume was measured in a few cases of merchandise a week contrasted to cases by the hour at Don's new store. A big weekday business was \$25 and a \$75 Saturday business was worth celebrating. Nowadays, individual customers drop that much money on just one order.

Many have served in both the Jefferson Food Market and Densmore's IGA during the past 20 years. I joined the Densmore fraternity in 1941, 1942 and 1943. During the first years, it was Don, Earl Eifert and I in the store. Later as business caught on, Ed Dunn joined the troupe. Others I remember were Don Green and Delmer Kramer.


Don took as much pride in his store and especially the produce department as he does now. Ed Dunn took pride, too. Don asked him to sweep the walk one morning, so Ed brushed the dirt and papers up into a neat little pile. And as he was about to whisk it into the gutter. Don rushed out admonishing him never to clutter up the streets like that. Instead, Don suggested that Ed sweep the refuse into a dust pan and dump it in the ash can out back. Ed always thought Don was needlessly tidy.

But Don got his reward one day while discussing a line of tobacco pouches with a traveling salesman. As the 2 were huddled over the counter, Don declared, "Now here's a pretty snappy number."

A beauteous blond customer had just stepped through the door. Hearing the fresh talk (she didn't know Don was discussing tobacco pouches), she turned and stormed out the door. Customers were hard to find in those days too.

Then there was the time Don Green was caught by an irate customer in the midst of throwing tomatoes at another more playful customer.

When the shelves had been stocked and dusted and customers were infrequent, we shot rats in the basement. We'd sit on the cellar stairs and fire .22 slugs at the rodents (most grocery stores have 'em) as they ran among the canned goods. At other slow periods, I can remember doing odd jobs at the Densmore home on West Columbia.
