From Leslie to Lansing

Big Grass Fire Battled Along a 28-Mile Front

A gargantuan grassfire that New York Central railroad Central railroad tracks from Leslie to Lansing, a distance of about 28 miles, gave firemen from 5 communities an all day battle last Friday, August 6.

Sirens and more sirens blew calling out Mason, Holt, Dansville, Leslie and Lansing fire departments while flames spread toward homes and over

Approximately 43 firemen and 11 trucks answered the alarms. The winding trail of grass fires started at Kinneville and Eden roads just outside Leslie and popped up in various locations all the way

From the air the fire would have looked like 100 camp fires springing up here and there all along the railroad right of way.

Firemen said the fires were started by sparks from a New York Central train which went through Mason about 11

Sparks from a hot box on the train showered Ingham county's tinder dry land along the tracks, starting the myriad of fires that mushroomed into full-fledged blazes, firemen reported.

Mason's fire units jumped from one fire to another. Ingham county sheriff patrol cars kept the fire fighting units informed by radio as to where a new blaze had broken out. As soon as a new fire was spotted, off the trucks would

Jumping from fire to fire showed wear and tear on all the volunteers and even on some of the equipment. The rough terrain and continuous hard usage told on the

of the wheat stubble field on College road.

The huge grass fire required the attention of every available volunteer fireman in Mason. Even some of the retired volunteers were pressed into action as the siren blew repeatedly Friday morning.

After the initial work of fire fighting, volunteers set about checking on smouldering ashes to insure that they didn't fire up again. A second blaze started up within the city limits of Mason just west of Barnes road Friday afternoon and firemen were called to put it

Some 5 patrol cars worked in the immediate Mason area to report and keep track of all fires. In some areas firemen left fires to burn themselves out as there was no damage that could be done. This made more men available in areas where homes were threatened.

Firemen said the same train went along quite a way past Holt road without starting another fire until it reached Aurelius road where more sparks flew, igniting surrounding grass.

At 4:30 p.m. Fridayanother grass fire broke out along Mason street in Mason.

over her husband's grand-213 Acre Farm Given To Camp Ingham Inc.

A 213 acre farm valued at facility will be operated by \$80,000 to \$100,000, near Highfields, the camp for boys near Onondaga, has been donated to Camp Ingham, Inc. The new farm facility is located only some 2 miles from "Highfield," where an administration building, including dining facility and lodging for boys, is presently under construction.

Focus at the farm facility will be on development of program -- not only farming, but various trade and technological subjects. Buildings at the farm facility appear favorably adaptable to use for shop, classroom, and indoor recreational purposes as well as for farming, "Highfields", which has a fresh stream running through the property suitable for damming and 28 acres of wooded area, will be developed as a park type camp and the residential area.

It is expected, as program is developed, that some of the boys will also live at the new location.

Both Highfields and the new

Camp Ingham, Inc., a nonprofit corporation representing interested community organizations and agencies. An appropriate name for the new facility is being sought and was discussed at the Camp Ingham board meeting Tuesday.

While it was felt the donors' names should appear in the title, they have specifically requested that their name be given no publicity as a result of the gift. They have asked and been assured that the property will always be used for an opportunity program for deserving youth such as is planned by Camp Ingham. Inc.

They have offered the suggestion, in view of the training emphasis planned, that the word "Academy" might be suitable to include in the title. The state highway department has started distributing second quarter motor vehicle highway fund collections to Michigan counties and incorporated cities and villages. Howard E. Hill, state high-

way director, said net receipts of the highway fund during April. May and June of 1965, amounted to \$52,548,373, an increase of \$3,508,891, or 7.2 percent, compared to the same period of 1964.

All state gasoline and diesel fuel taxes and license plate fees go to the Motor Vehicle Highway Fund.

After deduction of collection costs and the Waterways Commission's share, the money is distributed under provisions of state law which provide that 47 percent goes to the State Highway Department for use on state highways, 35 percent to the State's 83 counties for use on county roads and 18 percent to incorporated cities and villages for their roads and streets.

Under this formula, the State Highway Department will receive 24,697,735 as its share of the second quarter collections, while the counties will receive \$18,391,931 and the incorporated cities and villages will get \$9,458,707.

program will come to a close Friday, August 13. Ted Sampe, director of the program which has been in progress for the past 7 weeks feels that it was a success from the viewpoint of the children and it has won the approval of their parents, he said.

"I think we have learned considerable", he added. "One thing we know about what is to come in the future in local and federal school relations. There have been problems and we have identified some of these problem areas at the local level."

During the closing weeks the staff working on the program has been busypreparing pre-school inventory tests and behavior tests for the federal government which will use the information to better evaluate the program and determind what needs to be done in the future.

"At the same time we have been evaluating our own program", Sample said "and determining what needs to be done in future such sessions."

He said he is following up some of the medical and dental examinations given the children and has been informed that about 6 are in need of tonsilectomies.

Twenty five youngsters were enrolled in the Holt program and Sample said the attendance has been good.







This is a good year for stone farming. For five reasons! 1. Helps retain moisture.

2. Keeps weeds down.

3. Defies cats.

4. Discourages banties. 5. Discommodes dogs.

There should be a sixth reason also. It's interesting to use the stones we've picked up over the years in this way. It becomes kind of a fascinating 'picture' with the various texture of stones.

You've never heard of stone farming???????

Let me tell you its worth. It's actually sort of a stone mulch. Those of you who have looked for angleworms know the secret already of how it stays damp under stones. So when you surround a plant with stones it seems to keep that plant nice and dampish at the roots. That's what I call stone farming!

This began in a mind, and then in a wild and intense struggle to have a certain flowerbed along the sidewalk.

No, sir!! Do you think that even one of our eighteen cats would leave that strip of soft dirt alone? They camped on it! So I sharpened sticks and pushed them into the ground here and there. Well, they not only looked goofy but everyone wondered if I were tryping to pierce them to their death should they miss their step and fall face downward. . . to say nothing to what it would do to their back. . . !

I like it. It's such a good display of our stones in the bargain. And they are interesting. It's been such a lot of fun through the years (over thirty-five) picking up stones. It's made an adventure out of any place at all I've happened to be because there is always the possibility of seeing 'a stone'.

And whatever my family would have had to tease poor, goofy, little, old Mom about without her "stones." You see they seemed to have no earthly value at all, If I would have had to buy, borrow or steal them it would have made them important???? Now they are proving that they have earthly value.







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Okemos

It Grows and Grows **And Grows**

By Lula Howarth

Okemos for years was a pin point on the map. It is making it's presence known now in a big way.

Now thus 100 years ago the residents in a little settlement 2 miles east of the "Split Rock on the old Grand River road decided to call the spot Okemos, after the "Chief" -a friendly Indian neighbor whom his white friends designated "a man of his word".

METROPOLITAN AREA In those early days no one ever dreamed Okemos would

one day be in a Metropolitan area. It was a good farming It had rich timbered land and pioneer families who were

industrious and had courage and adaptibility to make a success in a new land. There was the Red Cedar River that made a water way for transportation for the Indians and also for the ploneers.

There was an Indian trail and a wagon road to Dexter and later to Detroit where wheat could be ground for flour and clothing and provisions could be purchased.

There was no plank road yet, because there were no industrial plants in Lansing -- in fact there was no Lansing. The first agricultural college in the United States was a struggling little school that had as late as 1870 only 100 students enrolled.

RAILROAD COMES

When the railroad from Detroit was completed in 1871 it was an impetus to the growth and stability of the village even tho it was 1/2 mile south of the town. The capital was in Lansing, there was industry in Lansing and M.A.C. was growing. Okemos was a good place to live.

There were churches, schools and doctors. It was within sight of the state capital and within walking distance of the college (M.A.C.).

Then came new roads, new industries lots of cars and the college grew from 100 students to 31,268 enrollment in 65. Lansing grew and for the past decade it has been a matter of speculation as to where this rapid growth in Okemos was going. For a few years it was with a pleasantly surprised attitude with which people observed the changes. This has now changed to astonishment and bewilderment. LOCATION IMPORTANT

The location of Okemos has lentimportance otit's phenomial growth but there has been industrialists, states men and capitalists -- men with vision, both in Lansing and the village who have made great contributions.

While chief Okemos was planting corn and making a camping ground for his warriors on the south bank of the Red Cedar, two men came to the settlement from Canada who were to play an important part in the future of the community.

They were Joseph Kilbourne and Freeman Bray. Kilbourne was an ambitious and agressive member of the state legislature. Bray was ambitious and ready to play a part in anything that would benefit the community. Their united efforts resulted in bringing the capital to Lansing against overwhelming odds. It is doubtful if either of these men would view with favor all of the progress in Okemos. Expressways and subdivisions do rob the land of some natural

FARMS NOW STREETS

Old pioneer farms have been laid out in new streets. Like mushrooms homes have risen on the horizon and the farm home of 3 or 4 generations becomes part of a big urban

The streets are lined with attractive homes, the new school buildings, the new churches and subdivisions - Indian Hills, Hiawatha Park, Tacoma Hills, River Downs, Chippewa Hills, Cedar Bend Heights, Navaho Ridge, Ottawa Heights, River Wood, Brian Wood and many others replace the rustic scenery and every place looks like a growing city.

On Doble road where some of the oldest farms were there are beautiful substantal homes along the north side in Tacoma Hills, promoted by the Ehringer Real Estate and on the south boundary is the development of Hiawatha Park, a promotion of Hicks Bros. Real Estate, especially attractive because of the rolling terraine, which makes a display of beautiful homes from Jolley road or Dobie road. Between these groups are the Forest Hills homes where new roads are being built into a new natural setting for homes that feature good living. This is a new addition to the well established project of

earlier building. MORE AND MORE BUILDINGS

On the Okemos-Mason road there is new building going on in every direction. The Kasuba Development company is building a group of 8 apartment houses with 30 units in

This is located just south of the river. Looking west from the construction area there is Kewanee Way with fine homes stretching toward the river.

Farther south on the right of the road is the construction of a research development a promotion of Keith Granger. New houses are going up on either side of the road as well as side streets and on the corner of Okemos and Jolley. Don Hodney is beginning one of the largest subdivisions

The judge added that Lifeline not only supplies a very needed program of guidance through the camping experience, but it also works with the boys in activities conduct-



The new plan was set up by the law enforcement committee with the assistance of Circuit Judge Marvin Salmon and Sheriff Kenneth Pread-

In giving the job new responsibilities the salary schedule was upgraded. The changeover would occur as vacancies in the 3-man court officer staff take place. One vacancy is due soon. According to the committee report the new classification will cost the county an additional \$232 this year. When all posts are reclassified the additional cost will be \$1,657.

The committee report cited that when the fourth circuit judge is added the law research-court officer job would be the equivalent of having 5 judges as far as distributing the work load and giving the 4 judges more time to hear cases. There would be a 1year time limit on holding







Daddy, Tell Me a Story

It is apparent that the Johnson administration theory in regard to keeping Americans informed is that they should be told all the good things, the pie-in-the-sky promises, the happy news about what Daddy LBJ is going to do for them. It is an intimate scene, indeed, with the Johnson cult picturing all Americans sitting at his knee fascinated by his stories of how he is going to mold the future.

It is alarming that only this week the Johnson administration successfully stalled a senate-house proposal to make the public records of government public.

It is even more alarming that senators and congress-

men would knuckle under to a passed-down directive intimating government by secrecy--executive privilege, if you

And most alarming of all is the complete apathy of many Americans who are apparently satisfied with well-coacned news handouts from bureau-

The news media has urged legislation as a guarantee of the citizen's right-to-know concept of government. President Johnson's reported sacking of such legislation can only indicate that Big Daddy subscribes to the theory that only he knows what is best for us children.

The Trapped Generation

Do you have that trapped feeling?

If the answer is yes then it means that you must have been born between the years 1913 and 1927. At least that is what the Associated Press maintains in a series called "The trapped generation."

The series points out that Americans in this agebracket are trapped because this generation is being forced to find solutions for others to follow, to resolve the vast number of emotional problems spawned by the age of discovery, to evaluate the way men think.

People in this trapped age bracket are caught between the extremes of death control-the ability of science to keep the elderly living longer and the ability to control infant mortality. In addition the changes in the educational modes have delayed the financial independence of children.

In other words the trapped generation has the old folks on hand much longer and the youngsters are delayed in reaching the productive years.

Added to this is the fact that the middle generation, if we can stand to be called that, has never known stability. No sooner did we learn that the world was made safe for democracy by World War I than we saw dictatorships rear their ugly heads to crush nations of people.

Within months of America becoming a nation of millionaires in the late 20s, the

country plunged into a depression lasting 9 long years.

We are constantly being reminded that if science of the atom doesn't blow this earth to smithereens it will only be because we have first poisoned ourselves to death with tobacco, car fumes or new drugs which kill by curing. Either that or we will die of thirst after contaminating our water supplies with our own refuse or detergents.

This is the generation that discovered the id, ego, psychology and sex, although not necessarily in that order.

This trapped generation is making most of the money, contributing most to that hard to define gross national product, making most of the laws, making the most dominant influence in our society--yet most of the older generation and almost all of the younger generation contribute little except complaints that the job isn't being done right.

Maybe what is needed instead of coddling the youngsters and wining and dining the oldsters in the manner to which they think they would like to become accustomed, the trapped generation should march on something, sit down on something, sit in on something or stand up for some-

Actually, though, there is a suspicion that the "trapped generation" is just an expression coined by some Associated Press headline writer.

The Right to Quit

Labor unions are going too far, it seems to us, in their current effort to make it illegal for an employer to go out of business without first obtaining the consent of the union or unions which represent his employes. A test case, based on a ruling by the National Labor Relations Board, is on its way to the U.S. Supreme Court.

One of the great virtues of a free enterprise system as contrasted with other systems is the freedom it gives the individual and groups of individuals to start a business. True, it is becoming more and more difficult to do this for a number of reasons, not the least of which are the restrictive practices of many unions. But it is still theoretically possible for any person to start any legitimate business if he is financially and otherwise qualified. And when that is not true, we will not have a free enterprise

But surely the corollary of the freedom to start a business is the freedom to stop it, provided one meets whatever contractual and other obligations may be involved in the suspension. Yet this freedom is what some unions are hoping to circumscribe.

In the test case, a federal district court has held that the employer in question had an "absolute prerogative" to go out of business or to discontinue any part of the business at any time he chose, without consulting the union in question.

Students Can Get SS Aid

Many students who receive social security benefits as the children of retired, disabled, or deceased workers can continue to get the payments after age 18 if they are attending school full-time, W. Scott Hamlin, social security district manager in Lansing, announced.

Under this new provision, contained in the 1965 amendments to the social security law, students can continue to receive monthly benefits until they reach 22 or complete their education, whichever is earlier, Hamlin continued.

Students whose benefits were stopped when they reached 18 and who are continuing their education as fulltime students will have to file a new application in order to have their payments started again. Benefit payments can be made retroactive to January 1965.

Young adults who take a fulltime vocational course, as well as those going to high school or college full-time, are covered by this provision, Hamlin stated.

In addition to benefits during the school year, payment can continue during a vacation period of up to 4 continuous months, if the student will be returning to school after-

Hamlin suggested that anyone having questions about this new provision write or phone the Lansing social security office, located in room 201 of the Federal Building, 216 Townsend street.

A group of 35 Argentine agricultural producers, composed mainly of self-employed farmers and ranch managers, visited the Ingham County Fair, Diehl Fields in Dansville and the Veril Baldwin and Sons Farm of Stock-

bridge last Wednesday, Aug. 4. R. C. Lott, county extension director, was host to the group pointing out various things they

might be interested in. The Argentine visitors paid all their own expenses to come to the United States so they could see first hand the opsociated industry in America.

Interests of this group lie mainly in the areas of livestock, dairy production, management, corp production, farm machinery and community activities relating to agricultural extension.

At the Diehl Farms in Dansville they viewed some 41 corn trials planted in a 70 acre corn field located at the southeast corner of Columbia and Clark roads.

Object of the corn trials is to compare nitrogen side dres-

eration of agriculture and as- sed corn to the plots receiving no extra nitrogen, other than the starter fertilizer.

At the Baldwin and Sons Stockbridge farm the group were particularly interested in the beef feeding operation, but also visited the head letluce warehouse market in the

Dorr Eckhart, Aurelius Township Supervisor, was well pleased with the Coachman Oats he planted this year. He said they yielded over 90 bushel per acre by measure, and by weight might reach 100 bushel yield.

He applied 350#/acre of 5-20-20 fertilizer with his oats which were seeded to alfalfa. Dorr said the AuSable variety yielded 80 bushel per acre and his Rodney better than 50 bushel.

The Coachman Oat became available this year resulting from MSU oat breeding research. It is an early, lodge resistant out which is tan in color. It has excellent test weight and an unusually good yield record.

It is adapted to the southern part of the state, while Rodney, Garry and the new AuSable marketing features of the price varieties are adapted to the central and north central areas of Michigan.

We have 41 corn trials planted this year May 7 on the Dave and Dorn Diehl farm. The 70 acre corn field is located at the south east corner that this permitted producers of Columbia and Clark Roads.

If you happen to be in this area, it would be most worthwhile to drive to the east end of the field, walk to the plots (back of the head lands) to compare nitrogen side dressed corn to the plots receiving no extra nitrogen, other than the starter fertilizer. The plots are eight rows wide and measure 1.14 acres each.

Starting from the east side of the field, plot 1 and 2 (or 1st 16 rows) received no nitrogen side dress. Plot 3 received 100# of nitrogen as anhydrous ammonia, plot 4, 150# and plot 5, 200# of side dressed nitrogen. Plot 5 shows practically no firing of the bottom leaves. The 100# and 150[#] plots show some firing.

Plots 1, 2, and 8 receiving no nitrogen side dressing, look like a fire had gone through burning the leaves half-way to the tassel. Corn followed corn in this field and the soil is good heavy corn land.

After the third driest July on record, it will be most interesting to get the yield results at the corn day to be held some time in October.

Clifford Allen of Dansville said, "It sure shows that ample nitrogen is important on corn, even in a dry year."

Falls, New York. Soybean Support Rates Set


on 1965 crop soybeans in Mich-Igan will remain the same as those for the 1964 crop, Frank Light, chairman of the Michigan ASCS State Committee, announced this week.

Rates vary in Michigan counties from \$2.18 per bushel to \$2.25 per bushel. This support rate is based on a national average of \$2.25 per bushel which is the same level as has prevailed since

Premiums and discounts are unchanged from those in effect for the 1964 soybean crop. Under the price support program terminal rates are not established for soybeans, Light added.

Light indicated that there are about 65 producers who placed a total of 72,500 bushels of 1964 crop soybeans under price support last year. He indicated that many producers over the years and especially of soybeans have taken advantage of the orderly support program. This program permits producers to finance their current farming operations through loans from the Commodity Credit Corporation and retain title to the commodities. Light pointed out to take advantage of any price increase during the marketing year.

The loan maturity date for 1965 crop soybeans which will be harvested this fall will be July 31, 1966, Light added. By way of general information Light stated that most commodity price support programs are administered by the State and County ASCS offices and details on the various crop programs may be obtained at the local ASCS offices.

Turner Implement Co. Farms Get \$5.10 Hike on Class 1 Milk

Michigan Milk Producers Association (MMPA) announced Thursday a new price to southern Michigan dairies of \$5.10 per hundredweight for Class I (bottling) milk,

This is an increase of 10 cents per cwt in the income farmers have been receiving for milk since February.

It follows an average increase of 6.4 cents per cwt which Southern Michigan dairy farmers will receive under area pricing provisions of a new Federal Milk Marketing Order which took effect Aug.

MMPA, the state's largest milk marketing organization, with more than 11,000 producer-members, established the \$5.10 per cwt price after a breakdown in negotiations with

In a joint bargaining effort with other milk producer cooperatives in southern Michigan, MMPA officials met with dairy spokesmen in three sessions, on July 20, July 27 and July 30.

The July 30 session lasted all night without reaching a mutually acceptable pricing formula.

The pricing agreement reached in February of this year expired at midnight, July 31. The new price to dairies announced by MMPA is retroactive to Aug. 1, and will remain in effect through July 31,

"It is regrettable that the dairies were unable or unwilling to come to an agreement with farmer-producers on a fair price for milk." said MMPA President Glenn Lake.

"In the absence of an agreement, we feel that the price of \$5.10 per hundred pounds of milk, established by MMPA, is essential to Michigan dairymen caught in a cost-price squeeze aggravated this year by severe drought conditions."

The new price will provide an average premium of 91 cents per cwt over the milk price for Southern Michigan established by federal order. sumer market

In the year beginning Aug. 1, 1965, MMPA producers will receive an estimated \$19,765,200 total negotiated premium over government established price. For the past several years, milk prices in Michigan have consistently been higher than provided for

New Shift Production

New methods of producing agricultural products are becoming the rule, rather than the exception. This often means drastic shifts in production and marketing centers.

Agricultural Experiment Station researchers at Michigan State University are currently trying to find out how these new technologies will affect Michigan's agriculture.

A case in point is the dehydration of onions. California now dehydrates more onions than the total of all onions produced in Michigan, the third largest onion growing state. The Michigan onion industry, say the MSU scientists, will have to incorporate these new technologies in order to remain competitive and in order to keep its share of the onion

The processing of potatoes is another example. MSU researchers report that the per capita consumption of potatoes has increased substantially in the last decade. Thanks to the advent of more processed forms of this vegetable.

Studies show that the 25 per cent of the potato crop now processed has a greater resale value than the 75 per cent of the crop which is unprocessed.

Continued evaluation of the impact of new technologies is planned to help growers and processors increase their share of the total U.S. con-

"Eminent Domain" "Man's home is his castle"--but like many an old castle, the walls may not stand against the battering-ram of that modern legal device known as "eminent domain."

Farmer and city dweller alike give way when the government steps up and says, "We want your property!" The law of eminent domain

says that public need has "first call" over private need in the claim to land and its use. There must be room for

schools, roads, power lines, prisons and hospitals. The point is granted. But such "condemnations" create problems for people. People are often displaced from their homes, their farms are severed and made useless or the pier of a highway bridge replaces the view from the front-room picture window

The farm may be split, and part of it may become hard to reach from the home-barn working location. Costs of traveling to the remote segment must be taken into account. So must driveways and lawns. A new road may make the location of a new driveway necessary and the cost of putting it in should be considered. Trees may be cut. They have value. Lawns may need regrading with topsoil. What claims can a property owner make when he disputes the "government" for the rights to his property? Highway and park expansions have made it important for farmers to know their property rights under these conditions. For almost always -- highways,
