Merchants Predict Big Buying Season

"Good to Excellent" is the reading of the Christmas business barometer this year in Mason.

John Green of the Dancer store reports that sales are up as much as 15 percent this year. Sales were slow early in December due to the bad weather but are picking up rapidly now, he said.

Mrs. Clayton Kent of The Kent Shop says this will be the store's biggest Christmas season. People spent the early part of December looking around for ideas but now shoppers are buying heavily.

"I expect these last few days to be busy ones," she said.

Ed Ware of Ware's drug store said his season sales are going well. Color T.V. sales are big as are radios and photographic equipment. Sales on black and white T.V. sets are down but the increased sales of color sets more than offset them. Polaroid

Swinger camera sales are up. Electric knives and power tools are good sellers this year, Harlan Smith of Smith hardware said.

A lot of families will find a new car under their Christmas tree or at least out in the garage, as local dealers report sales are high. Glenn Sheren of the Dick Lyon Chrysler agency says his firm will probably sell more cars this year than last year in spite of delays in deliveries of cars from the factory.

William Fink, of Fink's Jewelry store said Christmas shopping started early this year and his November sales were almost double what they were last year. Watches, fine jewelry and diamonds are selling especially well this year, he said.

Merchants believe the general prosperity of the nation accounts for the increase in sales. Mason merchants believe this may be the merriest and the greenest Christmas season to date.

Mayor Pearsall Says:

Pay Boosts Loom For City Employees Early Next Month

These are rough times for the city of Mason--the city can't seem to find or keep employees in the water, streets and police departments.

Right now there are job openings for 2 persons in the water and street department, one sewage treatment operator, and 2 policemen.

City councilmen pondered the problem at their regular city council meeting during closed sessions Monday night. The end result of the sessions was a pay raise for water, street and police department workers and department heads.

The exact amount is un-

known as yet, because "the city will have to find approximately \$3,000 from various city funds here and there," according to City Mayor Gilson Pearsall.

Explaining the council's reasoning for the raises Pearsall said this past year 8 men left the streets and water department--2 men left for the service while the remaining 6 left for higher wages.

Proposed raises under consideration by the council would bring the city's wage scale up equal to rates paid by the county. "We are in a high area and this makes it difficult for the city to get people to work for what we can afford to pay," Pearsall said.

Keeping a full staff of officers for the city police department is a constant problem. The 2 vacancies in the department right now were created by 2 men leaving for higher wages at the sheriff's department, according to the Police Chief Tim Stolz.

"The police chief is an excellent teacher in that he has provided a training school for the sheriff's department and the State Police," the mayor said.

In the past year there have been 6 men leave the city force for the sheriff's department, Stolz said. "In the past 6 years 13 men have left the city force for money reasons, one retired, 2 went to the State Police, one went to college and 7 others left for various reasons," Stolz said.

The proposed raises will bring city wages up to the county level, but will still be behind the State Police with comparable work hours. The proposed raises will affect 25 persons plus approximately \$150 per year raises to the city department administrators, the mayor said.

Looking to the future, the mayor said the raises should be adequate enough to insure a regular staff of employees, if the economy levels off.

Praising the city department heads, Pearsall said the city is very lucky to have such loyal and capable people in charge of the city's work, as they all can fill in where the need arises should an employee vacancy exist.

Mason's Postage Volume Quadruples at Christmas

If you think you have problems getting all those cards and presents to the right people in time for Christmas, consider the plight of the Mason post office which handles more than 1,300,000 pieces of Christmas mail a year. "Normally," says James Stubbett, Mason Postmaster, "we handle about 4,000 to 5,000 pieces of mail a day, but this time of year our volume quadruples. Last Thursday, for instance, we handled 19,092 pieces."

"We are handling an increase in volume of about 20 percent this year. And already we are more than a day ahead of last year's volume of outgoing letters."

The increasing population and the prosperity of the times are the reasons Stubbett gives for the increase in mail volume this holiday season.

"Stamp sales are also way ahead of last year," Stubbett said. Last year the postoffice stocked 60,000 5 cent Christmas stamps and had some left over after the holiday season. This year already sales have exceeded 65,000," he said.

"Deliveries are keeping current, according to Stubbett. A letter from New York to Mason, for example, will get there just about as quick as it normally would," he said. "If people will use zip codes, they will help us out

a lot," Stubbett said. By looking at a zip code number a postman knows immediately the geographic area and how to sort a letter. Without zip code he may have to look through a list of 70 or more towns in each sectional center to determine how to sort a letter."

The postoffice will be closed on Monday, December 26 and on Monday, January 2. There will be no mail deliveries on those days.

Mason Mayor Gilson Pearsall has started his own Action Line assistance for a Michigan Marine serving in Viet Nam.

Pfc. Timothy A. Slattery wrote to the mayor asking for help. He had been corresponding with a young Mason woman and was unable to read her returned address. Slattery mailed the damaged envelope and letter to the mayor in hopes Pearsall could find out the address.

It took a little sleuthing, but from a rural route number, a partial name and 3 letters of the street name, the mayor with the help of Mason's postmen came up with the woman's name and address.

Pearsall has taken a special interest in the serviceman and intends to contact the Mason woman, plus writing back to Slattery with the address requested.

Senior Citizen Tax Exemption Filing Period Is Approaching

Mason area senior citizens are reminded that affidavits for senior citizens tax exemption must be filed during the period beginning tax day, December 31, 1966 and ending with final adjournment of local Board of Review March 28, 1967, according to Mrs. Doris E. Austin, city treasurer.

The residency requirement was changed to 5 out of the last 10 years. The applicant must have resided in Michigan 6 months of each 12

month period of these same 5 years. The 5 years need not have been consecutive. Senior citizens are not required to own the homestead for this length of time, but must meet the residency requirement in the State of Michigan and own the homestead on tax day.

Applicants otherwise qualified, with homesteads on leased land, may receive tax exemption. Applicants owning real property outside of the State of Michigan are required to declare the cash value of same, Mrs. Austin says.

Applicants who filed last year should not have to again produce proof of age. New applicants must provide proof of age and ownership of property. The applicant may not own real property, including the homestead and other property, exceeding \$10,000 state equalized value.

Senior citizens on vacation are required to file for tax exemption during the proper period with their local assessing officer, even though they are away. This can be accomplished by obtaining an affidavit from their assessor prior to leaving, or by mail while away. They must present evidence of age and property ownership to their assessor. This can be accomplished before leaving the state or at the time the affidavit is mailed to the assessor.

Mrs. Austin says the assessing officer should assure himself that the property was owned on tax day, if evidence of ownership is presented prior to December 31, 1966. The burden of filing for tax exemption rests entirely with the applicant.

Affidavits mailed to assessing officer must be properly notarized and received by the assessor during the proper filing period. It is imperative, proof of age and evidence of ownership be furnished the assessor prior to the applicants leaving the state or during the filing period by mail, she says.

Affidavits may be filled out at the city assessor's office in the City Hall after December 31, 1966.

Veterans and widows of Veterans may also file for exemption after December 31, 1966.

Wounded in Action

Mason Marine Makes It Home for Yule Holidays

Every soldier in Viet Nam dreams about being home for Christmas and Lance Corporal Dennis Priest of 303 Kathryn street, Mason is no exception.

The Mason Marine no longer has to dream though, for he arrived home a week ago. Priest was wounded September 28 with mortar fire in his left leg, arm and back while participating in Operation Prairie in the vicinity of the Quang Tri province. Priest who was hospitalized for 3 months at Guam had served 10 months in Viet Nam and still has 2 more years left in the Marines.

The wounded Mason Marine was airlifted out of the fighting area and received immediate medical attention. During his stay in the hospital Dennis underwent 3 operations. Now he is enjoying a 30-day leave with his family and hopes to be assigned to a base in North Carolina after January 12.

What does a soldier do in Viet Nam to keep his spirits up?

"When we servicemen get tired, sick or just homesick --we sing," Priest said.

"Surprisingly the morale of the troops is excellent, mostly because they are in a hurry to get the war over so they can go home. It also helps to have a commanding officer like mine, as he treated all the soldiers like his own sons."

While in Viet Nam Priest observed that most Viet Cong (Communist troops) were well armed with automatic weapons and plenty of ammunition but were desperate for food. The Mason Marine feels the United States is winning more ground than they were, but "if we keep fooling around we will be there for a long time." Troops move in for a big offensive, hurt the enemy a little and then drop back giving them time to recover, Priest said.

Priest, who is 19 and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Priest, enlisted in the Marines while he was a senior at Mason high school. He was inducted shortly after graduation. Once his tour of duty is over, the young man intends to continue his education at Ferris State college in a clerical field.

HOW MUCH TIME DO YOU SAVE BY SPEEDING?

Not much. And a professional gambler wouldn't give you a darn for the odds. Here's what you save:

If you're driving through a small town where the business area is on average one mile long, you save 17 seconds if you exceed the speed limit by five miles per hour--say 35 instead of 30.

On the same basis, you will save one minute and 32 seconds if you drive through a larger town where the restricted limit is five miles long.

On the open highway where the usual limit is 60 mph, you will save four minutes over 50 miles by driving an average 65.

That's what you save. Now, here's what you could lose: Over 40 percent of all traffic casualties last year involved speeding. In the U.S., 17,000 people died and 1,553,800 were injured in such accidents.

Since you are violating the law, you can expect the law of averages to catch up with you now and again with a speeding violation. This can be very serious if there is an accident involving human and property damage and could decide the case against you.

If you wouldn't play against a stacked deck, then don't speed. It's really the same thing. See you next Wednesday.

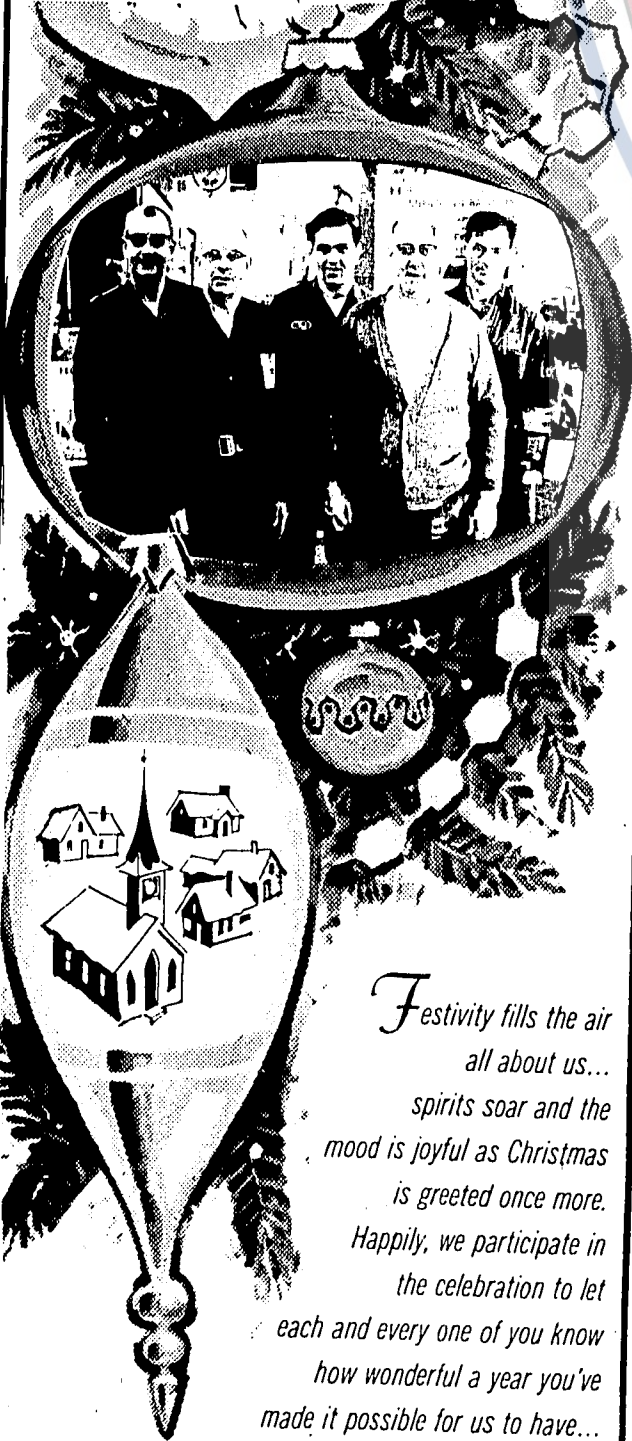

1,650 Persons Attend Lansing Comm. College Open House

The past week was Lansing Community college week and to cap it off the college invited its friends to an open house at the college at 419 N. Capitol avenue in Lansing to view its accomplishments.

The college has operated "on its own" so to speak during the past 2 years. In 1964 its own elected board of trustees took over the operation of the college from the Lansing Board of Education which had operated the school since 1957.

The college today has an enrollment of 4,147 students as compared to the 425 enrolled when the college first opened in 1957. It has shown a steady growth with enrollment increases each year of

its operation.

Throughout the past week visitors at the college have been taken on tours of the various departments of the school as were those who attended the open house Sunday.

Approximately 1,650 persons visited the school Sunday. They saw the various types of classrooms, learned about the many varied courses of study available to students and what the Community college has planned for the future.

These plans include a campus in the very heart of Downtown Lansing and already one building a health sciences, Liberal Arts and sciences building is underway on Washington avenue in Lansing between Genesee and Shiawassee streets.

The college presently is housed in what once was Lansing Central high school. Already the interior of the old school has undergone changes and the exterior also is to be given a new face.

The boundaries of the proposed campus are to be Saginaw street on the north, Shiawassee street on the south, Cedar street on the east and Capitol avenue on the west in addition to the present block surrounded by Shiawassee on the south Genesee on the north, Capitol avenue on the east and Seymour street on the west.

This is to be the first campus. Indications are that other campuses will be built in other parts of the area which the Community college serves—Ingham, Eaton and Clinton

counties.

The downtown site is expected to be limited to 3,000 students, more than half of whom already are enrolled.

Philip J. Gannon, president of the Community college, says that the student body ranges in age from 16 to 75 and that the college is making an unique educational contribution through the development of occupationally-oriented curriculums in the health, business and technical fields.

The college offers specialized programs offered under the federal manpower development training act which lead to vocational skills. Language arts are taught by using the latest teaching techniques.

Other courses include an audio visual tutorial program, courses leading to specialization in the field of business, liberal arts and sciences; a technology division in which students may plan a pre-engineering curriculum or a vocational career as a craftsman in the building, industrial or service trades.

The present board of the college is composed of Lee A. Trumble, of Lansing, chairman; Albert C. Boyd of Lansing, David D. Diehl of Dansville, secretary, and John H. Dart of Mason, David L. Froh of Lansing and Cecil E. McDonald of East Lansing, trustees.

Selecting Your Holiday Plant

The beauty of poinsettias has come to be one of the lovely decorative notes associated with Christmas in our northern states. Lucky indeed in the hostess who receives one from her holiday guests.

Here are some suggestions for you from Mrs. Margaret Foster, Extension home economist, on how to choose a good plant for your hostess, and--if you happen to be the fortunate receiver--how to keep it beautiful as long as possible.

In selecting the plant, look for foliage that is green all the way to the soil. This is a sign of a good healthy root system and a plant free of disease.

The true flowers of a good, fresh plant show little pollen, and therefore are not yellow but green or possibly red. (By the way, those brilliant red, large and showy parts of the plant are not the true flowers, you know. These red parts are called "bracts," and they are more like leaves than flowers. The true flowers are the tiny button-like structures clustered in the center of the bracts.) When much yellow pollen shows, the plant is more mature and will not keep its beauty much longer. Fresh looking green flow-

ers indicate a younger plant. To give a poinsettia plant the best care, place it near a sunny window, but not against cold glass. A hot temperature (over 70 degrees) should be avoided, too, because the blooms will mature and die sooner. It's a good idea to put your plant in a cooler room at night, too, at a temperature around 55 to 60 degrees.

Poinsettias don't like moving air. Avoid drafts of either cold or hot air on your plant, for longest life. Water your poinsettia when the soil feels dry to the touch. Give it enough water to soak the soil to the bottom of the pot, but don't leave excess water standing on it. Drain or siphon it off.

Every 5 to 7 days water your plant with a fertilizer solution instead of plain water. Use 1/4 teaspoon of fertilizer (20-0-0 in composition) to 1 pint of water.

To keep your plant for future flowering, the specialists at Michigan State university suggest the following procedure: when about half of the

green leaves and red (or pink or white) bracts have fallen off, gradually reduce watering until the soil is completely dry. Store the resting plant in the basement or other place that is cool (about 50 degrees) and not very light. Give it a little water occasionally. In summer when new growth starts, cut back the old stems to about 4 inches and re-pot the plant in fresh, porous soil having some peat and some sand in it. There could be 2 parts fresh soil, 1 part peat, 1 part sand.

When all danger of spring frosts is past, and temperatures at night are higher than 50 degrees, sink the poinsettia pot up to the rim in a well-drained place outdoors. Once a month apply 20-20-20 fertilizer mixed according to the directions from the manufacturer, on the package.

According to the MSU specialists, this kind of selection and care will extend your pleasure in your Christmas poinsettia not only beyond this holiday but into another season. A Merry Christmas to you!

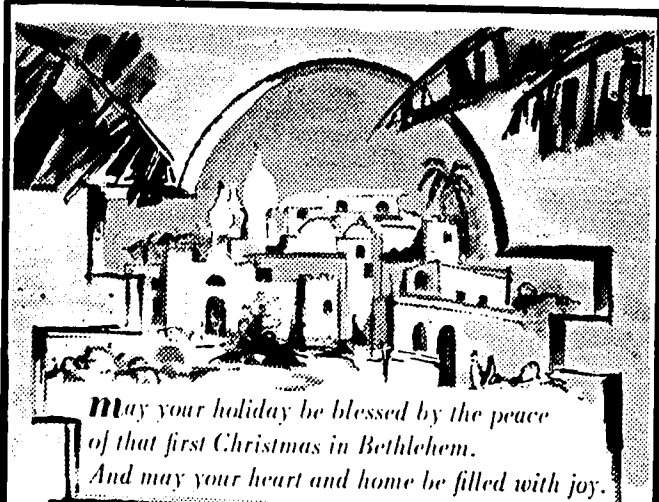

Jury Trials Go Back to Days of the Normans

The right of trial by jury is a right provided for in the state constitutions of all of these United States. But the right of jury trial isn't original to America.

Actually, jury trial is as old as the Norman conquest. In the 13th century the Normans began to favor jury trials over the older trials by ordeal and trials by battles. In the former, the accused was forced to run through a path of burning coals, or he was dunked under water. If he lived through the ordeal, he was innocent.

In the 13th century, the juryman served as a witness or as an expert. His function was to testify and inform the magistrates. It was not until the 16th century that the jurors' function as judge rather than witness was established.

Legal provisions for trial by jury dates back to the English Magna Charta which states: "... we will not set forth against him unless by the lawful judgment of his peers." The Bill of Rights granted the English people by William and Mary in 1688 is the first clear statutory provision for jury trial.

Challenging of the jury on the basis that it is not composed of a representative sampling of the population--is a comparatively recent development in jury history.

The recent motion made in Ingham County court by a Lansing attorney which resulted in a court order for a new jury list, is preceded historically by the case of Fay vs. New York in 1947.

In this case, which was settled in the Supreme Court, Fay's attorneys pointed out that the jury was not chosen "at random" but from special lists and that the jury was of a higher average income than an "at random" selection would yield. This tended to prejudice the jury against the defendant (who was a labor union officer accused of taking union funds.)

The supreme court indicated that failure to achieve an "at random" selection was a denial of the defendant's right to due process of law.

Incidentally a 10 year survey financed by the Ford Foundation and conducted by 2 University of Chicago professors of Law, is completed. The survey attempted to evaluate the effectiveness of trial by jury and to do so Hans Zeisel and Harry Kalven, Jr. examined 3,576 criminal jury trials and questioned the judges involved in each case.

In each case the judge involved was asked for his personal verdict. The judge and jury agreed completely in 72 percent of the trials. In the other 28 percent, the judges said the jury tended to be more lenient and to give the benefit of reasonable doubt in favor of the accused.

In only 9 percent of the cases did the judges feel that the jury had rendered the wrong decision.

The widespread belief that juries are easily swayed by

tears, attractive defendants and the clever dramatics of defense lawyers and prosecutors is a myth, the survey states.

"The net intelligence of the jury is miraculous," Zeisel says.

The survey concludes in "The American Jury" that while any jury is subject to human error, the jury system is the best way of insuring the accused the right to be considered innocent until proven guilty by law.

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The Ingham Intermediate board of education, meeting Tuesday at the board offices, 147 W. Maple street, Mason, received recommendations developed by the Vocational Education Study committee, which has been making a study of the need for vocational education in Ingham county.

The recommendations were ordered placed on file. Under the study procedure the recommendations now will be referred to the school superintendents in the study area at a meeting January 6.

At that meeting the extent of interest in school districts affected will be determined and should the interest of the schools warrant, the intermediate board will be asked to enter into discussions with the Lansing Community college board of trustees relative to specific operation of the program.

The study committee's recommendations are these: Two area vocational-technical centers should be established to serve secondary and post-secondary students. One should be located on the Community college site in downtown Lansing and the other should be located on the south side of Lansing at a major interchange.

These Centers would house approximately 1,900 half-time secondary students and 2,200 full-time post-high school students with equal opportunity.

Approximately 30-40 occupational offerings would be available.

The taxing, construction, staffing, and operation of these Centers would be carried out by the Lansing Community college with the secondary school programs being developed and implemented through direction from appropriate advisory committees of both school and business people.

Finally, the Ingham Intermediate Board of Education, as sponsor of the study, shall enter into discussion with the Board of Trustees of the Lansing Community college to discuss how these items can best be done and report to superintendents the results of such discussions.

The board also: Authorized inauguration of a county-wide summer speech correction program for severely speech handicapped children. The program probably will be conducted in Mason with a possible enrollment of about 75 children.

Was given a briefing on the status of the conservation education program for Ingham, Eaton and Clinton counties by Dan Griner of Charlotte, director of the program.

back in federal highway funds, the state highway commission announced this week. The projects include nearly 30 miles of freeway construction of 150 miles of other freeways and state highways and other miscellaneous projects.

The construction cost of the projects that are being delayed is an estimated \$40 million. State Highway Director Howard E. Hill told the Commission that many other highway projects scheduled for construction after next July 1 will be delayed, too, unless the federal government releases the funds it is withholding as an anti-inflation measure.

"The effect of this cutback will be felt for several years unless the funds that have been withheld are released early next summer," Hill said.

Hill told the commission

that "it was very difficult" to decide which projects should be postponed during the next six months.

"Every project that we had scheduled for construction during the first six months of the year is critically needed or it wouldn't have been programmed in the first place," he said.

Hill told the commission that the projects that are being postponed during the next six months will be re-scheduled at a later date.

"Every effort will be made to get them underway as soon as possible after July 1 but we won't be able to establish firm dates until we know what the federal financial picture will be after July 1," he said.

Only one project in Ingham county will be postponed. That is construction of a bridge to carry I-96 Freeway over the Grand River, US-127 and the New York Central Railroad

tracks, \$1.8 million. Originally scheduled for February.

Elton R. Smith, prominent Kent county dairyman who serves as president of the Michigan Farm Bureau, was named to the board of directors of the American Farm Bureau Federation, December 7.

Seek Vaccine For Bovine Mastitis

Research conducted at Michigan State university and other experiment stations throughout the world has yet to produce a safe and effective vaccine for bovine mastitis, according to Dr. C.C. Beck, Michigan State university Extension veterinarian. Dr. Beck says dairymen frequently ask about vaccines for the control of mastitis. He says that much money has been spent in research in an attempt to develop an effective vaccine.

"To date, all such efforts have met with little success and vaccines available are of very questionable value," Dr. Beck commented.

The veterinarian points to 50 different types of bacteria and related disease-producing organisms that cause mastitis. He noted that a cow that has had a case of mastitis is not immune or resistant to subsequent attacks. So if the disease itself produces no immunity, the veterinarian sees no reason to assume that a vaccine would be able to accomplish the task.

Dr. Beck says it is possible that a vaccine may be produced in the future through research and employment of modern vaccine production techniques.

In the meantime, dairymen must use the tools presently available for mastitis control. He lists these as:

- (1) Maintaining accurate herd health records and concentration on keeping replacement stock from families with a low incidence of the disease.
- (2) Raising replacements in a sanitary manner so they remain free of the disease.
- (3) Good milking procedures.
- (4) Good sanitation in all aspects of milking operation.

Wide Participation Urged In Feed Grain Program

The department of agriculture will seek a wide participation in the 1967 feed grain program to balance supply and demand and safeguard farm income.

Frank J. Light, chairman of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation State committee, said this week that widespread farmer participation will be urged for the program again next year because "fence-to-fence" planting could easily mean production of more corn and grain sorghum than is needed and could be profitably sold. With a couple of years of normal weather, feed grain producers would be back where they were in 1961, before the diversion programs were undertaken to stabilize supplies and prices.

The 1967 feed grain program, therefore, looks toward limited acreage diversion and increased expansion of production geared to needs—in other words, an increased output from about 12 to 15 million more acres without the risk of a drop in income. Diversion payments under

her organization in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Smith will be one of a 27-man board who will direct the affairs of the federation for the next year. The American Farm Bureau Federation, with membership in 49 states and Puerto Rico, this year reached the highest membership totals in its 48 year history. Forty-two of the 49 states reported more members in 1966 than the previous year.

On their 380 acre dairy farm near Caledonia, Smith and his wife, Lynde, have a Guernsey herd which ranks as one of the top in the state. He has been the recipient of several awards including "Dairyman of the Year" and Michigan State university's "Distinguished Service to Agriculture."

He has served as president of the Michigan Farm Bureau since 1964, and is also president of Farm Bureau Services, Inc., the farm supply affiliate company of Michigan Farm Bureau.

Over 7,000 farm leaders from throughout the United States and Puerto Rico attended the Las Vegas meeting, December 4-8. The Michigan delegation consisted of 105 persons. Prominent speakers appearing on the program were Charles B. Shuman, president, American Farm Bureau Federation; Richard Nixon, former Vice President of the United States, and Congressman George H. Mahon (D-Texas), chairman of the powerful House Appropriations committee and long-time friend of President Johnson.

Farmers are faced with a tight money situation, and "prospects are poor for much improvement in the near future," according to a Michigan State university agricultural economist.

In a report in "Michigan Farm Economics," Dr. John R. Brake said, "Interest rates will continue high—probably 7 to 7-1/2 per cent on short term and real estate credit. In addition, down payment requirements will be larger than last year."

Brake noted that tight money is a result of a series of events which probably began with the decision to increase the U.S. commitment in Viet Nam.

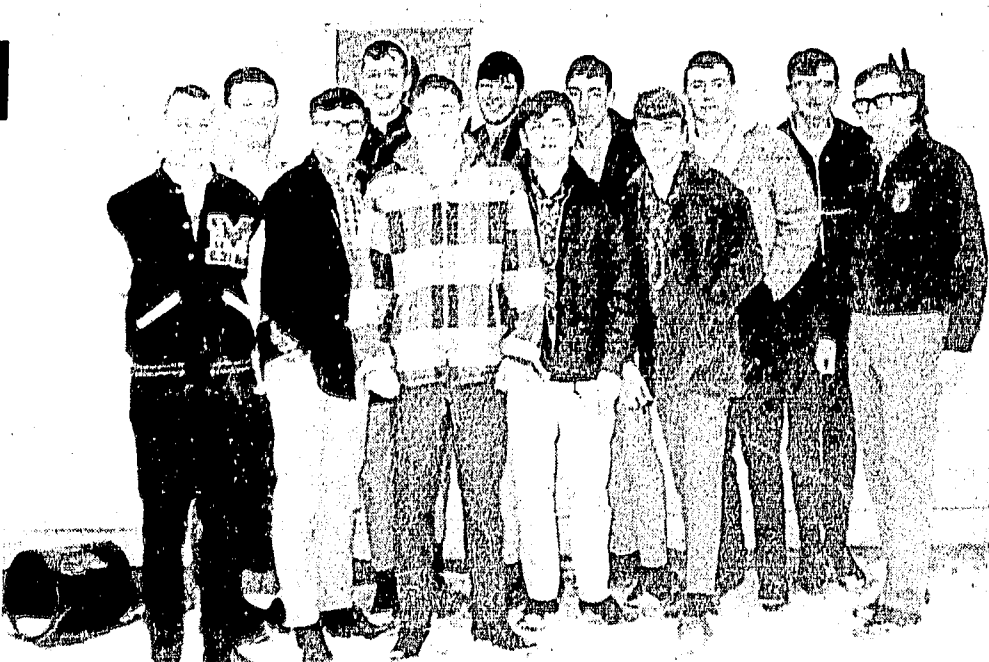
"Government spending was increased without being offset by increased taxes (government income)," he said. "Supplies of goods and services did not keep pace with the high level of wages and salaries."

"Optimistic businessmen wanted to expand their businesses. Consumers were in a buying mood. "Knowing that all such conditions lead to increased prices as consumers and producers bid for goods and services, the Federal Reserve Board of Governors late in the fall of 1965 initiated action to stabilize prices. They raised maximum interest rates that banks could pay on some forms of long term savings."

"This action was taken to encourage savings by those with funds. It also raised interest rates to discourage borrowing. "As a result, banks raised their interest rates on long term savings and on loans to their customers."

Brake noted that farmers, like other businessmen, have been affected by tight money. Credit has been harder to obtain and more costly. Then, how long will money remain tight? Brake said that depends on government action on taxes and spending and on the mood of the public.

"If taxes are increased and/or government spending decreased substantially, monetary controls could be eased. Or, if the public mood were to become less inclined toward expansion and borrowing, the demand for money would ease and interest rates should drop."

MHS Future Farmers Invest In Swine Raising Project

Members of the Mason Chapter of the Future Farmers of America are starting an experiment which could bring the investors profits--or losses.

The young farmers have set up a swine cooperative. Shares in the project were sold to all members who wished to buy for \$5 per share.

On November 7 some Yorkshire feeder pigs were purchased. Club members are paying Bob Solid of Dexter Trail, Mason, so much per pig to feed and care for the livestock.

There are 14 members who bought shares in the cooperative with the club assuming the rest of the costs. From the money received, the pigs and their feed will be paid for.

Through research in class

it was found that a profit could be made through such an operation. If any profit is realized, it will be split up among the shareholders. Those who invested are Windy Fell, Jim Thorburn, Howard Straub, Carl Lawson, Larry Evans, Dave Gray, Bob Ruttan, Larry Kranz, Barry Barrett, Stan Jordan, Don Kieth, Chuck Moore, Dale Rector and the club advisor Michael O'Malley.

"But," Brake added, "with the continued effort in Viet Nam, the 'Great Society' programs, and strong demand for goods and services, it is difficult to see much easing of credit in the next six months or so."

Dairyman's Future Bright If He Adapts To Changes

Michigan dairymen were cautioned recently that although the economic outlook is bright, they will have to be willing to adapt to great change in the next five years.

Dr. Charles Lassiter, chairman of the Michigan State university dairy department, sounded that warning at a West Michigan Dairy Conference near Ludington.

"I am convinced that those who want to dairy farm and are willing to make the adjustments necessary will receive a good economic return for their capital and labor," Dr. Lassiter said.

"Dairymen milking 5 years from now will have to be good in every respect--not only in production levels and high crop yields, but also in the size and efficiency of operation," he said.

The MSU dairy head warned, however, that successful dairymen will have to do a better job of managing labor. He will have to work out financial arrangements which will permit him to pay competitive wages and to provide improved working conditions for his employees.

Dairymen attending the conference got a peek at predictions for the future of their industry in a slide-type presentation developed by MSU's team of "Project 80" researchers.

They also heard MSU Extension specialists report on dairy research and trends in dairying.

Extension Dairyman Don Murray urged milk producers to familiarize themselves with dairy legislation so that they will better know what is expected of them under the law. He commended the dairymen for their progress in meeting the guidelines set up in Michigan's new "Grade A" law.

Murray praised the legislation, which he said helps Michigan milk producers compete with out-of-state suppliers and to take advantage of more markets.

Dr. John Speicher, dairy farm management specialist, spoke on "Dairy Business Performance Checks and Trends in Cattle Housing." He outlined several steps dairymen can take to make their operations more profitable--raising production

per cow; lowering feed costs; increasing labor efficiency; maintaining a strong herd health program; utilizing good young stock management; obtaining the highest milk price possible; and improving management procedures.

Martin A. Wilson, Extension dairy records specialist, reviewed dairy testing programs and described the MSU-developed Tri-Monthly Testing (TMT) program which will be available in February.

The new method is designed to provide production information only, and will test herds every three months, rather than once a month as in present programs.

Wilson said the TMT method is 95 to 98 per cent as accurate as once-a-month testing. It is estimated that the TMT program will cost less than one-third the expense of monthly testing, and will allow testers to service more herds.

Farm Week Will Open On Jan. 30

Throngs of Mason and county farmers will be heading toward Michigan State university on January 30, 1967 as that date marks the beginning of the annual Farmers Week, which continues through February 3.

The big mid-winter educational event for farmers and farm families will have its usual features and some new ones according to Byron Good, general chairman.

Two new buildings will be used for the first time for the event. Forestry, conservation, water resources and rural recreation meetings will be held in the new natural resources building. It is located on South Campus, south of Anthony Hall on Farm Lane and Wilson road.

Poultry and rabbit meetings will be held at the new Poultry Research Center on Jolly road, more than a mile south of the main campus, near I-96.

Among the featured speakers will be Dr. Paul A. Miller, assistant secretary of Health, Education and Welfare. Dr. Miller spent 15 years at MSU serving as director of the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, vice-president, and provost. From 1962 to last summer he was president of the University of West Virginia. He will speak at the annual farm management banquet on Thursday, February 2.

Programs are scheduled for all types of farming and special youth and women's events are also planned.

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Land Banks Have Funds For Ag Loans

The Federal Land Banks expect to have ample funds for productive long-term agricultural loans in 1967, according to Hans T. Hagen, president of the Federal Bank of Saint Paul. Hagen made this statement at a meeting of Federal Land Bank association directors and managers in Lansing December 12.

Attending the one-day meeting from the Federal Land Bank association of Charlotte were Manager Lester B. Koch, President Lloyd Beaton of Mulliken, and the following FLBA directors, Ludell Cheney, of Mason, Gerald Diamond of Mason, Lute Hartenbury of Eaton Rapids, Harry Wright of Charlotte, Leonard Johnson of Charlotte, and Rae Collar of Webberville.

The group discussed the current financial picture and the outlook for agricultural credit in 1967 with FLBA managers and directors.

"Due to the Vietnam War and inflationary pressures, the cost of loan funds continues high," President Hagen said. "During the past several months, Land Bank bonds, our source of funds for lending, have carried the highest rate in our 50 year history."

Hagen noted that there are more than 59,000 farmers and ranchers in North Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin and Michigan using the services of their farmer-owned bank. Their aggregate loans now exceed \$610 million - up to \$70 million from January 1, 1966.

Also discussed at the one-day meeting were plans to observe the 50th Anniversary of the Land Bank system, which has been dedicated to "America's Farmers: Providers of Plenty".

Right From Horse's Mouth

The horses at the Kisor Farms, 3301 Harper road, Mason, are making their wishes known for better roads in Michigan, via a petition delivered to J. M. Telford, president of the Michigan Good Roads Federation, by Russ Kisor of Mason and one of his outstanding show horses.

"We're a little late," Kisor said. "Our horses got up this petition in observance of National Save The Horse Week in October; it was approved

by every horse at the farm, without a neigh vote. The horses claim they had enough pulling cars out of the mud back around the turn of the century--they don't want to have to take on the job again.

You may quote me as saying this is straight from the horses mouth."

In accepting the petition, Telford said it reminded him of one of the favorite stories told by Horatio S. "Good Roads" Earle half a century ago. It seems that Earle attended a meeting of the Board of Supervisors in one Michigan county, and a supervisor told him that his township had voted down the County Road Law by 341 to 1. Earle then told them about a township where the residents figured that since the horses had to do the hauling, these same horses should be given a chance to vote on the good road question.

"That night," Earle said,

"they found every horse in the township had voted for good roads, and very lackass had voted against them." The supervisors almost threw "Good Roads" Earle--Michigan first Highway Commissioner--out of the meeting.

Telford gave Kisor and his horse, Oreo, each a copy of the Michigan Good Roads Federation Booklet, "Michigan Roadways Are In A Jam," and agreed to forward the petition from the Kisor horses to the Legislature.

"I have always had a great deal of respect for horse sense," Telford said. "I'm glad the horses--and the people--of Michigan are pulling hard for our Good Roads Program."

Several from Ingham At NFO Conventions

A record number of more than 10,000 voting delegates attended the annual convention of the National Farmers Organization (NFO), which ended a two-day session Thursday in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Those attending from Ingham county included Glenn Walker, Olin Wilde, Arlo Warfle, Mr. and Mrs. John Arends, Mr. and Mrs. LaVern Eldred, Ed Ottoman, Ed Brady, Ernie Knoch and Ford Hawkins.

Delegates to the convention authorized the NFO board of directors to immediately initiate steps to prepare for a milk holding action.

The resolution adopted by the convention in part was worded:

"To raise the general price level of raw milk and secure same by contract, which would necessitate a marketing agency in common for the good and security of the dairy processing industry; to insure an ample supply of dairy products to the American consumer at reasonable prices. Be it further resolved that NFO urge all members to hold their production on the farm and non-members to join NFO and hold to achieve these goals."

The action climaxed a 2-day session, termed by officials as the most productive and most successful in the history of the organization.

In commenting on the dairy

holding action resolution, the NFO said;

"Dairy farmers must decide whether they want to accept more of what they have had in the past or whether they want to unite their strength and establish a fair price for their commodities."

"The NFO has tried every means possible to avoid the use of holding action in milk, but it is becoming more apparent that dairy buyers and processors are not going to pay dairy farmers an adequate price for dairy products unless producers demand the price and back up the demands with their production."

"Such a holding action must not be built on emotion,"

President Oren Lee Staley told the delegates; "It must be a simple business approach--farmers putting a price tag on their products. This holding action must be conducted in an atmosphere of calmness. This organization has never advocated or condoned violence."

Minimum prices sought by the NFO included \$6.05 per hundred weight for Grade A milk; and \$5 per hundred weight for manufacturing milk, with added transportation differentials to outlying areas."

The NFO pointed out that "we have won our battle of recognition from meat and grain processors and buyers," in noting the progress of educating farmers to use their bargaining power.

Growing strength of the organization was focused on the addition of 3 more members to the national board of directors. One director was added for the state of Michigan and New Jersey and North Dakota obtained directors for the first time.

Addressing the first evening session of the convention were Senator William Proxmire, Democrat, Wisconsin and Congressman Alvin O'Konski, Republican, Wisconsin. Both told the convention that "the American consumer has been subsidized by the American farmer."

Staley, of Rea, Missouri, and Erhard Pfingsten, Sergeant Bluff, Iowa, both were re-elected president and vice-president respectively by enthusiastic acclamation.

In acceptance speeches, both stressed the very future of agriculture depends on the farmers' determination to use their bargaining power in pricing their products.

"Collective bargaining means farmers bargaining together and selling together," they said.

Appearing on the Thursday morning program was Mrs. Rose West of Denver, Colorado, originator of "Housewives for Lower Food Prices."

She told the convention that "we do not put the blame (for high food prices) on the farmers."

She offered the help of housewives all over the country. "The farmer is being gouged at one end and the consumer is being gouged at the other," she said.

Other speakers during the convention included; Senator Gaylord Nelson, Wisconsin; Congressman Melvin Laird, Republican, Wisconsin and Senator Walter Mondale, Democrat, Minnesota.

For First Offenders Rehabilitation Clinic Is Operating at Jail

Sheriff Kenneth L. Preadmore and Dr. Jose J. Llinas, chief psychiatrist at the Ingham County hospital, are conducting a prisoner rehabilitation clinic at the Ingham county jail.

"You don't help a man by closing a steel door on him," Preadmore said. "You've got to rehabilitate prisoners as well as punish them," he said, "and that is why we have established our clinic."

"Aims of the clinic are three-fold," the sheriff added.

"First we will provide judges with information on prisoners who have committed misdemeanors, felonies and other serious crimes. Our recommendations will help judges determine what type of sentences best suit the needs of the prisoner and the public welfare."

"For example, we might recommend that the prisoner needs psychiatric care. Or we might say that he is a good prospect for a day work program."

"Secondly, we attempt to determine if emergency treatment is needed for patients with serious mental disorders and to treat chronic alcoholics."

"And thirdly, we are trying to reach first offenders and help them with their problems before they become chronic offenders," he said.

Sheriff Preadmore was critical of the present law enforcement system which he said directs most of its energies

towards rehabilitation of prisoners who commit serious crimes while too little attention is paid to first offenders and to minor offenders.

"Minor offenses are significant to the offender in need of help," he said. "Why

wait until he has gone through the courts several times before we treat him? It isn't sound psychology nor is it sound economics. Each time an offender goes to court it costs taxpayers money in court costs, lawyer's fees and police officers' time."

"What is needed is a program designed to help these people with their problem before they get to Jackson prison," he said.

The clinic tries to treat a representative sampling of the 135 or so prisoners at the jail. It treats chronic alcoholics, sexual offenders, and dangerous psychotics among others.

"Statistics are not yet available, so I can't say definitely how successful we've been," he said. "We are operating without funds, once a week, and Dr. Llinas is volunteering his services. But I can say that prisoner reaction has been favorable to the clinic."

"One prisoner who was reluctant to attend the clinic later told me he was glad to find someone to talk to who understood his problems."

Asked about the clinic's lack of funds the sheriff said that he applied for funds to the Economic Development committee, a federal agency, a year and a half ago but was refused.

"The committee refused funds because it said the problem was a local one which was not of national concern," he said.

State Police Patrols To Be on Job

Michigan State Police holiday patrols will be operated during the Christmas and New Year weekends in special efforts to reduce accidents, Col. Frederick E. Davids, department director, reported.

Emphasizing that the state is headed toward a new annual high in traffic deaths, Colonel Davids urged motorists to exercise greater care in following safety rules and practices.

"The holiday season should be an inspiration to every driver and pedestrian to do whatever he can to reduce the risk of an accident," he said. Extra hours of darkness, frequently bad weather and road conditions and the drinking associated with holiday celebrations are factors which add hazards at this time of the year, he noted.

State Police patrols will provide maximum coverage from 3 to at least 9 p.m. each day of the holiday periods, with special attention to highway sections with bad accident experience. Department planes will assist in the patrols during daylight hours, weather permitting.

City's Purchasing Must Stock the Cupboards On Limited Budget

Governments balance it, housewives bargain for it, and husbands complain that it is not being kept. . . the budget that is.

And if you magnify the problems of managing the family budget,--you will get an idea of the job involved in budgeting for a city that shops for everything from floor wax to fire trucks.

Harold Barnhill, Mason city clerk knows how big a job that is.

"I don't do all the purchasing for the city," he said.

The heads of each city department handle their own purchasing. I buy for the city hall."

New purchases of more than \$500 must be authorized by the city council, Barnhill said. They O.K. the purchase and we pay the bills, he added.

Barnhill said the city watches its pocket book like the average housewife does.

"We save tax dollars by accepting competitive bids on items, he said. We do not always accept the lowest bid. We also have to take into account services offered and the quality of the merchandise or service."

"For example, said Barnhill, "when we accept bids on gasoline for the city, we consider the quality of the furnishings as well. The city pays about 16 cents a gallon for gasoline at this time. This purchase is tax exempt."

What is about the most expensive item on the city's shopping list?

"Well, the city bought a fire truck which cost approximately \$20,000. City maintenance vehicles and police cars are another big item. We try to trade police cars every year after they have about 60,000 - 70,000 miles on them."

Smallest items include pencils, office supplies and janitorial supplies. The city's shopping basket must hold everything from soap, all the way to dump trucks.

Can you remember any especially good bargain hunting done by the city? Barnhill was asked.

"We bought an army surplus jeep in Jackson for the fire department for about \$400. New that jeep runs around \$3,000 he said.

Barnhill said that the war in Vietnam has not resulted in any shortages in supplies and that prices remain about the same as last year.

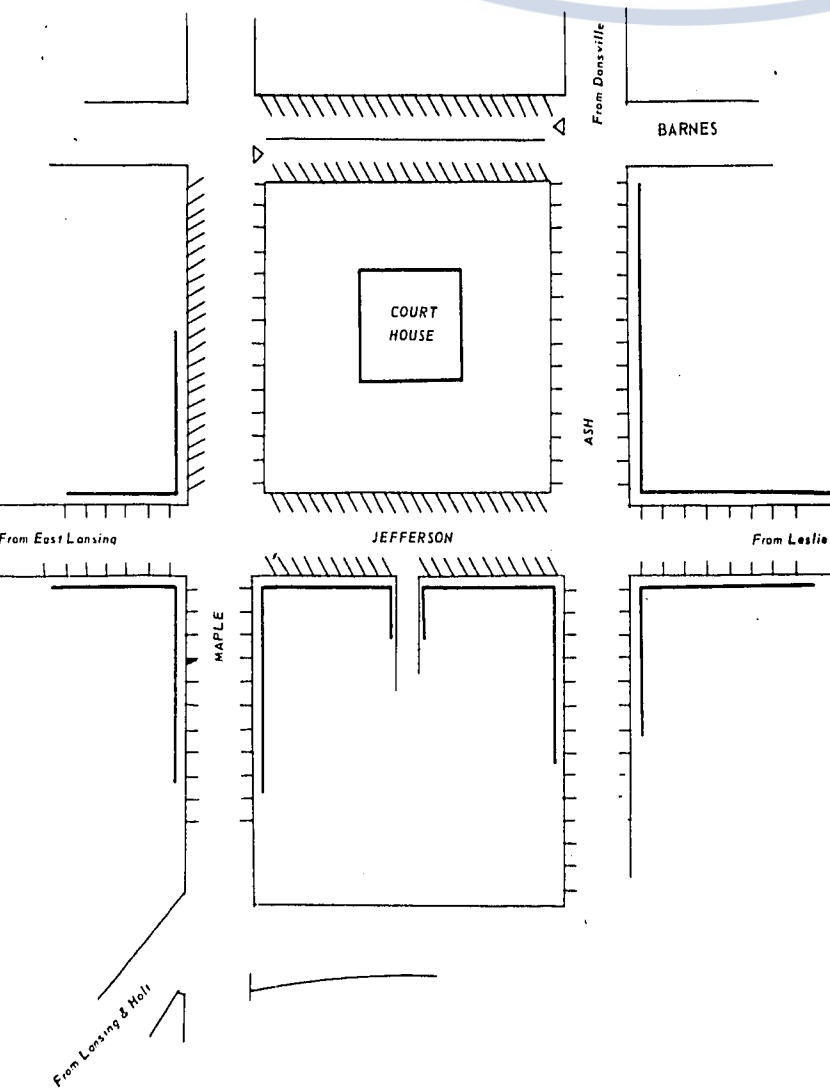

Safe Sledding Rules Listed

Ten rules for safe sledding with emphasis on a warning against coasting in the streets and hooking onto cars or trucks have been prepared by the Safety Council of Greater Lansing and are now being distributed to schools.

Copies of the rules may be obtained from the Safety Council by calling IV 2-1583, or in person at 1211 Bank of Lansing building between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. daily, except Saturday.

The rules listed include:

1. When coasting on your sled or toboggan, think of others.
2. Check for danger spots!
3. Make sure the coast is clear!
4. Never overload sleds or toboggans.
5. Go to recommended coasting areas in your community.
6. Never coast on streets that are used for motor vehicle traffic and others.

Veterans' Trust Fund Head Named

George Washington, director of the department of administration, announced Wednesday the appointment of Frank A. Schmidt, Jr., as executive secretary of the Michigan Veterans' Trust fund board of trustees. Schmidt has been acting executive secretary since July 5, 1966. He qualified for the position by a Civil Service examination. He succeeds the late Lawrence J. LaLone.

The Veterans' Trust fund provides temporary assistance to eligible veterans of World War II and the Korean conflict, or their legal de-

pendents. Moneys for the operation of the Veterans' Trust fund program are allocated to the several counties on the basis of veteran population. It is the official state agency to which Michigan veterans and their dependents may turn for information, guidance and assistance. This agency was transferred to the Department of Administration by the Executive Reorganization Act of 1965.

Schmidt, 47, has been employed by the Michigan Veterans' Trust fund since 1948 as field representative and assistant executive secretary.

Prior to that time he worked for the secretary of state and the office of veterans affairs. He was in the U.S. army from 1942 until 1946 and served in the European theatre of operation with the 90th infantry division, 3rd army. He held the rank of captain when he was discharged.

Schmidt is affiliated with the American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans, AMVETS, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Forty and Eight, and Knights of Columbus. He is married and has 4 children.

To Install New 'Give-away' On Michigan Freeways

New "give-away" roadside sign supports and light poles will be installed on freeways under construction in Michigan, the State Highway Commission announced today.

The new designs of the light poles result from tests conducted at the General Motors Proving grounds at Milford in which the highway department cooperated, R.C. Jones, design division director, said. The roadside sign support

designs were originally developed by the Texas highway department and the light pole design, called "slip base" because the poles will give way under impact at the base, will be included in plans for the I-496 in Lansing, an East-West Freeway through the Capital city.

Comparative tests at the GM Proving Ground showed that a car traveling 40 miles per hour incurred a two-foot deep

gash in the front end when it struck a conventional light pole and the pole was damaged beyond repair, Jones said.

By contrast, the front of the same type of vehicle tested in the same manner was dented only three inches when it struck a "slip base" pole and the pole was reusable, he said.

"The highway department plans to utilize the design on

all future freeways where pole lighting is required," Jones said.

"The Texas sign support design, modified by our design engineers so that signs struck will break both at ground level and part way up the support, will be used in signs on I-75 now under construction between Bay City and Higgins Lake and on I-96 between Marshall and the Indiana state line."

Peace Corpsman, Kin of Mason Pair Enjoys Life in Columbia

Life in the peace corps appears to be just about ideal, especially if you are stationed in Columbia as James Mitchell is.

Mitchell is a nephew of Mr. and Mrs. Otis Clipper, 423 W. Ash street. He is stationed in San Joaquin, a small town situated in a narrow valley surrounded by green subtropical mountains and one of the first Peace Corps sites opened in the world.

Mitchell tells interestingly of his work and the country in a letter just received by Mr. and Mrs. Clipper.

It follows: Forty-five minutes before my plane was to leave Kennedy Airport, I received clearance from Peace Corps. (P. C.)

The problem was with Selective Service not granting me the necessary permission to leave the country. Two months later the situation has been cleared up. On Dec. 5, I received my IIA deferment.

A hard summer was climaxed as 38 P.C. volunteers boarded the Braniff non-stop flight to Bogota, the capital of Colombia. I recalled the night before when I had visited the very spot at the University of Michigan where Kennedy made public his Peace Corps plans. It was a short five hour ride to the modern El Dorado airport. As the jet set down the last announcement in English ob-

viously directed at a certain 38 passengers, "Will the passengers please refrain from throwing pillows."

Once in the airport we were greeted by Colombian government officials and a cup of Colombian tinto (coffee).

Bogota is a city of considerable size and much activity. The night of our arrival a Russian ballet was performing, across the street Dr. Zhivago was showing, and all over I saw titles of the better stateside movies. Any book or record in English can be obtained in Bogota, and not uncommon are the Colombians that speak excellent English.

The next morning we had meetings with the U.S. Ambassador and his staff. In the afternoon I found out that I was being shipped out early the next morning for my Department (State), one that doesn't have the PINA program for which I had trained. It was a disappointment not to be able to spend a few days in Bogota with my group, and also to be transferred from my agriculture program to community development.

Friday morning I left on the 7:50 plane at 11:30 for the capital of Santander, Bucaramanga. I was surprised to find that Bucaramanga is a teeming city also with beautiful theaters, parks, and modern multi-story buildings.

For three weeks I was with an old volunteer in a community development site. Then at last, a month ago, I was assigned to my site. It is a beautiful pueblo of 600 people called San Joaquin. The municipio is divided into 18 veredas, the farthest being 7 hours by horseback. San Joaquin is situated in a narrow valley surrounded by green subtropical mountains. The elevation is 6,500 feet. San Joaquin is 6 hours from Bucaramanga, 3 by taxi on a paved highway, and 3 by bus on a poor dirt road that is often closed due to landslides.

San Joaquin was one of the first Peace Corps sites opened in the world. It has been a very successful site and many studies have been made here that have helped to develop the P.C. community development program.

Now the people of San Joaquin have an agricultural volunteer, and I have been received with much more enthusiasm than I had expected. I will be working mostly in agriculture except for overseeing the various community development projects. At this time we have two grade schools, one high school, a hospital, and a road under construction. I couldn't have gotten a more ideal site.

Here the climate is semitropical. We are close to the Equator so there is little variation in temperature, about 75 day and 55 night. The area abounds in bananas, pineapples, passion fruits, papayas, lemons, oranges, and many tropical fruits which are new to me. The people grow corn, potatoes, yuca, and other vegetables for home use,

mostly yuca, a tasteless, nutritionless starch.

The big problem here in agriculture is that the entire economic crop is fique, a succulent plant that has long, broad, fibrous leaves. The fibers are separated from the pulp and woven into rope, bags, and mats.

The soil here is not bad and the climatic conditions are fine for almost any crop. With fertilizers, insecticides and fungicides, and a few willing people the economic base of the community in agriculture can be broadened.

The sum of 16.5 pesos on the current market can be exchanged for one dollar. The average campesino (small farmer) of which 95% of the population is composed, makes \$30's weekly, mostly by selling fique. My monthly salary is \$1,250's monthly, quite possible the highest paid member of the community after the Alcalde (Mayor) and the Padre. Life is inexpensive for me, but for a campesino, his wife, and their average of 6 children living, life is a real struggle.

The campesino is a short man well suited for working the steep hillsides. It is no joke to hear that a campesino fell off his garden to his death. It is often necessary for a campesino to tie himself to a tree. They are mostly dark skinned mestizos who are never seen without their felt hats or ruanas (a blanket that is worn as a jacket). They are happy people who will give you anything and very often the last bit of food left in his home. The campesino home and almost all other structures are of tapia, nothing more than compressed dirt.

The campesino is hard working, but he often takes time off for a drink. Beer is very often over consumed on special days like Wednesdays (market) and on Sundays. Aguardiente is another popular drink made of distilled sugar cane. At first it hits the spot, but after 10 or 12 shots my vision starts to fail. Two favorite work day drinks are Chicha and Guarapo. Chicha is made from fermented corn juice, and Guarapo from fruit juices. They never taste the same and are always loaded with disease. Its just one of the hazards of the business. I just hope that all my shots and my present good health are enough to fight off the amoebas. Two months and I haven't had one sick day.

Another hazard in this particular site is a beetle-like bug called Pitos. They are carriers of a disease called Chagas that attacks and destroys nervous tissue. The bug comes out at night and bites his victim while he is sleeping. I have been bitten at least twice, hopefully by non-carriers. One of the projects of my partner and I is buying Pitos at 10 centavos for the Peace Corps doctors who are conducting experiments trying to find out more about the disease.

At times it is hard to remember that I am here to help the people realize they have the ability to improve their lives. It would be much easier just to hand them what they need, but that would not solve the problem. It would not give them the confidence in themselves, and in each other that they need in order to become a community instead of a society of individuals. An all too often heard phrase is "No soy capaz." I don't have the capacity.

Although I have not yet started working on a regular schedule my week will be something like this. Wednesday is market day, the day when everyone comes to town to sell their surpluses and purchase the necessities for the coming week. It is on Wednesday that we have sort of an open house. The campesinos stop by and discuss their problems and needs, and we make our schedule for visiting the various veredas. Thursday thru Sunday I will spend visiting the veredas. Monday I will stay in town to work on my projects here and take care of all the official correspondence and reports. Tuesday will be my day to rest or do whatever I want.

One of the things that I am looking forward to is the day in February when my colt is born. We have here 4 P.C. horses including one expecting mare. It will be a real experience raising a colt.

Another thing I look forward to are letters. A lot can happen in two years, and I would like to keep up with things. One of my New Years resolutions will be to answer all correspondence.



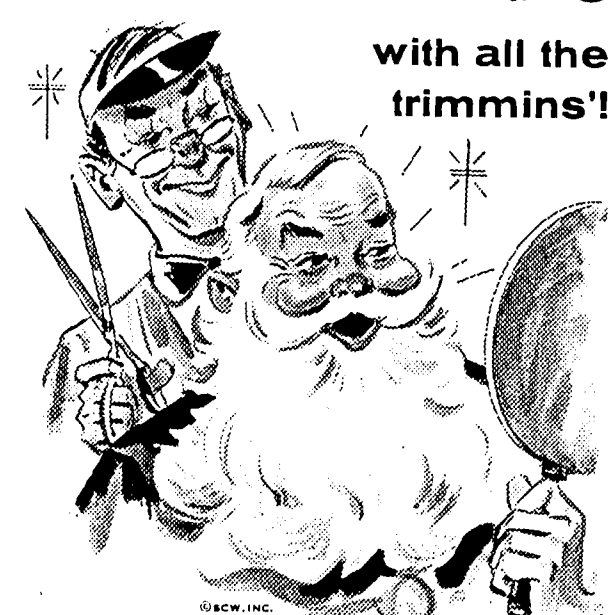

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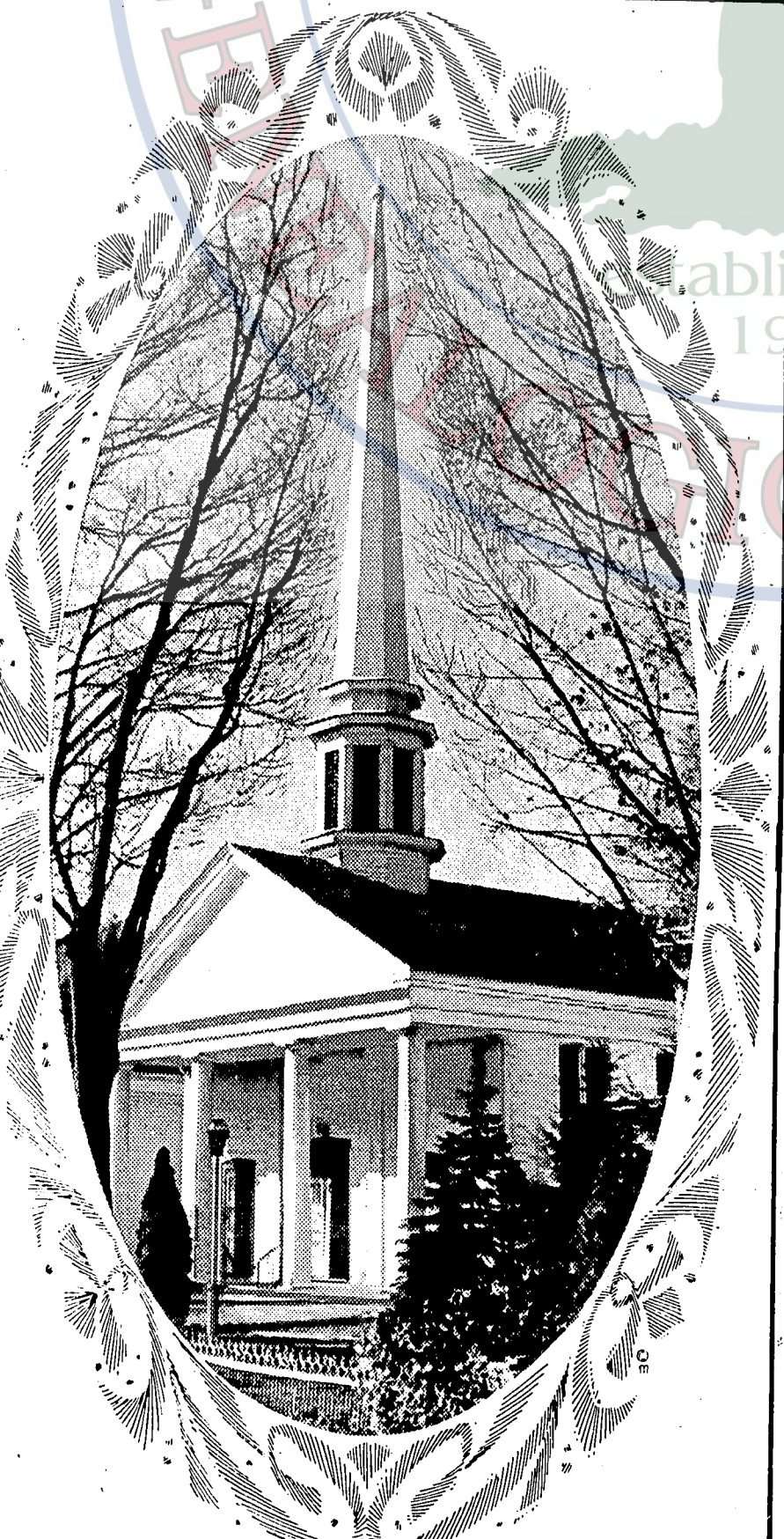

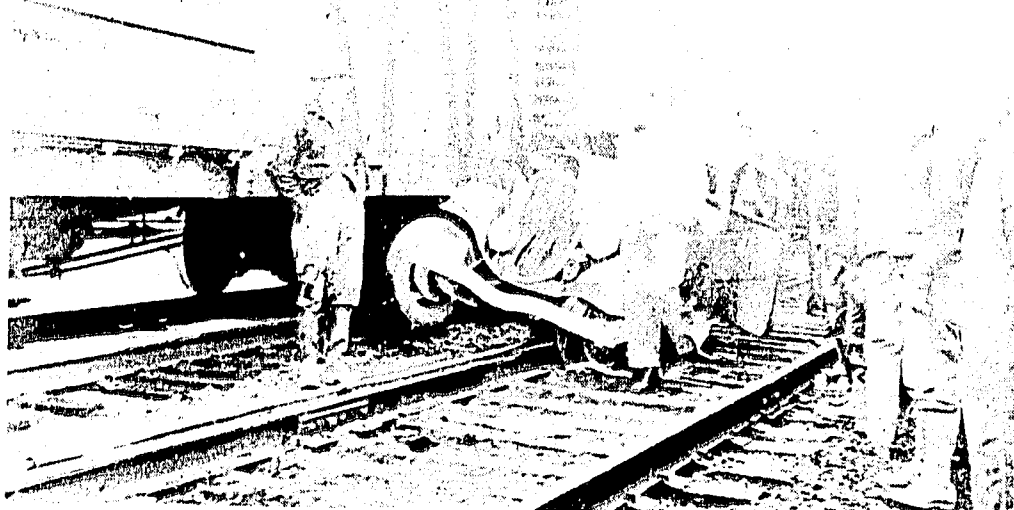

Under 21 Christmas Magic To Weave Its Spell

On Christmas Eve, in Mason, say about 6 p.m., the magic of Christmas will begin to weave its spell. The people on the streets will one by one, disappear to go and be with their families. The people in stores will be gay and happy as they wish everybody a Merry Christmas.

Gradually, the store lights dim or go out and traffic will become quite thin, until after awhile the only sounds heard are of an occasional passing car and the Court House clock as it sounds out the hour.

The homes will be bright with lights as people feel the happiness of Christmas closing about them. The houses will darken down as children are put to bed and other families are settling down for the

night. Throughout all of Mason, a feeling of peace will cover the city like a giant, warm blanket.

On Christmas day, around 6:00 in the morning or earlier, the town will begin to stir. Not everybody, but a few houses lights will go on here and there as children rise, unable to hold their excitement any longer, but after awhile most of the houses will be humming with activity. All day long, everybody will have the feeling of having something new. Sort of a fresh feeling. This sensation will not just last today, but will go on for several days afterwards, no matter what the age.

This feeling of Christmas that I have been talking about is felt in many different ways, by many different people. Of course, the children feel it in an excitement of presents and Santa Claus. Adults have the sense of peace and brotherhood. Most everybody though will be wishing someone else a happy holiday and since I am no exception, I wish each and everyone, a Merry Christmas and the blessings of our Lord, over and under 21.

Christmas Hazards

One of the most ironic things about this joyous holiday season is that many of the very things that make it a traditional celebration create possible health hazards. For instance, did you ever stop to think what could happen if one of those strings of merry lights shorted out and ignited the Christmas tree? It might mean tragedy for you and your family.

The greatest danger that all of those yuletide decorations create is--fire. Whether it is

caused by a dry tinderlike Christmas tree or faulty wiring on colored lights, it is something that you must always be on the alert for. I'd like to share a few suggestions with you that could help to make sure that your holidays are the festive time they should be.

Your Christmas tree should be set up well away from the fireplace or any other heating device, and firmly secured so there is no risk of it accidentally being knocked over. The trunk should be sawed off at an angle of at least one inch above the original cut so it will absorb enough water to keep it fresh. The water level in the base should always be above the cut surface. And when the needles begin to fall, it's time to remove the tree--even though the holidays are not quite over. When a tree begins to dry it becomes a serious fire hazard in your home.

When selecting decorations for the tree you should avoid ornaments made of celluloid, cotton, paper or any other flammable material. The safest thing to do is to use attractive ornaments made of glass or thin metal--and never, under any circumstances, put any lighted candles on the tree.

Another thing to watch for is worn insulation on your display lighting cords. One of the best investments you can make is to replace old worn and tangled cords with new ones. Trailing cords should be taped to wall baseboards so they will not be pulled by children or tripped over by adults. And be careful that the plug or switch is far enough away from the tree so that sparks will not be able to jump into the needles. It is also best to disconnect the lights before going to bed at night.

When it comes to your outside display lighting, make sure that the lights and cords are all thoroughly weather-proofed. Never use interior lights out-of-doors. The power cord should be overhead where it is well out of the way, and insulated to avoid shorting. Branches that support the cord should be padded so they will not wear the insulation away. And be careful to make sure that light sockets point downward so they won't collect any water.

With a little thought concerning these potential health hazards, I'm sure you and your family will have a joyous--and safe--holiday season.

When you say good things about people, tell them to their faces. There's already too much behind-the-back talk.

Understanding Your Health On Buying Christmas Toys

Sometime this week you're going to be shopping for those Christmas toys for the children. I'm sure when you are on the verge of selecting the toys, you'll ask yourself: "Will the kids really like these?" and "Will they get some real use out of them?"

Wisely chosen toys not only provide diversion for the children, but also satisfy their urge to use their new abilities--abilities that have developed as they have grown. Toys have built-in pleasures, and sometimes built-in hazards. The real skill in selecting toys is to know what toys fit which child.

The most common mistake is buying toys that are too advanced for the child. For instance, something that is just right for a ten-year-old, such as an electric train, would be very dangerous for a two or three-year-old if he were to attempt to plug it in with his still unsteady fingers. I think that knowing a little bit about the play habits of various age groups makes it easier to select toys.

Children up to about 2 have pretty much the same response to anything--they put it in their mouths. When buying a gift for a child this age you must keep this in mind. Sick to sturdy rattles, soft balls, stuffed animals, and blocks with rounded corners. And if the toys are also washable, mother will appreciate it.

Youngsters from 2 to 5 are interested in physical activity--in doing things for themselves. They like to explore and put much emphasis on events such as tea parties, attended by one live friend, and several dolls. Select toys that push or pull, make noise, that can be climbed on or pried up, or knocked down. Children around four also like diggers, tricycles, skates, and paper dolls. Simple tools, games, and all kinds of materials that allow them to release their artistic and creative abilities, such as crayons, clay and finger paint are also good selections.

When children reach six to ten years of age they have a burning desire to learn physical and mental skills. This is a fine time for the development of hobbies and interest in occupations. Select such things as kits to build anything from model air planes to the skeletons of dinosaurs. Other good ideas are costumes and equipment to pursue their favorite occupations--such things as puzzles, tinkering toys, construction sets, chemistry sets, simple microscopes and telescopes.

Another successful gift is a book on some subject you know the child is interested in. Most children's books are grouped by ages, making it easy to select one on the child's own reading level.

Michigan Mirror

'Christmas in Vietnam' --All Michigan Can Help

"Every family should give serious consideration to taking part in Michigan Christmas in Vietnam," said Governor George Romney at a kickoff press conference where the idea was presented.

Briefly, this campaign urges Michigan citizens to demonstrate their Christmas spirit by working through one of several agencies now functioning in Vietnam to help the people and servicemen there.

"The most severe need," stated the governor, "is for soap." He said that nearly every child needs medical attention and most of this need is related to the fact that they cannot keep clean. Soap, food and money, it is hoped will stream to Vietnam because of Michigan people and their generosity.

Newsletters and electronic media of the state were encouraged to get facts of the campaign to the Michigan public in time for the December 18-24 special week which was proclaimed by the governor. The Michigan effort, it is hoped, will stretch well into the next year.

Local Jaycee, Red Cross and religious offices are geared to work with state citizens, accepting their gifts and donations on the spot and sending them on to Vietnam.

Organizations cooperating fully in this program are: American Friends' Service Committee, American National Red Cross, CARE, Catholic Relief Service, Christian Children's Fund, Foster Parents Plan, International Rescue Committee, Lutheran World Relief, Project Concern, USO, Vietnam Christian Service, World Medical Relief, World Rehabilitation Fund, World University Service, and World Vision International Relief Organization, Community Development Foundation, Save the Children Federation, NAE - World Relief Commission, People-to-People Health Foundation, Inc., (Project HOPE), Seventh Day Adventist Welfare Service.

Prospects for legislative action aimed at more effectively measuring campaign expenditures may have been enhanced by a question which arose following the November election.

It seems the report filed by former Gov. G. Mennen Williams exceeded the limit

now specified by law in spending for his unsuccessful bid at the U.S. Senate seat. The report may be misleading, however.

Present law specifies that a candidate may spend \$40 for each 1,000 votes cast for gubernatorial candidates in the previous presidential year election.

Ambiguity in the law permits the candidate to spend this amount while any number of separate committees may also spend this much or more, depending on whether they come under the law's reporting requirement.

In the most recent election, it seems Williams' campaign workers lumped his own spending and that of several committees into one report.

Thus his spending went beyond the limit of the law.

Williams' opponent, the incumbent and victorious Sen. Robert Griffin (and other major office seekers for that matter) took the other route. He filed a personal spending report and individual committees working in his behalf filed separately. Taken together, several other candidates would have gone over the spending limit as well as Williams.

Revision of this law, which in effect is unenforceable because of its ambiguity, has been urged for several years primarily by Secretary of State James M. Hare, whose office tries to administer this law.

Hare has contended that in

addition to lacking teeth, the law's ineffectiveness is creating a situation in which only the wealthy can seek public office.

In 1948, when Williams gained his first term as governor he spent less than \$50,000 on the campaign. In 1960, Neil Stuebler's futile bid for the same office cost him over \$173,000 and supporters of Governor George Romney spent nearly \$290,000 on his second term bid. Neither candidate reported any personal spending.

What is needed, Hare says, is a law which will require registration of all political committees working in a candidate's behalf and a firm but reasonable limitation on the overall spending.

Pay as We Go

TO THE EDITOR:

I address myself to government economic practices, especially on the federal level.

We must pay for as much of our expenses as we are able to as we go along. It doesn't seem as though that should be such a difficult principle to keep in mind and to follow.

But the irresponsible economic record of the Johnson-directed 88th and 89th congresses tells another story--Tax cuts when there should not have been any, followed by government pay raises, lavishly increased spending, more tax cuts, and more spending on both domestic and military programs.

Further, as it became increasingly clear that tax rates should be increased, there was no proper action in regular session and no serious, known thought of special session, and even now opposition to that proper action is stupidly evident.

On the surface, government economic practices of large deficit spending are the first and largest single cause of the inflation which now upsets us.

Government treasury figures (the latest available) forecast a debt of perhaps as much as from 32 to 39 billion dollars this fiscal year. Government propaganda figures, of course, are lower. I applaud the recently proposed 3 billion cut in spending. But that or any other possible spending cuts can come nowhere near balancing the budget, unless vast cuts are made in Vietnam spending, an unlikely possibility. Taxes must be increased.

Yet, those who must resist tax increases are the ones who seem to want to spend even more in Vietnam.

Wish that we were not so involved in Vietnam--the wrong war, at the wrong time, in the wrong place--but the powers that be dictate that we be so involved and until they change we are stuck with that dollar cost, as well as other costs, and we must pay for what we can now.

Unfortunately, with such huge and mounting debt, even

many selfless domestic plans of those who wish merely to improve conditions at home take on more than an appearance of selfish plots.

While President Johnson, House minority leader Ford, and ex-vice-President Nixon have many differences, they have, I think, some things in common; namely, they are all fools and rank political opportunists where economic matters are concerned.

Of course, we may suffer the penalty of a mild recession if we take the corrective action of increasing taxes. But the penalty is not the result of the correction. The penalty is the result of continuing the bad practices and of continuing the bad practices while delaying, and denying the need of, the corrections.

We have two choices; (1) increase taxes and possibly have a mild recession or, (2) not increase taxes, continue, perhaps accelerate, the cruel inflation largely unchecked, and eventually have a more serious recession. The longer the corrections of increased taxes (and lower spending) are put off, the worse the situation will grow.

As I stated at the beginning of this letter, and it is the main thought, "We must pay for as much of our expenses as we are able to as we go along." Wake up, Washington!

Some concern has been expressed that the school gym, pool, cafeteria and other facilities carry a charge, even when used by the Mason area recreation organization.

Negotiations are underway on the use of school facilities and some councilmen have taken issue with the fact that there is any charge at all.

The fact that has to be faced is that providing the facility isn't the only consideration.

There are the utilities, the janitorial service, the supervision, the wear and tear on the facilities. The cost of these things has to be covered somewhere along the line.

School districts have budgets, too. School districts are just as hard-pressed as city councils, area recreation councils, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H clubs and such other organizations as might want to use the school facilities.

Renting out school facilities shouldn't be a profit-making business for the school district but certainly it is not asking too much to see that maintenance costs and utilities are met by those using the school facilities.

Make it None for the Road

Hidden in the midst of all the holiday frenzy and activity is the menace of those with too much holiday cheer of the liquid variety taking to the highways and streets with their cars.

There have been attempts to battle this menace with all sorts of projects and slogans but none of them makes as much sense as the new approach taken by the Automobile Club of Michigan.

In other years organizations have set up sobering-up stations to facilitate the

dispensing of coffee to drivers who have over-indulged. Usually these coffee-aid stations are advertised with banners urging "One for the Road."

The Automobile Club of Michigan has a better slogan this year. It is urging and pushing a special holiday pledge, "Make it NONE for the road."

If everyone subscribed to this slogan there would be less maiming and slaughter on the highways and a better brand of holiday cheer than that sloshing around in a bottle.

An Abuse of Tax Money

Congress has decided every taxpayer should have the opportunity to help pay for presidential election campaigns, on which exorbitant sums have been spent on an increasing scale in recent years.

The Congressional proposal is to permit each taxpayer to check off \$1 (\$2 on joint husband-wife returns) of his income tax payment which the Treasury then would divide between the Republican and Democratic campaign committees.

This would apply only in presidential years. It would apply only to the Republican and Democratic parties--although a minor party might qualify if it ever polled five million votes. None ever has.

The object of this scheme, as described by its author, Senator Long of Louisiana, is to diminish candidate and party dependence on "fat cats" and other big money interests. The object is desirable.

But the bill imposes no restrictions on political fund-raising or spending. As it stands, the money raised in this manner through the U.S. Treasury would be in addition to whatever the parties could raise as they do now--by solicitation, by dinners, by slick-paper magazines and program advertising, or any other means.

Party leaders always are crying about the swelling costs of campaigns, what with TV, etc. and the difficulty of raising money. If half the taxpayers would mark off \$1 for this purpose, the campaign managers would have more than they reasonably could spend, assuming they continued to collect from the usual sources as in the past. But they would find ways to spend it!

Legitimate campaign costs in this country are high. No presidential candidate could be expected to get along under the penny-pinching restrictions imposed on candidates in Great Britain by British law.

Conceivably, it might be logical for the taxpayers to finance political campaigns. (Shucks, they pay for everything else!) But only if expenses were severely restricted, only if donations from anybody else were prohibited, only if every dime had to be accounted for publicly.

The bill Congress now has concocted is full of holes, imposes no restrictions to speak of, and is merely a scheme to get some easy money for presidential campaigns. If it works, it soon will spread to every campaign. On this basis we hope, if the bill becomes law, blessed few taxpayers will check off their \$1 donations.

How Much More?

The cost of the Viet Nam war is more than enormous. It is becoming incredible. The word is that when Mr. Johnson submits his budget estimate for the fiscal year 1968 next month, it will call for defense spending of 72 billion dollars.

There is a strong feeling in Congress that another 5 billion will have to be added as time goes on. Even this feeling may prove optimistic, because 6 billion had to be added to the original estimate for the fiscal year 1966, and at least 10 billion will have to be added during the current year.

But let us settle for the figure of 77 billion dollars as a conservative estimate, at the rate things are going, and contemplate it for a moment.

Seventy-seven billion dollars is more than any country has ever spent on its military establishment in any year of history with only one exception: in 1945, the peak year of World War II, the United States spent 81 billion dollars on its armed forces in order to bring about the defeat of two of the most powerful military machines ever known.

Seventy-seven billion dollars is more than we spent on our entire defense establishment, including four major wars and part of a fifth, from 1776 thru 1942. It is nearly three times our military expenses in all of World War I. It is half again as much as we spent on the Korean war in its peak year.

Seventy-seven billion dollars is indeed an awe-inspiring figure. The question which faces us today is whether it will be enough to persuade a 20th century farming country in southeast Asia, smaller than half the size of Mexico, to give up its ambitions of conquest.

The question sounds ridiculous. And the answer, if the Johnson administration remains in the rut of indecision, will be even more so.

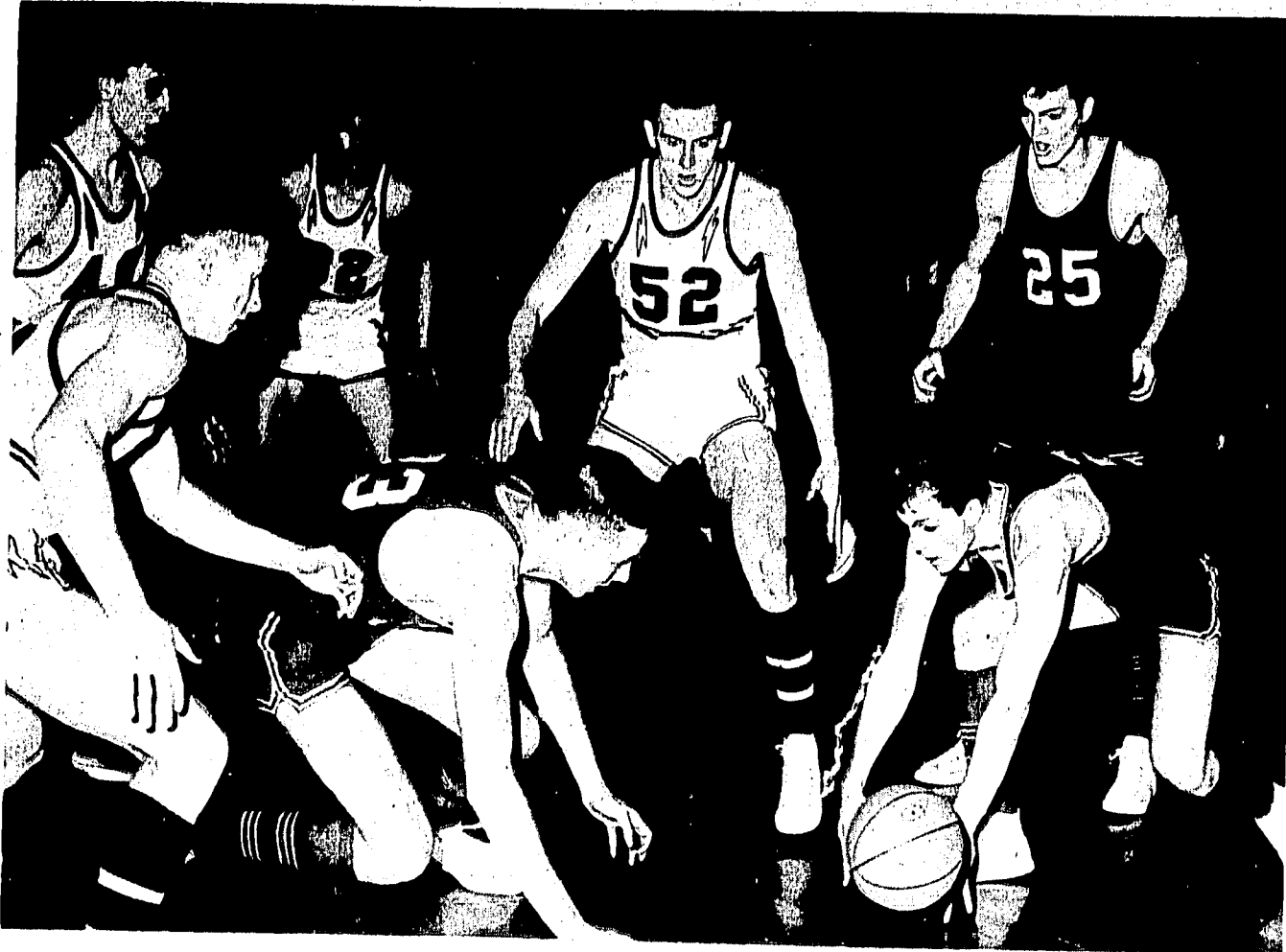

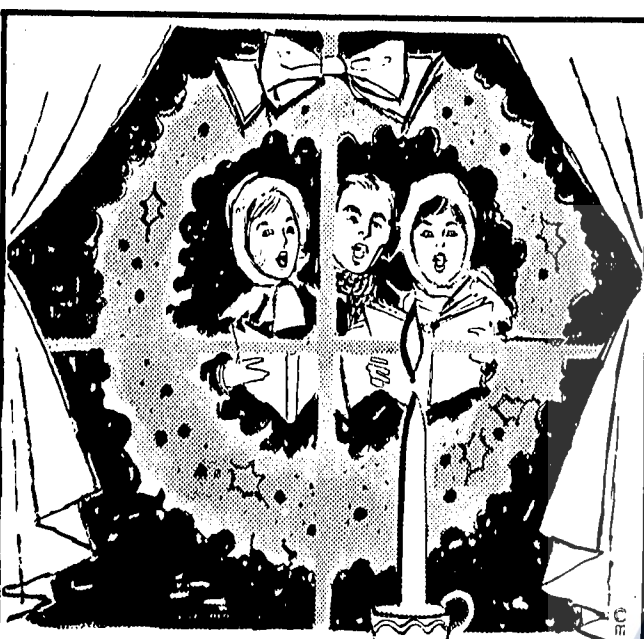

The Michigan legislature was the first in the United States to adopt the nation's most advanced milk sanitation code, enforced by the Dairy Division of the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Since the law went into effect on July 1, 1966, department dairy inspectors have issued operating permits to nearly 11,000 dairy farms after rigid sanitation inspections. In addition, tank trucks and processing plants come under the dairy code standards.

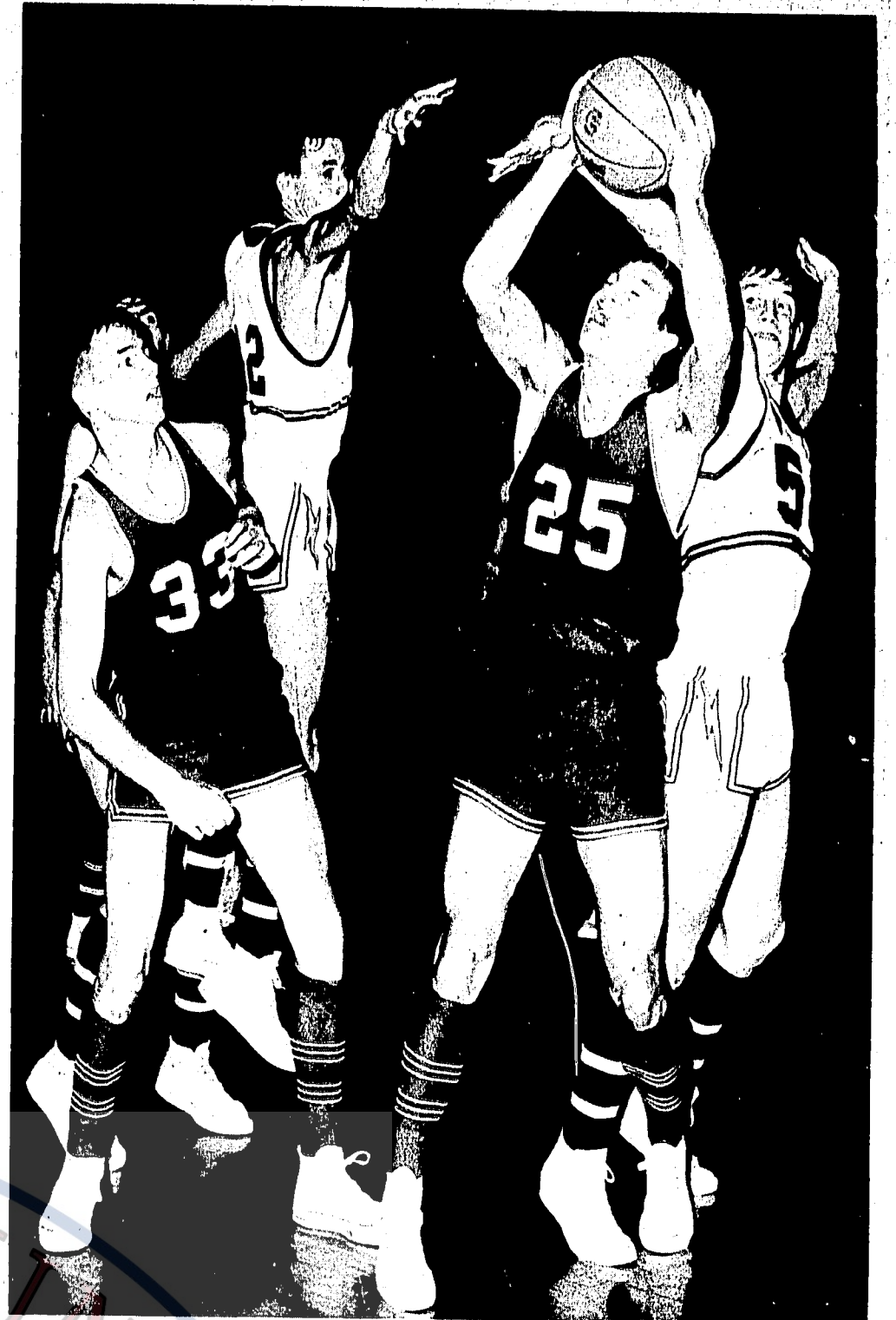

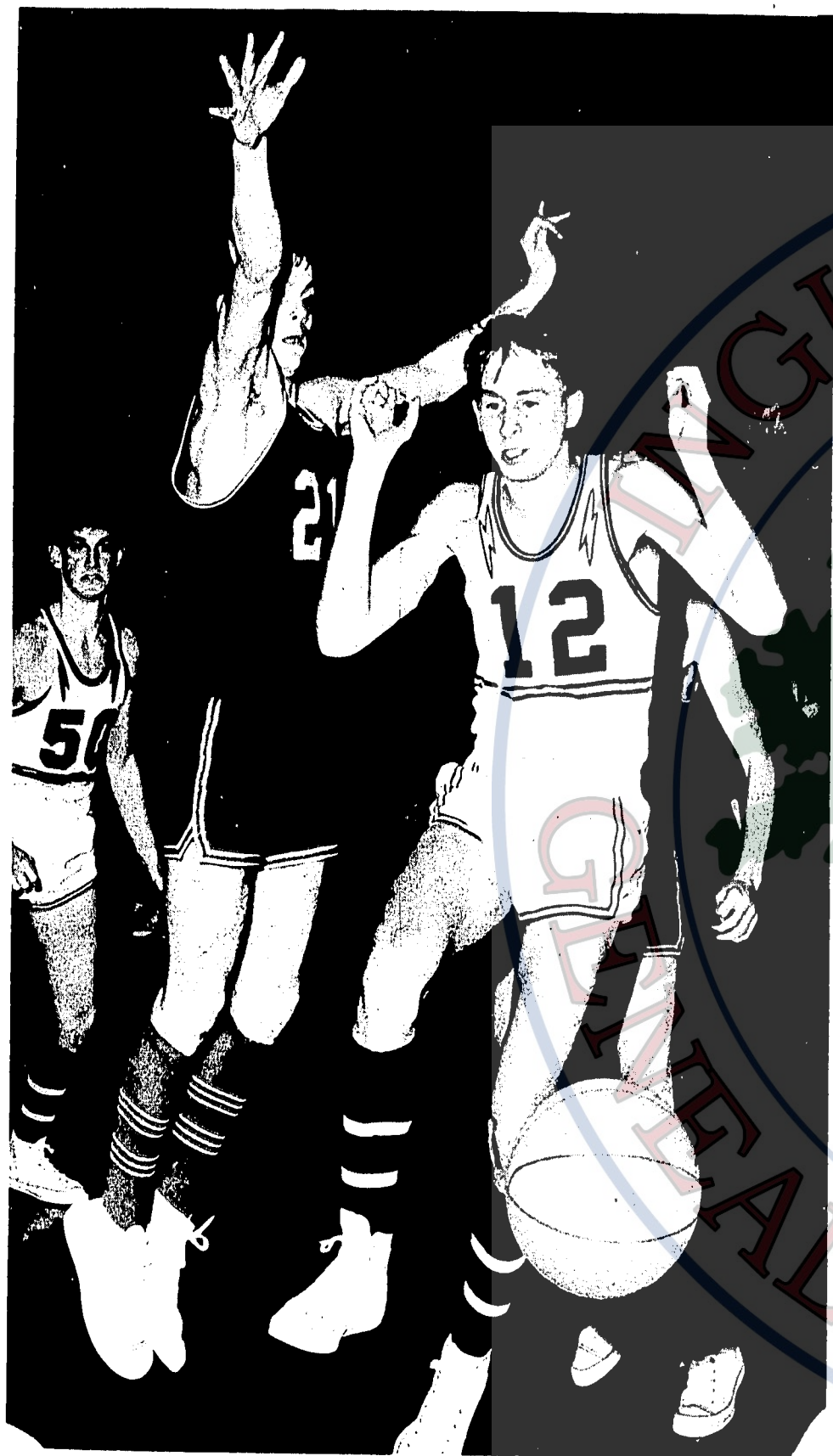
Chet Winegar was the only player for either team to reach double figures. He made it with 14. The Eaton Rapids shooter also did a good job on the backboards.
