SENIOR B CLASS ACTIVITIES

Their first activity was the Senior B play, "Minick", with Paul Axline taking the lead of a cast of fourteen characters. Next came the Senior B closed party.

The Junior-Senior Prom will be held early in the term and later the Senior A Prom. Then a whole flood of activities will swoop down upon them all at once: Senior Day, when all the seniors will strut about the halls; the Senior Day program, and following soon, the banquet. Their days as regular students at Eastern High School will be closed with the Baccalaureate services and the Commencement exercises, two events which will never be forgotten by any of them. Happy, busy, senior high school days, you will soon be a thing of the past!


ATHLETICS

BOARD OF ATHLETIC CONTROL

"The meeting will come to order. The business before the board today is to decide who shall receive awards for basketball and swimming." With these words Mr. Rich opens another meeting of the Eastern Board of Athletic Control. The membership consists of three representatives elected from the student body, Dwight H. Rich, Principal, Walter A. Graff, Coach, Don S. Wheeler, Athletic Director, and F. D. Manz, School Treasurer. The board approves all expenditures, as well as athletic schedules and awards. Three times each year they have charge of an assembly program for the awarding of letters. Under their direction the General Organization ticket is sold. The board receives a share of the money collected.

The boards in the past and this year's board are to be complimented on their fine, efficient work. In the fall of 1928, when Eastern High School first opened its doors, it was necessary in order to promote a sound system of athletics to go in debt for equipment.

During the summer of 1931 Eastern and Central officials met and decided to buy and install at Pattengill Stadium a floodlight system for night football. The equipment was purchased from the Giant Projector Flood Light Company. The total cost of \$3,200 was borne equally between Eastern and Central. The system is the best high school set-up in the state, being lighted under a power of 72,000 watts. The venture has proved very profitable because it allows Eastern enthusiasts not free during the afternoon to attend at night; also it eliminates conflict between our schedule and that of Michigan State College.

In the five years that Eastern has been in existence a total of approximately 120,000 have witnessed athletic contests. Quaker teams have traveled about 18,000 miles.

1932 FOOTBALL REVIEW

On the first day of school, in answer to Coach Graff's call for football candidates, approximately 100 boys reported at the gym and were issued equipment. Out of this group, five were members of the 1931 team—Clarence Zimmerman, Donald Hulliberg, John Turik, Wilson Hubbel, and Walter Swartz. Last year they performed at R.G., F.B., Q.B., H.B., and L.G., respectively.

In order to strengthen the team, Coach Graff shifted Swartz from L.G. to L.T. and placed Filion, a new man from Detroit, at L.G. In the backfield, Turik went to L.H. and a sophomore, Lyle Sherman, was given a chance to run the team at Q.B.

After two weeks of strenuous practice, most of the positions had been filled, and the team was eagerly awaiting its first clash of the season. On the evening of September 23, Eastern met Ithaca under the flood lights at Pattengill Stadium. Although the blue and gold-clad warriors showed ability in downing their rivals 26-0, the cooperation between the line and backfield was not smooth enough to show the real strength of the team.

Coaches Graff, Burnham, and Bovard worked hard during the next week, trying to iron out the rough spots that had shown up in the game with Ithaca. The results of their efforts showed on Friday evening, when the invading Bay City aggregation was defeated 32-0. The Easternites flashed a smooth working combination which scored a touchdown in every quarter, and two in the third quarter. The line opened huge gaping holes, and the backs did some fine blocking and running after getting to the secondary defense set up by the Wolves. The Quakers scored in all departments of the game, twice after uninterrupted 65 yard marches down the field. Turik cut and ran his way 45 yards for a touchdown, and was on the receiving end of one of Hulliberg's deadly passes for another. Swartz, Zimmerman, and Adams were the main cogs in opening up big holes in the Bay City line, while Hulliberg, Turik, and Sherman, the sophomore quarterback, were constant threats in the backfield. The following Saturday, the Quakers packed their war bags and invaded Saginaw Arthur Hill. Eastern came home with the honors of the day, winning 14-0, but not without a real battle. Eastern looked bad during the first quarter, being repulsed on the two yard line and was barely able to stop a Saginaw march to the goal line. Showing more vim, the Quakers started on a goalward march in the second quarter after Hulliberg intercepted a Lumberjack pass on his own 35 yard line. After smash-


ing their way to the 20 yard line Hulliberger caught the Saginaw backs sleeping and threw a perfect pass to Turik who took it in full stride to score Eastern's first touchdown. During the second half, the Easternites twice repulsed the Lumberjacks within their own five yard mark. Hulliberger broke loose through the center of the line, and made a fifty yard dash for the second and last touchdown of the game.

During the next week the coaches and trainers had a job on their hands, trying to get the boys cured of some bad bumps and bruises in preparation for the invasion of the highly touted Battle Creek team. On Friday night, under the flood lights, the two teams fought gallantly before a crowd of approximately 6,000 people, but when the gun cracked ending the game they were deadlocked 0-0. The Quakers set up a defense that held the Bearcats outside their 14 yard line during the evening, but their offense was only good enough to carry them to the Battle Creek 4 yard marker where they were held back. The Bearcats tossed pass after pass but the alert Quaker backs knocked them down just as often as they came. Several penalties were called on both sides for roughing. Smith, a sophomore, who did most of the blocking in the backfield, reversed the tables and proved to be the most consistent ball carrier of the evening. Filion, Eastern's star guard, played in Battle Creek's backfield most of the evening, several times stopping the runner before he could get started.

Recuperating from the hard Battle Creek game, the Easternites journeyed to Jackson for the second Five A League game on October 21. During the first half, the Quakers looked very mediocre scoring only one touchdown, a pass from Hulliberger to Adams in the first quarter, but in the last half they shoved Jackson all over the field to score a touchdown in the third quarter and three in the last, to win 31-0.

Coldwater was Eastern's next opponent. The game was played October 29, at Coldwater. It was a gala day for Coldwater; they were dedicating a new stadium. However, before the Quaker avalanche left the field, they had thoroughly subdued their spirits winning the game 32-0. Sherman and Hulliberger were the outstanding ground gainers, while Filion and Zimmerman made a wall of strength in the line. The reserve team played the last quarter and threatened to score several times but lacked the punch to drive it over.

The following week Ann Arbor's Big Purple team invaded Pattengill Stadium to furnish Eastern with its strongest opponent of the season. In this game Ann Arbor broke Eastern's perfect goal line record when they caught our backfield napping in the second quarter, and com-

pleted a pass for a touchdown. Miller blocked the try for point which finally proved to be the winning play of the game. Jennings, Ann Arbor's star quarterback, was held to one long run during the game. Turik sliced his way off tackle several times for long gains. Eastern scored early in the first quarter after Turik carried the ball on several long jaunts to the 13 yard line, where the whole line gave a mighty surge which left enough opening for Hulliberger to crash through for a touchdown. Swartz kicked the goal which proved to be invaluable. Harkness and Adams, Quaker ends, played a great defensive game turning Ann Arbor's end sweeps into Swartz and Kowalski, who stopped them dead. The center of the line was a bulwark of strength. When the game ended Eastern led the Five A League and Ann Arbor went home carrying a 7-6 mar on her fine record.

Following the Ann Arbor game, the boys practiced very hard for the annual Armistice Day game with Lansing Central for the city championship. Winning also meant the championship of the Five A League and at least a share in the mythical State Championship. It was snowing when the game started, and a crowded stadium stamped and cheered as the five year feud was renewed. Eastern scored early in the game when Filion broke through the line, blocked Look's punt on the twenty yard line and then managed to outrun and outslide a Central man to recover the ball on Central's seven yard line. Eastern's triple threat man, Hulliberg, behind a crashing



line plunged it over in two tries. Eastern was then held scoreless until the third quarter, when they began one of their smashing goalward marches. Turik knifed and dodged his way from the Big Reds' 19 yard line to the four yard line where three men brought him down. Hulliberger made three yards on the first play and was held to half a yard on the next. Smith was stopped inches from the goal. Hulliberger then carried the ball and a good share of the Central team over the line for the second and last touchdown. Faithful Swartz kicked his twelfth point after touchdown. The forward wall was almost impenetrable and the secondary defense was well handled by the Quaker four horsemen.

Gold colored letters were given to Swartz, Hulliberger, Turik, Filion, Hubbel, Schray, Zimmerman, Kowalski, Miller, Adams, Sherman, Smith, and Harkness. The last six named will be back for another season. Turik and Filion were honored when they were picked for the official all-state team. Turik, Filion, Hulliberger, and Swartz were picked for the Five A League first team, while Adams, Zimmerman, Harkness, and Sherman made the second team. Kowalski received honorable mention. Swartz received a second team berth on George Lawton's all-state and the captaincy of the third team in the official all-state. Warren Miller and Donald Hulliberger received honorable mention. Nine boys were picked for all-city team: Adams, Harkness, Swartz, Filion, Zimmerman, Miller, Sherman, Hulliberger, and Turik.



CROSS COUNTRY

After three years of Cross Country in Eastern, a winning team was turned out by Coach "Winnie" Winston. The team showed a fine spirit in winning the City Championship, tying for the Five A League laurels, and placing Kaiser and Spencer first and third respectively in the state meet to take the runner-up positions in the team score.

On September 30, Eastern won their second city championship when they defeated Lansing Central 26-29. Kaiser and Spencer showed some good, early season form in setting a new course record of 10:45, shaving 5 seconds off from the old record.

On October 11, Eastern journeyed to Michigan State College where they met and were defeated by the Freshmen 32-23. The following week October 18, a return meet was held over Eastern's course and again the Freshmen emerged ahead with an identical score. The outstanding performer of these two meets was Kaiser, who won first place in both meets and also set a new course record of 10:19 for the college course and 10:35 for the home course.

At the end of the week our boys were tied by Lansing Central for the Five A League honors. Kaiser was pushed very hard and had only a couple yards to spare, but in winning he broke the old course record.

The following week the boys began to hit their stride and took Dearborn, defeating them 18-37; Kaiser, Spencer, and Goetsch tied for first place honors.

At Ypsilanti in the State Championship run they were nosed out of first place by Kalamazoo. Kaiser turned in a great race when he led the field home, cutting 9 seconds off the state interscholastic record of 10:23 which had stood since 1928. His teammate, Spencer, also ran a fine race and was nosed out of second place only by inches.

At the end of the season Spencer, Buell, Abent, Groesbeck, Goetsch, and Captain Kaiser were awarded letters. Out of this group only Goetsch and Kaiser are lost through graduation, and with the other four back as a nucleus, a fine team is expected next fall.





In the overtime period Fiddler's long tom, against a lone free throw by Sherman, who had replaced Roe, gave the victory to the Almuni 23-22.

On December 15 the Quaker basketeers traveled to Ann Arbor, and were defeated in the Purples' small gym 24-23. The Ann Arbor team had the best of it the first half and led 17-11. Eastern came back in the last half outscoring their rivals 12-7, and just missed a victory. Kowalski, giant Quaker center, scored 15 of the 23 points. On the next night Eastern made up for the first two set-backs by winning from Mt. Clemens 24-10. Kowalski again came through for 10 points.

After a rest over the Christmas vacation, the Quaker quintet journeyed to Bay City, and returned with a 23-13 victory. The Easternites rolled up a 17-5 score the first half. During the second half, Coach Graff substituted freely. On the following Friday Eastern and Lansing Central clashed at the Vocational School Field House. Both teams set up air-tight defenses during the game. Eastern led the Big Reds at the half, 5-0. In the second half Eastern ran the score up to 15, while holding Central down to two long toms and two charity tosses for 6 points.



During the last half the two teams went on a scoring spree but Kalamazoo sank 18 points to Eastern's 10, giving them the game 28 to 15.

At the end of the season letters were awarded to Captain Hulliberg, Turik, Sherman, Kowalski, Swartz, Slabonek, Roe, and Brower.





BASEBALL



TRACK

"On your marks; get set." Bang! The crunch of spikes biting into cinders and another victorious track season was on at Eastern High School. Coach Graff had the candidates working indoors for two weeks before moving outdoors. The letter winners from the last year's team were Stewart Frankford and Robert Barnhart, half milers, Robert Godfrey and Lewis Armstrong, hurdlers, Darrell Fuller and John Turik, sprinters, Harry Fitch, 440, Ernest Spaniola pole vault, and Max Kaiser, the mile.

On April 29 the Blue and Gold track squad met and defeated Lansing Central and the two Saginaw schools, Eastern and Arthur Hill. The final points were as follows: L. E. 48½, L. C. 45½, S. E. 30, S. A. H. 6. Godfrey won both hurdle events to tie with Baird of Saginaw Eastern at 10 points. Kaiser ran an exceptionally fast race to win in 4:35.8. With only two events left, the two Lansing schools were tied, but Armstrong and Turik scored five points in the broad jump and Eastern's relay team took second to cinch the meet for Eastern.

May 2, 3, and 4 found the Easternites engaged in their annual three day practice with the Michigan State Freshmen. Frank Hoff, former Quaker captain and star, scored sixteen points for the frosh, while Godfrey scored 10 points to lead the Blue and Gold. Kaiser suffered defeat when Tom Ottey ran the mile in 4:25.3 for a new freshman record. Frankford broke the school record running the half-mile in 2:05.

Next on the program was a dual meet with Lansing Central. The Big Reds had a well balanced team which proved to be too strong for the Quakers and won 57-47. A new threat was found when Fuller, a former 220 man, was shifted to the 440, which he won in 52:9.

After a week's practice the team journeyed to Ann Arbor where they competed for the Five A League honors. Under a new ruling this was classed as regional meet. Eastern qualified Smith and Kaiser in the mile, Frankford and Spencer in the half-mile, Fuller in the quarter, Turik in the broadjump, Godfrey in the two hurdle events, Spaniola in the pole vault and the relay team for the State Meet. Ann Arbor had too many men for the first places and when the points



State Meet at East Lansing


were tabulated Eastern had 35 points, 9 1/3 points behind the winners. Kaiser set a new Five A League record of 4:34.6 for the mile.

Following a week of preparation, the boys who had qualified for the state competed at East Lansing. The weather was cold and disagreeable. Only one record was broken when Stein of Monroe pole vaulted 12 ft. $\frac{3}{4}$ in. Captain Kaiser gave Eastern five points when he won the mile in 4:35.2. Robert Godfrey placed second in the 120 yard high hurdles. Spaniola tied with five others for fifth place which gave Eastern a total of 9 1/6 points.

The State meet out of the way, preparations went forward to take Kaiser, State Champion in the mile, to the National Interscholastic at Chicago. On June 4, Coach Graff, Mr. McIntire, Frankford, Godfrey, and Kaiser made the trip by auto. Saturday morning Godfrey competed in the high hurdles but was eliminated before the finals. In the afternoon Frankford failed to place in the half-mile. Kaiser ran his best race of the season, when he ran a 4:32.9 mile, but placed only fifth, 2.9 seconds behind the winner.


SWIMMING

In answer to Coach Winston's call for swimming candidates, about forty boys reported one night early in November. Molding of a team began immediately. With Atchison and Hicks, two veterans back from last year's squad, plus some sophomores and reserves, Winston produced a team which won four out of seven dual meets, and placed a third and a fifth in the state.

The first meet was with the Alumni on December 22. The old grads gave the Quaker swimmers a premature Christmas present by losing 28-40. The teams split even on the number of firsts won, but the Easternites garnered too many seconds and thirds. Shortly after the Christmas vacation the Blue and Gold swimmers met Lansing Central and lost 48-27. Hicks and the medley relay team were the only Quaker entrants to place first. On January 24, the Easternites pulled a surprise when they defeated the strong Michigan State Freshmen 41-34. Gibb and Wingerter won the diving and breast stroke, while Clark won two fine victories in the 50 and 100 yard free style. Following this victory they journeyed to Battle Creek, the home of last year's state champions, where they suffered a beating, losing the meet 52-20. The Quakers gave the Big Reds from the West side a real scare when they did some fine swimming to come within one point of winning; score 39-38. During the next two weeks the Quakers won easy meets from Ann Arbor and Jackson, beating them 44-26 and 48-27 respectively.

March 4 found the gold-clad swimmers journeying to Jackson where they participated in the Five A League championships. The Quakers duplicated their last year's performance when they finished in third place. In the state meet held at Ann Arbor on March 11, Hicks took a third place in the backstroke, Wingerter placed third in the breast stroke; the medley and 200 yard free style relay teams placed fourth to give Eastern enough points to place fifth in total points.

Letters were given to Byelick, Hicks, Clark, Atchison, Gibb, Wingerter, Bartell, and Strauss. Reserve letters were awarded to Armstrong, Gibbons, West, Reuffer, Kahler, Duckett, MacDonald, Spurway, Wilcox, Montgomery, and Reeves.

TENNIS

Another victorious chapter was written in the athletic record book when the 1932 racquet wielders continued a string of victories that have piled up over the past four seasons. During the four years that Eastern has been in existence, Coach Fox's tennis teams have won the regional championship four times. More brilliant is the dual meet record. During the four seasons they have lost but one dual meet, that to Flint Northern in 1930 when the Flint team was good enough to win the state title. The team won their second Five A League Championship in 1932, when they defeated Ann Arbor, Battle Creek, Jackson, and Lansing Central in dual meets.

Eastern started the season on April 10 by sweeping to victory over Owosso 12-0. On April 23 they met and defeated Saginaw Eastern 8-1. Continuing on through the season they downed Flint Northern 7-2; Battle Creek 6-1; East Lansing 5-2; and 4-3; their city rivals, Central, for the city championship 5-2; Jackson 7-0, and finally Ann Arbor, their last Five A League rival, 7-0.

Hardly had the boys completed this schedule within a period of five weeks before they were competing for the regional championship. Slashing their way through to the finals, Martin and Captain Beckwith, two team mates, fought it out, Beckwith finally winning 4-6, 6-2, 10-8. The same feat was duplicated in the doubles when Hershey and Brower defeated their teammates Dahlberg and Kwast 6-4, 6-3, to win the regional championship.

Individual highlights were: Martin's defeat of Wallace, Saginaw Eastern's star, 4-6, 7-5, 6-4; Beckwith's dual win over Landon of Ann Arbor 6-3, 6-3; Hershey's decisive victory over McKibben of Central 6-1, 6-2; and Spurway's regional tournament defeat of Pat Johnson, Central's No. 1 player by scores of 0-6, 12-10, 6-2.

At the end of the season major letters were awarded to Captain Beckwith, Hershey, Spurway, and Martin. Minor letters were awarded to Dahlberg, Kwast, Brower, and Pazon.



EASTERNER

Interest in Journalism has grown so greatly in the past year that it was necessary to form two classes. These classes met daily with Miss Grohe during the fourth and seventh hours. Their purpose was to learn the principles of journalism and put them into practice through editing the school paper, the *Easterner*. This was published every two weeks alternately by the fourth and seventh hour classes, with the fourth period class editing the first edition. "Journalism for High Schools" by Hyde is the textbook used for study material.

The work required during the semester from each student comprised ten news stories consisting of sports and news items, five editorials, five feature stories for entertainment, and five special contributions made up of humor, personal observation, or any other special columns.

Each class elected its own editor, assistant editor, and staff. As far as possible, each person performed the duties that appealed to him most in editing the *Easterner*. Three issues of the paper were put out by each of the journalism classes, and the two classes combined their efforts in doing the senior issue.

In the first semester last fall, the journalism course was a general elective, but in the second semester it was an English 8 course. Miss Nellie Grohe, the literary adviser of the publication, has given a great amount of time to the paper since the beginning of our school and deserves much credit for achieving a First Class Honor rating the last two years through the National Scholastic Press Association. Ralph B. Peterman was the business manager and E. L. Courtney was the printing adviser.





Organized in the fall of 1932, the club immediately went ahead with its program. Club periods were taken up by metal work, leather work, and sketching.



public speaking, modern world literature, composition, creative writing, and journalism. Three foreign languages are taught in Eastern: Latin, the foundation of all language study; Spanish, the language of its native land and South America; French, the voice of France. Social Science offers World History, the study of ancient periods; United States History, the beginning and rise of the United States; Economics, dealing with industry and finance; and Civic-Sociology which considers the social problems of civilization. To complete a real education, some branch of mathematics and science should be included. 
manship, commercial English, and office practice. The students generally elect office practice in their senior year, for it gives the final polish to their entire program and prepares them to enter the business world.
