LOOKIN' BACK ON THE SEVENTIES

During the nineteen seventies, many significant people and events left their permanent mark on the American people, and with their charm, intrigue and controversy, they were destined to influence all the seasons of the eighties.

The world of politics was by no means left untouched by the past decade. The Watergate scandal and the resignation of President Richard Nixon were to permanently alter the public's outlook on politics. In 1974, newspaper heiress Patricia Hearst was kidnapped by Symbionese Liberation Army members. She later changed her name to "Tania," pledged her allegiance to the SLA, was arrested, released from prison and married. On the other side of the ocean, such antagonists as Idi Amin, who threatened our wallets, brought American blood to boil.

The sports scene saw countless records broken and medals won since 1970. Muhammad "The Greatest" Ali captured the heavyweight boxing crown for the third time. The public was at once outraged and triumphant in September, 1978, when a federal judge ruled that women reporters were to be allowed the same privileges to after-game locker room interviews as male reporters.

Moreover, in 1972, Olympic swimmer Mark

Spitz won fame by swimming away with seven gold medals.

The controversial death of rock-and-roll legend Elvis Presley left millions of fans screaming in grief. Meanwhile, Elvis's "Doctor Nick" was left to explain the superstar's unnatural death to a suspicious America.

Concern arose for the Catholic church in September, 1978, when Pope Paul VI passed away. To add insult to injury, his successor, Pope John Paul I, reigned for only 34 days before his own death, but his successor, Pope John Paul II, gained countless fans when he visited the United States in 1979.

Fads came and went quicker than ever during the seventies. Jogging became the number-one American prestigious pastime, not to mention a number-one source of income for sportswear manufacturers.

Racquetball was soon to share the limelight as sports enthusiasts traded in their tennis rackets for the short, expensive and newly famous "racquets." Cheerleading jumped a few notches from college sports to pro football games. Popularity wasn't all that changed, either. The girls in short skirts and bobby socks changed to professional models and dancers, with none lacking in

the "looks" department.

Tragedy struck as the skies over the U.S. began to rain defective aircraft, specifically the DC-10. Hundreds of people were killed in several crashes, each of which replaced the one before as the worst of its kind ever to occur. Incidentally, 11 people discovered that self-destruction could be achieved by means other than boarding a DC-10. They were the unlucky ones who didn't survive the mob at the Cincinnati Who concert in the fall of 1979.

In their traditionally irrational way, Americans flocked to Chicago in 1978 to view the contents of King Tut's tomb. They braved numerous hardships and slept their leisure time away on the front steps of the museum to be the first in line.

Those not willing to fight the crowds to see King Tut flocked to movie theaters to be intimidated by "The Godfather," to move faster than light with "Star Wars" and "Star Trek" and to fight crime with "Superman."

All in all, the seventies were years that will not be forgotten by those of you who lived through them. As bad as it may have seemed, those who stop to think about how far we've come since 1970 will generally agree that those were ten truly memorable years.

In the Mock Elections you were voted "Hairiest Legs" and you were a girl.

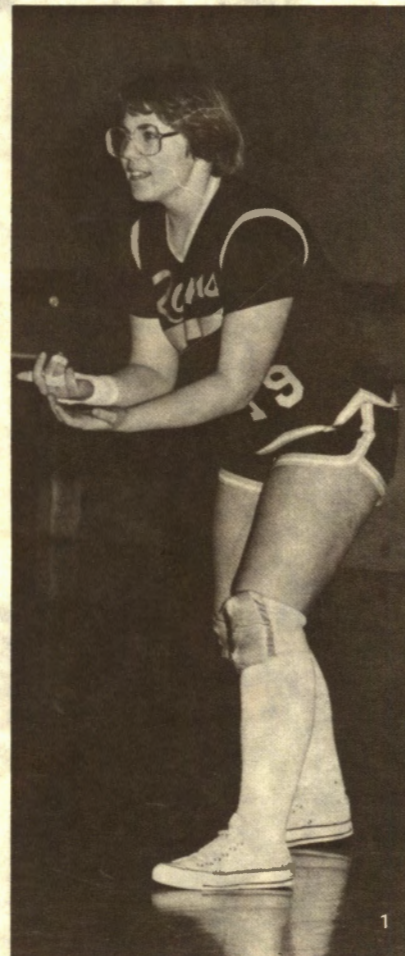
You were wearing a sexy dress and a guy whistled and you saw his dog come running around the corner.

Senior Jennie Hedglen commented, "Everyone should take Physics to develop their thinking skills ... but it's tough stuff."

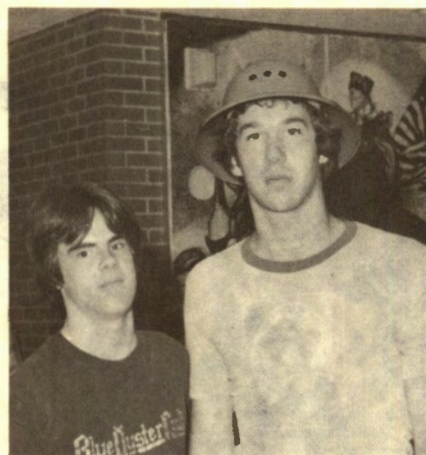

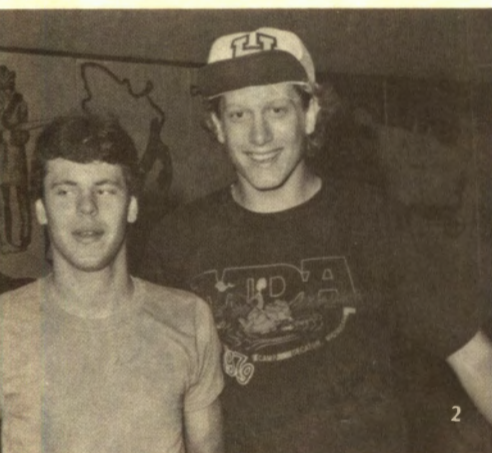

GRADE POINTS QUESTIONED

It has long been the complaint of many students that grade point averages are not fair representations of actual student performance in school.

This argument may be valid, considering that certain courses are obviously more difficult than others, and yet all classes are weighed equally when student grade point averages are computed.

It has been suggested in the past that "degrees of difficulty," similar to those in sports such as diving and gymnastics, should be used in computing grade point averages. I feel this possibility is worth exploring.

With this system, students would continue to earn letter grades, but when grade point averages were figured, a "degree of difficulty," predetermined for each class, would be multiplied by each letter grade.

This attempt to make the grading system fairer might even serve as an incentive to students to enroll in tougher classes, since students would realize that these classes would mathematically be given more weight in the computation of their grade point averages.

Of course, many difficulties would arise in planning and implementing such a system. It would be especially hard to determine which classes would receive higher "degrees of difficulty."

However, it would not be impossible to install such a system. I suggest that a committee composed of counselors, faculty members, administrators and volunteer students, (representing the entire student body, not just the college-bound group whose grades are in the 'A-B' range), be organized to discuss the feasibility of such a program. Isn't such an idea for improving the accuracy of grade point averages worth looking into?

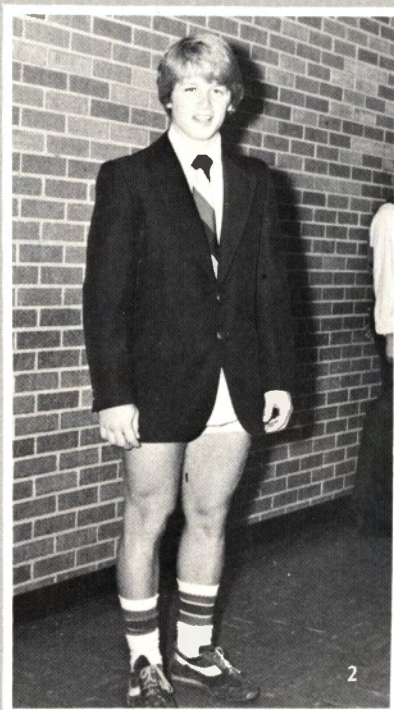

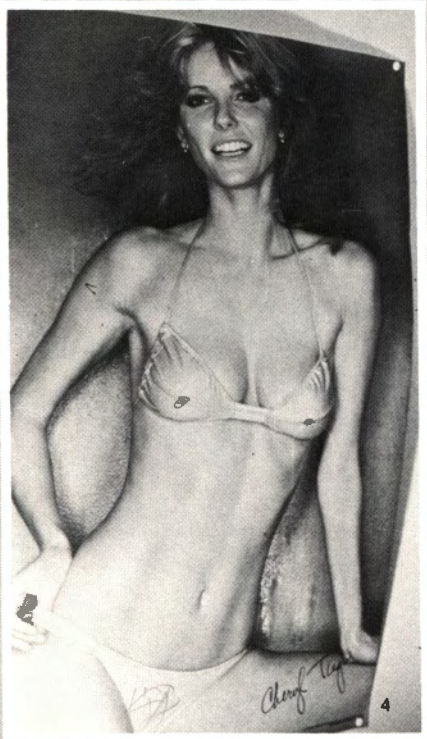

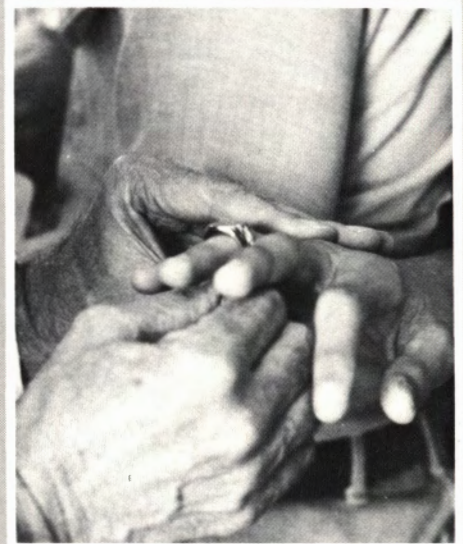

The third annual Pepsi-WVIC assembly November 27 had the theme of problem solving and used animation to provide entertainment and interest.

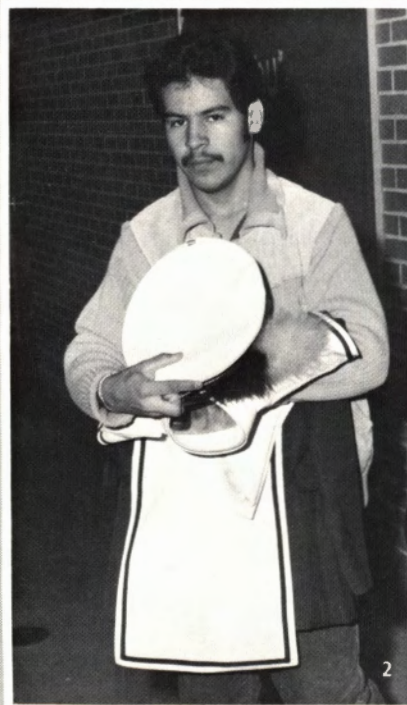


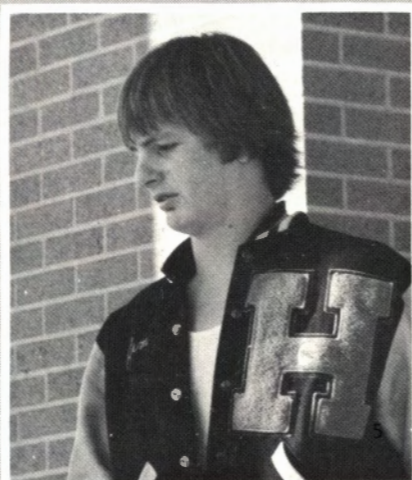
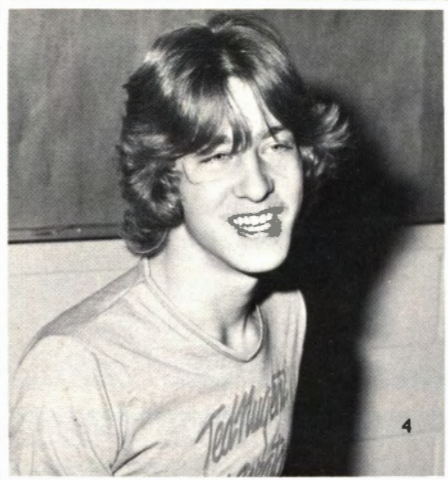

It's uncertain how long George will live, but it could possibly be 25 years. In the meantime, George hung around room 305 and enjoyed his visitors.





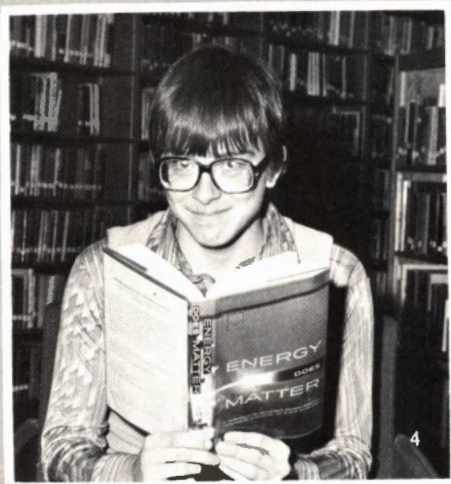

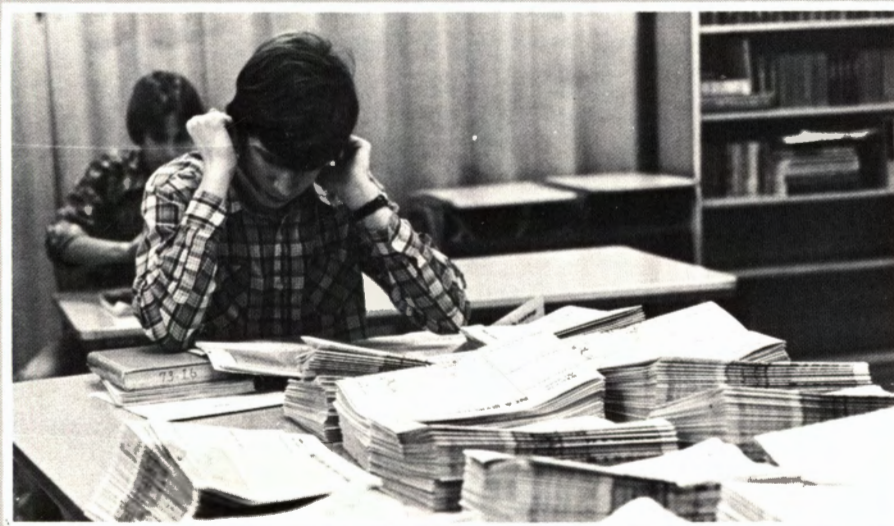
HIDE-N-SEEK

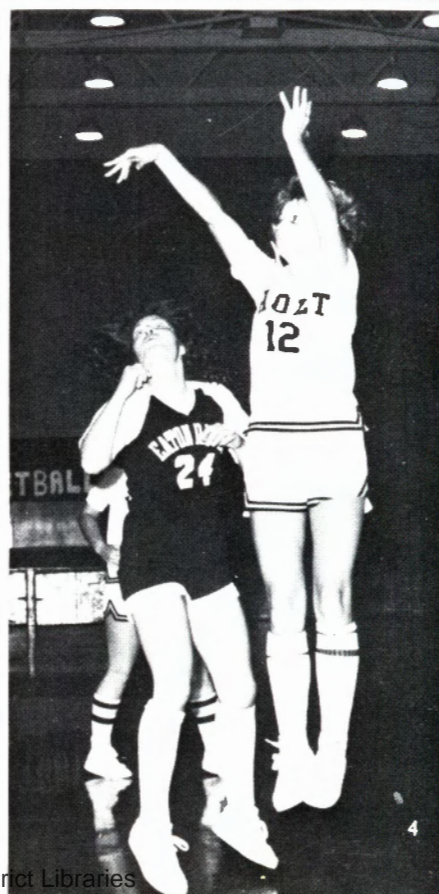
ANYONE FOR BASKETBALL?

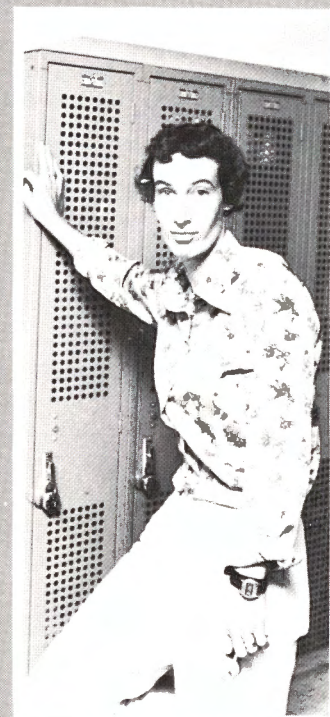

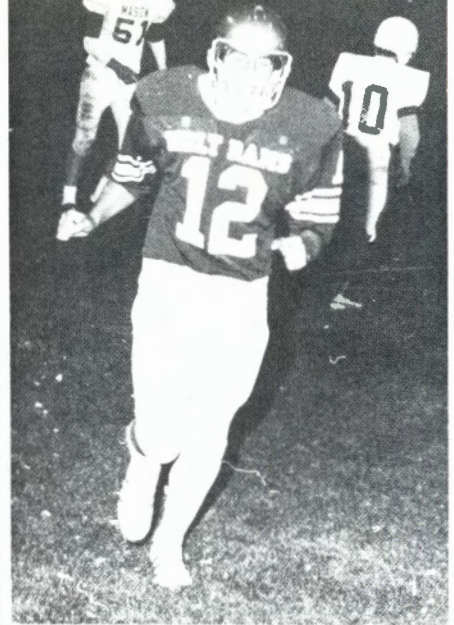
COACH SKI'S TREASURE CHEST

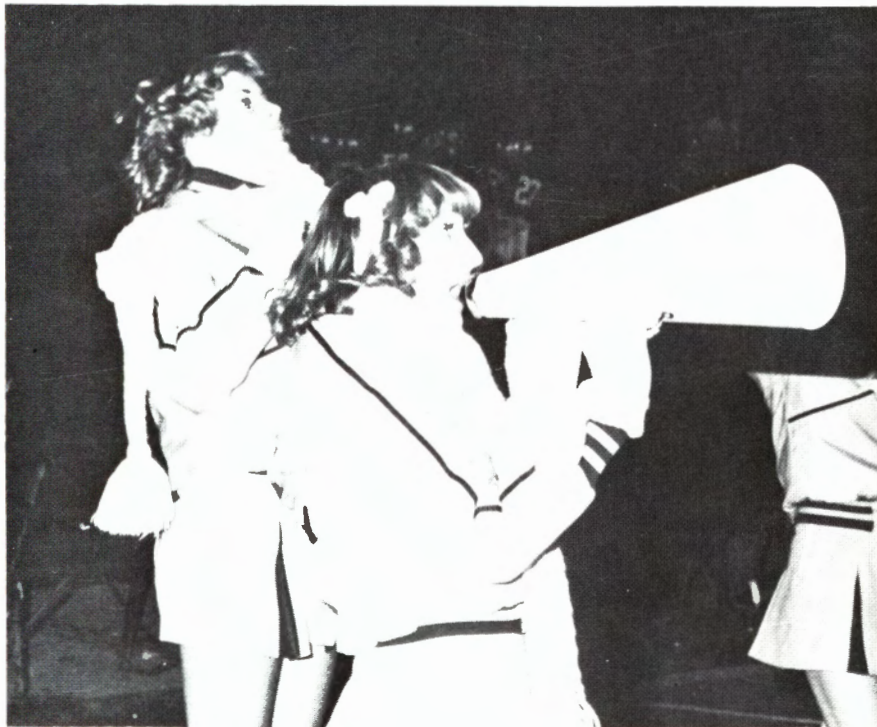
GIRLS PLACE IN TOP TEN!

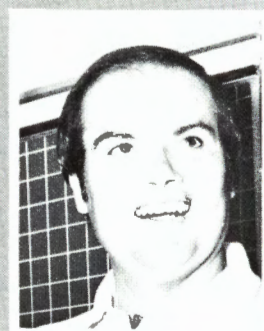

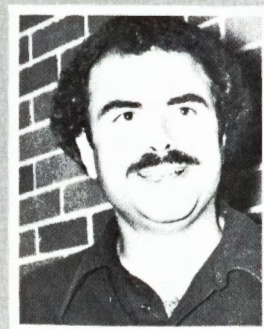

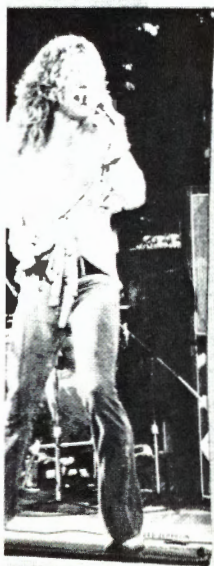

One aspect of the ISAAC program that made it quite unique is the team teaching that took place daily in the Industrial Arts lab. "Mr. Alan Peterson and I enjoy this method of instruction because it enables us to work towards common goals, interact with students on a one-to-one basis, or use the team approach in presenting an idea or new process," said Mr. Leo Allaire, ISAAC teacher.

"The ISAAC lab is such a large area that it takes both Peterson and me to manage not only the 250 students we see daily, but also the seven different areas and 64 different machines and processes that are going on each day. Within the lab area we are involved in everything from the process of removing an engine from a car to figuring the hypotenuse of a right triangle," said Allaire.

"The thing I enjoy most about teaching ISAAC is the chance I have to interact with my students. Many teachers in a school system never get to see that special side of a student who has a chance to excel in an area other than academics," said Allaire.

Also, the program at Holt has been successful mainly because of the school district's commitment to a new and better approach to areas of Industrial Arts.

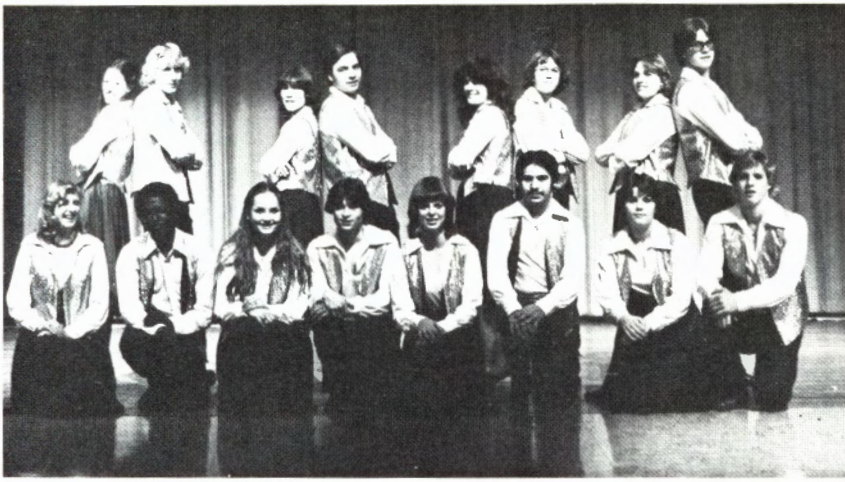
for the seniors was Ken Royston.

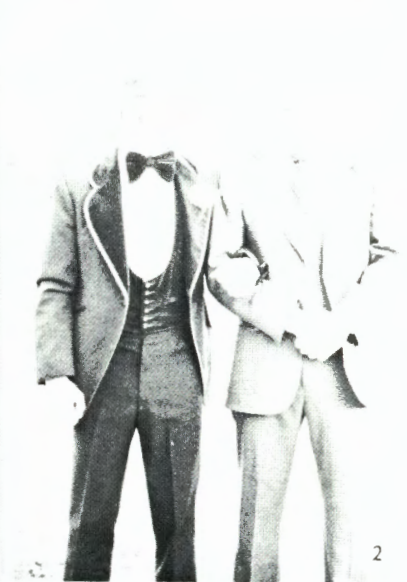

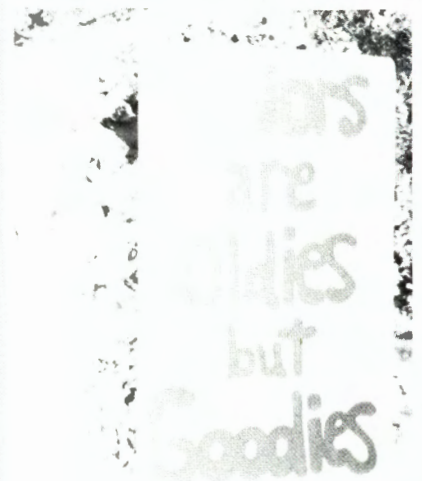

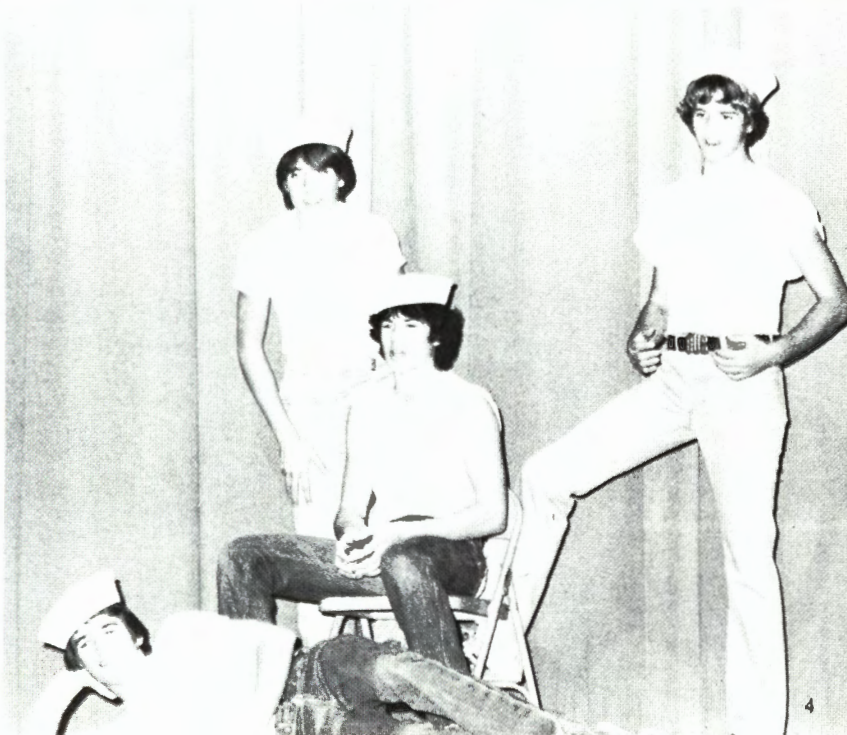


SOPHS CHOW DOWN

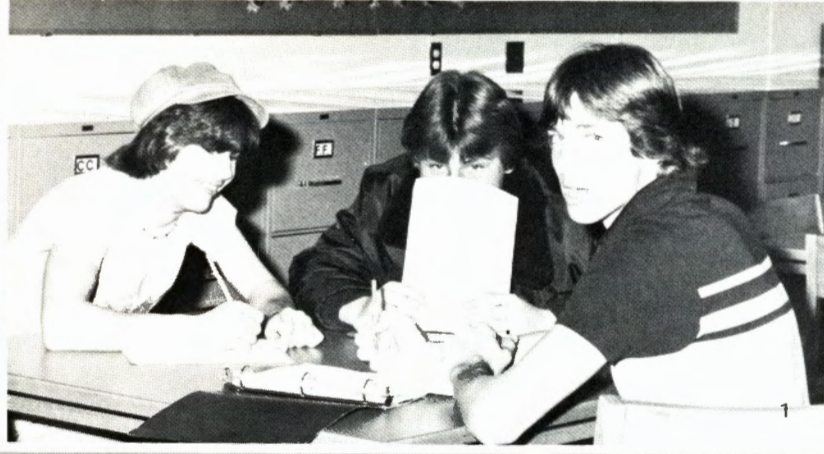

'FINE' ARTS

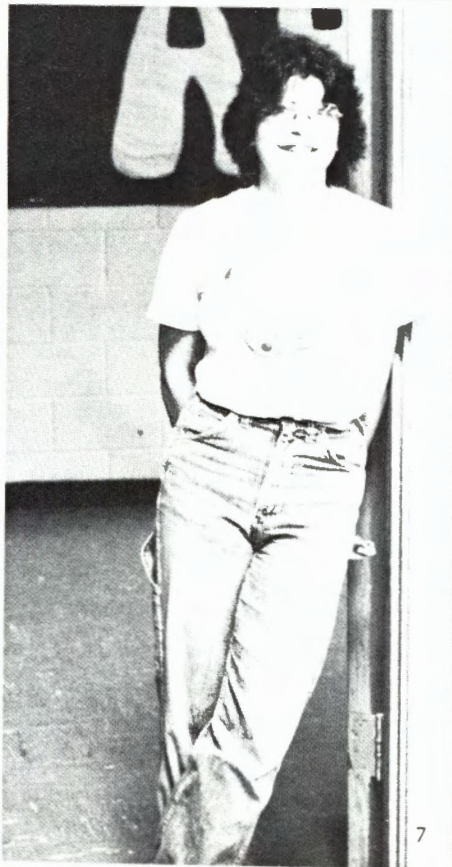
A collection of art from all Holt schools was on display at the fifth annual Fine Arts Day February 9.

The day was coordinated by Fine Arts Committee chairman Mr. Ron Allen, who felt that "the performances and art demonstrations were handled by the students very professionally."

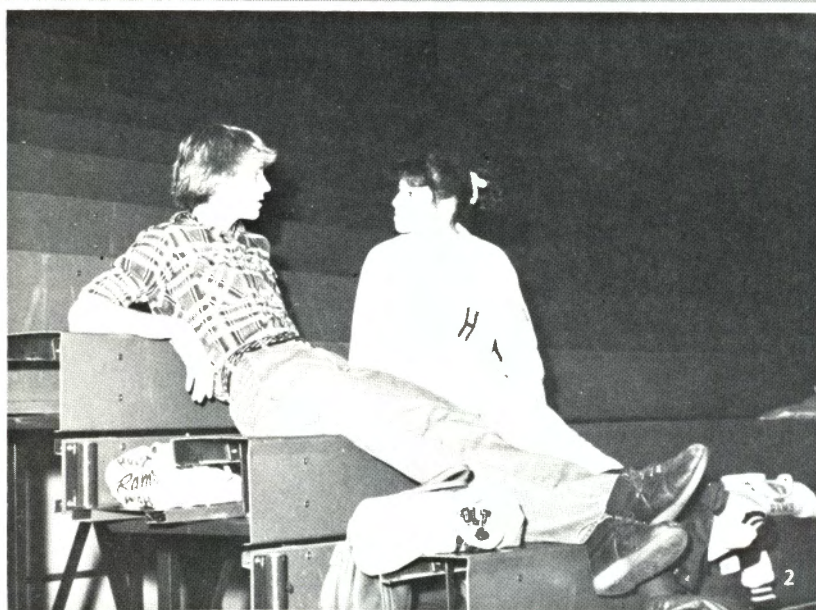

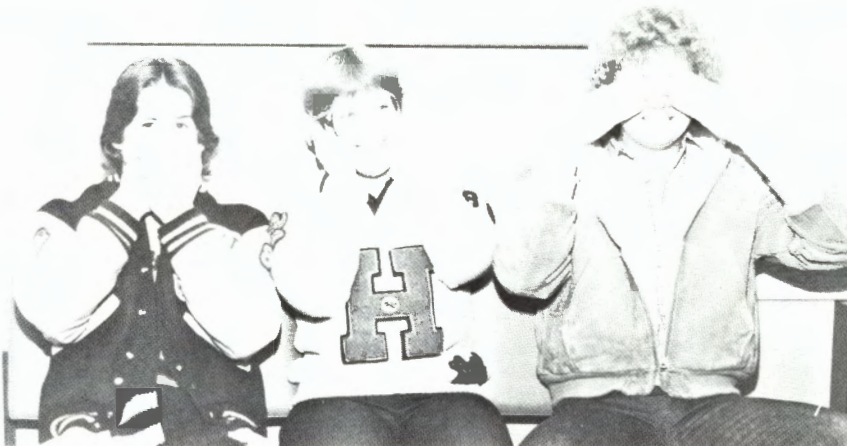
headquarters in St. Johns to design a career education newsletter, which they entitled "Career Tracks."

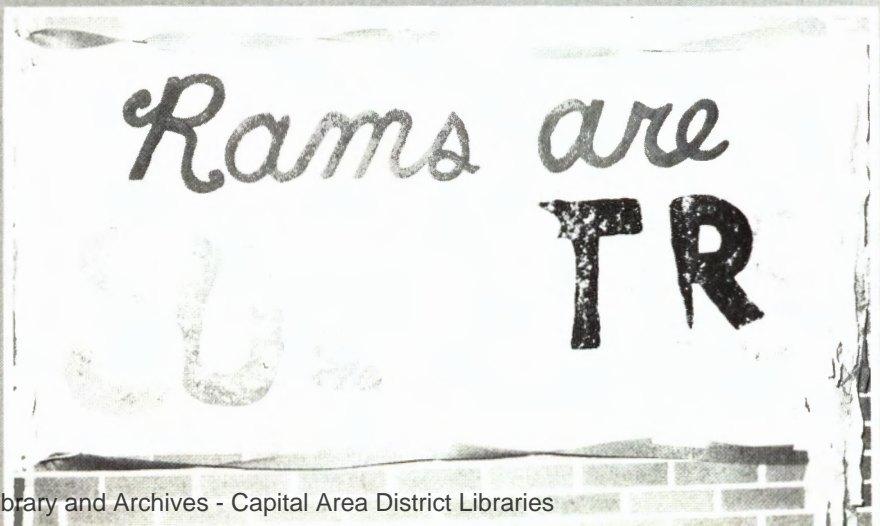
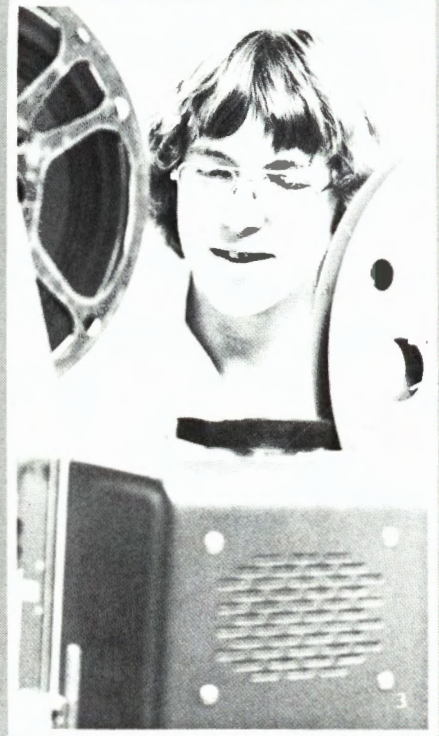

In February, Hershberger and Conarton, along with JoAnn Fox from Waverly, organized and produced the second issue of "Career Tracks."

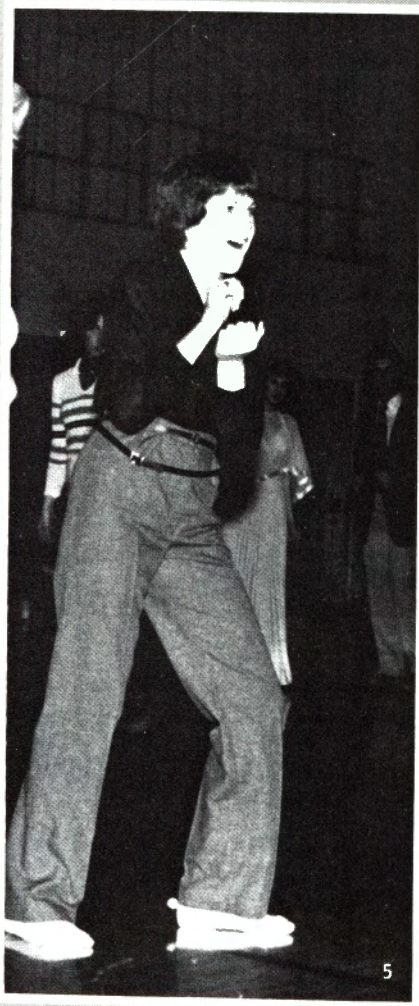

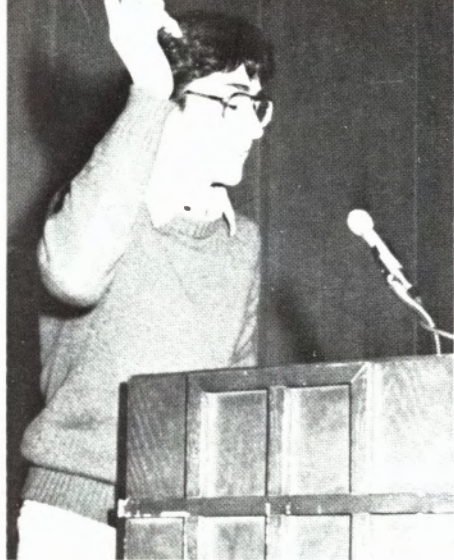

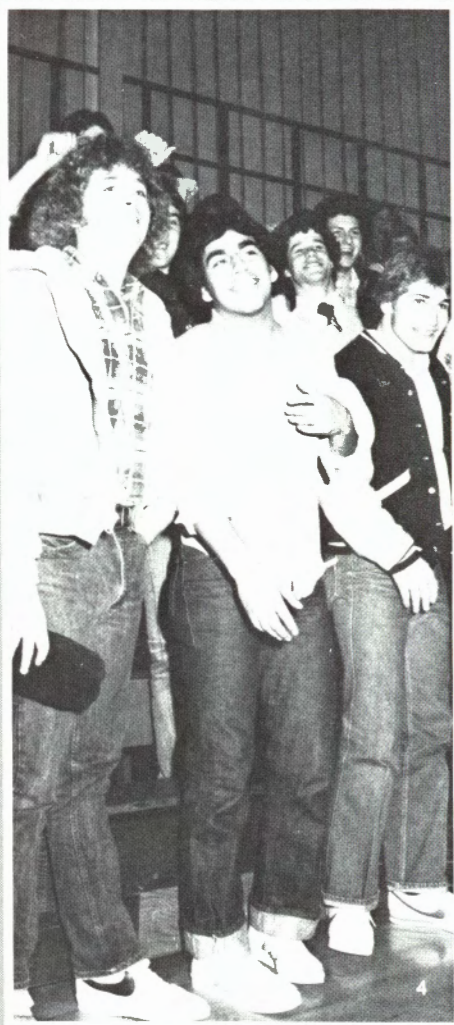
The CAC National Honor Societies set up February 6 for their annual Exchange Day.

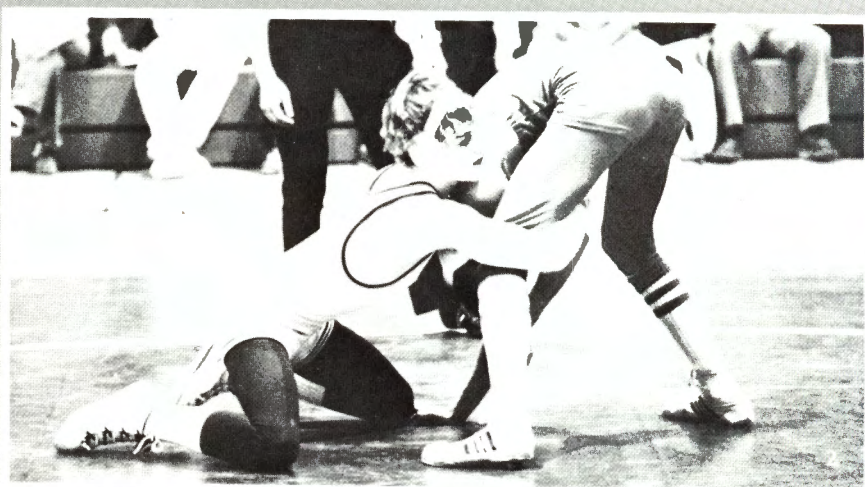

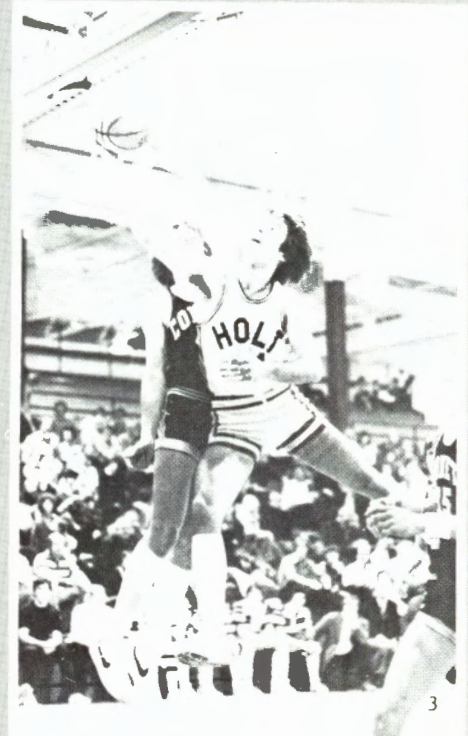

"I hoped to teach my players more than just basketball," explained Inkala. "I hoped to have had a positive influence on my players."

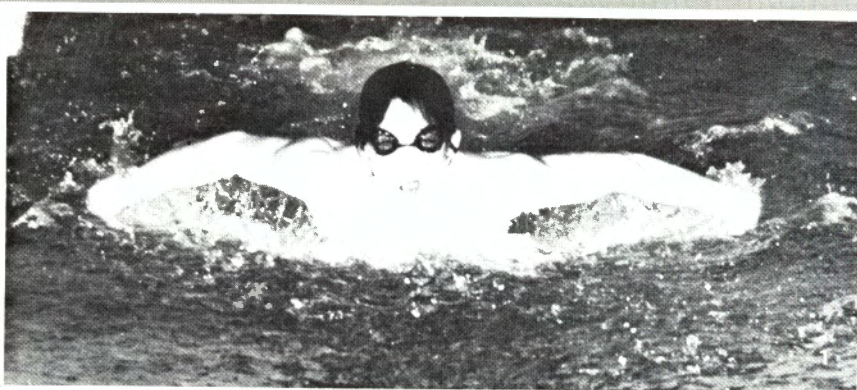

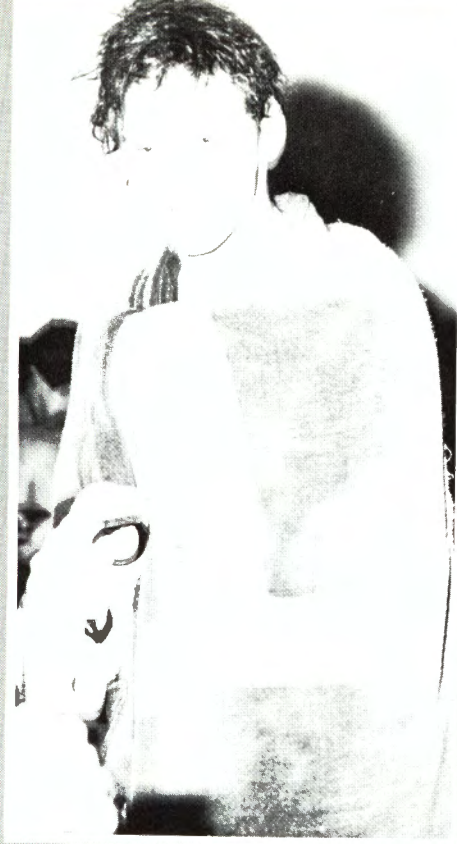
Johnson set a school record in the 200 IM with a time of 2:01.4 and qualified for State

"Our team's skills improved a lot this season, but unfortunately, not soon enough," stated JV volleyball Coach Candi Colchin.

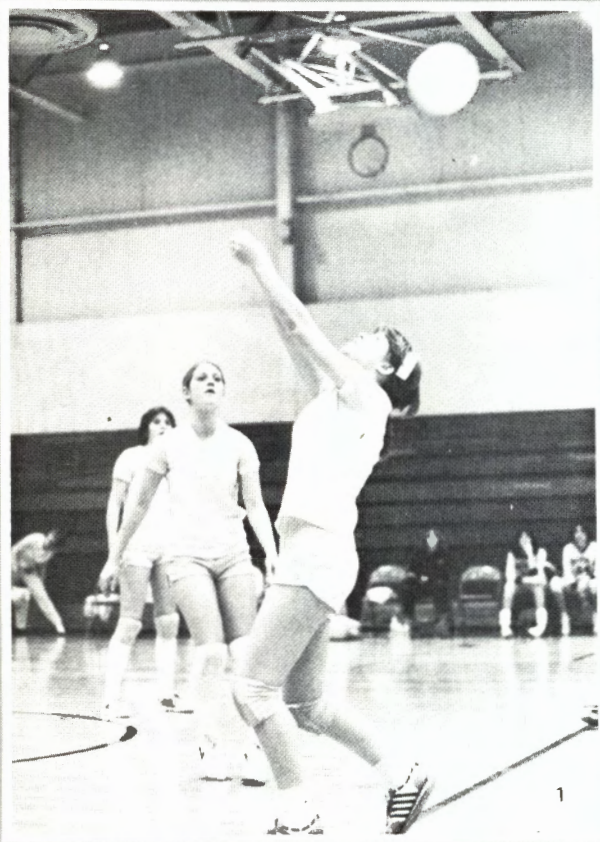

PART TIME CREDIT, PART TIME BUCKS

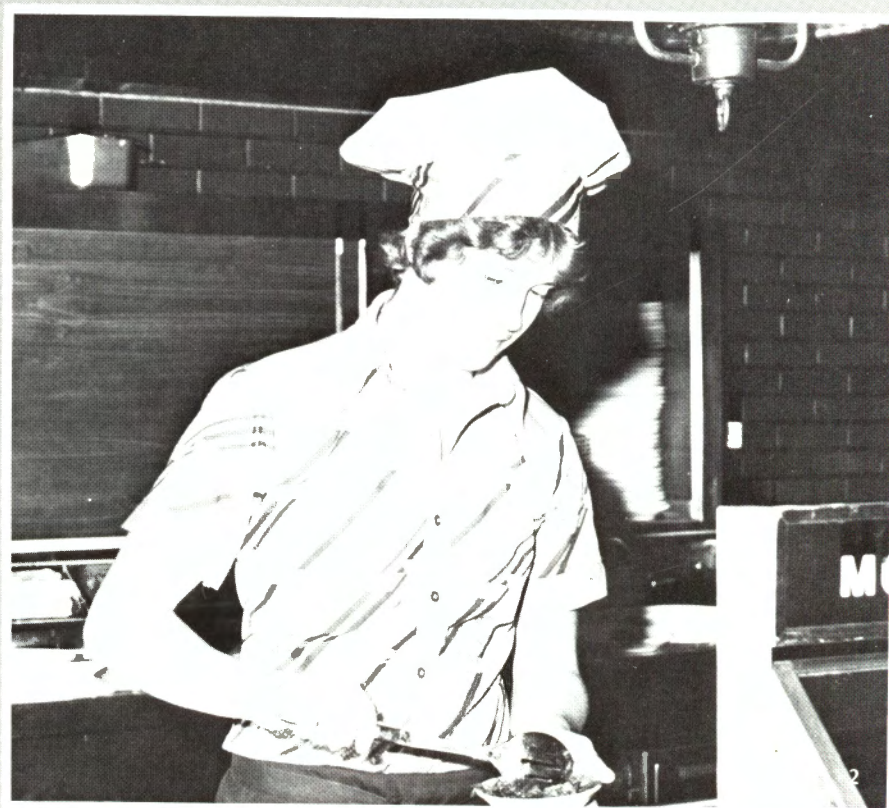
To give students an important learning experience in the job market was the goal behind Co-op, according to Mr. Scott Shimnoski, one of three faculty Co-op coordinators.

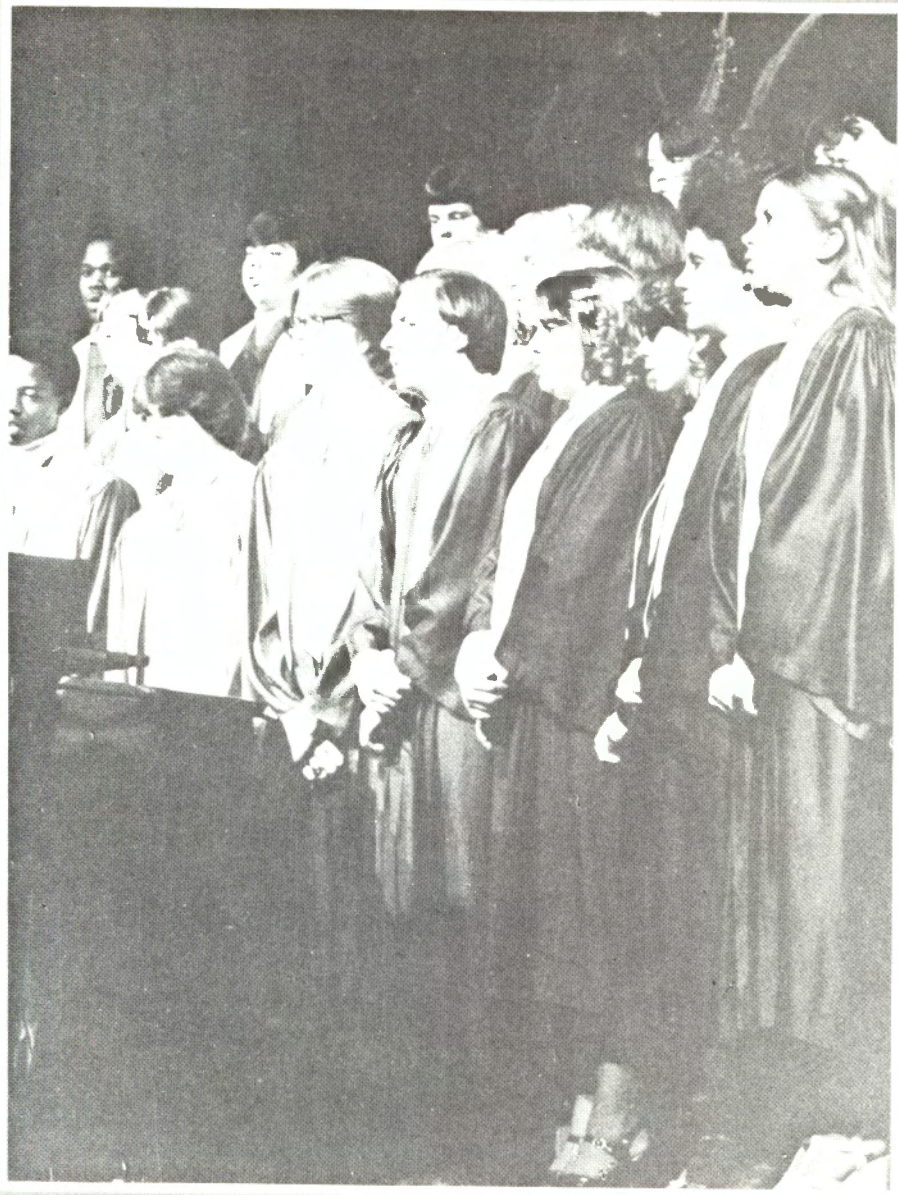
Choir can be a learning experience, but it can also be very exasperating. "Auditioning your first time out is unreal, even though it's just you and Mr. Allen.

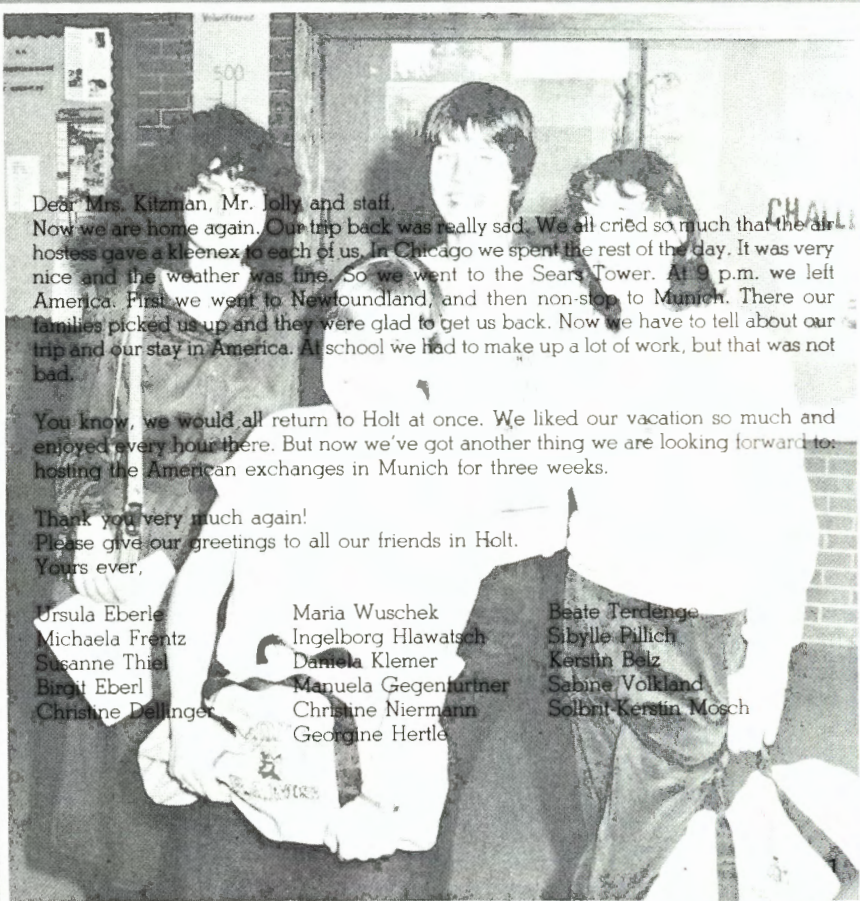


FRIENDS AROUND THE WORLD

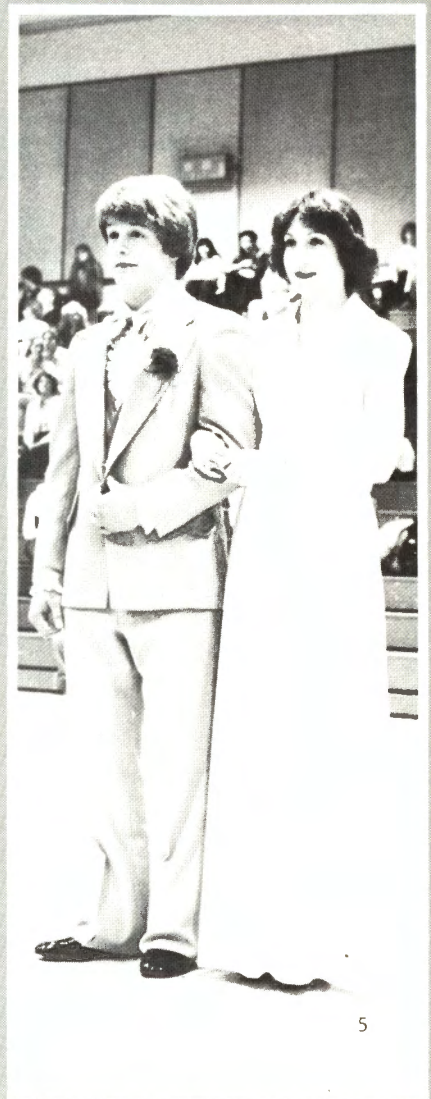
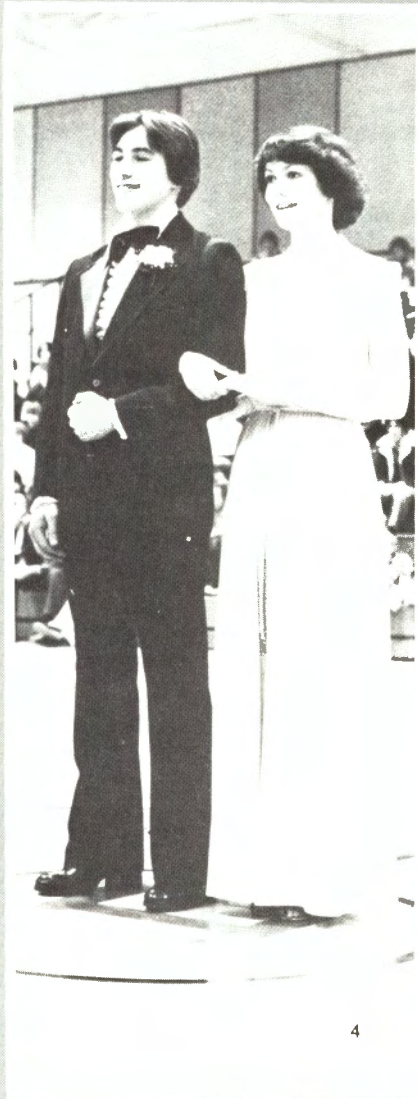
After the game, everyone danced to music by 'Target', and then watched a second presentation of the court where the king and queen announced the winners of the Pep Week contests.

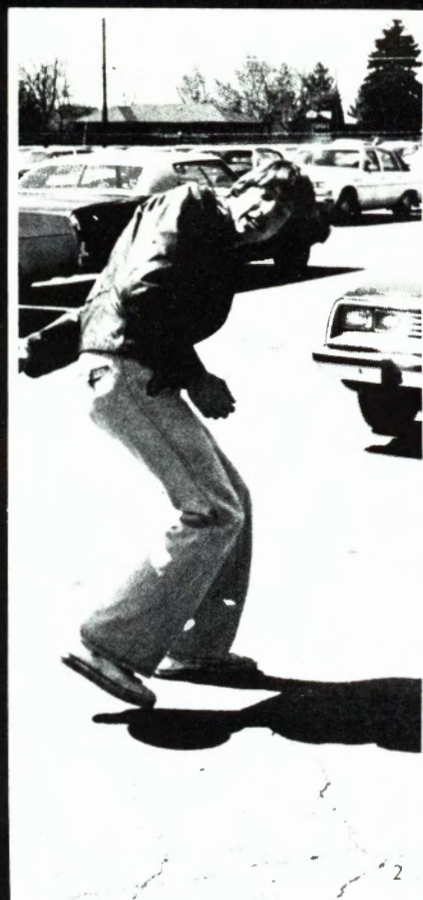
THEIR SECOND SCHOOL

Well, I would like to extend that message a little further for students who will be attending Holt in the years to come.

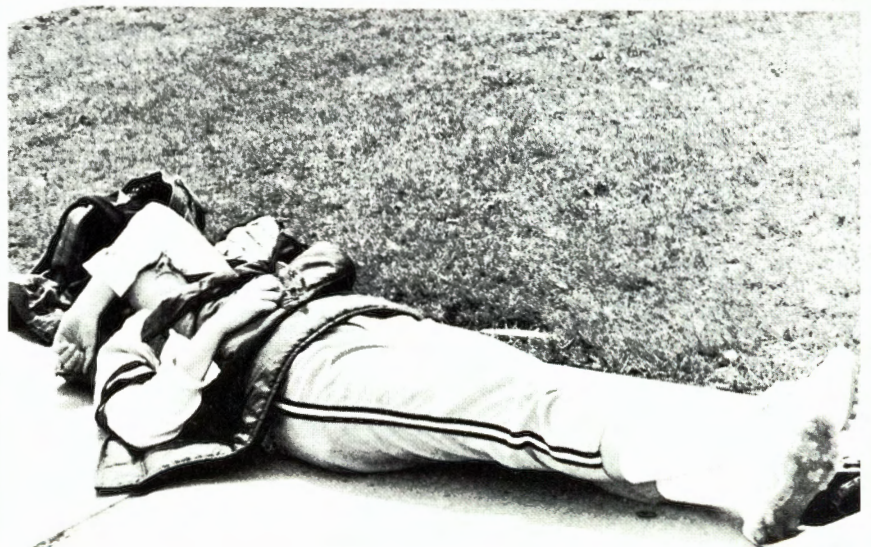
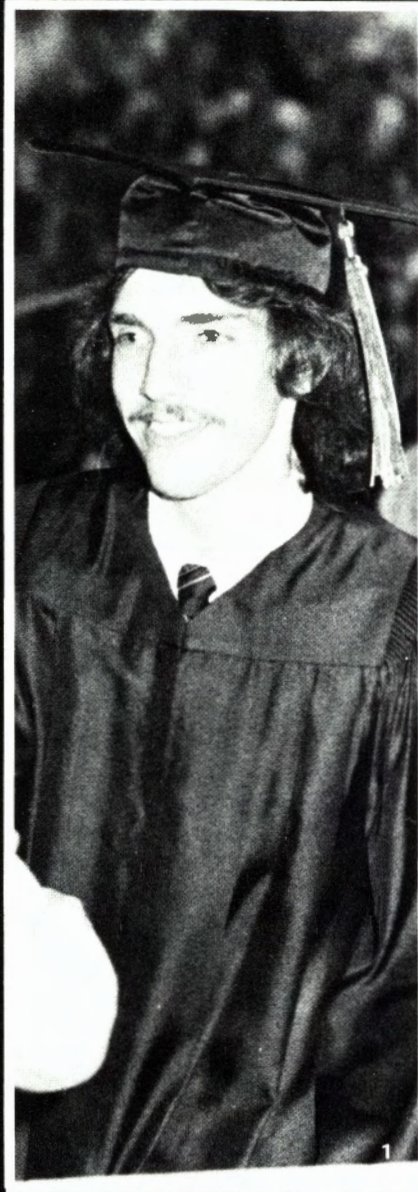
I sit here and wonder whether students of the future will remain stagnant within the walls of their cliques or if they will branch out and include all types of individuals.

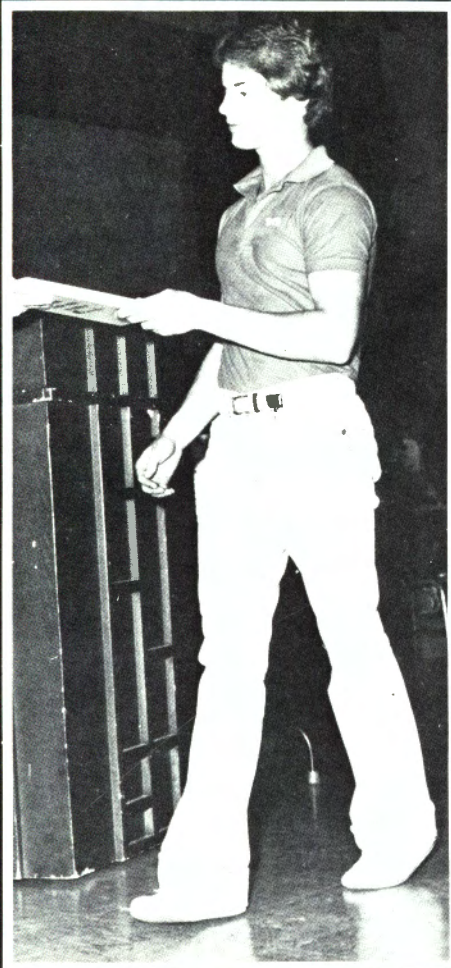
Eighty five senior letter winners and the spring varsity athletes were recognized at the annual Sports Assembly, May 28.

We have a good teaching staff. I enjoy seeing students develop . . . it's a joy to see them grow. I plan to stay in education as long as I see progress."

Does he have enough dealings with students — or is he an all-paperwork administrator? "I don't have enough contact with students . . . definitely not. That's one reason I moved the office from the other end of the building. It is hard to socialize as often because of the nature of the job."

What does the "boss" do in his spare time? "I play racquetball and do some art work. I also have two children with whom I like to spend a lot of time."

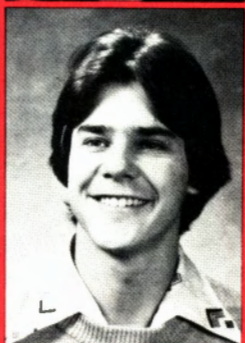
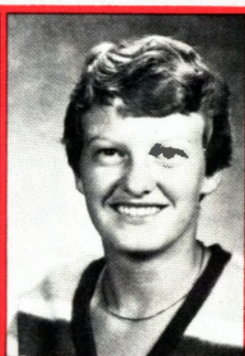
As seniors, the girls wore Calvin Klein jeans and cowl neck sweaters as in the past, but styles did change enough so we had a look of the 1980's.

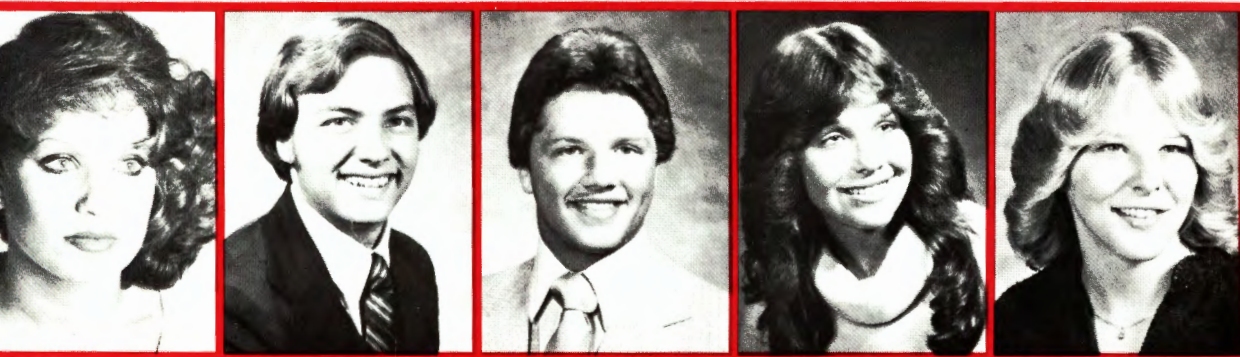


SENIORS STRIKE

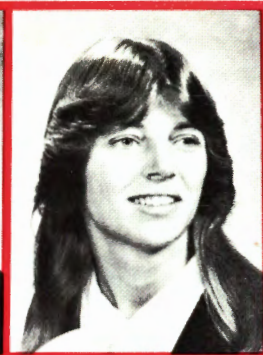
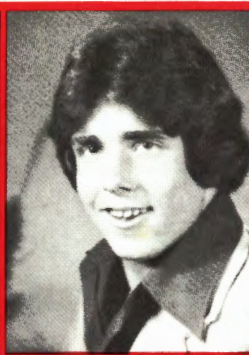
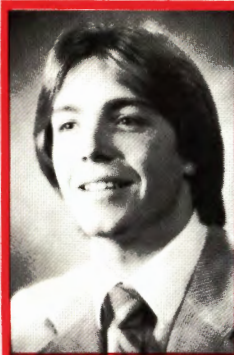
WORLD WAR ... IT'S NOT FOR US

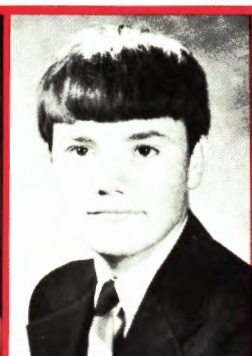
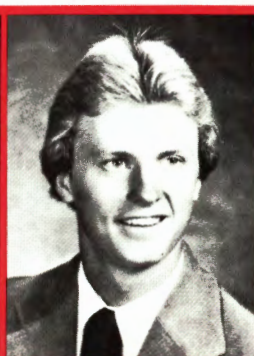
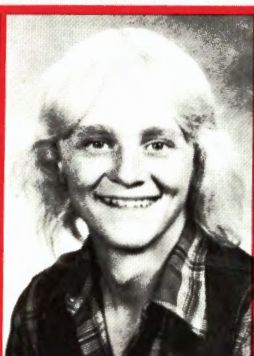
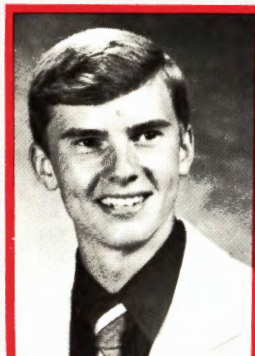
The majority of the class had their senior pictures taken by Powell Studios, and photos were delivered early in December. We spent the Christmas season exchanging with both classmates and teachers.

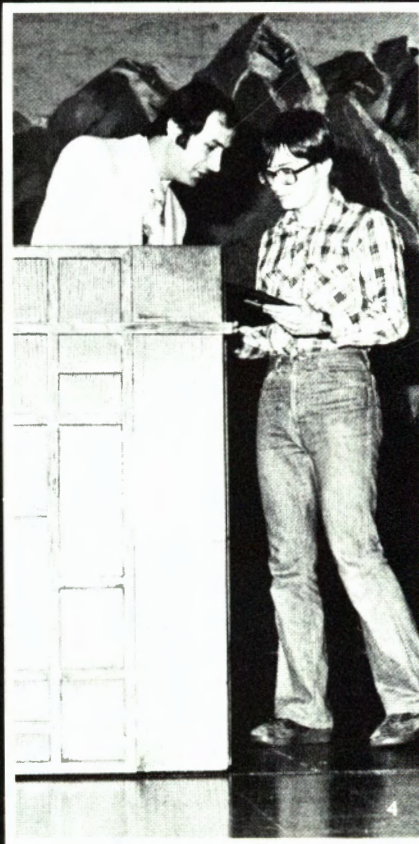
A MOST HONORABLE NIGHT

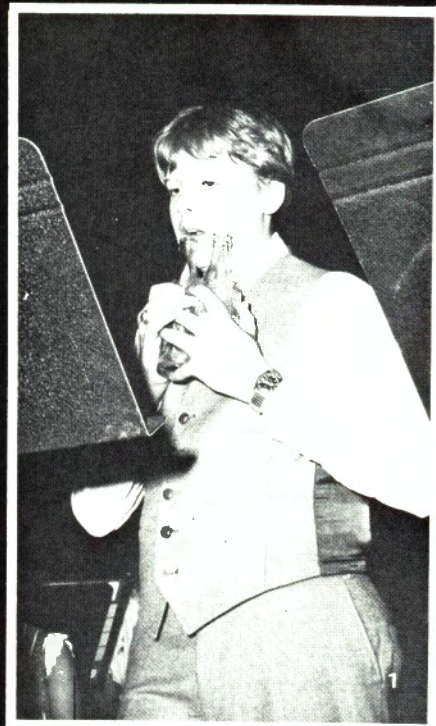
FOOD FOR THOUGHT

After studying for countless hours over the past four years, the Top 10 and 3.5 students were honored at catered dinners and banquets sponsored by the Board of Education.

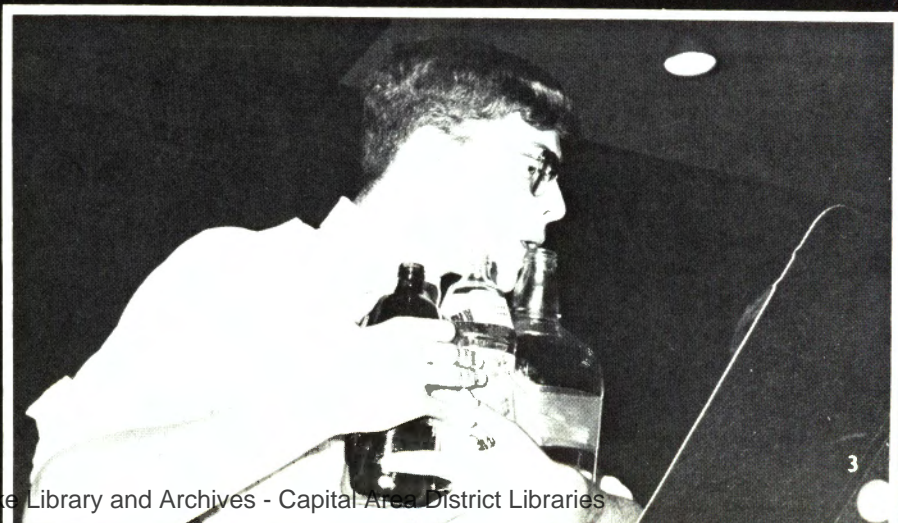

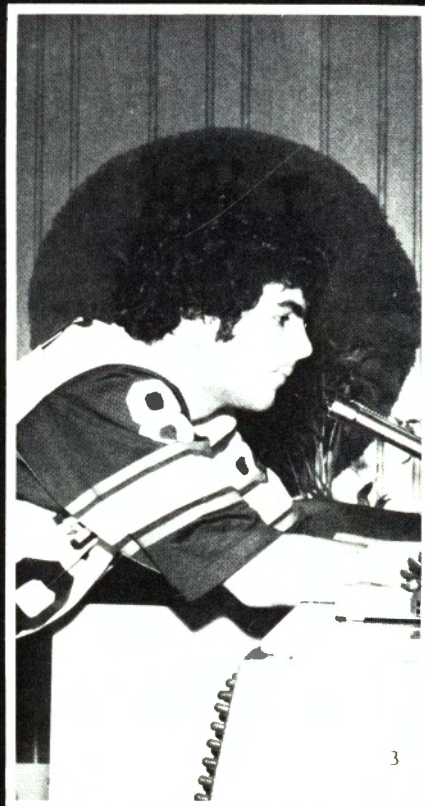

Because of the addition of Mrs. Hammond, the center was open to students all day long throughout the school week.

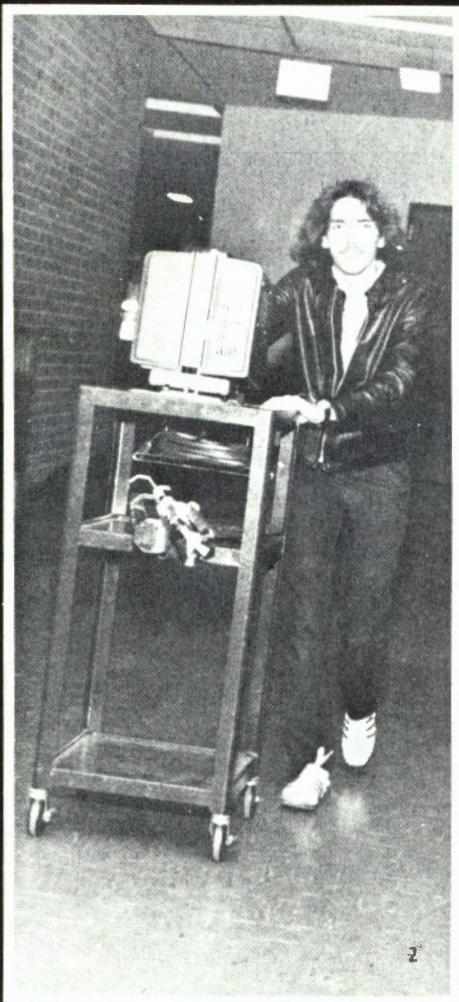
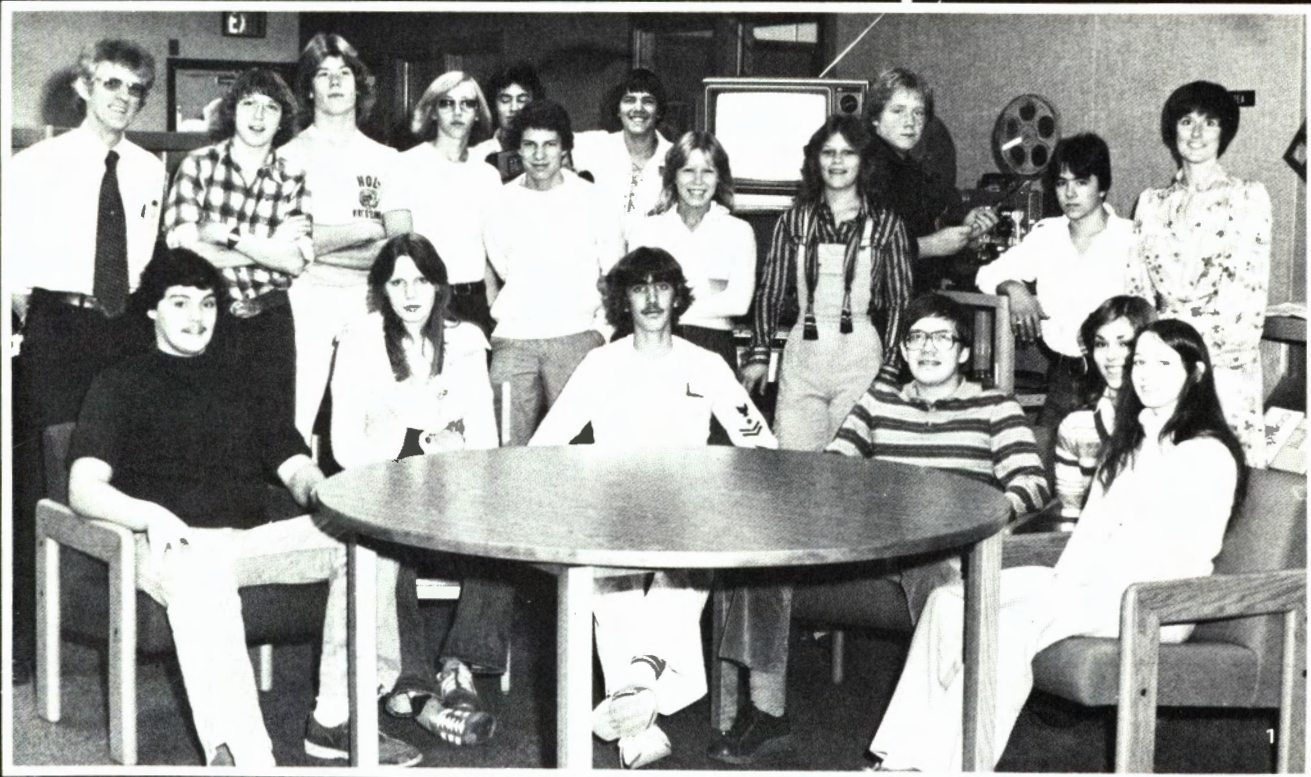

The band and Mr. Jerry Winters helped to celebrate spring with their annual Kiwanis Concert March 26 and their Pops-Cabaret Concert May 21.

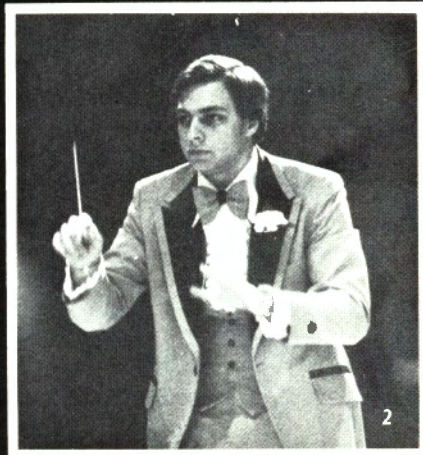
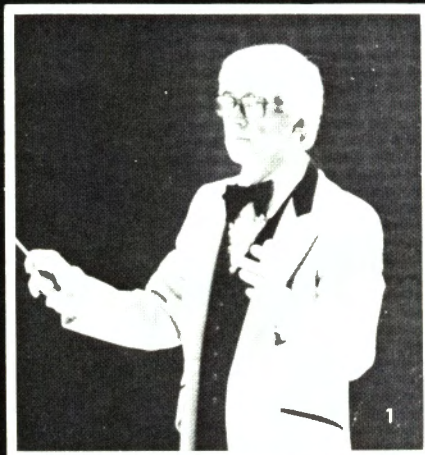

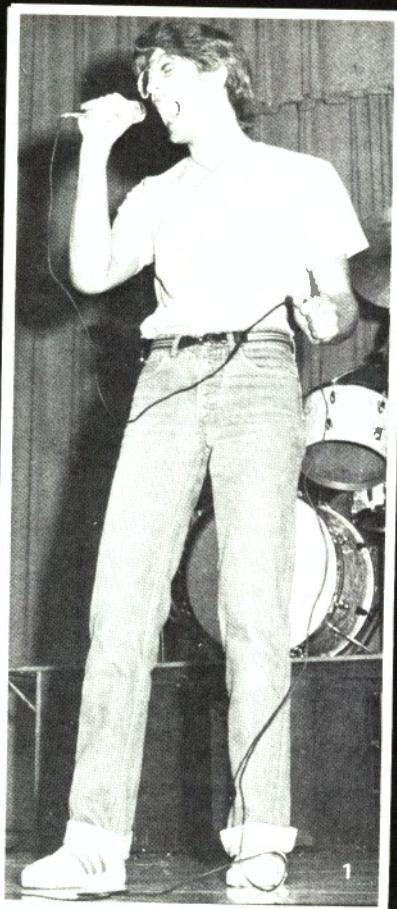
FRIDAY MORNING FEVER

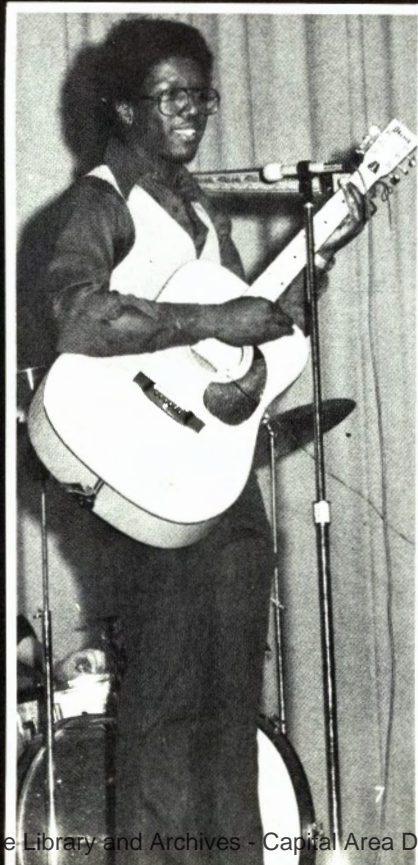
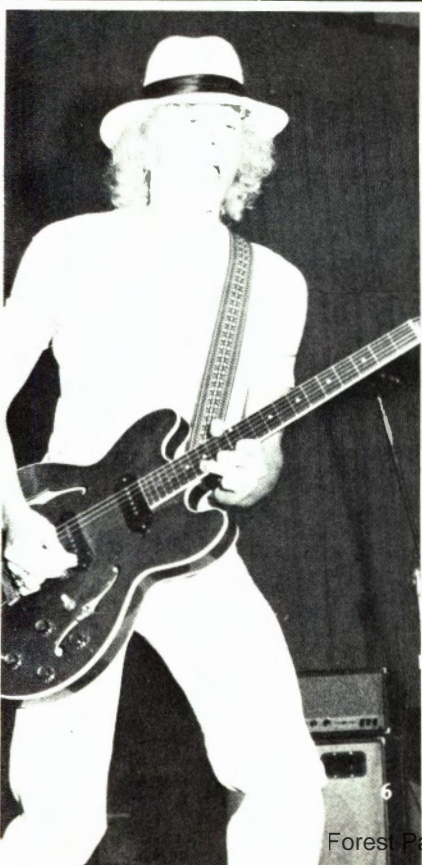
They could have slept in, but students packed the auditorium for the annual Variety Show where seven acts entertained for over an hour on June 6, the last official day of school.

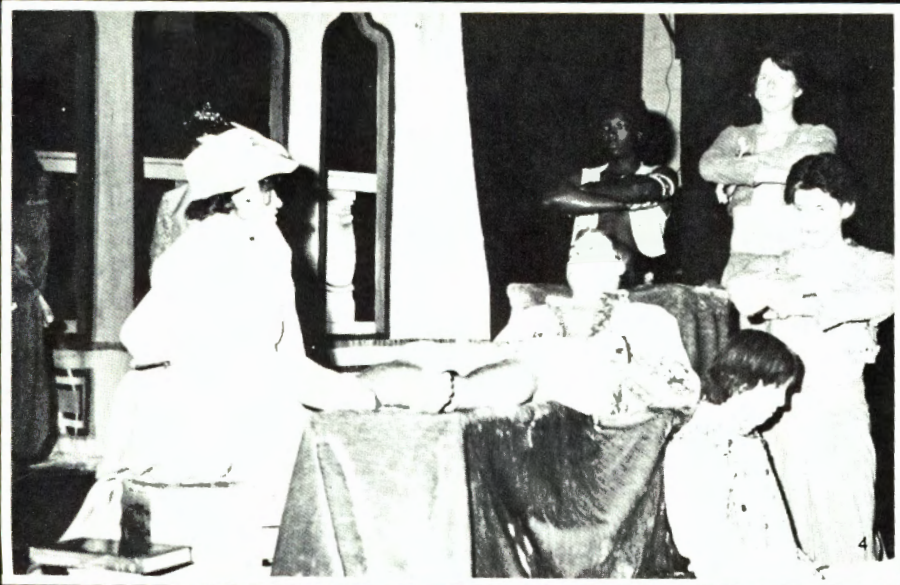
A nameplate with the inscription "Dad" was given to Mr. Allen on opening night. Closing night also brought flowers, hugs and tears.

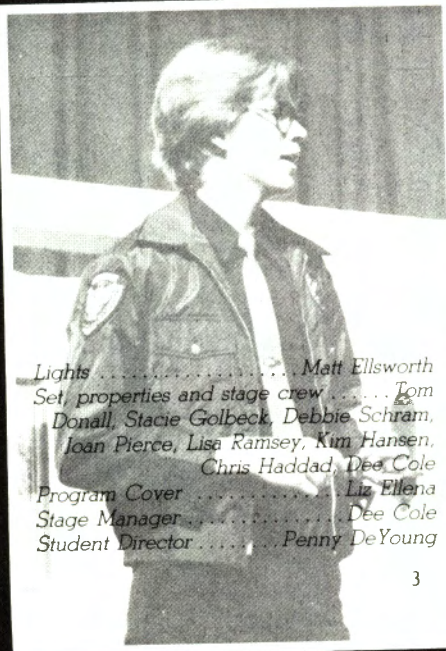

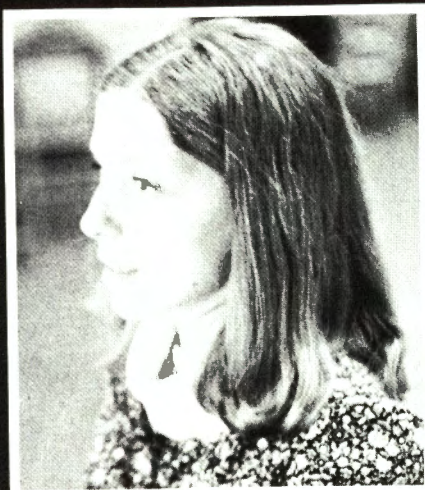
