HOLD ON, ROLL ON




SUMMERFEST RIDES ATTRACT STUDENTS



UP AND DOWN


Oh no, not another lecture. There is nothing worse than a full hour lecture on those days when you can't stay awake.

For most, learning and teaching was "work", but seeing growth and feeling proud kept both students and teachers rolling on



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


"I GIVE UP." Matt Doran attempts one of Mr. York's "impossible" problems.







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LOOKING UP TO WHAT'S HAPPENING

US INVADES GRENADA

A small island in the Carribean stole the attention of many as US Marines invaded Grenada on Oct. 25, 1983. President Reagan sent troops to rescue the 1,000 American Medical students who feared being held hostage by pro-Cuban factions during the attempted take over the existing Grendian government. Most Americans agreed the rescue mission was necessary but differed if whether or not the mission was also a political move.

OVER 200 MARINES KILLED IN LEBANON

Sunday was normally a day of rest, but on Oct. 23 many Marines were digging through rubble hoping to find one more survivor. Less than two miles away and twenty seconds after the Beirut-International Airport explosion, a similar event took place at the French paratroopers's building. The French toll stood at 56 dead, 15 injured and two missing. This double act of horror left questions about the US Peacekeepers' role in the troubled country, Lebanon.

FIVE HOUR DAY

Holt High School cut back to a five hour day making the school day significantly shorter. School was dismissed at 1:55 p.m. and 10 minutes were added to lunch. Not many students complained. The early dismissal time allowed more time for homework, athletic practices and after school jobs. The disadvantages arose during scheduling. Class selections were reduced and so were the number of classes fitting into the day. For many students this meant loosing an elective that may have added extra enjoyment or challenge into their school day.

'BALTIMORE WINS WORLD SERIES

This year's World Series was different from the past. The first game had no walks, which has never happened before in a series. There were more bean balls thrown than usual causing a bit of hostility between the Phillies and the Baltimore Orioles. The Orioles kept pushing, and because they pushed they won.

KOREAN AIRLINER SHOT DOWN

On Sept. 1, 1983 there was a brutal attack in the sky. A 747 Korean Passenger Airliner was targeted and shot down by a soviet fighter plane. It was said that the Soviet pilot couldn't distinguish if it was a commercial jet or an American radar plane, the RC-135.

The shooting was denied at first by the Soviets, but later they openly admitted to the horrifying act. The death toll reached a frightening 269, 61 were Americans. Much mourning and anger was felt around the world.


JAMES G. WATT

In July, 1983 Anthony Carter led the new Michigan Panthers Football Team to victory over the Philidelphia Stars. The newly formed United States Football League completed its first seasor of play.

No one expected the rush on the Cabbage Patch Kids, least of all Coleco. But right before Christmas there was a huge demand for these ugly but cute dolls. They had reached into the hearts of millions and definitely their pocket books. The dolls, sold originally, for \$25 but sometimes reached as much as \$150. Many people waited in lines outside stores for as long as 14 hours. One person even went all the way to London to get a doll for his five-year-old child.



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
BEGINNING WITH COACHES ENDING WITH WINNERS



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SLOW SEASON











At districts the Holt girls played to their best ability but lost a close game to Grand Ledge. Senior Janet Fish received the Most Valuable Player Award.


TWO SHOTS Teresa Glynn displays her skill at the free-throw line.


JUMP BALL Starting the game is 5 foot 10 inch Sue Kukulka.



















Excitement wasn't always in the crowds, the players enjoyed the competition too. "I like playing a good team in front of a large crowd," commented senior Dan Knechtel. "I play for the competition and I like representing our school on the court." junior Scooter. Troph added, "The most exciting thing about playing Varsity basketball is just to win, wins at Holt haven't been very plentiful in recent years, but just to win is exciting."

According to the coaches, the game of basketball was important to them also. "I enjoy the opportunity and challenge of competing against the very best players and teams in the state of Michigan," remarked Head Coach Bob Simmons. Assistant Coach Bruce Larner added, "I appreciate having the opportunity to work with the Varsity. It is a good experience for me, hopefully it will help me in getting a coaching position at a higher level."

This year's Boys' Varsity Basket-ball Team improved greatly in the number of wins and points scored, ending the season with a 6-14 record over last year's 2-20. Tropf scored a total of 311 points, an average of 15.6 points per game, with Don Garchow as second highest scorer with a total of 203 points total and 9.7 points average per game.






BUILDING TEAMWORK







The team ended the season with a 2-6 dual meet record, placing seventh in the CAC.








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"A" EFFORT PAYS OFF

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HARD WORK IS KEY TO VICTORY













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YOUTHFUL STARTERS GAIN EXPERIENCE



"Winning the Mason invitational for the second year in a row was the high point of the season," concluded Coach Cory.






IT PAYS OFF

















Then there were also the clerical assistants. The Office would have had an awful time operating without them. They answered phones, handed out passes and collected attendance sheets.













Thanks to the Band, Holt High School experienced another spirited Homecoming and football season.








Putting smiles on faces is what Ramsingers was all about. The group of 18 singers performed before groups ranging from elementary students to senior citizens.

"Our year was fantastic," concluded Coach Duling," Working and learning with the squad was a very rewarding experience for me. I look forward to working with everyone again next year."








The setting was the living room of the Old Brewster home in Brooklyn, New York, during a late afternoon in September, 1941. This event was reinacted by Holt High School students in the Pernert Auditorium on an evening in November, 1983. This mystery, well known to audiences, brought out a good crowd.

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


"Friends are friends forever if the Lord's the lord of them. And a friend will not say never though the welcome will not end," was the continuation of the Baccalaureate theme.


FINAL TIMES
