




IT'S ABOUT TIME



hung out with my friends and played a game or two of cards," explained junior Manuel Garcia.







Other people weren't too impressed with the crafty style. "My book bag is a


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


seeing my friends everyday, especially the ones I don't see too often out of school." commented Meaghann Beck.

Mr. Northrup has had first place teams in the past, and this year was no exception. This year's winning team consisted of Arlo Elv. Lisa Clark, Michelle Mazner, Ethan Sustaita, and team captain Dan

Reinecke. They earned \$247, 682.79 and the biggest stock gain came from Brooke Corporation at \$91,107.

Of course, with all the winners there must be losers. And this year, Holt stood out with the winning and last place team. Lead by team captain Matt Bahr, this group captured slot 171 and earned \$5,319.

Any student who enters this contest or the real thing should be prepared for the hard times of the economy and the ups and downs of the stock market. Any help that tney can get along the way, students found most welcome. No one wanted to lose hard earned cash or even the gifted margin money handed out in Consumer Economics classes.


exam with and pay them off." Whether or not Schalter passed any of his exams last semester probably depended on the honesty, or total lack thereof, of his teachers.



















One of their most honorable victories was also one of their hardest fought against the Black Dogs. Glencoe United

















By year's end, Tara Fowler had concluded about the two groups' service focus, "How can giving be difficult when you bring joy into other people's lives?"











Being a PAL brought me closer to my peers. We had a good time; it's not always so serious as it seems," responded junior Liz Ribby.

Many of the people who lent their time and energy to the organization, and rode on the PAL's float, agreed that being in the club was rewarding in every way. Junior Abby Feguer reflected, "I think PAL's make a difference around the school. I wanted to be a PAL to help people have an easier time in high school. 


They got creative and busy filling the gap between what schools could provide and the difference needed to make programs and events a reality.

The book's 224 pages were printed on 100 pound enamel stock in 10 point Times for body copy and 8 point Times for captions. Process Color was used on 24 pages of the senior portrait section with spot color applications in Maroon, Ochre and Ultra Blue. Ochre and Colonial Blue were used in the Opening. Represented by Dave Loney, the book was printed in Shawnee Mission, Kansas by Herff Jones, Inc.

The book was programmed in Pagemaker 6.0 on Macintosh 7200's and submitted on disk to the printer. Lending programming assistance were staff members DeJuan Parker, Laurie Morse, Eileen Briggs and former staff member Lesley Gottschalk. The 1998 Rampages received a Spartan Award from the Michigan Interscholstic Press Association in state judging.






