



Throughout the years, Holt as a school, as well as a community, has flourished. The improvements to the once small farm town have included the expansion of the population, invasion of new businesses, and the construction of new buildings. One of the most publicized improvements that Holt has experienced is the addition of a new, technologically advanced high school. The school will include wireless communication abilities, touch screens, teacher projection stations, more computer labs, along with numerous other futuristic capabilities that will allow students and faculty to function more efficiently. Besides the technology of the new school, the commons-centered building will feature a two story academic wing with double presentation rooms, an indoor track, an eight lane Olympic size swimming pool and an overall more productive environment. 



Whether or not you approve of tattoos and piercings for high school students or anyone else, you will more than likely see them walking down the halls or streets of Holt for many years to come.














After collecting pieces from both semesters, students were able to display their artwork. "The fair was fun and entertaining," recalled sophomore Pete Samuelson.
















In Mixed Company





The gun goes off; the sea of runners sprints from the starting line. At the mile mark, the boys begin to kick it in. The pace quickens and the opposition can't stay with them. By the time they hit the mile and a half mark, the race is theirs. Step by step they increase their speed, way out in front of the rest, to finish one right after another in first place through twelfth place against Everett and Sexton. This is just one example of the dominance of the boys cross country team.

This was truly the year of the Ram. The boys cross country team had a very strong 2000 season. The running Rams had several accomplishments, including winning two invitationals of more than 12 teams (Battle Creek Lakeview and Mason).

At the Haslett Invitational, only one out of 18 schools beat the Rams, and that team was Detroit Catholic Central, who took third in the state meet.

The mighty Holt Rams were number two in the conference, with only the fifth ranked Comets of Grand Ledge ahead of them. At the Greater Lansing Championship meet, the Rams took forth out of the thirty-seven teams. Toward the end on the seasons the boys were ranked in the top twenty in the state for three weeks in a row.

But despite great accomplishments, there were a few down points to this season. The Rams missed state finals by one place at the regional final. "In my career I've had ten different teams go to the state meet. This is the fifth or sixth best team that I've ever had, and they didn't make it to state finals. That goes to show you what a tough region they had," remarked coach Jerry Gillett, an accomplished cross country and track coach of 31 years.

Senior Mark McGarry stated, "It was frustrating to go to watch state finals and know that there were 10 - 15 teams there that we had already beaten or would beat." Mark missed state finals by 5 places, despite running a 16:57, just 14 seconds off of his personal best. However, junior Derek Dell qualified for state finals individually with a time of 16:33 and ran his second best time of 16:43 at states. Other near misses for states were junior Mike McClure and senior Dale Vow-

The els. Mike commented, "We had to have five guys around 17:00 in order to go to state finals." McClure and Vowels

"This was came very close, both under the fifth 17:10.

The top seven, or the varsity runners, this year were: Derek Dell, Mark McGarry, Mike McClure, Chad Wilson, Dale Vowels, Mike Stowe, and Justin Detmers. Despite injuries to Detmers and Wilson, the team was successful and close knit.

In the 99' and 00' seasons the guys' cross country team only had a total of two' losses. This should speak to the way that Holt has continued with its tradition of good distance runners. Depth was the true key to Holt's success. They had eight different runners run under 18:00 minutes. And another four or five on the junior varsity team that were under 18:15. The junior varsity team was led by sophomore Tommy Jones, junior Mike Hefty, sophomore Mike Fobbe, and freshman Alex Michler, and won two invitationals and placed very high in every other showing. These underclassmen would have been varsity runners at nearly any other school. In the years to come Coach Gillett can look forward to strong, promising pro-





was in attendance to watch his "boys," Jack Scott and Joe Zolnai, win their state titles.












The JV team also competed once before C.A.C.s. The team traveled to Macomb to perform against some tough competition.





At the dual meet against Sexton and Everett, senior Stefanie Schrauben beat her own school record as she cleared 9-9 and won the pole vault. "This performance earns Stefanie elite status in the vault, as few women in the area have gone this high," said Rarick. Schrauben also took third at the Honor Roll meet.

The end of the season brought many new surprises for the lady Ram runners. Melissa Ballard had an outstanding first place finish at the state meet in the shot put. Kelly Robinson yet again broke her records in the one and two mile races finishing fifth and sixth respectively. Nicole Daggy also had a surprise overall sixth place rating, from finishing third in the second fastest heat of the 400 meter run. It was overall a great year to be a Lady Ram Track and Field team member!





Special Olympics












