










Honors Choir competed at Regionals. 11 students qualified for the State competition.


Senior **Chris Gillespie** earned the rank of Eagle Scout.








#### We've Got Talent



Amanda Becker said. "I had to embrace this year and let go of some of the traditions from other years."


The team was able to use the new intensity and will be able to grow for years to come.







Although they didn't make it far in the state tournament, the boys planned to work hard to prevent injuries and make it further in upcoming seasons.











"It was one of the greatest experiences I've had in tennis," senior **Robert Hull said**. "Being a part of school history means a lot to me."



"We joke around a lot and we have fun," junior **Justin Green** said.



"It really helped us and the younger players to see things being broken down and to help us bond," Houser said.





After games, everyone was invited out to dinner as an effort to fuse the excitement of both teams. With three graduating seniors on the










The seniors got to participate in their final home games and performances while simultaneously preparing for prom, and their graduation coupled with open houses.

"It's just been a lot of change, which isn't always bad," senior **Maria Williams** said. "There's been a lot of shuffling around and it's been distracting."


Even with all these distractions, the seniors were excited to move forward with their future plans, while the other Holt High School students move one year closer to the end.











"We have senior and junior led practices to help build up the confidence of the team," junior **Paul Schalau** said. "We're doing this in hopes to make the best lacrosse team vet."









Senior **Cara Orth** always has one main focus while playing tennis; to get the ball over the net. As she backhands the ball, she sends it over.

















Its helps some excel into their career path but it also helps some students notice that they might want to take a different route, like senior **Lauren Voss.** 

"I thought cooking was really interesting, but then I realized it wasn't really what I wanted to do," Voss said.

Giving students the chance to try different paths is one of the important parts of Capital Area Career Center. Most students don't get the opportunity to test out a Career. Students get one step ahead of the rest of their class just by taking a few classes in Career Center.

Being a part of the program had its cons as well. Students missed three hours of their day to attend these classes. Students missed out on day to day life as a high school student, however they were given the opportunity to explore careers that others don't get.



They ended up loading Zack into the ambulance, which at the time, did not have a heartbeat. We learned later that they did get one on the way to the hospital."

Deb and Jane weren't the only heroes that day. Senior **Kiel Oates** was also there for the rescue. Kiel and Zack were on their way to their car heading for the Career Center when Zack collapsed. Kiel ran so fast to the attendance office to get help that one of his leg braces couldn't take it and broke under pressure.

"If I could say anything to Deb, Jane and Kiel, I'd say thank you for your fast actions to save me, and for all the visits I got from Kiel in the hospital," Rauchholz said.

"All I was thinking was that I couldn't let another parent bury their child," Deb said. "As I was doing the compressions on Zack, all I could see was my

own son's face when I knew he had died. I know he was there in spirit with me when I was helping Zack."


