















"If you're cutting a lot of weight before a tournament, you're going to be drained the next day," sophomore **Emilio Pupo-Rivera** said.

























Players such as sophomore **Jesse Heikkinen** took the rough season as a learning experience.




















"The most interesting thing was how things in other countries are different and learning what's normal in one country and not in another," senior **Samuel Lagunas** said.



COLOR GUARD


