












BELIEVE THERE IS HOPE FOR A CURE

"Special Olympics has played a significant role in many Holt kids' and young adults' lives," para-educator **Sally Meade** said. Special Olympics changed student's lives by giving them something to look forward to during the school year for them to participate in. This gave them a goal to accomplish. Special Olympics allowed kids with an intellectual disability, a cognitive delay or a developmental disability of all ages to participate in various sports that they may not have been able to do with their traditional high school teams.

"There are twenty-two sports offered and over 20,000 athletes that participate in the state of Michigan alone. There are six state level competitions, four district tournaments, and more than four-hundred competitions statewide," **Meade** said. Special Olympics is a statewide club/group, Holt alone participated in at least eight Special Olympic events, including flag football, basketball, track and field,





Taber liked to wear neutral colors, like taupe and beige. "I get most of my clothes from Forever 21 and American Eagle," Taber said.









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














DESPITE THE RACKET




that the kids can understand better from us than a teacher because we are closer in age," Ostrowski said.


















ONE BUCKET AT A TIME



buzzer system is used. 
Many of the nominees shared two characteristics: hard work and kindness. "My work whic, this year I've been working hard," senior Monica Pham said.

"You remember what you did and the experience of doing something, which is a lot easier to remember than something you just wrote down," junior **Alexandra Brayton** said.


These unique labs are only experienced due to science courses here at school. A whole new world is opened up to students and they get a front row seat to get their hands dirty with work.


Cottom showed what true dedication could really do for a team







I made friends with them and I get to talk to them and go on outings. Blowing is my favorite" senior Darien Jackson. Jackson has used LINKS for three years.

As a LINKS you set an example for the people watching you. Man took that challenge head on. "I love being a role model for my LINKS because it helps me become a better person. Knowing someone is watching me I try to do my best," senior Davon Walls said. Unlike many streets downtown the LINKS effect is no one-way street.


















SWING FOR ONE, SWING FOR ALL






made it," senior Taylor Jenks said. Being








scared at first, being the only freshman on the team, but with this team they made me feel like family," freshman Rylee Stiles said. As the team grew from the already


familiar seniors to a combination of underclassmen and seniors, they accomplished a unified, communicative team that supported each other on and off the court. "I've known the other seniors since





New coach changes the future of Holt football




Although there were many challenging games, the team believed that they would come through in the seasons ahead. "I think with him as head coach, Holt football will do big things in the future," **Gray** said.


