|deology aside, many agree the 2016 United States presidential election yielded one of the most divisive, unique election years of our lifetimes. Not only did Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton present different policy, but they, along with primary candidates presented themselves in vastly different manners that sparked an interest in politics among Holt High School students. For the first time ever, students voted, campaigned, volunteered, donated, protested, engaged in political debates, and found themselves in the political realm.
"Kids who weren't able to vote did a lot of spreading the word and spreading their beliefs through signs, discussing opinions, and doing other stuff. That is probably the best thing people can do if they're not able to vote" sophomore Ayden Soupal said. Soupal and other students who were unable to vote found different ways to interact with their candidates, including attending rallies. Bernie Sanders and Donald Trump both held local rallies that multiple students attended, encouraging them to expand their political views and share those views with other students and peers. "It was a lot more of a priority to go to rallies when the general election became neck and neck" Soupal said. This often sparked political debates among students.
"I tried not to get too mad at people, but the only time I get in arguments is when somebody is being directly disrespectful towards someone or mean for no reoson, but most of the time it's trying to understand where they're coming from" senior Kathryn Morris
said. Arguments on policy among students were not only found in classrooms but also on social media. For example, when senior Dylan Reich called feminism the "biggest joke/cancer of our society," with the hashtag \#factsss, it caused a political uproar on Twitter. Many students, including seniors Nicole Hefty and Madeline Bennett, rebutted his argument and argued that his opinion is not a fact, but simply his opinion. Rights among women and underrepresented communities were a vital component of the 2016 election and often was the reoson many students became politically engaged and supported their candidates.
"My big thing was human equality. I don't care about your gender, who you identify as, what sex you're attracted to, or what race you are. We're all human and that's my big message to everyone, regardless of your party. Bernie and Hillary stood for that message. Trump just went against my whole ideology of human equality which is why I wasn't a supporter of his whatsoever, " Soupal said. Social issues attracted many students to become involved in the election, because regardless of age many knew they could influence how Plonned Parenthood and the Environmental Protection Agency are funded, whether or not the Dakota Access Pipeline is built, rights of the LGBT community, or even healih care reform that affects millions. "I'm happy that they just came out with this new healthcare bill that's going to repeal and replace ObamaCare," senior Alex Anderson said. As a former Jill Stein supporter, Anderson became fond of Trump postelection due to his
strong economic and immigration proposed policies and Trump's near immediate delivery of action on these policies. On his first day in office, Trump rolled back many Affordable Care Act regulations, which excited many but devastated others.
"I think that this years election was good for our country, even though it put a deep divide between people with differing opinions," senior Elise Richards said. Upon walking in the double doors of the high school the day after the election, tensions ran high. Students and teachers were filled with joy, anger, tears, and anxiety for the four forthcoming years. This was the first time many realized the significance of the executive office and how the presidency affects the lives of billions. The country wos in a state of disbelief, which is evident with Trump having one of the lowest approval ratings of all time of an incoming president. "We still have four years and he still has a lot do, and people's opinions of him could change," Anderson said.

## FUNDING VS. FUNDRAISING

Playing whiffle ball or throwing a football around in the backyard was how most children spend their childhood. From a young age, playing sports was a form of pastime. Through elementary school and middle school, playing a variety of sports taught kids how to be an acceptable teammate and to learn to love being active and playing sports. "Sports are important because they teach us the value of teamwork and resilience at an early age. It also helps with confidence," senior Elie Anid said.

By the time freshman year of high school rolled around, most student athleres knew what specific sport, or sports that they'd play. Buying the basic equipment and appropriate clothing for the sport was just the beginning of the fees. The pay-to-play fee, the apparel, and the gas to drive to away games began to add up quickly.

To help cover these costs, most teams held fundraisers. Selling coupon cards, collecting pop cans, and selling food items were among the common approaches. Many athletes were asked to sell at least 15 coupon books, or collect three bags of pop cans from their family. Offen times, students struggled to meet those requirements because of their financial situation, thus affecting the amount of money the team hod to spend. "I think fundraising is helpful to bring in extra money, but I don't think it should be their main source of income," sophomore Morgan Schramm said.

Aside from fundraising and accepting donations, the school provided a sum of money to the sports teams. For larger sports, like football, their check from the school was typically bigger because of ail the costs they had to cover, however, that only covered a fraction of the costs. Purchasing new jerseys,
buying footballs, paying referees, and paying coaches only amounted to part of the total costs. "I believe more money isn't directed towards athletics because if one program gets a large amount of money from the school to buy new uniforms or something, it would seem unfair to the other programs. It would be easier for the school to distribute small amounts towards all programs," senior Marshall Miller said.

Others believe that focusing the money on improving the school and purchasing supplies was a priority. High school sports wouldn't exist without the high school itself. By directing the money to academic-related costs, the school was able to stay running smoothly. All athletes have heard the speech from their coaches emphasizing the importance of academics coming before athletics. The phrase "studentathlete" is in that parlicular order for a reason. "I think they try to focus on academics first and making sure we have a nice school," senior

## Rebecca Rose said.

The pay-to-play fee is a common cost that high school athletics require for their athletes. Each athlete at Holt was required to pay a $\$ 150$ fee prior to their season starting. Volleyball players and female golfers paid their fees in the fall, while boys lacrosse and softball players paid their's in the spring. The pay-to-play fee helped cover basic fees such as transportation and paying coaches. For multi-sport athletes, they were required to pay the cost once. Aside from the monetary value, the title of the cost is misleading. Many believed that the cost should be labeled as a participation fee opposed to pay-to-play. "Yes and no, I think that it's essential that players pay to play because it benefits the school as a whole, but I also believe that the school still
needs to get [additional] money somehow," junior Chase Stewart said.

Year after year, various Holt sport teams succeeded. The wrestling team defeated Battle Creek Lakeview to win their 30th straight district title, the volleyball and basketball teams won their districts, and baseball competed for their third consecutive district title. Despite the success of our teams, the amount of money given did not change. Equipment would still be needed and transportation would still be a necessity. "I think we should spend more money to fund teams that do well in their compelition. I don't see the point in giving extra money to a program that fails year in and year out," senior Andrew Hall said.

As a form of fundraising, the sports that attract large crowds required a five dollar admission fee into the game. Many fall and winter sports required this fee. These costs could have gone directly to the team itself or could have circulated back to the school's funds. At the beginning of the school year, a season pass was available to students to purchase for thirty dollars. This card allowed students to get into any home sporting event with a flash of their card. While the initial cost was a lot up front, it paid off in the long run. The five dollar admission fee often drove students away and discouraged them from coming to the game. "I think [the five dollar admission fee] prevents people from going, and maybe lowering the fee would help," Rose said.

## TRADITIONAL CALENDAR VS BALANCED CALENDAR

A possible school calendar change for all of Holt Public Schools was a popular topic among the community. School administrators had been hinting at possibly converting all schools in the district to the balanced calendar school schedule, rather than the traditional calender that had been enforced for years. The balanced calendar schedule was designed to reduce the amount of months off in the summer and give students and staff more periodic breaks during the school year. This meant, for instance, school would start earlier in August rather than September, and instead of four days off for a midwinter break, there would be an entire week off. So what did students prefer? A longer summer or more breaks during the school year? "I support it [balanced calendar] because it means longer, more frequent breaks during the school year and students wouldn't forget as much information as they did with the traditional colendar," senior Cheyla Westiohn said.

An arguable point in favor of the balanced calendar schedule was students being able to retain information better. They wouldn't have three whole months of summer with no academics. Sometimes those three months made the transition back to school even harder because most students had been
busy doing non-academic activities. "I think a balanced calendar could work in theory, but I prefer the regular school calendar. I like the long summer break and it frees up time for things like club sports or a job," senior Kade Brickey said.

An argument against the balanced calendar was that students wouldn't have enough time to be dedicated to jobs, activities, or go on vacations without their three-month summer. Some believed students needed those three months off to give them a mental break from academics, and instead channel their energy into other activities they may not have been able to do during the school year. Others were torn, and couldn't decide which schedule they would prefer. "I think a balanced calendar allows for more breaks and less people getting 'burned out,' but I also think that because so many things are already built around the traditional schedule, it would be hard for families to adjust," junior Amando Mealy said.

Some of Holt's schools had already adopted the balanced calendar schedule. The elementary schools were the first to try it out, and most recently, the high school leaned toward a balanced calendar schedule by implementing some extra breaks and
beginning the school year earlier, starting in the 2017-18 school year. For families with students in different grade buildings, having their children on two different schedules was a complication. Having all the schools in the district on the same schedule, balanced or traditional, was a preference for most families. "I think it would be beneficial for other schools in our district to have the smae schedule. We would all be on the same time frame when it comes to our breaks," senior Brianne Overly said.

Overall, the debate between which calendar would be the most beneficial for our school district has yet to be resovled. With the administrators taking tiny steps to experiment with the schools' calendar, the next couple of years could bring many changes. While the student body has their own differing opinions, this topic was also commonly dicussed over social media and meetings involving the community. The possible switch of traditional to balanced calendar has already created an ongoing discussion that will continue to be an opportunity for the community to voice their opinion until these changes become final.
