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
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
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









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No Deposit, No Return










Although this years Winter Homecomina didn't have as much excitement and enthusiasm as it was supposed to, it had it's amusina moments.





"Four guys in a band" (Matt McDonald, Clint Luke, Brian McVay, and Sean Seavolt) really rocked the place with their Metallica movement.



The chorale gave another grand performance including solos, duos, and quartets. All of the chorale's astounding voices joined together for an amazing performance of "The Phantom of the Opera."


The Spring Fling was a performance worthy of Leslie High School, and we hope for more of the same next year.









No Turning Back

August 1, 1989. The alarm clock rings at 5:30 in the morning. It's time for me to get up and finish packing my suitcases. I have the last breakfast with my parents and my brother. I look at our house for the last time for a year. Finally at 6:30 we carry the luggage to our car and we are ready to leave.

Silence filled the car from Giessen to the airport in Frankfurt, West Germany. It's only a 30 minute drive but it seemed like a lifetime. I was excited to see what my new home in Leslie was like. I was also excited to see what awaited me.

At the airport I met other exchange students who were also going to Michigan for the year. At 8:30 I heard them announce that it was time to board the

plane headed for New York. It was now time to say good-bye to my family, who I would be without for an entire year. Butterflies filled my stomach when I walked through the gate. Now I knew that I couldn't go back, there was no way. It was exciting to fly only with other exchange students, knowing that we would be living in a country 9 hours away from our own. New families awaited us. Known to us only by a phone call, a letter, and a picture.

Arriving in New York, we had to wait for 5 hours. We then went on to Detroit, where we knew our host families were expecting us. This 2 hour flight was exciting and scary, making the palms of my hands extremely sweaty. Finally, we arrived. We walked through the gates and there were our host

families with welcome signs and balloons. It was great to see.

After I found my host family we went to get my luggage and then it was on to Leslie. By the time we arrived here it was 9:30pm, I had been up for 20 hours and I was so tired. They showed me through the house, in which I would be living for the next year.

So far I've had a great time. I have learned to become more independent and to make my own decisions. I also learned to keep an open mind and accepting a new culture was easy. I would like to thank my host family, the Waldofsky's, and everyone else for letting me have this unforgettable experience.

many classrooms and I didn't know where any of my rooms were.


- ◆ One of my greatest memories is going to be Prom. I had an excellent time there.





The next time you complain about having too much homework, remember that teachers have more than just one assignment to do.





Aides provide a vital role in the day to day running of LHS--and they often work hard doing it.



One third of the students questioned said they have taken a class they thought they were going to like, but ended up hat-


ing it. Many of them said it wasn't the teacher; the class just wasn't for them.








(above) Roseann Barnhill works hard to finish her article to beat the next newspaper deadline in Leslie Pub.


When asked who an outstanding P.A.L. is she began compiling a list. Finally, she sighed thoughtfully, "They're all wonderful."




The requirement for membership in N.H.S. is academic excellence. High-ranking students can become members by invitation only.

A week later a tired and homesick group flew back to Michigan and realized that maybe Leslie isn't that bad.








Kathy Lewis led the Hawks in steals with 79. followed by Michelle Lewis with 57.


Shannon Craft led the Hawks in points with Shana Lubahn shot for 154, and Michelle Lewis totalled 111 points.




Tracy Feazel led the team in steals with 84, followed by Angie Shroufe with 56, and Rachel Hartenburg with 53.





The JV and varsity squads spent hours practicing cheers and creating contests for the pep assemblies. For example, the football players participated in


relay races, such as a piggy back ride, the wheel barrow, and a sack race. Cheerleaders also made signs and pepped up the team and the school.

Both teams showed improvement and hopefully they will form a decent varsity ball team next year.



his year's varsity volleyball team had an extremely rocky road. Even though their record was only 2-13, it doesn't show how hard these ladies worked.





Jessica Poleski commented, "Our team has worked well together, and we all get along. I feel everyone has improved during the season, and we have gone against some real tough teams."







More interest in the wrestling program is needed if Leslie plans to compete with the excellence of past years.



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
Tennis Team





Overall everyone competed well and represented L.H.S. with pride and excellence.



States set aside a day entitled Earth Day to raise people's awareness of environmental concerns.


