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
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New Construction Proves that...



Math Rally



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










NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY

P.A.L.s

P.A.L.s is also known as Peer Assisted Listeners. This group is made up of several students from each class that care about the state of the student body's disciplinary records. The group was started in 1995 and had only 6 members. They had mediations with people who were fighting, or had one-on-one's with people who just needed someone to talk to about their problems. However, since the group was newly formed, not many people knew that P.A.L.s were around.

Since then, the group has expanded: now comprised of over 20 members. The P.A.L.s have taken the school by storm, participating in an average of 3 mediations a week. Anyone caught fighting in school has the option of attending a P.A.L.s mediation in lieu of detention for their first offense. The mediations don't have a 100% success rate, but the results are noticeable. Given time, the P.A.L.s could have a dent in Mr. Droski's disciplinary duties.

The P.A.L.s try to help students find an alternative to their problems, centering on feelings toward the situations rather than anger and discontent over the hassle of talking about it. The P.A.L.s go through a three day training in the summer so they know the best ways to understand the problems they encounter.

Several training sessions are also available to the P.A.L.s during the year on subjects such as stress management and crisis prevention. Many P.A.L.s take advantage of these opportunities to become better listeners.




















