COMING HOME CRAZIES






CHOIR






Still, for a team dominated by freshmen, they had a great year. The freshmen are fired up for next year, as are the sophmores moving to varsity




Still Runnin'




Boys Varsity Basketball



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
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Honors Night




Leigh Ann Frinkle










