


The Spirit

Enduring memories of friendship and good times were developed through participation in school social events. Student-faculty affairs, informal dances, and formal events such as the prom provided a necessary complement to the academic portion of school life.

The extra-curricular activities at Okemos provided students with a means of expressing their personalities in a way which academic activities alone can never do.






A pink dog was given as a door prize. Bill McCloud was the holder of the winning ticket stub.

Mr. Joseph Guertin opened the meeting with a brief talk on the purpose and hopeful gains provided by Career Night.











School Work



The academic spirit of Okemos high school was evidenced during the past year as most students devoted the largest percentage of their classroom hours to solids which formed the core of the college preparatory program. Basic courses in mathematics, science, foreign languages, English, and social studies were augmented by the numerous innovations of modern education. 


Challenge of Responsibility



Ag Classes Raise Farm Animals, Crops









School Sports




One of the most obvious expressions of school spirit was student participation in the athletic program. The development of sportsmanship and a desire to win were both products of a strong school interest in athletics.


Ron Davis. quarterback, tries to round left end during the Okemos-St. Mary's game.
















for Graduation




The class sponsored a dance November 16. Lan-







Looking ahead to future expenses, sophomores sponsored money-making projects to swell their class treasury. They sold cokes and candy from concessions at the basketball games.





Freshmen Adjust to High School Life


Freshman began the school year with a completely new set of subjects and activities. Their orientation to high school was achieved in a variety of ways.


Counselors aided freshmen in scheduling subjects which would be most useful to them. Physical education, English, and Social Studies 9 were required courses for all freshmen.
